One More Hurdle... **By Char Jokerst**



Imagine you, your spouse, your child, or your neighbor are having an emergency that requires advanced medical procedures. Time is of the essence, and response time for an ambulance in our area is 25 minutes to one hour. While our fire department is only 15 minutes away from most patient contact, we currently have only the most basic life support capabilities and are not able to administer crucial life saving interventions and medications known worldwide as "ALS," or Advanced Life Support.

But we are getting closer. In February of this year our Fire Chief, Brandi Dudek, completed a grueling course of study and internship and was awarded a certificate for her AEMT, or Advanced Emergency Medical Technician license. This March, she passed her National Exam

and is now a nationally recognized NRAEMT, which was the final hurdle to gaining her local AEMT licensure. There remains one more "minor" hurdle before our fire department can offer these new ALS skills to you.

Before we delve into this final hurdle, let's acknowledge Brandi Dudek's huge accomplishment: The AEMT course included 80 hours of classroom time, 80 hours of internship in an ambulance and in the ER, 15 actual ALS patient contacts (that is administering ALS medications to a real patient under the supervision of a paramedic), a written exam, a demonstration of skills exam, and finally the National Exam. This intense course of study occupied Brandi's "free time" from early last fall, through the holidays, and into February of 2018. The class was held in Downieville, where 11 other students from Sierra City, Downieville, Pike, and Alleghany were led through their studies by Frank Lang, Nurse Practitioner, of Downieville. Brandi has been an EMT since 2010 and the Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department (CVFD) Fire Chief since 2013.

Chief Dudek's new license allows her to administer multiple life saving measures to adults, children, and infants. She may administer medications intravenously, via syringe, and orally. The list of medications will include saline (for resuscitation in multiple types of emergencies), dextrose and Glucagon (for diabetic emergencies), Narcan (for opioid overdoses), bronchodilators (for asthma and difficulty breathing), nitroglycerin (for heart attacks), epinephrine (for allergic reactions) and activated charcoal (for neutralizing some poisons). But, as noted above, there remains one final hurdle before any of these skills can be brought to bear in Camptonville...

The CVFD has been a licensed provider of Basic Life Support medical services for many years, and CVFD's firefighters and EMTs rely on this licensure to administer emergency medical services here in Camptonville. In order for Brandi to be allowed to use these new AEMT skills, the CVFD will need to be licensed as an ALS provider by the Sierra Sacramento Valley (SSV) medical authority. Gaining this license will require the completion of several tons of paperwork, hiring (or perhaps in our case "volunteering") a program coordinator, establishing a Medical Director (under whose authority Brandi would work), and finally, keeping all of these ducks in a row year after year. Brandi herself will be required to complete 86 hours of Continuing Education credits every two years, up from the 24 hours required of an EMT.

Chief Dudek is currently catching her breath after five months of daily study, but has already started on the work of gaining an ALS license for the CVFD. Lucky for us, our VFD neighbors in North San Juan have recently completed this feat and have offered

their support and assistance. Nonetheless, the coming hurdles remain mostly unknown, and getting this task done and keeping the license active in the years to come will consume many resources and years of time. It behooves all us to acknowledge Chief Dudek's commitment and passion and to lend her our support. It's one thing being a volunteer Fire Chief. It's another thing when you add on the role of EMT. It's quite another when you take on the role of an ALS-capable AEMT, and probably too much when you ask this same person to manage the entire program. The CVFD needs EMTs and desperately needs dedicated administrative support, and, as always, a little more funding.



crowded, busy, stressful) lives without instruction manuals, without filters, and without fully operational auto-controls. We adults arrive at parenthood without instincts, without previous experience (or sometimes with negative experience), and often ourselves without fully operational auto-pilot – children bearing children. Through much of early evolutionary history and simpler social eras, that was, in fact, the norm. It's amazing the species has lasted this long! But so far we have, and our social arrangements for continuing to do so have gotten pretty complex. Both childhood and old age have gotten prolonged, and the transitions between life stages have become less clearly marked.

So, how does this dream called "becoming human" get fully realized? Well, part of the answer lies in the dream or goal itself. Becoming human is a process, and we live it together. We make each other the child and parent we are to become, and by extension the family, community, and world we are to be part of. A world of responsibility! A world of freedom and opportunity!

Plan to spend quality time in the present moment that every child dwells in. You will come to know them and yourself. Spend time in the presence of those in your community who've experienced this process before. Take a parenting class – this is not instinctual; there are wise guides; and some methods are more likely than others to help you reach your long-term goals. When over-stressed or tired, take time outs – these are for the adult as well as the child. Keep your sense of humor well exercised. It is one of our most fully human and humanizing attributes.

Remember that filter mentioned earlier that children come without? This lack can be an endless source of laughter and a great teacher, as well. It can help us see ourselves and the social world we live in much more clearly, both the part we like and the part we might want to change.

Whether you laugh out loud or in your heart of hearts, teach children tact and kindness by being kind. It's the only "kind" that lasts.

Dear Neighbors: A Letter to the Community

As most of you know, the house behind the

school burned down on Thursday, February 22nd. Because it was early evening and in the middle of town, many of you were around to watch the progression of the incident and may have some questions about how things developed.

Camptonville School's security cameras provide an accurate timeline for the events that took place. At 7:30pm, obvious flames are suddenly visible upstairs in the north side of the second story. At 7:36pm, a resident is seen leaving the house and shortly after another resident is seen attempting to extinguish the fire with a garden hose with no effect. Less than two minutes later, brave neighbors are seen leading the residents safely away from the building.

At 7:41pm the Emergency Command Center in Grass Valley receives its first report of the fire and begins dispatching the appropriate agencies. Our dispatch pagers sound at 7:42pm, almost 13 minutes after the first active flames are visible outside of the building.


7:47pm, Chief Brandi Dudek arrives at the scene on Spring Street and determines that the house cannot be saved because of the extreme fire conditions. Knowing that other agencies are on their way, she correctly directs Camptonville's responding engine to approach through the school and be better positioned to implement the national protocol to protect public infrastructure first, then private property, and then natural resources.

Our engine arrives at 7:53pm and connects to the hydrant on Cleveland Avenue, pulls into the school grounds, and is putting water on the most critical areas by 7:55pm. We are thankful for the help we received from the Forest Service and North San Juan and Pike volunteer fire departments that helped us contain the fire to one property. Thanks also to those of you who called 911, moved cars to keep the road open, checked on and helped the distraught residents, and even pulled hose.

To anyone who would insult us, attempt to intimidate, and even make personal threats while we volunteer to protect your property, you should know that although that is unacceptable, we will continue to train and prepare and be available to help any of our neighbors and their families when an emergency arises. We encourage anyone else to consider volunteering their time as well.

New Search and Rescue Equipment for Yuba County Mounted Sheriff's Posse

The Yuba County Mounted Sheriff's Posse will be able to enhance its search and rescue capability in Yuba County's mountainous regions and waterways with the help of a grant from Yuba County Water Agency (YWCA). The \$5,000 grant, approved by YCWA as a part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will help the Sheriff's Posse buy contemporary, multi-unit waterproof medical first aid packs for use when searching near waterways and during wet conditions. It will also pay for upgrades to volunteers' first-aid packs.

"The Mounted Sheriff's Posse provides valuable first-aid services to some of the most remote areas in Yuba County. including YCWA's New Bullards Bar Reservoir and New Colgate Powerhouse," said YCWA Chairman Brent Hastey. "We are so grateful for their quick emergency response capability, and are happy to help them do it even better with this new equipment."

This is the first agency to benefit from YCWA's Grant Program, created in January 2018. These grants are designed for first responder agencies in Yuba County. Grant funding requests must be connected to YCWA's missions of flood risk reduction, water supply reliability, hydropower generation, groundwater management, fisheries enhancement and recreation in and around New Bullards Bar.

The monkey mind is a term sometimes used by the Buddha to describe the agitated, easily distracted, and incessantly moving behavior of ordinary human consciousness. As an ordinary human afflicted with monkey mind, I offer these thoughts for April.



As we celebrate Earth Day and the coming of spring, let's ask the question: how's the Earth doing? Here in the Sierra foothills, we've seen disturbing signs regarding Earth's health, including drought, record forest fires, extreme heatwaves, and massive numbers of tree deaths.

What's to be done? The climate crisis may be a non-starter on the national agenda, but cities and states are stepping forward to create solutions. The top priority should clearly be drastic reduction in the use of oil and coal. Fossil fuel use is identified¹ as the largest global source of carbon dioxide gas, which makes up a whopping 65% of greenhouse gas emissions. So the most direct path to both reducing greenhouse gases and improving public health – with air quality ranked as the leading environmental threat to public health² – is to move away from oil and coal and turn toward non-polluting alternatives.

Camptonville's service district and school will be looking at steps we can take locally to reduce fossil fuel use. Nevada City, Truckee, South Lake Tahoe, and hundreds of cities nationwide will be doing the same.

FREE Well Assessment Program

Have you ever thought about having your well assessed? Well, you may want to consider applying for a FREE well assessment. That's what I did after seeing a small article about the opportunity offered by Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC) in Nevada County's *The Union* newspaper. The RCAC Individual Well Program provides a free well assessment for eligible private well owners that includes an inspection for potential well vulnerabilities, potential contamination sources in close proximity to the well, and an inspection to make sure the well was constructed properly according to well construction standards. Well owners are also provided with education and resources to ensure their drinking water source remains safe and reliable.

After the inspection and well assessment is conducted, a detailed report is provided to the owner with recommendations of possible needed repairs and water treatment options, which are discussed at the time of the assessment. A Well Owners Resources Package is provided as a continuous learning resource. And, if follow up technical assistance is needed, they are there to help.

I found the one-hour assessment and inspection to be very informative and educational. I look forward to the report, which will list any recommended actions in order of importance.

For more information about RCAC, check out their website at www.rcac.org. To apply for a well assessment, click on the link to the Individual Well Program. RCAC has also scheduled a Private Well and Septic Systems Maintenance Workshop at the Madelyn Helling Library in Nevada City on **April 6th, 9am – noon**. I personally want to attend this workshop to learn what I need to do to ensure that my septic system and quality of my water source are, and remain, safe, reliable, and functional.



New Column from the North Yuba Naturalist blog -- A Rare Northern Goshawk!

This week I found a beautiful, dead, adult male Northern Goshawk in the woods. I found it face down, spread-eagled on the ground, at the base of a large Douglas Fir tree. Its neck was broken, and its beak was slightly cracked. It was large and weighty. I took tons of photos. The feathers were so finely detailed -- such beauty! These beautiful birds are uncommon and few in number in our area. I was sad that he had died. I feel so privileged to have been able to study and photograph him.

Northern Goshawks have a wingspan of 41", a body length of 21", and weigh about two pounds. They are the largest and most powerful of North American accipiters. Accipiters are hawks that are distinguished by short, broad wings and relatively long legs, adapted for fast flight in forests. Usually they rely on stealth and lightning quick strikes to catch their prey. If detected by their prey, they can chase them at tremendous speed through the forest, using their tail as a rudder! They hunt for birds, mammals, reptiles, and insects in the forest and forest clearings. They will attack while in flight, from a perch, or on the ground. They catch their prey with their feet.

Their preferred nesting habitat is mature old-growth forests, with a 60% closed canopy, and in close proximity to a creek, pond, or lake. Nesting begins in February or March. A large stick nest is built, mainly by the female, on the largest, lowest branches of a mature conifer. The nest is approximately 3'-4' long, 1.6'-2.2' wide, and 2' tall. The interior cup is lined with leaves and strips of bark, and is 9" long and 3" wide. The Cornell Lab of Ornithology states, "Northern Goshawk pairs build and maintain up to eight alternate nests within their nesting area. Even with options available, they may use the same nest year after year, or may switch to a new nest after a brood fails. Pairs may add fresh conifer needles to the nest during breeding. Aromatic chemicals (terpenes) in the needles may act as a natural insecticide and fungicide." Surprisingly, Northern Goshawks do not mate for life!


