Do you like tomatoes? Saturday, May 3 we will have Cherokee Chocolate, Amanda Orange, Golden Jubilee, Aunt Ruby's German Cherry, True Black, Amish Paste, Mr. Stripey, Mortgage Lifter, Prudence Purple, Momotaro, Plum Tigress, Principie Borghese, Paul Robeson, Brandywine, Box car Willy, Early girl, Sun Gold, Sprite, Sweet 100's, Washington Cherry, Juliet, Yellow pear and others for sale. The local gardeners as well as the nursery venders can tell us about the unusual varieties. Peppers, like Fish, Red Cheese Rosso, Anaheim, Thai Red,Roberto's Cuban seasoning and others will be available. These eggplants, Nadia, Rosa Bianca, Oriental Charm, and others will be on sale also.

Many offerings are in store for us Sat, May 3, starting at 9 am, at the Rebel Ridge Store for our Annual Plant sale and Flea Market. Kitchens Garden, Anahat Farm and for the first time, Roger Rollins with his U-bet Nursery plants will be here. In addition we will have individual Camptonville gardeners offering tomato and other plants for sale. Our Camptonville school students will also have tomatoes and other plants for sale. Kitchens Gardens usually has tomato, pepper and vegetable starts as well as perennials, shrubs, berries, fruit trees and landscaping plants. Anahat farms will have a large variety of heirloom tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, eggplants, basil and lettuce starts. Roger Rollins specializes in perennials that work right here at our elevation. Our new garden supply store, Rebel Ridge Organics run by our own Jessie Wilcox will have organic potting soils. Jessie will also have that soil enricher and plant nourisher par excellence: worm castings in 1 cubic foot bags. Jessie will take orders for her veggie starts. Also look for your seeds from Jessie.



Another first for our sale will be Iris from Sandra Manning. She will have color photos of the over 70 varieties of Iris she is raising. She invites us to reserve the variety we like and we will get it later when it's ready to be planted.

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) is an arrangement between individual's farms and community members. It is the most direct way to support your local farmers. In return, you receive fresh, healthy, seasonal food and the satisfaction of knowing you are truly making a difference!

CSA members invest in the farm at the beginning of the season, when funds are most needed, by purchasing a subscription. Then throughout the season, they receive a weekly box of produce or other goods. Many farms offer opportunities for you to become involved in the farm in other ways, like participating in harvesting.

## Mobile Medical Van a Go!

Thank you all for your valuable input into this endeavor, by completing the survey and communicating your wants and needs. Through a grant provided to Western Sierra Medical Clinic, Inc (WSMC) Camptonville, Pike and Alleghany communities will benefit from a mobile Medical Van in the near future. Here is what Mark Lang; Chief Executive Officer of the clinic, reported:

"By mid April the vehicle will be ordered, it is expected to take two months to build and the hope is by summer 2008 services will start. That being said, in the beginning we will be operating just under 20 hours a week. We will start out with 1-2 days a week in Camptonville.

We are looking at is a 26-foot mobile clinic. It will have an exam room, bathroom, wheel chair access, air conditioning and heating. We are also looking to have x-ray available in the van as well. I really want the people of Camptonville, Pike and Allegheny to take ownership in this. It is their Community Health Center and I really think it will only get bigger."

CCP will be working alongside WSMC to coordinate this wonderful service for our community your input is greatly appreciated, any thoughts as to where, when and times to provide these services are welcome. 

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# General Plan Update Advisory By Cathy LeBlanc

The Yuba County Board of Supervisors (BOS) has finished their 5<sup>th</sup> and final study session regarding significant issues to be addressed in the up coming Yuba County General Plan. The next phase will be the *Alternatives* phase of the update. The purpose of these study sessions are to give Yuba county planning department staff guidance and direction so they may proceed with preparing a draft general plan that reflect the Boards early thoughts on these issues. The next steps will be additional town hall meetings, continued advisory committee meetings and public input to gather more information to assist in the development of a Draft General Plan.

At the 5th study session all Supervisors were present except Mary Jane Greigo, (who in my opinion was missed). It is always surprising to me to see how our Government works. I would expect a certain amount of expertise, knowledge and common sense. But if you sit in on one of these meetings you quickly learn, that ain't always so.

The meeting centered on managing urban growth and land use recommendations. The Planning Department laid out scenarios to address questions previously asked by the Board. The questions ranged from county agreements with its cities to global climate change. The Board was in partial agreement (or disagreement) with about every issue. Where should major growth develop over the next 20 years? Should it be concentrated along our major corridors of HWYs 65 and 70? Supervisor Logue said projections show Wheatland will be the fastest growing city in Northern California. Though Supervisor Stocker suggested the county concentrate on revitalizing and invigorating Linda and Olivehurst. Supervisor Nicoletti wondered at what point do we call ourselves "built out". How much growth do we want? To save cost his idea is to consider a regional approach for utilities and services when planning for the future. At this point Supervisor Schrader commented on creating MaLindaHurst.

The Planning Department's Dan Cucchi continued the presentation discussing community design. Does Yuba County want to have a *sense of place* or is it okay to become anywhere USA. To illustrate this point he showed a slide of a Wal-Mart and asked the Board where they thought it was, Marysville? Yuba City? In fact it was in Las Vegas. Cucchi spoke of future designs and the impact of transportation and air quality. Should new communities have infrastructure that blends business with housing so that it is walk-

able and include lanes for biking? Nicoletti said the community of the future that the Planning Department was laying out, is the reality of Marysville today. It has all those components. Yet does anyone walk?

Next, the Board looked at our carbon footprint/greenhouse gas emissions and compliance with Assembly Bill 32 (AB32), which all new County General Plans must comply with. or risk a lawsuit from California's Attorney General. (On September 27, 2006, Governor Schwarzenegger signed the California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006, or Assembly Bill 32 (AB 32). California's landmark legislation that establishes mandatory greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets to be achieved through regulatory and market mechanisms.) Supervisor Logue said that Global Climate Change was a "Spin", denying it as reality. He said it is mainly a problem of China and went so far as to say AB32 is a disaster. He made a point for government to "get out of the way and make this a business friendly county." He doesn't want to mess things up. "No one will move here if we make our General Plan comply with AB 32." (Hello?) Supervisor Stocker let the Board know that global climate change is real and we have no choice, it fact it's our duty to comply. Fifty percent of greenhouse gas emissions come from cars. (For more information on AB32 go to http://gov.ca.gov/index.php?/fact-sheet/4445/)

This discussion left me feeling sympathetic for our planning department. They laid out some thoughtful ideas that were often dismissed. It will be interesting to see how all this plays out in the General Plan.

On a Camptonville note: After examining the data that the Planning Department has on their General Plan update website. I was a bit shocked to see that Camptonville data was outdated. I brought this to the attention of Wendy Hartman, Acting Planning Director of Yuba County and personally handed her (and consultant Mathew Gerkin) a copy of the Camptonville Community Health Action Plan, reminding them that our community just spent a year developing it and presented it to the BOS last December. I urged them to use it to help guide them in future General Plan discussions.

At this point folks all I can say is, we have our work cut out and I can't wait for the next General Plan Town hall to come to town. Stay tuned!!!

It's that time of year again when things are drying out. As a friendly reminder we would like to advise everyone that as of May 1, 2008, both Burn Permits and Campfire Permits will be required. Permits will be issued at the Yuba River Ranger District office and are free of charge. Also, it is drying out very early this year so PLEASE do not burn when it is windy. Clearances are required around residences; please make every effort to complete them as soon as possible to protect your home. # Yuba River Ranger District By Betty Leffew

Campgrounds along Highway 49 to Union Flat are now open. You can make reservations at Recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. The boat ramps are open and trails at Bullards are open. No estimate yet on when the dock will be put in. Some of the trails in the high country, on the south facing slopes, are opening with patches of snow and some trees across them. The North Yuba trail along the river between Indian Valley and Goodyear's Bar is also open.

Fuel wood season opens May 1, 2008 on the Tahoe National Forest. Permits can be purchased at any ranger station. Permits will be sold through October 31. The price per cord is still \$15.00 with a 2-cord minimum and a 10-cord maximum per household. Applications for mail-in permits can be found online at www.fs.fed.us/tahoe. We will also send you mail-in applications. In general, the permit allows removal of dead and downed wood on TNF system lands, but not on private land. Trees may not be cut if marked with paint, wildlife signs, boundary landmark signs, other official signs or in areas closed to woodcutting. Carefully study the maps accompanying the permits to see which areas are closed. Woodcutters are responsible for knowing what the daily fire restrictions are. The following day's information will be on the recorded message, after 5 PM, at 288-3231. Try to get your wood in early in case fire restrictions limit woodcutting, due to potential fire danger this summer.

Dooryard burn permits are now due. You can pick up one at the ranger station. You will need to check with the Department of Air Quality or the ranger station for burn day status.

Rainfall for April 2008 is .77 inches bringing our season total to 41.27 inches. Last year's total was 41.22 inches. Not looking good so please use extreme caution as things dry out.





## CPHC /REACH Children's Roundtable Report

The Children's Roundtable grassroots budget coalition efforts are gaining momentum, California League of Women Voters is signing on. The purpose of the coalition is to educate legislative staff and the community about the real effect these cuts will have on the welfare of our most vulnerable population, our children. The ultimate goal is to save children's programs from budget cuts. We need to gather letters to send to legislators and published letters to editors and also prepare editorials to help increase media attention. A steering committee has been working to establish a budget message to integrate into our letters to legislative staff and the media, gather stories and letters, coordinate and approve all documents that will go in our grassroots lobby binder. The *unanimously chosen* Budget Message is: Our Children, Our Duty, Our Future
