and our anger and murderous rage into anything that might resemble peace. It makes us question if we are truly capable of creating a world of compassion, community, and deep communion.



Let's Rock This Party! Saturday, December 5th





Diary of Mary Alexander
Variel."

The Variels were some of the first pioneers to settle in Camptonville. Variel Lane is named for this family. In 1852, Mary, her husband Joshua, and their two small children traveled from New Harmony, Indiana to

Camptonville in an ox-drawn covered wagon. Mary described the decision to make the trip as follows:

"My husband and I were greatly interested in the inducements a trip to California offered, and while we frequently discussed the possibilities of such a venture, we were thoroughly alive to and considered the toil, danger and uncertainty that would attend it, but countless stories of the boundless gold fields, where we could go out with a basket and pick up a supply of gold nuggets at any time, overcame any fears we had entertained, and we concluded to join the first expedition that was organized in our neighborhood."

Rod Bondurant (aka The History Geek) says: "It's a must read! Imagine leaving home to go collecting baskets of gold nuggets! I enjoyed this 110-page illustrated book; Mary was a savvy and resourceful woman, and her writings bring to life the story of the long dangerous trip from Indiana. This book is an easy read and gives good personal insight into what it took to survive in those challenging times."






What's Happening at the Community Center?

If You Consume It, You Could Die!

BPA stands for BISPHENOL-A, a chemical that can be really harmful to humans and the environment. When I say harmful, I mean it can kill you and the environment. BPA can cause heart disease and diabetes if you consume it. For example, if you left your plastic water bottle in the sun and you came back for some water, you might have just drunk BPA. Plastics buried deep in landfills can leach harmful chemicals (like BPA) into drinking water.

Burning plastics can release toxic fumes with BPA. When plastic is manufactured it creates large quantities of chemicals that might be absorbed by humans. 92% of Americans age 6 or older test positive for BPA. Plastics don't biodegrade, but they are at a risk for photo degradation, which is light exposure that dissolves them into polymer (small) particles, which have BPA.

According to the article "The Truth About Plastics,"*
chemical building blocks that make plastic so versatile are the
same components that might harm humans and the
environment. If you are using plastic water bottles, you have a
risk of getting BPA. Some of your drinking straws, clothes, soda
bottles, detergent bottles, and even your toothbrushes might
have BPA. BPA could even be in your plumbing pipes.
According to information from www.NOAA oceanservice.com,
you could be drinking BPA all the time.

Don't consume BPA! Buy BPA-free items like glass or metal containers and drink from water bottles that are metal or glass.

son just got out his computer and signed us all up for the 2015 event. No refunds! So I figured, what a way




