Yuba Watershed Protection and Fire Safe Council Updates Cathy LeBlanc

Yuba County Water Agency approved funds to allow Yuba Watershed Protection and Fire Safe Council (YWP&FSC) to develop a Yuba Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). What does that mean? Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP), as the grant administrator for the Yuba Watershed Protection & Fire Safe Council (YWP&FSC), will be seeking bids later in June to update the geographical information systems data for the pre-fire planning maps for the five fire districts of the Yuba County Foothills and to develop and submit a Community Wildfire Protection Plan for this same area. More information will be available after the June 12 YWP&FSC meeting.

The YWP&FSC is also continuing to investigate the feasibility of operating a small biomass facility at Celestial Valley. We will be preparing a proposal to send to the USFS under the Community Capacity and Land Stewardship Program to allow CCP's continued participation in the process. The goals of the program are to ensure community -based organizations and collaborative groups have the capacity and resources to convene, plan, and monitor watershed restoration and landscape scale restoration projects on National Forest lands.

We have a very unique atmosphere and a high staff to student ratio that enables us to know and advocate for each individual child's strengths and needs. This year, I was overwhelmed by the number of Camptonville "graduates" who came to offer their services by coaching a sport, helping in the classroom, mentoring students, facilitating a yearbook club, and completing a high school senior project by adapting and producing a play. That exemplifies the type of lasting bonds that students form with our school.

I am immensely proud of the progress that the students and staff of Camptonville School have made this year. Yuba River Ranger District Annie Prout-Garcia

It feels like summer is upon us, and, thanks to the low amount of snow this year, most of our campgrounds, picnic areas, trails and other recreation sites on the Yuba River Ranger District are already open, which is sooner than usual. On some north facing slopes you will still find patches of snow, but all trails and campgrounds in the Bullards and Hwy 49 areas should be open and accessible. In the Sierra Buttes area most Tahoe National Forest Campgrounds are open except Salmon Creek due to paving maintenance.

Jessica Prince, our Fire Prevention Technician, would like to remind you that Burn Permits are now required. This limits burning to one 4x4 debris pile at a time with a valid permit. Please ensure your pile is 'Dead-Out' before leaving. We did not have a very wet winter or spring, therefore vegetation is much drier earlier than we are used to. Please use extra caution in the forest and around your homes. Try doing your weed-eating and chainsaw use early in the morning. If you are going camping, be sure to pick up your campfire permit which advises on safe campfire use. As always, stay safe!"

You can receive Residential Burn Permits and Campfire Permits at our Ranger Station free of charge. Please be sure to check with the Department of Air Quality for burn day status. During business hours, you can call the Yuba River Ranger Station for burn status information, 288-3231 or 478-6253. After hours or on weekends please call the appropriate county:

permits is \$15 per cord with a 2-cord minimum and an annual 10-cord maximum per household. Permits can be obtained at all Ranger Stations, the Forest Headquarters or by mail. Applications for mail-in permits can be found online at http://www.fs.usda.gov/detail/tahoe/passespermits. Firewood season will extend through December 1 or until rain and snow make the roads impassable. Please be sure to call and check fuelwood status each day you plan on cutting.

Fuelwood permits can still be purchased. The price for

The Yuba River Ranger District no longer allows cutting of standing dead hardwood trees. Standing dead pines and other softwoods may still be cut. Dead wood already on the ground may be taken. The district made this change so that we could allow the season to continue longer in the late fall, rather than having to shut down as soon as the hardwood trees lose their leaves in the autumn.




