There was great representation from all corners of our town, and the *critical mass* that CCSD was looking for was found and sealed with a unanimous *YES* vote to proceed with the transfer of the Masonic Lodge to the community. What transpired that night was a wonderful sight to see.

Twelve people also committed themselves to becoming founding members of *Friends of the Building*. This "steering committee" will be the decision-making body for how the center will be run and what activities will be held in the building.

On April 17, *Friends of the Building* met for the first time to brainstorm and discuss immediate and long-term funding issues and future plans. This team used the *Right Question Project* work sheets made during the

community meeting as their guide to identify how they will operate and bring our Community Center to life. What a pleasure to see this group of people from such a wide range of ages and backgrounds tackle head-on the tasks of running our center. Two representatives from *Friends of the Building* then attended the CCSD board meeting on April 21 to give a report on what was accomplished at the meeting and what their next steps will be. *The next Steering Committee meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, May 7, at 7 pm at the Masonic Lodge/Community Center building.*

Another wonderful thing to share with you: Dick DicKard, CCSD Board Member, announced at the April 9 community meeting that in order to close escrow, there was an immediate need for approximately \$5,000. At the *Friends of the Building* meeting it was reported that donations have come in that will generously cover that amount. A huge thank you to those who gave their financial support on such short notice. The goal is to complete this real estate transaction by June 30.

I would like to thank Dick DicKard for his steadfast effort to pursue this whole process with the Masons. Dick has worked tirelessly for months, communicating with members of the Masonic Lodge, and researching what is needed to get this project off the ground. A huge thank you to the Masons, as well, especially to Ted Gardener from the Masonic Lodge in Nevada City. Without their generosity, I wouldn't be writing to you now. Thank you to those who have stepped up to lead and to those who have graced this project with their financial support.

As you probably know from The Courier and talk about town, the Masons have offered their lodge to Camptonville to be transformed into our community center. But there are costs involved in the transfer process even though the building itself will be a gift. As word got out about the offer, residents began calling to offer their help.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank those people for their generosity and their proactive approach to achieving a goal that has been top of the list since the first Town Hall meeting in 1995.

The Gene Hanson family has donated \$4,700, which is the amount estimated to cover the costs of acquisition. The Hanson family has been in Camptonville since the 1800's and is clearly committed to helping the community best serve its residents. In addition, there have been contributions from the Bob McDonald family and from three anonymous donors, which will be critical for the moving-in process. We deeply appreciate these donations and are in the process of creating fundraising strategies to cover the ongoing costs of maintenance. There's something special about living in a community where the efforts of those working to acquire the building are so quickly reinforced by the support of local residents. Dear Camptonville Residents,

I feel a special kinship with the people of Camptonville. They enjoy their remoteness and close relationship with nature. They prefer tree-tops to rooftops, as I do. I try hard to attend every



public meeting at Camptonville, including school graduations, where I give out awards to deserving students. For years I have donated my excess fruits and vegetables to the Camptonville Farmer's Market.

Keeping the Country, Country. It's been my battle cry for the past 20 years and it will continue to be my fight for the next four. The threat of housing developments in the Yuba foothills is ongoing.

In Brownsville, there is a large subdivision proposed by Soper-Wheeler Company, a timber firm. So far, Soper-Wheeler has designated some 5,200 acres of their land south of Brownsville for residential development, requesting that County Officials re-zone the lands from "timber production" to "agriculture/rural residential." The result could be 5-acre parcels or even smaller.

Soper-Wheeler is trying to get this land annexed into the North Yuba Water District. Coping with a severe drought, the North Yuba Water District has difficulty supplying water to customers in existing foothill homes. The last thing the water district needs is greater demand.

In Dobbins-Oregon House there are four to five would-be developers who present a similar threat to the stability and tranquility of the foothill community. Owners of at least 5,000 acres, which are currently zoned for 20-40 acre parcels, are attempting to re-zone to 5-acre parcels or less. If this were to happen the population of Dobbins-Oregon House will double and possibly triple!

It is my experience that this is not what the people want. The results of my recent survey of foothill residents, 81% of respondents are concerned about "over population" in terms of adequacy of water, roadway congestion, sewer, police and fire protection. (Continued on Page 5)

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Comments on: Camptonville Community Health Action Plan By Hal Stocker

I have read the Executive Summary of the Community Health Action Plan a few times over the years, and I have always been impressed by the values and insights expressed therein. I guess they are my kind of values...and insights.

The phrase, "Camptonville residents prefer treetops over rooftops" has stuck in my mind and I have repeated it to people a number of times. I also prefer "raw earth" over "cement," and natural, undeveloped spaces. I have a large garden and 50 fruit trees at my home in Challenge, so I am pretty much a farmer at heart, regardless of what else I am. At Challenge, I am in much the same type of setting as you are – primarily in an evergreen forest with oaks, madrones, and various types of brush. As described in your Plan, I consider it "a wonderful natural setting" – on par with any setting anywhere.

It's interesting your Plan mentions conservation of Timber Production Zones (TPZ) and that the process should not allow exploitative zoning. I'm presently fighting conversion of 5,200 acres of TPZ land south of Brownsville which could turn into a residential subdivision – in the face of water shortage, lack of infrastructure, etc.

I share your appreciation of the local Saturday morning Growers market. You can't get produce any fresher and tastier. Since I grow a lot more than my wife and I can eat, I have often supplied this market. Sincerely, Hal Stocker (675-2282)

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The Mumm Sawmill - Dirt and Dust Part 2

If you would like to look in on the Mumm Sawmill as it was in the mid-1940s, time-travel with me up old Moonshine Road, past Moonshine Creek. We drive through the creek and up the Red Hill. Some cars need low gear on the hill, but the new road will go around the hill so it will soon be better. We'll turn in when we come to the road just past the old Beresford mill, which turns off to the left and also goes to Bert and Bertha Treloar's. This road isn't much different from Moonshine, except there is less gravel and more dust. The Mumm mill is about a mile from the turn-in, and it may be pretty dusty, so close your windows.

There has been quite a bit of traffic here lately, partly because of the mill and partly because Al Moellen has been logging on the property around the mill. Smaller logs are dropped off at the Mumm Mill, while bigger ones go to the Griffin Mill in Camptonville. You can hear trees being felled every so often, along with a sound new to logging here: the sound of chain saws. Dad bought one of them the other day. It is a Mall saw, and it is a big machine. It has the motor and handle bar on one end and the oiler and a handle on the other. To start it, you wind a rope on the end of the flywheel and give it a pull.

There is a clutch to engage the chain, which has teeth similar to those of a crosscut saw on a chain. The motor only runs in a vertical position so the blade is mounted on an assembly that allows it to be positioned vertically or horizontally. This allows for felling or bucking of the timber. If a log should bind the blade when making a cut, there is really no option but to cut the saw out with an axe or another saw. Under-bucking is virtually impossible because of the handle on the "stinger" end. Oh yes, we loved that old Mall!





Yuba River Ranger District

Campgrounds along Hwy 49
to Wild Plum are to open April 25, except Ramshorn.
You can make reservations at Recreation.gov or call 1877-444-6777. Bullards Bar campgrounds, boat ramps, and trails are open. No estimate yet when the dock will be put in. Dogwood, redbud and some wildflowers are blooming.

The fuelwood season for the Yuba River Ranger District is April 17 to December 31, 2014. Cutting of standing dead hardwood is permitted from May 1 to November 1 only.

The price per cord is still \$15 with a 2-cord minimum and 10-cord maximum per household. We will also send you mail-in applications. Carefully study maps accompanying the permits to see which areas are closed. Woodcutters are responsible for knowing the daily fire restrictions. The following day's information is on a recorded message after 5 pm at 288-3231. Try to get your wood in early in case fire restrictions limit woodcutting, due to potential fire danger this summer.

Dooryard burn permits are required May 1st. You must check with the Department of Air Quality or the ranger station for burn day status.

Rainfall for April, 2014 is 1.54 inches, bringing our season total to 33.20 inches. Last year's total was 39.11 inches. Not looking good so please use extreme caution as things dry out.

Trout in the Classroom

What an exciting time at Camptonville School! The Trout in the Classroom (TIC) program is off and running. As part of the Reading Marathon kick-off, students learned to tie a "Woolly Bugger" and fly cast. Thank you to the volunteers who made this possible. It was great fun and the perfect way to prepare for the arrival of the school's trout eggs.

Soon after the kick-off, Greg and Kathy Payne of Yuba City delivered the school's aquariums and equipment, and provided assistance to the program coordinator and teachers. The teachers and students then welcomed the arrival of the eggs on March 26. Yes, the students and their teachers are now proud trout "parents"! Bill Copren, of Feather River Chapter of Trout Unlimited (FRTU), in coordination with many other FRTU volunteers delivered to the school the eggs that originated from the Shasta hatchery.

Students and teachers are now tending to tanks and eggs as they observe egg development and eagerly wait for them to hatch as alevin. When ready, they will release the fry into Bullards Bar Reservoir as permitted by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. These trout are triploids, meaning they are sterile and intended to be released without a genetic impact to native fish populations.

As part of TIC, the 6-8 grade students will conduct science projects that pertain to the program and aquatic resources. Additionally, the K-2 and 6-8 grade students will meet with the South Yuba River Citizens League and the Sierra Streams Institute in the field to learn about aquatic macroinvertebrates and water quality.

On behalf of Camptonville School and FRTU, thank you to the Camptonville School Parents Club, Camptonville School, Camptonville Community Partnership, E.C. Powell Fly Fishers Club, and Yuba County Water Agency who have generously provided funding. In addition, thank you to Bill Copren and Greg and Kathy Payne who donated their time and expertise. Taken together, these contributions have provided for the equipment, teacher support, and coordination to implement TIC in a first-class fashion. The students will continue to grow to care about their watershed and have fun while doing so.


