### Terry Riley in Camptonville

August 29th was an extraordinary night, as an obviously emotional Terry Riley performed in his hometown for the very first time. The sold-out inaugural audience at our new Camptonville Community Center packed into the cozy yet more than adequate performance space to have composer and keyboard giant Riley transport us into beyond the beyond.

Riley's eclecticism was at the forefront. Opening each act with an Indian vocal raga to electronic tambura and tabla accompaniment, Terry's voice never sounded more assured, more clear, and more devotional. Jumping next into an improvisatoryseeming yet thoroughly composed piano piece, "I like Your Eyes Liberty," Terry's pianism wowed the crowd. What a lovely, harmonically-rich work it was, combining Terry's background in jazz stylings with his own trademark swirling pulses.

Using a large electronic keyboard with an apparently infinite array of voices and multi-tracking capabilities, several of the following pieces ventured into dense layers of atmosphere. Terry closed the first act with "The Camptonville Strut." The work revealed the wit and fun-loving side of Terry, and the attendees were most pleased; how could they not be?

After generously sharing time with fans during the intermission, Terry returned to the hall for more of the same. The audience, which seemed to be evenly divided between locals and Nevada County residents, responded with increased enthusiasm after each piece. "The Camptonville Strut" returned as the encore and got the whole crowd rockin' to its feet. This was a fantastic debut for our brand new venue that hopes to bring a wide variety of entertainment and other services to the foothill community. Keep us on your radar! 

activities, folks seem to have planned very little for October.




#### Breathe out ....

Fairfield and reopened the IVO Resort on May 22, 2015, making it the "go to" place for campers enjoying the many beautiful campgrounds in the North Yuba River/Indian Valley area. They also offer the unique experiences of dining in a "Classic 50's" restaurant or camping in a Teepee!

Karla happened upon the Outpost when, during a road trip, nature called and she had to make a stop. The Outpost was closed at the time, but she and Dave later discovered, while looking for possible retirement property, that it was for sale. 
# Like a Warm, Summer Shower...

### The Water Report


You could almost hear the collective sigh when it rained on the evening of September 16th. But, as your proverbial bearer of bad news, I'm here to say "the drought continues." At the August 24th CCSD Board Meeting, the board elected to invoke "drought restrictions" in Camptonville, limiting customers to 10,000 gallons per month per meter with no economic impact unless you go over the 10,000 gallon limit. Then, it hurts: Customers going over the limit will pay the full cost of producing water, or \$10 per 1,000 gallons.

But wait, there is good news to share: First, customers have responded and overall water use has dropped from a steady 12-16 gallons per minute to 10-11 gallons per minute. With approximately 150 water users in town, we are now using 105 gallons per day per person. We are right there at society's minimum water allotment of 100 gallons per day.


Second, we are now supplementing the Campbells Gulch water with well water. We are limiting our take from the creek to 6 gpm, and running both our wells 6 to 8 hours per day such that both sources provide a 50-50 share in water production. As a result, we are able to keep a small amount of water flowing past our diversion structure, keeping aquatic life downstream moist. You may have noticed a change in the water taste: The water is at times bitter and metallic tasting: those are the days when we produce more well water than creek water, and the high iron and manganese content of our local ground water changes the overall water quality. But, it's not bad and beats the alternative.

Third and last, CCSD was informed in early September that our application to the USDA Rural Development Service has been accepted. We have been offered a combination grant and loan package to design and construct Phase 2 of our water system improvement project. A grant of \$590,802 and a 40-year, 2.125% loan of \$69,000 has been offered and would be used to drill two new wells and construct a well water treatment facility to strip out the bitter taste of iron and manganese, should the CCSD board elect to move forward with the package deal. Funds to pay for the loan and to build a reserve fund for the replacement of short-lived assets must - as a condition of the USDA offer - must be paid for by a monthly water rate increase. Should the board move forward, expect to hear more about that very soon.

Consumption remained flat at 12 gpm but has since dropped to 10-11 gpm range, following adoption of Drought Restrictions.
The deficit in creek water is now made up with well water.
We're not out of the woods yet, but we are still gifted with flowing water. Thanks to All who contribute to meeting our water needs!





# Free "Every Kid in a Park" Pass for 4th Graders!

Fourth graders can visit the new website

www.everykidinapark.gov to obtain a pass that provides free access for students and their families to all federally-managed lands and waters – including national forests, grasslands, wildlife refuges and waters. The pass is for the '15-'16 school year and grants free entry for fourth graders and three accompanying adults at more than 2,000 federally-managed sites.

With the cooler weather upon us, it is a great time to visit the district trails. The Sierra Buttes area is beautiful this time of year with fall colors starting to show.

Fuelwood cutting is still open with a permit. You must call in (288-3231) to see if it is a cut day before you go out to get your wood. Remember, you have until December 31st to get your firewood cut. You can only cut dead standing hardwood until November 1st. Dooryard burn permits are still suspended until further notice.

Bullards Bar will be closing for the season on October 15th. The campgrounds along Highway 49 and the high country are open until end of October. After that they become *no services*, *no fees*. (Private campgrounds remain open - Editor)

It is Deer Season, so use caution while in the woods. The season closes on November 1st in D3, 4, and 5. We finally got a little rain in September, but only .15 of an inch.


# Update: Forest Fires Put Defensible Space Assistance on Hold

Hi folks, Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) has been working with the Yuba County Water Protection and Fire Safe Council to help elderly, disabled, or low-income homeowners create 100-foot defensible space around their homes for fire protection (through a grant from CalFire). While this defensible space is no guarantee homes will be saved if a forest fire roars through, fire fighters will have a much better chance to defend them.

In an ironic twist, these efforts in Yuba County have been delayed as a consequence of the recent forest fires that have devastated our state. CalFire personnel have not been able to process our CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act) Notice of Exemption. The project is eligible for an exemption because this work is on private land and there would be no "ground disturbing activity" performed. But understandably, forest fires take precedence for CalFire personnel. As a result, our defensible space assistance efforts are put on hold until we receive notice that the exemption has been granted.

We are hopeful this project will roll out before winter weather is upon us. Stay tuned. If you are an eligible Yuba County resident and would like to sign up for this service or would like more information, please call CCP at 288-9355.



### Do you have Life Flight Insurance Yet?

major medical issue, such as a heart attack, it is likely you may be flown by an air ambulance to a trauma center or a hospital that can better take care of you - up to an hour away here in the foothills. When time is of the essence, first responders may order an air ambulance. However, helicopter rides are expensive - in excess of \$25,000. First responders in our area do not get the option of which air ambulance will be dispatched. It could be Reach for Life, Enloe FlightCare, or may even be California Shock Trauma Air Rescue (CALSTAR).

The Camptonville community has a special annual membership rate of \$25 with Reach for Life, but this may be increasing. Enloe's annual membership rate is \$40/individual and \$50/family. CALSTAR's annual rate is \$45/individual and \$50/family. I would recommend memberships with both Reach for Life and Enloe FlightCare.


