I want to give a huge shout-out to all of the talented musicians who volunteered to












Summer is almost here, but there is still snow in the high country. North Yuba campgrounds are open, as well as Sardine Lake and Salmon Creek campgrounds. Crews worked hard to get higher elevation campgrounds open for Memorial Day weekend. We have many brochures and maps at the USFS station, so stop in for information before heading out.

As of May 1st, door yard burn permits are required, so call for the daily burn status in your county. For Yuba County, call 741-6299, Nevada County: 274-7928, Sierra County: 289-3662, or check http://myairdistrict.com/index.php/burning-info/burn-day-status/.

We had 0.32 inches of rain in May (as of May 20th). This brings our season total to 112.22 inches.

Across the table from me at Starbucks was a stranger, a woman I'll call Lynne.

Lynne and I arranged to meet knowing that we disagree on politics, but that we agree on one thing: the political divide in this country, the anger, the demonization, is frightening and dangerous.

I supported Sanders in 2016; Lynne supported Trump, then and now. We have nearly opposite opinions on immigration, climate change, abortion, the role of government, and sources that we consider trustworthy. We both care passionately about freedom, democracy, and equality, but those words lead each on very different paths.

We each think "the other side" is deluded, ignorant, possibly crazy or criminal.

And we each fear that the other side is intent on hurting us and those we love.

As we talked, I kept thinking about that fear. I would like to believe that I am capable of respectfully listening to opinions and ideas I disagree with. But when the fear comes up - that the other person is a threat to me or to people I care about - then I react with anger, with a desire to squash the offender – to argue, to correct, to punish.

And yet here was Lynne sitting across from me on a warm April day in Auburn: a woman whose politics I don't like, but who makes meals for homeless people, does community charity work, and says she loves the U.S. Constitution - a woman who is willing to spend time with me, a stranger whose beliefs probably irritate or even alarm her, because she wants to make things better.

Lynne and I know that we will probably never agree on what's a fact, who can be trusted, or what is to be done. But since our meeting, every time I feel rage rising in me because of "the other side," I think of Lynne, and I remember that she's not my enemy.

It's been 50 years since that wild and free time in 1967. We lived in the East Bay suburbs in a house where only tomatoes had stood before. We did not even have a stop light until you got downtown. At that time, I was 11 years of age and wore my shoulder-length hair parted on the side, with bangs, surfer style.

On weekdays I couldn't wait to get home from school and change out of the dress all us schoolgirls were forced to wear. Those were the times when the "civilized world" still expected women and girls to conform, and we did.

As I walked the mile or so home, I had my mind on one thought: Get out of my school clothes, put on my jeans, surfer striped t-shirt, and desert boots to go ride my Stingray bike around the neighborhood. My parents wouldn't be home from work yet, but I knew I'd better finish any homework and do my chores before they were.

My lime green Stingray with butterfly handle bars had a "sissy-bar" at the rear of its banana seat. Riding that bike, I'd feel the ocean breeze wafting in from the bay and smile. I did some of my best 11-year-old thinking, riding through the neighborhood. If I saw my friends, I'd stop and say hi. If not, I'd just listen to my transistor radio tuned into the groovy-est station I could find. Most radios were AM back then.

I was more or less my own person. As far as my parents were concerned, if I did what they expected, I was free to wander, often until it was time to help make dinner or I heard my dad call my name.

I am the youngest of four girls, so by the time I was eleven my sisters were out of the house, or just about, and on their way to living their own lives. As a kid in those times, I was given plenty of chances to learn right from wrong. It seemed everyone in the world smoked cigarettes, and drinking and driving (yes both at the same time) was all too common. By eleven I had tried both (not driving) but doing so had not tarnished my innocence...

## California's Medical Cannabis Cultivation Program Draft Open for Comments Until June 12th

By California Department of Food and Agriculture

The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) released proposed regulations for the State medical cannabis cultivation and licensing program. Release of the draft regulations marks the official start of a 45-day public comment period provided under California law. All interested parties are encouraged to submit comments about the proposed regulations to CalCannabis, the branch of CDFA that is overseeing the cannabis cultivation regulatory framework.

"We truly want to hear from Californians who care about the cannabis cultivation licensing process," said CDFA Secretary Karen Ross. "This is an opportunity to help us make sure we develop the best and most effective regulatory framework for our State. I encourage people to carefully review the proposed regulations—then tell us what you think."


Comments may be submitted in writing during the 45-day open-comment period, or verbally at the remaining public hearing: **Wednesday**, **June 14**, **2017**, **1pm - 3pm**, California Department of Food and Agriculture Auditorium, 1220 N Street, Sacramento, CA.

The last day for the public to submit written comments is **Monday, June 12th, 2017, by 5pm**. Comments received after this date will not be considered for modification of the proposed rulemaking.


There is currently budget trailer bill language designed to align the Medical Cannabis Safety and Regulation Act with Proposition 64, the Adult Use of Marijuana Act. If that bill passes, the current proposed regulations will be withdrawn and a new set of regulations will be proposed that is consistent with changes in the law. However, public comments on the current draft regulations are still very important, as many of the provisions in the licensing regulations will carry over to new regulations if the trailer bill passes.

CalCannabis is preparing to accept applications for State cannabis cultivation licenses beginning January 1st, 2018.

#### **Spring Time Is Baby Bird Time!**

By Wildlife Rehabilitation and Release (WR&R)

Spring is here and so is baby bird season. Janice Barbary, Songbird Rehabilitator for WR&R, suggests the following steps people can take to increase the survival rate of orphaned or injured birds they find.

#### 1) Put the Baby Bird Back in the Nest!

If a baby bird is found on the ground and if it seems unhurt, look for its nest and its parents. It may take 30 - 45 minutes of uninterrupted watching to spot the parents if they are out foraging for food. "If the baby seems unhurt and if you can find the nest with parents still in attendance, you can put the baby bird back into the nest... The parents will NOT abandon the baby just because you touched it," reassures Barbary.

Contact WR&R's Intake Center for further instructions if the young bird is injured, you can't locate the nest, the nest is too high to reach, or the parents don't come back to the nest.

#### 2) Keep the Bird Warm, Dark, and Quiet.

If the bird is injured or truly abandoned - keep it WARM, DARK, and QUIET. "To a tiny injured or baby bird, you look like a predator," cautioned Barbary. She advises folks to put it in an appropriately sized box with small air holes and a lid; line the box with white paper towels adding crumpled paper towels around the edge to support the bird, and keep it quiet. Do not give it anything to drink or eat, as improper feeding techniques or

the wrong food can kill it. Keep children and pets out of the area. While transporting to WR&R's Intake Center, turn off the air-conditioning and radio.

#### 3) Contact WR&R's Intake Center: 530-477-5774.

The Intake Center will accept birds and provide advice between 9 am and 5 pm, seven days a week. Contact the Intake Center at 799 Maltman Drive, Grass Valley for guidance on what to do if a bird is in distress.

#### **Additional Concerns:**

Cat-Caught Birds Need Care Immediately!

Cat saliva contains a bacteria harmless to cats but lethal to birds. Even if the bird escapes, it will likely die from infection or injuries

Black Headed Grosbeak

unless treated quickly with antibiotics.

Window Strike Injuries:
If a bird flies into a home
window and is alive but
stunned, also call WR&R.
Such collisions may cause
head trauma, and medication
to reduce/prevent swelling
may be given before the bird
is released.

WR&R needs additional volunteers! WR&R is a

nonprofit organization dedicated to the rehabilitation and release of injured or orphaned native wildlife. They have teams that care for raptors, songbirds, small mammals, and bats. To volunteer, contact the Intake Center at: 477-5774.

#### Tale of the Circuit Rider

'Circuit rider' is a popular term referring to Methodist clergy in the earliest years of the United States who were assigned to travel around specific geographic territories to minister to settlers and gold miners, and to organize congregations - a lonely and dangerous mission. Riding on horseback between their destinations, these preachers were popularly called circuit riders or saddlebag preachers, but officially they were called traveling clergy. The need for 'old fashioned' circuits generally ended sometime before the U.S. Civil War.

However, the United Methodist Church still supports a circuit rider. Pastor Elita (Ellie) Lubiano, wife of Pastor Ed Lubiano of the North San Juan United Methodist Church, rides circuit between the Methodist Churches in Downieville and Sierra City. Leaving their home in Colfax early every Sunday, Pastor Ellie drops off Pastor Ed at the North San Juan United Methodist Church, then continues east to Downieville and Sierra City for 9:30 and 11am services, returning in the early afternoon to fetch Pastor Ed and return home. Not on horseback, but in a car and with a Bible at her side, Pastor Ellie Lubiano continues the tradition of 'circuit rider.'
