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Children's Advocate's Roundtable Report: Federal Healthcare Reform

On March 23, 2010 President Obama signed into law the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Why was health reform necessary? In California alone there are over 8 people million uninsured. I am one of them. As a mom with less than full time employment there were no affordable insurance plans available to me. Yet, I made too much money for subsidized health care such as Medi-Cal. My small employer could not afford it either. Many folks like me would end up in the hospital emergency room if something serious happened. Then the debt incurred could put my home in jeopardy. Now every United States citizen is required to be covered but, there will be options and help including exemptions for financial hardship.

Teri Boughton of California Healthcare Foundation, Anthony Wright of Health Access and David Panush Senate Pro Tempore Health Advisor were the panel members present at the April Children's Advocates Roundtable. They came together to help explain the new law Anthony Wright has called "A Patient *Bill of Rights* on Steroids". Whether you currently get health coverage through an employer, a public plan or buy as an individual you should receive affordable coverage and essential benefits. It guarantees a choice of doctors and health plans and it maintains your coverage even if you loose your job.

Simply put it will do three things:

- 1. It is a giant consumer protection Bill that prevents the worse insurance company abuses.
- 2. It is the largest coverage expansion since Medicare in the 1960's. It will expand coverage to 32 million nationally people by 2019.
- It begins to control cost. The Congressional Budget Office estimates it will cost (and raise) \$938 billion over the next ten years. During this time period it will actually reduce the deficit by \$124 billion.

More good news:

- This legislation will allow four different plans plus catastrophic and no share of cost for preventative service.
- It will increase funding for community clinics.
- It creates state-based health benefit Exchanges with standardized information where small employers and individuals can buy insurance through private or state plans.

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- There is NO pre-existing condition clause. Which means after 2014 you cannot be denied! For children this starts in September 2010.
- There are no lifetime caps or restrictive annual limits.
- Older children up to 26 years could qualify under parent's coverage if they're still living at home.
- And more! For the full analysis go to www.healthaccess.org

How will this measure up in our own state? There will be more work to do legislatively and many of the provisions will not be fully realized until 2019. But for California there can be no rescissions to health coverage including Healthy Families. This Program currently insures nearly one million children in California. This means the Governor cannot cut the program as he wanted to in his proposed 2010-2011 state budget. As evidenced by a 4-1 vote of the Assembly Budget Committee (4-19-2010) that also rejected reducing eligibility or increasing premiums in the Healthy Families Program. I am pleased to thank Sierra Health Foundation for sponsoring this report.

Jenny Cavaliere

Experience fits needs, according to Candidate.

Citing her 15 years service on the North Yuba Water District (NYWD), District 5 supervisorial candidate Jenny Cavaliere says, "No one else in the race has my experience with water issues". She's also on the Boards of the Northern California Water Association (NCWA) and Yuba County Resource Conservation District (YCRCD).

Cavaliere feels it is of major importance that our Supervisor be up-to-speed on water issues in preparation for the 2016 federal relicensing of the multi-million dollar, Bullard's Bar-Colgate-Englebright hydro-electric facilities, the County's largest revenue source. She's determined the economic benefits of The North Yuba hydro-power complex stay local, not go to outside corporate interests.

She prevailed in 2008 to have the Foothills Water District be included in the Yuba County Integrated Water Management Plan. Her efforts secured some \$3 million in funding for replacement of seriously outdated water tanks in Challenge and Forbestown. "I convinced the Valley folks that the Foothills needed inclusion," says Cavaliere. "I was rather tenacious!" "I can't think of anyone who keeps up on water issues like Jenny" she, "was instrumental in getting the boundaries expanded to include our district", says NYWD General Manager Bill Suppa, "she is extremely hard-working and very community minded"

Committed to sustainable agriculture locally, including a potential Yuba County USDA certified meat processing plant, she'll push for financial incentives, including tax credits, for local farmers, ranchers and small businesses like the Enterprise Zone near the Marysville Airports.

Cavaliere attended Michigan State University studying Animal Husbandry, later pursuing graduate studies in Ruminant Nutrition. Her career includes research positions in immunology and cryopreservation of stem cells and research work at U.C. San Diego Cancer Center and Scripps Institute.

In 1989 she moved to Yuba County to raise Purebred Angus Cattle High Sierra Beef was "conceived as a means of keeping local ranchers sustainable on their family farms—to strengthen and drive the local economy." A hands-on farmer the high-energy 57-year-old is out on the tractor at 6:30 each morning. "Jenny is very diversified in agriculture, and very much clued in to the needs of small farmers," says Roger Ingram, County Director, U.C. Cooperative Extension Service.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT By Alan Kinne

Over the last two weekends, members of the Camptonville Fire Department have received some very important and valuable training. On Saturday, April 10, six of us traveled to Dobbins/Oregon House to take part in a live burn exercise. An old two-story house that had been in the family of a Dobbins firefighter for many years, was going to be burned to provide training for firefighters from several agencies. Those present were divided up into 3 member teams, and we took turns going into the house where fires had been set in various rooms. Wooden pallets were used as a fuel source. Experienced Dobbins staff accompanied each team and explained what was happening and the best way to deal with it. Our own Captain Tony Scarafiotti performed this role as well. To watch a large tongue of flame come across the ceiling over your head is a real eye opener!! The Safety Officers became concerned about the structural integrity of the building after the various fires, so decided to pull everyone out and let the house burn. It did not take long for it to become a raging inferno. Hose lines had been placed around the house to keep other buildings and trees from igniting. One tree in particular had to be doused a few times. I was about 25 to 30 yards away from the building taking pictures, but the heat was intense. It took 30 minutes for the house to become a pile of debris; only the chimney was left standing. I want to thank Dobbins Chief Mike Butler and his staff for allowing us to participate in this training. You can practice for hours on a simulated burning building, but that in no way compares to 10 minutes inside the real thing.

On Saturday, April 17, five of us took part in a Low Angle Rope Rescue class with the Downieville Fire Department. We practiced at a



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site dropping about 150 feet down a steep incline to the river. We all took turns going down the incline, either by using a rope system that allowed the individual to dictate how slow or fast they went, or by using the power winch on the back of the Rescue Truck, which let you move at a constant speed. The key to the whole descent is what the instructors kept telling us all day, "Lean back!!" The more you lean, the easier it is. Some of us took down the Stokes Basket, either by ourselves or with a partner, and then proceeded to bring it back up. A couple of brave souls volunteered to be the victim and rode the basket up. Big difference between an empty basket and one with a person in it. The last drill was to bring up a victim in the basket using a Z Line system. No power winch used for this. This is the "Old School Way". Using ropes, pulleys, and a couple of vehicles as anchors, a bunch of us grabbed the line and pulled. After a short distance, the line was "reset" and we pulled again. It took about four resets to get the basket with victim, and the two rescuers to the top of the incline. Makes you just love power winches! Many thanks to Downieville Chief Lee Brown and his department for the training.

March was a little busy as compared to most years. We had 9 calls: 4 motor vehicle accidents, 4 medical and 1 standby (never went to scene). As of this writing, April has had 4 calls: 3 medical and 1 smoke check. On one of our medical calls, we had 10 members turn out at 4am!! REMINDER: Starting May 1st, Burn Permits are REQUIRED!

What is EC?


EC is an acronym for "elimination communication". The idea is based on increasing communication between baby and caregivers to facilitate toileting into a container or the toilet. According to the book, babies have an inborn awareness of their bodies. If we, as caregivers, tune into that awareness, we can support our babies in their elimination habits.

Babies give clues (or cues) as to what they want and need. They fuss and wiggle to let us know they need to eat, sleep, be held, or need a new diaper. We guess what they need; sometimes we're right, sometimes not. The premise is, babies are aware of their need to go to the bathroom and give cues. We have the choice to teach them to use diapers or the toilet. This method also increases a feeling of safety and confidence for the baby in that they are successfully communicating their needs.

I've recently had a baby. While I was pregnant I saw a news clip about diaper-free child rearing. Shock was my first response. Impossible, I thought. Then I began to imagine what it might be like if a diaper-free reality was actually possible. Ultimately, I acquired the book.

I am excited to say our family is trying the EC method with success. Our baby is now six weeks old and we "catch" most of our infant's poos, and about half of her pees. Additionally, the game isn't all about guessing. Our baby seems to have some patterns and also the ability to wait short times (or hold it) for the toilet. When we are successful, the baby shows pleasure over the whole experience. Also, we are saving loads of money on disposable diapers! I am hoping that when our child begins to walk, will be so accustomed to using the toilet, that she will be "trained" already!

If anyone reading this is interested in more information, contact the resource center to pass a message to me. I would be happy to share more details and answer questions. There is also a book called Diaper-Free Baby, by Christine Gross-Loh.

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Yuba River Ranger District By Betty Leffew

Campgrounds along Highway 49 to Union Flat are now open. You can make reservations at Recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. The boat ramps are open. Bullards Bar and the trails are open. The North Yuba trail along the river between Indian Valley and Goodyear's Bar is open. Dogwood and Redbud's are blooming. Wildflowers are close behind.

Fuelwood season opens May 12, 2010 on the Tahoe National Forest. Permits can be purchased at any ranger station. Permits will be sold through November 7. The price per cord is still \$15.00 with a 2-cord minimum and a 10-cord maximum per household. Applications for mail-in permits can be found online at www.fs.fed.us/tahoe. We will also send you mail-in applications. In general, the permit allows removal of dead and downed wood on TNF system lands, but not on private land. Trees may not be cut if marked with paint, wildlife signs, boundary landmark signs, other official signs or in areas closed to woodcutting. Carefully study the maps accompanying the permits to see which areas are closed. Woodcutters are responsible for knowing what the daily fire restrictions are. The following day's information will be on the recorded message, after 5 PM, at 288-3231. Try to get your wood in early in case fire restrictions limit woodcutting, due to potential fire danger this summer.

Dooryard burn permits are now due. You can pick up one at the ranger station. You will need to check with the Department of Air Quality or the ranger station for burn day status, 288-3231 or 289-3662.

Rainfall for April is 5.79 inches so far, bringing our season total to 44.87 inches. Last year's total was 40.88 inches. Been pretty consistent the last few years. We could use more snow.

Yuba County's School Superintendent Ric Teagarden made a special visit to our school to warn the school board that financial changes at the State level will impact our school in a major way and that the board must look at reducing expenses right away. While all schools are being impacted by the State's budget crunch, Camptonville School has good reserves and we have not felt the panic that other districts have felt. That said, we agree that the reason for our particular predicament is that we have a severely declining enrollment that resulted in a considerable loss of income from the State. So the board is seriously looking at a financial plan for the next few years in terms of staffing, enrollment, and quality of education.

We have received stimulus money from the US government. The Parent Council is also earning funds through the Box Top program, Save Mart school cards and (soon) Raley's cards. (Camptonville School receives money each time you buy at those stores using the special cards.) Call the school for more info. 288-3277





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
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Recycling & Fighting Cancer

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Chicken Chronicles By Stephanie Ruff

There certainly has been a lot of excitement around the Rebel Hen Ranch. Most of you think of April 15th as tax day. Well, it turned out to be birthing day here on the homestead. Two of our bantam hens had gone broody but they were nest hopping and being a bit sporadic about the whole thing. So, I didn't really bother to count the 21 days it usually takes the eggs to start hatching. In the back of my mind I figured I had at least a week to get prepared for the newcomers. The banty bungalow is not set up for a brood of baby chicks.

Last Thursday when I let the bantams out of their hen house I noticed that the two broody hens were sharing the nest with the most eggs. They looked pretty cozy so I didn't separate them. I stuck the other eggs underneath them. Strange noises came from the nesting box, but then broody hens always make strange noises.

We were headed to Sacramento that day so Liam and I were checking on the chickens before we left when I heard a tiny "peep!" I looked into the nesting boxes and there was a tiny chick the size of a golf ball as bantams are miniature chickens. I started panicking (remember I'm the worry wort) - we were leaving for the day and I hadn't set up any kind of brooder for them. The nesting boxes are high above the floor and the food and water are outside. There would be no way for the chicks to get around. We had to think fast! I had an old kennel from Blue's puppyhood. So we stuck the kennel into the bungalow -filled it with straw, food and water. We moved both broody hens, 2 baby chicks (at this point) and all the eggs into the kennel. Hubby, Liam and I worked quickly! After much flapping and pecking we managed to make the move.

By the next morning we had 4 babies. I realized this dog kennel was not going to big enough and they would need to run around. We brought out the old chicken brooder cage from past babies we have raised. We put it inside the hen yard and hooked up the dog kennel to it.

Sadly one of the babies died. It appeared that the little one was squashed by one of the mamas. It was quite flat. There were still 6 eggs unhatched and the mamas didn't appear to be setting on them anymore. I wondered if I should get rid of them as I had heard they will not hatch if they are not getting mama's warmth for all but 20 minutes of the day. I called a friend who has much experience in these matters and she said to leave them for a day or two.

I'm so glad we did as much to our surprise we had a new 4th baby after waiting a few days. We decided to let the eggs stick around awhile just in case.

Meanwhile....a storm brews. Suppose to be a big one! Rain and snow expected thru the week. I wasn't feeling well. Around 5pm I realized the babies and their mamas were not in a storm proof arrangement. With low energy Liam and I whipped together quite the "shanty" out of pallets and tarps. It's really quite embarrassing as I take pride in my coops!

It had been several days since that last chick had hatched and the mamas **really** seemed to be ignoring the remaining eggs this time. I was able to reach in the kennel when we were building the "shanty" and they were not warm. I decided to take the eggs out to give them more room. Liam put them in shed while we finished. Later, I had forgotten all about the eggs and began doing a storm clean-putting all tools in the shed.
