# Who Knew? Plaque on our Meek Monument is the Work of California Public Artist

One of the three monuments at the foot of Cleveland Avenue that we pass on our way in and out of town commemorates town father William Bull Meek. It was installed by E Clampus Vitus (ECV) brethren and commissioned from one of their own, the sculptor William Gordon Huff. Huff created a number of works for public spaces, notably several large pieces for the Golden Gate International Exposition on San Francisco Bay's Treasure Island in 1939, as well as sculpted heads, diorama figures, and drawings for a University of California Department of Paleontology exhibit, a large figure of Chief Solano on display in Fairfield, a series of ceramic tiles for the ECV Hall of Comparative Ovation

at the Old Timers Museum in Murphys, and numerous historical plaques throughout
central California, Vermont, New York, Massachusetts, Illinois, Florida, and even Antarctica.

Rod Bondurant, Rochelle Bell, and I met with Huff's son Tim and David K. Smith of the UC Museum of Paleontology (recently retired) at the Meek monument after David contacted *Courier* Editor Shirley Dickard with what he thought might be a story of local interest to Camptonville. We had a great visit with David and Tim, and learned about the artist who created the Meek plaque. David is working on a biography of William Gordon Huff and shared the following information with us.

William Gordon Huff was born in Fresno in 1903 and spent his high school years in the East Bay. Although a history buff, Huff decided to study art, attending schools in Oakland, San Francisco, New York City, and Paris, France. Huff made the first of what would be many historical plaques in Bennington, Vermont, in 1929 to commemorate Civil War soldiers. Huff's first historical plaque in California was a 1933 tribute to Francis Marion "Borax" Smith, founder of the Key System, an early East Bay mass transit system.

Also in 1933, Huff entered and won a competition to create a sculpture of the Suisuni chief, Francisco Solano or Chief Solano. The 12-foot tall sculpture can still be seen in Fairfield today.

Huff's biggest claim to fame was his work for the Golden Gate International Exposition of 1939–1940 on Treasure Island. He designed four figures for the fair's centerpiece—the Tower of the Sun—representing Art, Science, Agriculture, and Industry. Two of each of these were scaled up to 20-foot-tall plaster statues to stand in bays in the octagonal Tower. Huff also designed a male figure for the Arch of Triumph and a female figure for the Court of Flowers (28 nine-foot-tall plaster duplicates decorated buttresses around the perimeter). # Del Sol Quartet - July 16th in Camptonville!

Of Del Sol Quartet's latest release, *The New York Times* enthused: "See if your foot can stay still once you put on this funky disc of rhythmically infectious . . . music." Banish all thoughts of tux-wearing, uptight classical musicians when you think of this exciting group coming to the Camptonville Performing Arts Center, Saturday, July 16th.

Sure, they can play the standard repertory, but since their beginning in 1992, their reach has extended to commissioning and performing new works, including works by local composer and Series Curator Terry Riley. What a gift it is for our little town to feature artists like Del Sol who have graced the halls of The Kennedy Center, The Library of Congress, The National Gallery of Art, Smithsonian's Freer Gallery in Washington DC, and many, many, more, including tours of Switzerland, France, China, South Korea, Canada, and Mexico. Del Sol has also held residencies at various educational institutions across the US.

There remains a strong international element to their music, having recorded works by composers from Peru, Spain, Turkey, Iran, Uzbekistan, Australia, Denmark, and on and on.

This extraordinarily varied repertoire perhaps reflects the group's eclectic mix of personnel. Founding member violist Charlton Lee earned a B.S. degree in Applied Mathematics and Physics from Berkeley before obtaining his Master's in Music from the San Francisco Conservatory. He also practices martial arts and is an avid chef. Violinist Benjamin Kreith rafts the Grand Canyon and is so fluent in Spanish as to have taught in Barcelona and translated a Spanish novel published this year. Violinist Rick Shinozaki has worked with local composer Jay Sydeman and performs regularly as part of a duo with pianist Irene Jacobson, creating works that have been called "scintillating" and "in perfect harmony." The New York Times has called Cellist Kathryn Bates' sound "beautifully rounded." She regularly takes time away from her cello on outdoor trails, either hiking, running, or backpacking.

# Free Introduction to Grant Writing Workshop

A one-day intensive workshop to build grant writing skills for organizations and agencies in the Sierra Nevada Region will be held on Thursday, August 18, 9 am to 4 pm at the Camptonville Community Center.

The Sierra Nevada Conservancy (SNC) looks to the agencies, organizations, and local governments in the Region to help achieve its vision for the future — that the magnificent Sierra Nevada Region enjoys outstanding environmental, economic, and social health, with vibrant communities and landscapes sustained for future generations. Camptonville Community Partnership is partnering with SNC to bring this workshop to our region.

Who should attend? Community, nonprofit, and local government representatives of all experience levels who want to learn how to prepare effective grant applications.

The workshop will cover the basics of grant writing and program development, including:

- · How to make your application as competitive as possible
- · Basic program development for effective grant writing
- . The eight standard parts of a grant application
- · How to create a work plan and budget spreadsheet

This will be a small, interactive class. Participation and homework will be required. Come prepared to discuss a real project that you would like to fund. Individual assistance will be provided on writing assignments. The instructor is Elissa Brown, SNC's Fund Development Coordinator, an experienced grant writer and grant writing instructor.



## Linden

Tilia spp. (americana, cordata, europaea, grandifolia)

Linden (Tilia spp.) has earned a special place in my heart. She is not



from this continent, however, but was brought over by settlers who could not live without her. Linden, also known as Lime or Basswood, was used for so much more than medicine. Endemic to northern Europe, the Linden tree can grow to over 100 ft tall and has heart shaped leaves. As a worm resistant wood, Linden was prized for many different purposes, used for everything from furniture, musical instruments, fine baskets, flax-like fiber to make fishing nets, to matting for gardeners, and more. The flowers, in full bloom, waft a most enchanting perfume into the air, drawing one near, like a honey bee (and bees really do love this tree). The flowers and bracts are the medicinal part of the tree.

Energetically, Linden is slightly sweet and cool and has a watery quality. It is used in conditions of hypertension and can be a great addition to an atherosclerosis therapeutic protocol, especially when combined with Cratageous spp. (Hawthorn).

Linden is also considered a diaphoretic, helpful in feverish colds, especially with children (often with presenting nervous system disturbances). It is helpful for recovering from viral infections as well. Some indications for Linden in nervous system support include: nervousness, insomnia, restlessness, irritability, or nervous headaches. I feel Linden to be a milder nervine, a bit more subtle than Skullcap, Passionflower, California Poppy ,Valerian, and many more. Yet, it is a wonderful addition to nervine formulas and can serve as a lead herb with hypertension-related issues.

There are places to visit Linden trees in Nevada City, and they are just reaching the end of their blooming season. If you are unable to meet Linden in person this year, you may try it as a tea or herbal infused honey. I will be offering seasonal, fresh infused honeys this summer and fall, and Linden will be the first! Contact me at harvestingvitality@gmail.com to order a jar. As with any herbs, please consult your health care practitioner before using if you are on medications, pregnant, or have any serious health conditions.

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
# The Water Report



The creek has begun its summer drop-off. While we've seen water spilling over the dam all spring, we're now measuring 4 inches over the weir, or about 150 gallons per minute running downstream. Last year at this time we had 1-1/2 inches over the weir, so we can say El Nino was good to us this year.

Consumption is following last year's trend. As I write today (6/20), we're flowing 16 gpm out of plant, same as last year. This is good, as we need to continue our conservation efforts. Thanks to all for the ongoing concern. May your gardens flourish!

We've seen some high over-night water usage, about 5 to 10 gpm for the town, which means some over-night watering is going on, perhaps a forgotten hose? Please check your irrigation systems before running inside from the mosquitos. Here's to a great summer!

# Change in Air Ambulance Services By Brandi Dudek, CVFD Chief



There have been recent changes in Air Ambulance Service for our area. Reach Flight Care has been sold and they will not honor CVFD's previous contract rates. The new membership for a family is \$65 per year. The CVFD will continue to pursue our community discount rate and hopefully when things settle down with the merger we can renegotiate. Since we don't know if our area still needs to purchase plans for both Enloe Flight Care and Reach Flight Care, please continue to purchase both and we will keep you informed. When the need arises for an air ambulance, we do not get the choice of which Flight Care service will be called. It all depends on who is available. To enroll, call Reach at 800-793-0010 and Enloe FlightCare at 530-332-7300.

Camptonville VFD has been very busy this month, paged out for 21 calls: 12 medicals, 1 vegetation fire in Dobbins, 1 structure fire, 2 debris/illegal burn piles, 1 trail rescue, and 4 MVA (Motor Vehicle/Motorcycle accidents).

CVFD responded to another structure fire where the home was fully involved with extension to the wildland. Fire danger is very high, so it is extremely important to have your 100' clearance. If this fire happened in July or August, we could have had a bad outcome with a full blown vegetation fire. Please be diligent and get your clearance done.

Our roster is down to 13 with 1 cadet, but only about 6 come to regular trainings and about half of those respond to emergency calls.

As always, we are looking for volunteers! Training is Tuesday evenings from 6–9 pm at the fire hall, with one night per month in NSJ for medical training. Stop by and check us out! We can always use non-firefighter volunteers for general support, such as paperwork and maintenance at the station. If interested in being part of a great team, feel free to give your Chief a call at 288-3303.

In 1935, Huff met Charles Camp, renowned vertebrate paleontologist and Director of the UC Museum of Paleontology (he has a dinosaur named after him). Camp was also an historian of the American West and an early member of E Clampus Vitus who served as Noble Grand Humbug of the Yerba Buena #1 Chapter in 1938. Camp and Huff remained friends for 40 years, and during that time, Huff worked on a number of projects for his friend as well as the Department and Museum of Paleontology. Huff created illustrations, more dioramas, and hallway exhibits. Along the way, he too, became involved with ECV and made a series of historical plaques for the group to install throughout California. And he made a number of ceramic tiles commemorating ECV members and other California notables, including Camptonville's own Bill Meek.

Huff died in 1993, and apart from the Clampers, few people have ever heard of him. Huff did not do gallery shows, and his work is not on display in major museums. But because Huff's art was primarily public art—his plaques, the Chief Solano statue in Fairfield, and the Ichthyosaur relief at Berlin-Ichthyosaur State Park in Nevada—thousands of people have seen his work, including all of us going to and from Camptonville.


