January in 1,2,3 Grow By Marcy Kime

This has been an off month with crazy weather and all sorts of colds and viruses going around, leaving us with fewer class days. When we were there, we made the most of it, and it seems many of us were glad to get out of the house and socialize, suffering from a bit of cabin fever!

Parent Council was cancelled in January as was the January Dental Discussion, but we will be back on track in February. We have started a more detailed weekly Kindergarten Readiness schedule every Thursday, now that we are that much closer to our students entering the school next year.

Four of us attended the First 5 Commission Meeting to find out if our grant will be extended for an additional twelve months past June 30th, and they decided the topic needed further discussion at their Executive Council meeting. We hope to hear more on this in the next month or two.

A few people have asked and/or made comments as to why we don't just have a regular preschool/daycare program in which the parents have to pay instead of always looking for free money from grants and such (though so many of you out there in the community have been nothing but supportive - thank you!) The answer to that entails many parts. First, we cannot become a licensed program in our current facilities, (though we are thankful to the school for letting us be a part of the campus); we need a larger, multi-room location as children must be separated by age. At this time there is no other location in our small community to house us. Another reason is that some of the folks that attend our program are raising their grandchildren, and many of these folks are retired and did not plan for such an expense, but also want their grandchildren to have socialization and a jump on their early education. Third, being in such a rural community we attract a variety of family types and needs from a couple of counties and many at this time just want to get their children socialized, enjoying our drop in casual environment which sort of acts as a parent co-op. Many of the parents here don't want to put their children into an all day, everyday program, they just want them to start learning to play and work together with other children, and many of the parents enjoy chatting with other parents when they normally would not have such an environment in which to meet. We

could not gather in such a fashion if we were licensed. As the program stands now it also allows everyone to be a part of it, unlike many programs that are income eligible. This is an on-going discussion and researched topic for me as the Program Manager, and I would love to hear any ideas you have for a solution to our needs, or if you have any ideas of a location we might use to further our growing program.

In February we are having a Dental Discussion on the first Tuesday, Parent Council the first Wednesday, a tentative non-certificated CPR class for the parents, and a Nutrition and Physical Activity Puppet Show for the children near the end of the month, on top of our regular class times. 
Beginning By Stephanie Williams

Your dam input is needed By Richard DicKard


The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is in the final stages of taking community input to their process of relicensing dams and electrical power generation plants in Nevada County. The Middle Yuba River can be affected by the new license differently than it has been in the past. In 2009 FERC will begin taking input for the relicensing of Bullards Bar Dam and the Colgate Power House. Here again, changes may occur that could affect our area. Local, Camptonville input is important. We need to identify issues of concern to us such as water quality and quantities, fish and aquatic resources, recreation, socio-economic resources, and land use to name just a few of the areas. Once identified, a study can be requested to see if those issues will have an impact on Camptonville that can be somehow mitigated. These areas of concern have been discussed at recent meetings of the Camptonville Community Service District (CCSD). If you would like more information or have concerns, please contact me at 288-3479 or attend a CCSD meeting which usually occurs on the third Monday* of each month at the Camptonville School. *(weather permitting, we have a guorum and the creeks don't rise.)

Medical care screening

Clinic – March 8 Submitted by Gary Schlussler Mountain Range Lodge #18

Shriners Hospitals will hold a confidential, free clinic at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital to identify children in our area who can benefit from the expert orthopedic and burn care provided at Shriners Hospitals.

If you know of any children under 18 who have problems of the bones, joints or muscles, or problems associated with healed burns, bring them to the free clinic for an evaluation to find out if they are eligible for free, expert medical treatment.

Shriners Hospitals treat such problems as, scoliosis, neuromuscular disorders, hand and back problems, leg length discrepancies, rickets, congenital hip problems, juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, and orthopedic problems associated with cerebral palsy.

The clinic is free and the consultations are entirely confidential. The clinic date is Saturday March 8, from 9am to 1pm at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital (Outpatient building), in Grass Valley. For more info contact George Harper at (530) 265 5310

YOUR VOICE COUNTS, VOTE

Well Camptonville It's voting time again. And just so you know for this election, Camptonville once again has a polling place; the LDS church. **If you wish to and if you have a vote-by-mail ballot you may vote in Camptonville on Election Day,** February 2 at the LDS Church located on Marysville Rd. and Hwy 49. between 7am and 7pm,

Here's How:

You can just drop off your completed vote-by – mail ballot. Or you can vote at the polling place. To do that you must bring your non voted vote-by mail-ballot and give it to the polling place worker before voting a regular ballot. If you are unable to surrender your vote-by-mail ballot, you may still cast a "provisional" ballot at your polling place which will not be counted until the county elections official can determine that you have not also voted a vote-by- mail ballot. (Elections Code 3016 and 14310)

Now for Cathy's Picks: Before I go on I must give the necessary disclaimer:

In my opinion **this is a vote NO ballot** for the reasons listed below.

Measure N Yuba County NO

After attending many Board of Supervisors meetings on the subject, (in my opinion) this housing development does not have the best interest of Yuba County in mind, (especially the foothills and mountain region) The North Yuba Highlands are slated to be built adjacent to the Spenceville Wildlife area. Those that would benefit most would be folks who live in Roseville (proposed traffic corridors lead in that direction not into Yuba) oh and of course the developers. At the last BOS meeting I attended on the subject, Yuba County folks stepped up the microphone in droves giving their reasons for not wanting the project. The only person for it was the spokesman for the developer. It was then decided that the voters should decide

Proposition 91. NO

IT'S NO LONGER NEEDED.

As the official proponents of this measure, are encouraging you to VOTE NO ON PROPOSITION 91.a different constitutional measure on the November 2006 ballot that also accomplished what Proposition 91 set out to do. That measure, Proposition 1A, was approved by an overwhelming 77% of California voters in November 2006.

Proposition 92 NO

Though it may sound like it's helpful to students it actually changes the make up of the Board of Governors and funding requirements. (Mainly it would remove Community Colleges from certain funding streams by separating it out from k-14 education covered by Proposition 98). I believe students need a financial break but \$5.00 off per credit is not a good trade.

Proposition 93 NO

93 is designed to trick voters and sabotage voterapproved term limits. It would actually increase terms for certain current incumbents. It's written by career politicians and funded by millions of dollars from special interests with business before the Legislature.

Proposition 94-97 NO

REFERENDUM ON AMENDMENT TO INDIAN GAMING COMPACTS.

Indian Gaming Compacts benefit the Big 4 tribes. Many local tribes including the Strawberry Band of Maidu receive no compensation I .just don't see the benefit especially since it omits certain projects from the California Environmental
