As the school year winds down and the earth bursts into bloom, we look back and see how much we have grown, how much we have learned, how our children have blossomed.

The older children (2-4) are beginning to recognize, and write, letters in their names. They are getting better at counting, and at making connections. There are 1,2, 3... pots of peas. When we put seeds in soil, water them, and give them sunlight, they grow. Friendships are blossoming too. Children are using their imaginations and props to explore the world together and to think of what could be.

We went on a field trip to Rebel Ridge Organics , where Jessi Mullins, the proprietor, gave us a tour of the nursery. Inside the greenhouse, the seeds are planted, sprouted, and tended until they are ready for our gardens. These seeds need the same thing that our plants in the classroom needed: soil, water, sunlight, and to be kept warm on cool nights. Children potted their own spinach seedlings and brought them home. We made a class mural of blossoming fruit trees with birds in their branches. We had a picnic, sang songs, and played.

Thelma Amaya, behavioral specialist from the Yuba County Office of Education, gave a parent workshop at the Camptonville Resource Center. Her presentation was titled, "The Three Cs of Parenting Success: Connection, Credibility, and Consistency". She emphasized that there must be "connection before compliance". Children first need to feel connected. We can achieve this by adding play to our routines and by offering two choices. To achieve credibility, we need to be sure that we can enforce commands before giving them, and to follow through on what we say. Being consistent means that we have a plan for managing difficult behaviors (Ask for help if needed.) and stick to it.

Patients who have found it nearly impossible to access specialty care can see a specialist from the comfort of their primary care office.

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Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP)-Resource Center Update

<u>Summer Recreation</u>: We're looking for community partners to help develop our Summer Rec. Program. Current plans include Swim Days! with Camptonville School and A *Camp Out @ Willow Creek*. A mentor-stipend is available. Give us a call at the Resource Center (530 -288-9355).

<u>EBT is coming to Yuba Farmers Markets:</u> We continue our involvement with the Yuba County Nutrition Action Plan (YCNAP) and are making good progress to have CalFresh Outreach (CFO) and /EBT (Electronic Benefits) honored at all Yuba Farmer's Markets (FM). The Marysville FM will offer it when it re-opens Friday nights starting May 31. The Camptonville FM is preparing to offer EBT, as well.

<u>Yuba County FRC Network</u>: The Network joined the California Family Resource Association (CFRA) to submit a regional grant proposal that proposes to help educate and perform outreach to Yuba County residents to learn more about how to apply for healthcare under the Affordable Care Act.

<u>Bio-Energy and more!</u> CCP is the grant administrator for the Yuba Watershed & Fire Safe Council (YW&FS). The Council will receive funding from the Yuba County Water Agency for a Community Wildfire Protection Plan. A bid for proposals will be released in May. The Council also continues with efforts to bring a Bio Energy facility to Camptonville. We are working with the landowner, consultants from Sierra Nature Conservancy (SNC) and the foothill community. In so doing, we arranged a tour of the proposed facility March 19th. This tour connected interested parties, including Supervisor Hal Stocker, with the landowner on site. This proposed facility would receive and utilize chipped, forest biomass thereby reducing fire hazard and producing electricity that potentially PG&E will buy back, while creating income and employment. 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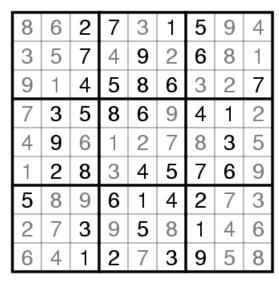

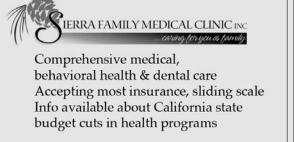
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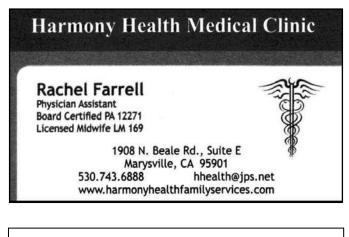
History in the Making at the North San Juan Senior Center

You, too, can be part of the history of the Ridge. Come stitch on Tapestry No. 5, being created at the North San Juan Senior Center most Wednesdays at 2 p.m. "Learning the art of tapestry is easy," artistic director Mary Moore says, "125 people, from kindergar-teners to 90-year olds, have been stitching on this project. We've even had a few brave men."

The Ridge Tapestry project is the vision of Marsha Stone, and artist Jennifer Crosby creates the original artwork for the tapestry. Marsha sees the project as a way to repay the community for all the good work and culture of the Ridge. Depicting the history of the Ridge over the last 20 years, each tapestry commemorates a particular movement or event. Thirteen tapestries are planned in all. Tapestry No. 5 is the history of Gold Mining from 1970 to the present time.

When finished, the tapestries are rolled up and placed in a special archival box with other material that protects and preserves them. They are put on display a few times a year at the North Columbia Cultural Center. Everyone who has worked on a tapestry and all donors have their names stitched into the back of the tapestry. Yuba River Ranger District Annie Prout-Garcia

Yuba River Ranger District Annie Prout-Garcia

Bullards Bar Campgrounds are now open. Campgrounds along Highway 49 are open as of April 26th, 2013. The hiking trails on the Yuba River Ranger District are opening earlier this year, due to minimal snow pact.

Woodcutting permits for the Tahoe National Forest can be purchased beginning Wednesday, May 1, 2013. The price for permits is \$15 per cord with a 2-cord minimum and an annual 10-cord maximum per household. Permits can be obtained at all Ranger Stations, the Forest Headquarters or by mail. Applications for mail-in permits can be found online at *http://www.fs.usda.gov/detail/tahoe/passes-permits*. Firewood season will extend through December 1 or until rain and snow makes the roads impassable.

In general, the woodcutting permit allows removal of <u>dead or down wood</u> on Tahoe National Forest system lands unless otherwise designated. The Yuba River Ranger District no longer allows cutting of standing dead hardwood trees. This is a change from the past. Standing pines and other softwoods may still be cut. Dead wood already on the ground may still be taken. The district made this change so that we can allow the season to continue longer in the late fall, rather than having to shut down as soon as the hardwood trees lose their leaves in the autumn. Wood cutting permits do not allow cutting on private land. Trees may not be cut if marked with paint, wildlife signs, boundary signs, and other official signs or in areas closed to woodcutting.

May 1st also brings the need to obtain a residential burn permit. You will still need to check with the Department of Air Quality for burn day status. During business hours, you can call the Yuba River Ranger Station for burn status information. After hours or on weekends please call the appropriate county:
