- Birds to watch for: Northern Flickers, Fox Sparrows, White and Gold-Crowned Sparrows, Pine Siskins, Goldfinches, and other fall migratory birds.
- Waterfowl begin to arrive in Marysville's flooded rice fields.
- · Deer are rutting.
- Full (Hunter's) Moon: October 16th; New Moon: October 30th.
- Draconids Meteor Shower: October 6–10 (peaks October 8th). Best viewed right after sunset.
- Orionids Meteor Shower peaks October 21–22. Best viewed just after midnight and right before dusk.
- Fall harvest ready to be picked and preserved!



This ancient system of personality types can help us recognize and eliminate barriers to change. It can deepen our capacity for freedom and self-awareness, as well as our empathy for others.

Many Camptonville residents have experienced Diane's Enneagram workshops. New and returning students are welcome at this workshop. You'll be introduced to the nine personality types and how to work with them, along with tools such as Gestalt Awareness Practice (GAP) to transform unconscious patterns of thinking and behavior. No preregistration is required.

Diane has taught the Enneagram for over 20 years for personal and workplace use. She uses the Enneagram as part of an integral approach to inner liberation with women serving life sentences at the Central California Women's Facility in Chowchilla.

Community Meeting for Forest Biomass Business Center Update – October 20th By Regine Miller, CCP

CCP invites you to attend a Forest Biomass Business Center (FBBC) community meeting **Thursday**, **October 20th**, **from 6:30 to 8 pm at the Camptonville Community Center.** CCP will provide an overview of the project and an update on the developer search, ownership model, and permitting. All are encouraged to attend and provide their input.

CCP is pleased to share that, in collaboration with a highly qualified team of consultants, researchers, and technology providers, it recently submitted a Phase 1 application to the California Energy Commission's Electric Program Investment Charge (EPIC) grant program requesting funds for advanced emissions control and cooling system technologies for the planned biomass to energy facility. If the Phase 1 application passes the screening process, CCP will submit an expanded Phase 2 application in December. If awarded funding, the EPIC grant will provide up to five million dollars toward the bioenergy facility's design, equipment, and construction, and will significantly increase CCP's equity in the project.

CCP is currently advertising a project developer Request for Qualifications (RFQ). Responses to the RFQ were due 9/23, with interviews scheduled for October and final selection by mid-November. CCP anticipates working with the project developer to establish the facility's legal ownership entity later this fall.

Marijuana Measures – What Are They?

As we head toward legalization and regulation of marijuana, there are two measures that Camptonville will vote on this November. These issues can be confusing and complex, so here is some basic information. If you would like to talk with someone locally about these measures, feel free to contact me at 288-0618.

• California Proposition 64: This proposition, if approved, would make it legal for anyone over the age of 21 to grow, process, and use marijuana for nonmedical purposes with certain restrictions. The state would regulate and tax the growing and selling of medical and non-medical marijuana. • Yuba County Measure E: This initiative focuses on the process of regulating the marijuana industry in Yuba County. If approved, this measure would align Yuba County with the regulations that Proposition 64 would establish, if Proposition 64 were approved. It does focus on curtailing big, illegal grows. As a new Camptonville resident, I'm so happy to see the many ways people are building

community – the *Courier*, the Community Center, the friendliness when I stop by the post office or Burgee Dave's. I get a sense of a tolerant, welcoming place. So I was puzzled, curious, and a little alarmed when I saw a Nevada City Peeps Facebook post in all caps - POLITICAL CORRECTNESS IS RUINING OUR COUNTRY, the woman wrote. What did she mean, I wondered, and why post this in a non-partisan neighborhood group?

My context for politically correct involves learning, for example, that it's politically correct to use the term women rather than, say, ladies or girls in political discussion, or to describe people as disabled rather than handicapped. It didn't seem like anything that could lead to ruin.

It seems that the meaning of being politically correct has morphed over the years from a relatively benign term for using courteous and inclusive language, to a national crisis, at least for some. Recently, a prominent politician, when accused of using insulting language, dismissed the criticisms with, "I don't frankly have time for total political correctness. And to be honest with you, this country doesn't have time either." So perhaps the term has also taken on a meaning of trivial discussion, or perhaps excessive sensitivity.

A new Pew Research Center study shows that 78% of Republicans and 37% of Democrats say that "too many people are easily offended," while 21% of Republicans and 61% of Democrats say that "people should be more careful to avoid offending others."

Whatever you think of political correctness, it does seem like simple survival smarts to be inclusive and tolerant in a small community like Camptonville.

Remember the June Primary?

Oh that... Seems like a long time ago, but I just discovered that Yuba County has detailed results on their web site. So, I explored (at the Yuba County Elections site-previous elections -statement of vote). Wow! Camptonville was sure excited and voted differently than the county trend. Our turnout was an astounding 71%; countywide was only 49%.

For Democrats:	Bernie	Hillary	Everyone Else	
Camptonville:	111	39	1	
County total:	2,771	2,388	132	
For Republicans:	Donald		Everyone Else	
Camptonville:	63		13	
County total:	5,289		1,088	

Note that in Camptonville, Democrats voting (151) outnumbered Republicans (79) while in the county overall, the two parties were about equally represented. For comparison, our more liberal neighbors in Nevada County had Bernie sweeping the county with 13,827 votes, Hillary at 8,175, and Donald at 12,050. Our often harder-to-classify neighbors in Sierra County gave Donald 531 votes, Bernie 297, and Hillary 224.

On our Measures A and B (Marijuana), Yuba County solidly rejected them, while our local vote was over 3:1 in favor.

So....in this very polarized election where so many have a rigid position already, the big question locally, and certainly nationwide is: What will the Bernie voters do? Stay home? Switch to Hillary? Hang on to your hat. It's gonna be wild.



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Meet Your Local......Community Volunteer Extraordinaire – Rita Ortega

Volunteer is what Rita Ortega does; it's who she is. As a founder and for 25 years, one of the organizers of the annual Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department Picnic, Rita (along with Linda Haas who worked with her at Sierra Mountain Mills) came up with the idea and created the "Pink Ladies Auxiliary." That was 1988. Today, the organization has 10 members. Rita maintains notes and records of each event that are used in planning future ones. The Auxiliary as a group decides what needs to be done, and each member takes on tasks to make it happen. The Picnic has been very successful in generating needed funds. In the Picnic's first year, 1989, the goal was to raise enough money for one backboard. They raised \$3,000! Over the years the annual event raised enough money to fund the fire house that was built by community volunteers. Rita's other volunteer activities include serving on various boards: Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP); Camptonville Community Services District (CCSD); and the Joint Powers Agency (JPA).

Rita and husband, Jerry, moved to Camptonville in 1978 when Jerry, a Wildland Firefighter with the U.S. Forest Service, was transferred from the Los Padres National Forest. Moving to the "big trees" from open space was a culture shock for Rita, who now laughs at her original impression of living life as a pioneer on the "Little House on the Prairie." She baked bread, made jam (which she had never done) and wouldn't drive the "long" distance to Grass Valley in the winter. Living in the foothills was a totally different lifestyle than she was used to.

After relocating, Rita wanted to be a secretary, but had no experience, so she volunteered as a typist with the U.S. Forest Service. She later obtained secretarial/clerical jobs with various timber companies. In 2001, she was hired as Office Manager with the CCP. Rita learned a great deal about life skills working with the women of CCP. Cathy LeBlanc became her hero.

As the CCP Office Manager, Rita was responsible for all financial activities including payroll, monitoring grants, preparing reports, etc. – all with deadlines. Her sense of duty made it difficult for her to "get away" during certain times of the month. Consequently, she and Jerry were unable to do much traveling.


Rita is now retired and is very much enjoying her "freedom." For relaxation, Rita enjoys reading, or just sitting out on her deck watching the birds and other wildlife. She is looking forward to road trips with Jerry in the near future.

Family and community give her the most joy. She believes in "paying it forward" by helping the community through her volunteer activities. What she enjoys about Camptonville is the "powerful" sense of community; when a neighbor is having difficulty, everyone comes together to help. She loves her life as wife, mom, and grandma, and being able to be there and available for her family.

Lieutenant Governor Gavin Newsom Honors Camptonville-based Non-Profit

Lieutenant Governor Gavin Newsom awarded a Certificate of Honor to the Lioness Tale Prison Project, headquartered in Camptonville, for its innovative program of transformation for women in prison. Newsom commended the project for its "ongoing commitment to provide hope and healing to women serving life sentences in maximum security prisons."

The Lioness Tale Prison Project (LiT-uPP) is a program of **Skyline Harvest**, a nonprofit organization founded and directed by Diane Pendola and Teresa Hahn. Since 2009, Diane has made frequent, 500-mile round trips to Chowchilla to help women who are serving life sentences at the Central California Women's Facility (CCWF) experience a program that includes meditation, Gestalt Awareness Practice, and the Enneagram. The project centers on Pendola's book *The Lioness Tale* as a metaphor for finding inner truth and meaningful lives in the context of long-term imprisonment.

The Certificate of Honor was issued by Lt. Gov. Newsom's office to recognize the August 18th graduation of the third class of program leaders, who will become



facilitators for other inmates. The program leaders take ownership of the program, helping other inmates with long-term sentences to live purposeful lives that positively impact prison culture. There are now over 300 women at CCWF who have participated, with a current waiting list of more than 200.

The project's web site, http://thelionesstale.org, includes descriptions of the experience by program participants. Participant Jackie wrote, "LiT-uPP changes lives, thinking, and hearts, creating safer communities inside prison walls and outside prison walls as well. It brings light to why negative and addictive behaviors develop, then healing to those behaviors. This journey through LiT-uPP is a must for anyone who wants loving-kindness in her own life." Weather is forecast to be sunny and warm for most of the month. Hunters and fall enthusiasts will be using campgrounds on a first-come, first-served basis. Our campgrounds at Bullards Bar will close October 15th, and the gates will be locked.

Backyard burn permits are still suspended in accordance with www.fire.ca.gov/fire_protection/fire_protection_burnpermits.

Fire safety is still very important. The Forest is still in Fire Restrictions in accordance with Order No. 17-16-01, and you can only have a campfire in established campgrounds.


You must adhere to these guidelines for campfires: While the fire is burning, always keep a shovel and bucket of water nearby, and ensure there is a responsible person in attendance at all times. Never leave children around a fire unattended.

To completely extinguish an open campfire, use the "drown, stir and feel" method: drown the fire with water, then stir around the fire area with your shovel to wet any remaining embers and ash. Be sure to turn wood and coals over and wet all sides. Move some dirt onto the fire site and mix thoroughly to fully smother it. Finally, feel the area with the back of your hand to ensure nothing is still smoldering. See: www.preventwildfireca.org/Campfires.

Fuelwood cutting information is available at the Yuba River Ranger District Hotline **288-3231**. Be sure to check the day's Project Activity Level. Don't start a fire with your chainsaw!

Keep our bears (and people) safe. People who live in, or visit, bear country need to remember to keep all garbage sealed in airtight containers. Never keep food in your tent. Keep a clean camp by cleaning up and storing food and garbage immediately after meals. Put sealed containers in the trunk of your car if bear/food lockers are not available. If you put anything that has an odor in your car, be sure to use airtight containers and have the windows all the way up.





The Water Report



Last month, we asked you to do some water conservation as the creek was beginning to taper off, and you've done it again. From the CCSD Water Department, our thanks for your efforts! The creek continues to supply our reduced needs, and we continue to share the water with our downstream wildlife friends. Right now, the creek is flowing about 30 gallons per minute, compared to our current draw of 10-15 gallons per minute.

The "other news" isn't as good. We have two standby wells, both of which worked hard last summer to meet our needs. We turned the wells on in early September, only to find out that one of the wells is not producing water. At this time, we don't know if the well is dry or if the pump is too tired. The other one, however, is working well and helping out when needed. Keep your fingers crossed!

The 2016 Creek flow has fallen low enough that it finally "appeared" on our chart. In previous months, the flow was over 50 gallons per minute so the graph did not appear. We're now in a downward trend as reported last month. The 2015 and 2016 creek flows both appear as dashed lines on the graph, and you can see that we're falling at the same rate as last year, just a month later.

Keep your guard up for leaks and dust off your rain dance gear!

Parent Participation Preschool??

Parents are a child's first, most enduring, and most influential teachers! Almost all of us have

had the truth and weighty responsibility of this statement driven deeply home to us the first time our little, monkey-see-monkey-do sponges start reproducing one of our own least admirable habits. Whoops! Guess I can't let myself say or do that quite so freely anymore!

Parenting teaches us at least as much about ourselves as it. does about the little people in our care. We're in this together and for the long haul. It's a whole lot easier and more satisfying when we are active participants - active and aware. It is a way for us to empower both our children and ourselves.

And with infant/toddlers, even after you are reassured, his separation anxiety or basic needs may require that you stay.

That stage, however, will pass, and then what or where? The Resource Center and its computers are always an option for parents. The library is a quiet place with lots of books, some of which even need shelving for someone so inclined. Some parents walk the track and find a way to increase their daily exercise. Others volunteer in classrooms. You could be the parent who organizes a craft circle, reading club, or self-help/mutual support group. CCP and the Resource Center are there to help connect you to whatever resources you might need to make it happen. Your dreams and participation can make something new a reality, and we always need someone back in the classroom at snack time.

Oh, and for those of you sinking into doubt and dim-wittedness during a child's teen years, hang in there; you will rediscover your native intelligence and deepening wisdom in their eyes and in your own as they progress into their grown-up life.


