Brunch with The Courier Saturday, April 1st, 9 to 11 am, at the Community Center





Sri Moonshine Presents: Keyboards and Vocal Chords - April 15th By John Deaderick

Imagine if you will, that you are a folk musician and a big fan of, say, Joan Baez, and she asks you to perform with her! Or you're a rock n' roller and you get the nod from Sir Paul McCartney. Such was my delight in the summer of '92 when I got the call from Terry Riley, whose great admirer I was and remain. I was at Stanford on a post-grad Fellowship in Greek Tragedy when Terry and Mikail Graham bade me go to the library and check out Swiss artist Adolf Wölfli to see if I'd be interested in working on a show about him. Granted, I would have been overjoyed no matter the subject, but the Wölfli work proved to be incredibly inspiring.

Move ahead 25 years to the now, after performances in L.A., Atlanta, France, and Switzerland, Terry and I will present a concert version of selections from The St. Adolf Ring. For Terry aficionados, the work has achieved a near mythic status, largely because so few have seen it! There are no recordings, though Terry has adapted, performed, and recorded a few excerpts for solo piano. There is a longer piece on Terry's release Atlantis Nath that includes my vocal, but that's about it. So our April 15 show at the Community Center, Keyboards and Vocal Chords, will offer a rare and possibly final glimpse into this "lost" work. The St. Adolf Ring offers joy, pathos, and ecstatic flights of imagination as it explores the nature of Divine inspiration and the fine line between genius and madness. And I think this is some of the most beautiful music Terry has ever written.

But as they say, that's not the half of it, for Keyboards and Vocal Chords isn't just about the Wölfli selections. Much of the show will feature Terry's notable piano improvisations with new songs, old standards, and cool narrations. Sometimes we'll be working together and sometimes we'll be going it alone. I'll be offering readings, monologues, and, who knows, I might even sing . . . but that's no reason to stay away! Please join Terry and me in this cozy and acoustically warm venue for an evening of fun, musical virtuosity, and theatrical highlinks!



Meet Your Local Volunteer Firefighter - Jim Esry By Linda Rose

Many local residents already know Jim Esry. He's been fighting fires and responding to vehicle accidents, medical, and other emergencies for the past 17 years. He joined the Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department (CVFD) in 1999, after retiring from his career as a truck driver. Seventeen years with CVFD has earned Jim seniority status. Very passionate about his work, Jim loves helping people and his community. He thrives on the adrenalin rush he feels when responding to emergencies.

As a First Responder, Jim responds to all emergencies with dedication and compassion. He is certified by the Red Cross to perform CPR and "package up" the injured for transport by ambulance or helicopter. First Responders must complete refresher classes every two years to maintain the CPR certification.

Jim is also licensed by the DMV to drive the big fire engine and water tenders, and must complete annual driver training in order to retain his licensed status. He trains other firefighters on the use of the numerous valves and hoses on the fire engine. He also participates in training new firefighters on all other hands-on emergency procedures.

Born in Santa Cruz and raised in Sunnyvale, Jim spent much of his youth on the Santa Cruz Boardwalk. His mother worked at the Coconut Grove Penny Arcade/Ballroom.




While she worked, his father, who operated the Merry-Go-Round, took Jim to work with him. Jim spent his time in a "cage" above the Monkey Ring and dropped the rings picked by riders back into the Monkey's mouth through a slot.

Jim moved his family to Camptonville 47 years ago after he and his wife at the time drove through the area. They decided this was the place they wanted to live. Returning home to Campbell, they packed their bags and, within two weeks, moved to Camptonville. Jim has never regretted the move. His two children both attended Camptonville School. Daughter, Ginger, a United Airlines flight attendant, lives in Grass Valley. Son, Bryon, works for the Union Pacific Railroad and lives in Antioch. Bryon was also a Camptonville Volunteer Firefighter and worked for the CA Department of Forestry before moving out of the area.

During fire season, Jim contracts with Cal Fire and Department of Forestry and uses the water tender that he and Ginger co-own. He also brings the water tender to the annual parade in Camptonville, offering rides to children.

Jim's passion for helping others is further demonstrated by his volunteer work with the Nevada County Food Bank. He estimates they feed about 150 people on a regular basis. The number increases considerably during harvest season when the "trimmigrants" are in the area.

Jim loves living in Camptonville and enjoys its close knit community. When a neighbor is having difficulty or there is an emergency, everyone comes together to help. And you can be assured Jim will be there first.

The Yuba River Ranger District Report

Has spring really sprung? Time to gear up, get out, and enjoy the new look of our rivers, lakes, and streams. Bullards Bar campgrounds open April 15th. Reservations are required through Emerald Cove Marina, 692-3200. The hiking/biking trails took quite a beating, but are open. Watch for recently fallen trees. Come out and support the Hot Shot Half Marathon, April 8, 8:30 am, Vista Point Road, Bullards Bar.

Oregon Creek Day Use opens May 1st. Three Highway 49 campgrounds should be open May 1st, and hopefully several others will be open by then as well. Whitecloud campground also opens May 1st. Services will be provided and fees are required. All campgrounds will be Walk-Up, (first come, first served) until the reservations system kicks in sometime between Memorial Day and early June (depending on specific campground conditions). Check www.recreation.gov for reservation details.

Now that we are coming into some clear days, it may be a good time to maintain defensible space around your house. Burn permits are not currently required to burn natural vegetation from your property, but be sure to call 741-6299 for daily Yuba County Burn Day information.

As of the 27th, March precipitation is 7.55 inches, bringing the season total to 103.08. The 2016 season total was 59.01.

Eagle Scout Repairs Bullards Bar Trail

Ethan Oakes, age 15, is a sophomore at Yuba City High School. He is a Scout working to get his Eagle Award. To achieve the Eagle Award, he has to do an "Eagle Project," which is a project of large proportions (not just cleaning up trash, etc.). Since Ethan and his family come up to Bullards for wakeboarding and mountain biking often, it was natural that he do a project relating to a place he loves.

Due to heavy rains, many parts of the Bullards Bar Trail have major erosion damage. Coordinating with Paul Hart of the local USFS Yuba River Ranger District, we decided to build a new "bypass" around the eroded area on the west portion of the Bullards Bar Trail. In all we cut 300 feet of new trail that completely bypassed the dangerous trail. Now hikers, runners, horses, and cyclists can safely navigate the west end of the trail with no worries about eroding areas. We also cleared and repaired four culverts on the trail that had been clogged with debris and were impeding good water flow, and which could cause more erosion. We had 20 volunteers helping with the project - all from Yuba City. The crew did a great job and USFS's Paul Hart was pleased with the results. My ACA Story (Affordable Care Act/Obamacare) By Cathy LeBlanc

I am sharing this letter I sent to my legislators in hopes that others will be inspired to share their stories as well.

I thank God for the Affordable Care Act! Without it I would have a much different story today. I am the part-time Executive Director of a small non-profit in rural Camptonville, CA. Our work focuses on community health and well-being. For years previous to the passage of the ACA, I could not afford health insurance. I made too much to qualify for MediCal and too little to pay the high cost of health insurance premiums. So when ACA passed I became one of the first to sign on. Through work I also made sure others in our low-income community could access it as well, including my adult children. Thanks to the ACA I finally had high-quality affordable health care (Anthem Blue Cross Silver Plan @\$150 month). Little did I know how vital this would become.

In May of 2016, I was diagnosed with breast cancer. At the cost of thousands of dollars, I had to undergo mammograms, sonograms, biopsies, lumpectomy, lymph node removal, six rounds of chemotherapy with two different and very costly drugs, and 33 radiation treatments. I am said to now have "clear margins." I will take medication and continue to have follow-up appointments with my oncologist for the next five years. Only then will I be declared a survivor. I am thankful for all this great care. Because of it, I came back to work only seven months after diagnosis, and I still have my home.

I, and millions like me, need affordable health coverage with monthly subsidized payments (preferably single-payer!).

Please help me. If I lose my insurance I may no longer be able to afford the medication and follow-up services I need to become a survivor! At 61 years young I have so much life to live and unborn grandchildren yet to meet and love.

In 1970, 20 million Americans participated

in Earth Day, a national teach-in on the environment. Among the powerful images from that time: pictures of birds and sea mammals choking in crude oil from a giant oil well spill off the California shore and the Cuyahoga River on fire. Toxic chemicals impacting wildlife and the environment, farmworkers suffering from chemical exposure, danger from nuclear waste, and global starvation had become national concerns.

Almost 50 years later, national and local action has mitigated some dangers. Some toxins have been banned, some waterways and toxic dumps cleaned-up. New standards for auto emissions and new international agreements – both now under attack – have the potential to reverse climate damage. Action can make a difference.

Earth Day 2017, Saturday April 22, is a great day to stand up for the environment.

On April 22, there's the March for Science* [see links below], an international event "to celebrate a passion for science and to support and safeguard the scientific community," and on Saturday April 29, there's the People's Climate Mobilization,** to "advance solutions to the climate crisis that are rooted in racial, social, and economic justice and...protect our right to clean air, water, land, healthy communities, and a world at peace."

Spring Spirit at our Historic Cemetery By Rochelle Bell

As the sun peeked over the trees at our house on Saturday, March 11th, the car was packed and the cooler stuffed. Do you have Life Flight Insurance?

If you get in a car accident or have a major medical issue, such as a heart



attack, it is likely you may be flown by an air ambulance to a trauma center or a hospital that can better take care of you. Here in the foothills, the nearest ground ambulance is 35, 45 or even 60 minutes away, and then it takes the same amount of time to get to the nearest hospital. In situations where time is of the essence, first responders may determine it best to order an air ambulance. However, helicopter rides are expensive and could cost in excess of \$25,000. First responders in our area do not get the option of which air ambulance will be dispatched. It could be Reach for Life, Enloe FlightCare, or may even be California Shock Trauma Air Rescue (CALSTAR).

The annual membership rates are as follows: Reach for Life is \$65 per household.; Enloe is \$40 for an individual and \$50 per family; and CALSTAR is \$45 for an individual and \$50 per family. Many residents will have memberships with both Reach for Life and Enloe FlightCare. *This would be my recommendation*. Here is how to get your applications:

- Full Moon April 11th; New Moon April 26th.
- Spring! Wildflower hikes at Bridgeport. Arrival of the Moonshine Osprey pair. Migratory songbirds in courtship plumage. Lots of nestgathering activity. Slow-moving newts. Foraging for wild greens. Eating asparagus, peas, and lettuce from the garden. Our local tom turkey gathering his harem. Redbuds blooming.
- Jackrabbits In the spring, watch for jackrabbits feeding at night (sometimes early morning or evening). When weed-eating tall grass, watch for baby rabbits, called leverets. The mother often separates them by putting one in one area, two in another, and a fourth in a different location, reducing the chances that a predator could get them all. Leave them where you find them as the mother is most likely nearby.
