Looking back, it's hard to find an exact history of the Camptonville School Garden. All I know for sure is that from some flower beds and veggie boxes planted by the small hands of the 1,2,3 Grow preschoolers,

to the seeds and starts propagated under grow lights in Steve Kelly's K-1 classroom over a decade ago, the garden continued to grow. I remember the excitement when Mr. Kelly and his class raised money to buy the original greenhouse. Eventually there was a worm bed and a composter and lots of garden boxes.

When I started my job as principal 4 years ago, Christina Ledson and Candace DeMaranville were organizing a garden club and family/community work days. The garden has been utilized by staff, and our youngest and oldest students alike for education, art, nutrition, physical activity, and environmental studies.

The garden is also a major part of the School Wellness Plan. You can't help but notice the amazing dedication and commitment of our school community to wellness and nutrition. Fresh, local ingredients are a part of our school's daily breakfast and lunch program. The garden elective is a popular choice in our new elective program. Last year, students helped Norm make new boxes and remove those that had rotted. In the spring, Jessi invited us to start our seeds in the Rebel Ridge Organics' greenhouses and taught students about plant biology. We are now blessed to create meals for our students with an abundant harvest of cucumbers, zucchini, peppers, tomatoes, spinach, and the list goes on...

Major supporters of the garden over the years include Yakshi and 1,2,3 Grow, Camptonville Community Partnership, Jeanne Black, Cheryl Durrett, The Parents Club, local businesses and elected officials. #### The Water Report - Thundershower Relief

The thundershowers of August 4 - 6 actually raised Campbell's Gulch overflow from 1" to 1-3/4" for a week, and we continue to hold with 1" of overflow. Please take some credit for that as well: Your conservation keeps water flowing past our diversion dam and keeps the creek alive. Your conservation is also keeping our tank full all day long, and this continues to hold the drought ordinance in limbo. Water use last month was under 17 gpm, again record-breaking conservation by you. So thank-you - keep up the good work!

**Grants**: We finally got word that our water system improvement grant is moving forward: We were awarded a total of \$789,341 to construct a new storage tank and modernize the plant. The environmental review process is nearly complete, design work is getting started, and we should be bidding the project by Christmas time, for construction starting early next year. The tank will be in place by fall of 2015. This grant is funded by the Department of Water Resources Proposition 84 funds and is being managed by The Sierra Fund of Grass Valley and the Camptonville Water Deptartment. We are also working hard on a second grant to fund the development of two new wells.

**State Drought Laws**: The state of California passed new water rules effective on Sept 1, 2014. They read: "To promote water conservation, the following is prohibited:


- Watering that results in water flowing off the property, or onto pavements and non-irrigated areas;
- The use of a hose that does not have an automatic shut-off nozzle that stops flowing if you drop the hose, when washing motor vehicles;
- Watering or washing driveways or sidewalks;
- and, the use of potable water in a fountain, unless the water is recirculated.

Violation of these actions is punishable by a fine of up to \$500 for each day in violation." The CCSD Board urges all customers to abide by these rules.

#### PG&E Awards Funding for our Foothill Fire Safety

Great news! PG&E awarded the Yuba

Watershed Protection and Fire Safe Council (YWP&FSC) six grants in late August to benefit fire safety efforts in the Yuba foothill community. A grateful thank you to Chris Schroder, PG&E representative assigned to the YWP&FSC. Chris used his listening skills at various monthly Council meetings to discern whether our foothill community has "shovel ready" projects that could be completed by October 31, 2014.

Funding will provide much needed equipment to the Smartsville and Camptonville Volunteer Fire Departments as listed in the Community Wildfire Protection Plan. Awards will also provide brush-clearing efforts along Moonshine Road and the Challenge 4-H camp. Other funding will help folks with special needs (low income, disabled, or elderly) clear defensible space around their homes, provide infrastructure for a chipping program, and signs to raise residents' awareness about the law requiring a 100-foot clearance around homes.

#### **River Cleanup**

Hats off to Camptonville School for helping to keep our watershed clean! Students and staff will participate in the Sierra Nevada Conservancy's Great Sierra River Cleanup on **September 15th** at the Oregon Creek Day Use Area. This is the third year students and staff have participated in the cleanup which is a state-wide effort to remove trash from river corridors, promote river stewardship, and affirm the desire for clean water and healthy rivers.

Last year, Camptonville students removed over 60 pounds of trash and recycling in less than two hours including, but not limited to: diapers, cigarette butts, clothing, bedding, glass bottles, cans, food wrappers, and straw wrappers. The Sierra Nevada Conservancy's cleanup effort, in partnership with the California Coastal Cleanup Day, serves to care for the State's waterways from the headwaters to the sea.

Reminder, the US Forest Service and Calfire have issued a burn ban. No fires outside of designated campgrounds! Also, it is extremely important to have your 100-foot clearance surrounding your property. This could improve the chances of saving your home, should a vegetation fire erupt.

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#### **Ohio Museum Seeks Pelton Water Wheel**

The Pelton Water Wheel is critical in supplying hydroelectric power around the world, and Lester Pelton ranks among the most important and well known inventors in history. Sadly, here in Camptonville where Mr. Pelton made his remarkable innovation, few know much about him or what made his water wheel so much better than others. This lack of recognition is also the case in Vermilion, Ohio, where Lester Pelton was born and spent his early years before joining a group of other young men traveling west in the California Gold Rush.



Local Vermilion historian, Richard Tarrant, is working to bring more attention to Pelton's life and work. Richard's grandfather operated a print shop in Vermillion for many years. The shop has stood idle for

many years, but now Richard and his wife are turning it into a museum featuring the old presses and typesetting equipment that remain from its heyday of operation. (You can visit https://www.facebook.com/VermilionNewsPrintShopMuseum to learn more).

As the museum will also display other artifacts of the past, Richard would dearly love to obtain a Pelton wheel to highlight the achievements of Lester Pelton and his world-changing invention.

Rod Bondurant, treasurer of the Camptonville History Society, recently returned from a visit to Vermilion, a pleasant town located on the shore of Lake Erie and popular with tourists. Rod met with Richard, who graciously provided a tour of the town and the sites related to Lester Pelton, including his very humble grave.

The History Society has been in contact with Richard for some time, and now that our two towns, both important in Lester's life, are developing museums, we hope the connection will become even stronger and that we can work together to raise awareness of this almost forgotten inventor.

The History Society is hoping that someone in our area has a Pelton wheel that they would be willing to donate for display at the museum in Vermilion. If you have any information or ideas that would help us find a wheel of a manageable size, the History Society will happily handle shipping it to Mr. Tarrant in Vermilion. #### Bullards Report By Hal Stocker, 5th District

Supervisor, Yuba County So, do you think Bullards

Bar is low? Well, yes it is, but it's still one half full! And it's a




lot better off than Oroville, Shasta, and Folsom reservoirs. It's better off due to our great "wet" watershed that gets more rain and snow per acre than any other California watershed.

Bullards Bar water level is now at 1,833 feet above sea level, and when it's full, it's at 1,956 feet; so the water level is now down 123 feet. There are now 486,000 acre feet of water in the lake---whereas there were 966,100 acre feet when it was full. So, it is still 50% full. That's a lot of water for cruising and fishing .... and sight-seeing.


The Yuba County Water Agency's FERC re-licensing program is pretty much on track, considering it will take a couple of years more than planned to complete two of the studies due to low water levels. We're looking at 2020 for completion.



A report from the marina says fishing is good---for bass, kokanee, and trout. A monster 8 pound spotted bass was landed a while ago. There's still plenty of water for the fish. The lake is 400 feet deep!



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#### Mumm Sawmill Part 4: Moving the Logs By Robert Mumm

Once one log is cut up, another is needed. If it is a small log, Dad rolls it onto the carriage by himself. If it is large, my brother comes up past the saw and helps load it onto the

carriage. For really big logs, Raymond has to come up too. Cant hooks or peaveys are used to move the logs, turning and rolling them. My brother John has to be careful as he grows stronger for fear of breaking them. This also applies to turning the log to cut the successive faces as it is squared up.

In this mill, all the power used to move and turn logs is human power, except moving the carriage along its track, and even that was done by human power in an earlier version of this mill. My Dad cranked the logs through with a windlass for the first couple of years until my brother reworked a Model "T" transmission to make a feedworks to run the carriage back and forth.

Well, that last log was a tough old butt-cut, and the saw needs to be sharpened, so they are shutting the mill down. Notice how calm it suddenly is. Dad will have a smoke and then file the saw's teeth, while Brother John and Raymond will use the time to get sawdust and bark fragments out of the way. I do a full cleaning of the mill after school each day, but things have to be kept clean as they go.

I guess Dad has to show off a bit as he reaches into a shirt pocket and pulls out a packet of cigarette papers, separates one, and forms it to a "V" with one hand, while opening his tobacco pouch with the other. Somehow the tobacco goes in just so, and he then seals the paper with his tongue as his smoking things are put away.

This time the saw will only be filed, but when the teeth are really worn, they will be replaced by using a special tool that engages a locking device, which holds them in circular cages in this inserted tooth blade. The first saw blade used in this mill didn't have these replaceable teeth, but depended entirely on filing deeper and deeper.

There is no mill whistle, but as soon as Dad has finished with the saw, my brother will start the engines, and there will be the "slap, slap" of flat belts driving the main saw and the feedworks.

#### Yuba River Ranger District Report By Betty Leffew

Not much news this time. Please remember that we are in fire restrictions. No campfires outside of designated campgrounds. Please make sure your campfire is totally out when you leave your campsite. No campfires in the backcountry. Portable stoves can be used but campers must have a valid campfire permit. Please remember that you are responsible for the safety of your campfire or portable device. By obtaining a campfire permit, you are agreeing to abide by all of the conditions on the permit. You can still stop by any Forest Service office to obtain your campfire permit in person and get any questions or concerns you may have addressed. Campfire permits are valid through the end of the calendar year.

You can now obtain a campfire permit online at http://www.preventwildfireca.org. This is a three step process:

- 1. Register with name and address.
- 2. Watch a required 2.5 minute video on campfire safety.
- 3. Successfully answer all questions to pass the quiz.

Once you have completed all of these steps you can print and sign your campfire permit, to keep with you.

Listed below are some important dates to remember: November 1 - No cutting of standing dead hardwood November 15 - Sierra County rivers and streams close for fishing.

December 31 - Fuelwood season closes. Rainfall for the month of August is .35 inches. Have a safe and fun Labor Day!

#### Is that Campfire Really Out? Use "Drown, Stir and Feel"

Here are three steps to make certain your open campfire is completely extinguished, using "drown, stir and feel."

- 1. Drown the fire with water.
- 2. *Stir* around the fire area with your shovel to wet any remaining embers and ash. Be sure to turn wood and coals over and wet all sides. Move some dirt onto the fire site and mix thoroughly to fully smother it.
- 3. *Feel* the area with the back of your hand to ensure nothing is still smoldering.

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#### Update from Forest Biomass Business Center!

About a dozen individuals showed up to the Open House Meeting on August 21 to hear next steps and learn of ways to be involved in the development of the Forest Biomass Business Center (FBBC). Chris Friedel, project manager for Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP), led the discussion and brought new insight to the gathering. Attending were representatives from county government, UCD Cooperative Extension, PG&E, TSS Consulting, Camptonville Community Service District and community members from as far away as Pike.

Chris shared news of project development, explaining the steps that have brought us to where we are now. In August, CCP received a grant from the Sierra Nevada Conservancy



to keep the community informed and connected to the undertaking and to hire a consultant with the technical expertise to guide the project's next steps.

Coming up in September, CCP, working with the Yuba Watershed Protection and Firesfe Council (YWP&FSC), will work through a selection committee to develop a Request for Proposals to send out to consultant firms from around the nation. The consultant will develop a feasibility study that will bring us through the next two phases.

*Phase One* will give us an in depth understanding of the laws and regulations governing the project, identify opportunities for co-located businesses and perform a technology analysis and prioritization.

In *Phase Two* the project will look at the Celestial Valley old mill site in depth to propose the best electricity generating technology to use, give a current biomass feedstock assessment, discern the technical feasibility, economic feasibility and offer a facility financial analysis. The end product will give the community the recommendations necessary to move forward or not.

Toward the end of the meeting Cathy LeBlanc led the group through a visioning process, asking them to use their imagination to tour the future, when the project is completed and prospering. At the same time Jeanne Black let folks know how she will capture some of their most striking ideas and turn them into images. *(Continued next column)*

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



USC Telehealth can help with: parental support, child and adult special needs, stress, depression, anxiety, couples therapy, work/life balance, grief and loss and much more.
