





Camptonville Town Hall Meeting Reveals Community Interest and Issues By Cathy LeBlanc

As Camptonville Community Partnership dug deeper into the Town Hall's small group work, we discovered more of Camptonville's interests. We saw similarities surface across issue areas and a willingness of some folks to take action in at least some of these areas. For many groups, the new Community Center was seen as under-utilized. The discussion that developed from the four prioritized breakout groups: Economics, Recreational Opportunities, Services, and Community Culture and Connectedness answered a set of questions as follows:

The Economics and Business group saw cottage industry and interest in artistry, gardening, etc. as a way to boost our economy. They explored the ideas of a marketing cooperative for job training, shared office space, and access to technology and grants. They discussed developing a time-share bank (service exchange), and discovering funding source possibilities including loan-angels. They also noted Camptonville could utilize its natural resources aimed at tourist industries.

The Recreation group answered the question: "How do we get there?" by stating their goal as providing recreation services to the community and helping sustain the Community Center. They looked to collaboration with others, seeking funding grants for desired activities and personnel. The next question they answered was "What is in the way of getting there?" They noted that to sustain the Community Center it would take people, community support, and money. Although CCSD and CCP are working on this, they felt it would be beneficial to develop collaboration agreements with USFS, the Yuba County Water Agency, and Camptonville School, and that more collaboration between neighboring communities (Downieville, Sierra City, NSJ, Dobbins) was in order. They noted that due process and resistance to change (or perhaps better stated as maintaining our culture) are barriers to overcome.

Next up was Services, ie: transportation, law enforcement, fire protection, housing, auto repair, etc. This group answered: "How do we get there?" by noting we need to squeak a lot, be involved at the county level (where the money is), be collaborative with sister counties, speak up, visualize needs, find funding/investors, create a grassroots council to do the above, and support CCP in its role to help accomplish all this. Folks listed money, knowledge (not knowing who can help), education, our changing but unknown needs, our rural location, small population (not much demand), and our unfocused voice as barriers. We need wide involvement from the people living here, including the existing community and businesses, Yuba County and Supervisor (all services), State/Feds, Business Owners- investors- the private sector, and YOU!

The last priority issue that surfaced was Culture. What makes us happy and thriving? This was seen as our involvement with and our connectedness to our neighbors. They saw our "moral value" as being a place to start to answer the question: "Who are we?" They felt a desire to reconnect to each other through community events: music, phone calls, and personal connections. They also felt a venue to talk over our concerns and interests was a vital way to get more people involved and to engage younger people. This coincided with noting the need for more support to keep the Community Center open more often. Some of their ideas to engage folks included the creation of a *Wishing Wall*, developing *Questions of the Week* and monthly meet-ups where folks can just show up for regular, topic-based interaction.



Next we asked, is there anything in the way of accomplishing this? They listed fear of all types: emotional, law, regulations, judgment, and differences added to our disconnection as well as isolation. Why don't we have it already? Here folks felt a need for more volunteers, especially for the Community Center, but also for marketing and promotion of events. They listed the Community Center Steering Committee, CCP, CCSD (cemetery, water, community center, fire), and the Historical Society as some of the groups already working on this. This group felt we needed to engage younger people. As one person said: "Look around the room. Where are the families?"

This sentiment was echoed throughout the evening. Although a very mighty 36 folks showed up, we wanted to know why more were not present. CCP can act as a hub to further correlate this info into community action. New Bullards Bar Recovering from the Drought

New Bullards Bar Reservoir storage is finally recovering after four years of what some newspaper articles have reported as a 1,000-year drought. While the drought severely stressed the reservoir storage and water supplies, the benefit of surface water storage proved its value for water supply to Yuba County Water Agency's (YCWA) eight irrigation district customers and fishery flows in the Lower Yuba River.


The very good news is that for the first time in four years YCWA water operations have moved from minimum flow drought operations to spill releases so water storage will not encroach into the New Bullards Bar flood pool. The spills are a requirement because the federal government paid \$12 million to control the top 38 feet of winter storage in New Bullards Bar.

What a difference a year makes. March rainfall, expected at about 200% of average, has made up for the poor February rainfall that was 27% of average. Now the seasonal rainfall and snowpack will be above average, which is excellent news compared to last year's snow pack that was a mere 6% of average. The additional runoff and snowpack from the March storms ensure full summer and fall agricultural water delivery and provide enough water supply to maintain reasonable carryover storage in New Bullards Bar reservoir.

The water storage carried over from one year to the next created the ability to deliver more water to our irrigation districts than nature would have provided during the drought. Without this storage, our customers would have suffered more than the 30% cut experienced in 2015, and the water temperature in the Lower Yuba River would likely have been too warm for the spring run Chinook Salmon and Steelhead Trout to survive.

On December 9, 2015, New Bullards Bar storage was the lowest it had been in three and a half decades at 340,110 acre-feet. While this may seem like a lot of water, there is a 234,000 acre foot minimum pool regulatory requirement which means there was only 15% of usable capacity of storage remaining. Another year of drought would have had severe consequences to the farmers, fish, and people. Thankfully, this year is turning out to be better than average.

Time to gear up, get out, and enjoy the new look of our rivers, lakes, and streams. We got a whopping 14.19 inches of rain recorded in the rain gauge for the month of March thus far, putting us at 56.93 inches this year! As a result, rivers have been raging and Bullards Bar Reservoir has certainly benefited from the rain as well.

Bullards Bar Reservoir is looking much fuller and Emerald Cove Marina has had many reports that the spotted bass fishing is great right now. With the weather starting to take a turn, now is a great time to get out and enjoy some outdoor activities. It would be a great time to check out the beautiful trails our Tahoe National Forest has to offer: feel free to stop by the Yuba River Ranger Station to pick up free trail maps.

Now that we are coming into some clear days, it may be a good time to maintain defensible space around your house and outbuildings. Burn permits are not currently required to burn natural vegetation from your property, but be sure to call 741-6299 prior to burning to find out if it's a burn day in Yuba County.

Camptonville VFD received five calls this month: three medical and two MVA (Motor Vehicle/Motorcycle Accidents).

Our roster is down to 13, but only about 10 come to regular trainings and half respond to emergency calls.

We are always looking for volunteers! Trainings are **Tuesday evenings, 6 - 9 pm**. One night a month, we go to NSJ for medical training. Come check us out!
