The Trip by Riverboat

Stephanie Korney of the Camptonville Historical Society introduces an excerpt from "Crossing the Plains: The Diary of Mary Alexander Variel" (to Camptonville from New Harmony, Indiana, by ox-drawn wagon)

In 1852, early Camptonville pioneer, Mary Alexander Variel, and her family left Indiana to make the long journey to California. She made the trip with her husband and three-year-old son and six-month-old daughter. The trip began in April with a 17-day journey on the steamboat "Brooklyn," from Evansville to St. Joseph, Missouri. They traveled three rivers: the Ohio, the Mississippi, and the Missouri.

According to Mary, "The trip down the Ohio was a very pleasant outing. We had music and singing, and in the evening two fiddlers furnished music for regular old-time dances, in which most of the passengers indulged. Everyone seemed light-hearted...If we had realized then what was ahead of us, I believe (the steamship captain) would have been compelled to turn back and return us all to Evansville. I supposed, though that it was the prize of golden nuggets that were awaiting our baskets that lured us on, for we did not turn back."

Trouble began when they reached the Missouri, a rough, turbulent river with many sunken logs posing a danger to the boat. Luckily, when the "Brooklyn" hit a snag the collision happened in daylight; if it had been night, everyone would likely have drowned. A day later, there was a fire on board. Mary quickly took advantage of the shallow water to carry her children to a safe place on land. "It did not occur to me at the time what in the world I should have done there alone in that wilderness with my children, if the boat had burned up." The fire turned out to be just a burning feather-bed.

After the travelers arrived at St. Joe, they learned that the old "Brooklyn" had sunk. Mary realized for the first time the danger they had faced on their river trip. "I learned from that pilot that the boat was a rotten old craft, and that she had been greatly overloaded, and that we had really taken great chances in making the voyage in her."

And then the Variels began the "real" journey west.

- Because our long-standing desire for a community center was in this plan (the outcome of every Town Hall meeting since 1997), we've had support in getting our new Community Center up and running.
- This plan also enabled Camptonville youth to give input to the Yuba County Parks Master Plan.

Now our community goals needs to be refreshed and we need your voice!

After dinner, the 2016 Town Hall will be a fast-paced meeting, starting with a community survey, then large and small group discussions where we'll define what we value in our community. We'll decide on our top issues, dig deeper into those issues, and finally decide which are the top ones to work on. And finally, we'll celebrate with the raffle.

to Lennon–McCartney. It was first performed by the Beatles on *Our World*, the first live global television link. Watched by over 400 million people in 25 countries, the program was broadcast via satellite on June 25, 1967.

The Beatles were asked to come up with a song with a message understood by everyone. "It was an inspired song and they really wanted to give the world a message," said Brian Epstein. "The nice thing about it is that it cannot be misinterpreted. It is a clear message saying that love is everything."

According to journalist Jade Wright, "Lennon was fascinated by the power of slogans to unite people and never afraid to create art out of propaganda. When asked in 1971 whether songs like "Give Peace a Chance" and "Power to the People" were propaganda songs, Lennon answered:

'Sure. So was "All You Need Is Love." I'm a revolutionary artist. My art is dedicated to change.' "

Drop by drop, rain has steadily soaked our parched soil and begun to nourish the forest here in Camptonville. At the Ranger Station, we have been fortunate to have received 13.65 inches of rain as of January 27th, compared to a mere 0.58 inches for the same month last winter. The season total since July is currently at 35.36 inches, and the long-term forecast looks promising for additional precipitation.

The long nights and cloudy days of winter may have cut into your firewood supply, but fear not: 2016 Fuelwood cutting permits for Tahoe National Forest System Lands are currently available at the Camptonville Office. Remember that only softwoods and dead and down hardwoods may be cut until May 1st.

Campground Hosts Needed

Lastly, we are looking for qualified and energetic campground hosts for select campgrounds throughout the Tahoe National Forest, including Cal-Ida and Wild Plum along Highway 49. If you or anyone you know is interested, please contact Cory Richardson at 288-3231. Volunteers are required to furnish their own RV, but will receive a reimbursement of \$200 per week to help cover expenses.

Randy Fletcher, Yuba County 5th District Supervisor, was recently appointed as an alternate to the Board of the Sierra Nevada Conservancy (SNC). This agency was




created by legislation (AB 2600) that became law in 2004, and impacts 22 counties that are either partly or wholly located in the Sierra Nevada mountains. Yuba County is part of the Central region, along with Nevada, Placer, and El Dorado counties.

The mission of this agency is: "Sierra Nevada Conservancy initiates, encourages, and supports efforts that improve the environmental, economic, and social well-being of the Sierra Nevada Region, its communities, and the citizens of California."

With that in mind, the agency provides funding for local projects that encourage tourism, recreation, protection, conservation, and restoration of natural resources, as well as reducing the risk of natural disasters such as fires.

SNC funding for projects comes from a variety of sources: Proposition 84 Grant Program, the Environmental License Plate Fund, Proposition 1, and various state and federal agencies such as EPA, CA Dept. of Fish and Wildlife, the National Forest Foundation, and Cal Fire to name a few.

At the most recent meeting in Sonora, CA, on December 9-10, 2015, Mr. Fletcher participated in a field trip to the Rim Fire area to discuss issues and projects regarding wildfire recovery and resiliency in that area. Items for discussion at the board meeting included the awarding of Proposition 1 Grants for approved projects. 

Tahoe National Forest Names Eli Ilano Acting Forest Supervisor

He brings years of natural resource and public land management experience, including working for the past five years as the Deputy Forest Supervisor of the Tahoe National Forest. His past experience also involves working for the Bureau of Land Management, United States Senate, and in the non-profit sector in communities around the country, focusing on natural resource issues.





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Forest Biomass Business Center Update By Regine Miller, CCP

The Forest Biomass Business Center continues to make progress. CCP, in coordination with the Nevada County Biomass Task Force (NCBTF), selected TSS Consultants to complete a site plan and a conditional use permit for both the Camptonville and Nevada County facilities. Work is set to begin in mid-January.

CCP and NCBTF also expect to begin work with Phoenix Energy for the System Impact Study for each facility in January. CCP submitted a grant application to the National Forest Foundation in mid-November, which would increase its organizational and financial capacity to continue outreach, and to select an ownership model and project developer using a community-based process.

As a jump start to the grant application, CCP has held initial conversations with the site landowner, the CCP Board of Directors, legal counsel, and business counsel on possible ownership options. We expect it to take several months and a couple of community meetings to determine the business structure that meets the landowner, community, and CCP's desires, and are eager to see it established so that the project may then move forward with selecting a developer.

With 2 seconds remaining in the game, eighth-grader Kyle Ledson stepped to the free throw line with his team up by one point. With the outcome hanging in the balance, Ledson calmly sank both free throws to ice the game and give the Camptonville Cougars basketball team a 47-44 regular season victory over Mount Saint Mary's in the Nevada County Small Schools basketball league.

"I feel like this is a great team," Ledson said with a wide smile after the game. "We've all been working really hard and we're all together all the time. We grew up together, we know each other well."

With a small pool of players to choose from (there are about 70 total students at Camptonville Elementary, kindergarten through eighth grade), the Cougars take what they can get, said coach Jeff Ledson, Kyle's father. "Routine work drives out non-routine work and smothers to death all creative planning, all fundamental change..." -The Essential Bennis

So what does that mean? For some, a new way of looking at the same future or perhaps an old faded glory becomes fresh? Well why not? Isn't all this, the reality of our universe, our personal reality, the way we leave our legacy? Why can't we just put our best foot forward and get on with our lives? Why indeed?

Here's a few words from author Dave Logan to get a conversation with your Leadership Yoda going: "The Leadership Saboteur seeks to displace reflection-causing epiphanies and work that would create transformation, i.e. structural, and lasting change, with routine work and distractions. The Leadership Saboteur and Leadership Yoda both know that confusion is like the turbulence early test flight pilots reported as they neared the speed of sound. After pushing through, Chuck Yeager and his fellow speed pioneers regained full control of their planes and felt a surge of acceleration."

As the new year begins, spend a few hours in this reflective mindset reviewing the year. If you keep a journal, read it. If you don't, reread old emails, or scroll through your calendar. What happened? What were the patterns? What did you learn? What did you fail to learn that would have made you more effective? What did you learn about leadership? What will you do differently in 2016?

Finally, as the pace of life picks up in 2016, inform your Leadership Yoda that you will ask the following question in the future: "What has become clear to you since we last met?" Pick a date on your calendar now when you will schedule a meeting, free of distractions, with your Leadership Yoda. You might even write that question in the calendar entry. One last piece of advice: the moment these "steps" become a process, stop them immediately. Remember, routine work is the domain of the Leadership Saboteur.

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Fire Safety Programs Update

Firstly: Hooray, rain! It has almost felt like too much rain, but don't let the feelings of relief brought by a few moments of blue sky make you forget about the months of hot, hot, hot we've had these last few years. The environment was, is, and will continue to be in dire need of more precipitation. So, although fire danger may be the farthest thing from your mind right now, now is actually the perfect time to get your home and property prepped for wildfire. Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) would like to remind everyone of the free chipping and defensible space clearance available through Yuba County's Fire Safe Council.

The free **Residential Chipping Program** is provided in partnership with Yuba County. The County will chip debris that residents have already cleared on properties off of any county maintained road or County Service Area road. Don't know whether your road falls under either category? Call us at 288-9355 and ask -- we're your neighbors; we're friendly. It's free to apply and free to get services. The chipper is ready and waiting!

The Fire Safe Council also offers a **Defensible Space Assistance Program.** This program is designed to help those who are physically or economically unable to create the state-mandated 100 ft defensible space around their homes. The program includes an initial one-day cleanup of brush and woody fuels, reduction of fire danger in immediate surroundings of home, and on-site education about maintaining effective defensible space. CCP apologizes to those who have already requested this service and had to wait due to a hiccup in the system. We are expecting Cal Fire to release the funds for this project very soon and will then begin scheduling work. We thank you for your patience and encourage anyone who is not yet set up to receive services to contact us for an application.
