I have seen this department grow not only in the number of volunteers, but also in the depth and quality of training that has been accomplished. A lot of work and effort has been put forth to give Camptonville a Fire Department that it can be proud of and count on. We have a dedicated core of individuals who give of their time to make this department what it is today. Other departments in the area have seen this transformation and know that we will be there to assist them if called upon. A lot of the credit for this improvement can be attributed to the man who will be taking over when I leave. Assistant Chief Mark Jokerst. Mark was the long time Chief of the Pike City Fire Department. While in that position, he also filled in as Acting Chief of Camptonville for a period of time, while we were in the rebuilding stage. Our collection has grown to over two hundred patches, with more on the way. We will be coming back to the area on a regular basis. There are a few events that take place each year that we don't want to miss. Our coming adventure is going to be

both exciting and scary.

On December 18th, our department was honored to provide transportation for Santa Claus to the Camptonville School. Despite rainy weather, we got him there safely and on time. It was a great turnout as usual. Everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves and the kids that were there got some great presents. The Fire Department helped collect toys for the event and we wish to thank all those who donated. We can always count on the good people of Camptonville to help out when the need arises. All campgrounds are in winter status, which means no services and no fees. For up to date information on the status of the snow trail system feel free to call the ranger station, (530) 478-6253. We have plenty of free Winter Recreation maps to help you enjoy some winter fun.

Fishing in Sierra County rivers and streams closed on November 15, 2010. Fishing in the lakes and reservoirs is open year round. Brochures are available at the ranger station.

Burn permits are no longer needed for dooryard burning. You do still need to check with the Department of Air Quality for burn day status. During business hours, you can call the North Yuba River Ranger Station for burn status information. After hours or on weekends please call the appropriate county:

Yuba County east of Bullards Bar (C'ville):

Yuba County west of Bullards Bar: 741-6299

As of December 20, 2010, the Yuba River Ranger Station has received 34.81 inches of rain. Last year at this time we were only at 12.18 inches, so we have seen some big changes this year.

I was looking through the box, the button box where Grandmother saved all her buttons. There were shoe buttons from Aunt Ethyl's baby shoes, and coat buttons from Grandpa Charlie's P coat that he wore in WWII. But I wasn't interested in those. No, I was looking for the silver snowflake button, polished so that it reflected light like a little mirror.

I lifted it out of the box and looked up at Grandmother who gazed at me with a knowing smile. I held it out and set it into her waiting hand.

She walked over to the soft couch near the fire and sat down. I followed, climbing up next to her and snuggling into the comfort of her open arms. She held the button up toward the firelight and I watched as the flames danced over its surface.

"Why did you choose this button, my dear?" Her voice was soft and distant and her eyes glistened in the firelight, matching the dancing flames on the snowflake button.

"It's always been my favorite," I said, trying to remember why I would spend so long searching for this particular one.

"Do you know where it came from?" She asked, as she peered down into the mass of golden ringlets on my upturned head.


"I bought five snowflake buttons to adorn the white silk cape I made to go over my wedding dress, when I married your grandfather. That was just before World War II."

"Your grandfather didn't return. He was lost in a battle early on. I remember opening the door to two army men, come to bring me the news, although, I already knew. Your grandfather's spirit came to me to say goodbye. I awoke one night, filled with dread. Swirling before me was an energy so bright, wrapping its love around me. I knew it was him. And then it disappeared. In

my grief, I took my wedding dress apart. Sewing pieces of it into every dress or shirt I made – keeping your granddad close to me. As the years went by, cloth fell apart, disintegrating. But the snowflake buttons still reflect the love I have for your granddad."

Snuggling next to my grandmother, into her softness, her warmth, I felt Grandpa's spirit present somehow. It was a familiar presence. And I knew that his presence had been in that snowflake button all along, calling out to me, calling me to place them into grandmother's hands, so I could hear his voice in her story. And — though I didn't know it then — so their story could weave its thread into my own.
