With so many elections decided by less than a thousand votes, does it matter if you personally register and vote? Here's an interesting viewpoint from a Huffington Post article, "The Soul of a Citizen:"

It seems to be a universal experience in the human journey that somewhere along the road between birth and death, we become disappointed or feel betrayed...And if, in the face of disappointment, loss and devastation, you or I decide that "life sucks, who cares, why bother, I give up, my vote and voice don't matter," then the spark of life that is our spirit, our authentic self, the soul that came here to wake and show up, the light that came to shine, grows dim and eventually, that light goes out.

Please, let your light shine! Here is some voter information:

- You must register by May 21st for the June 5th election.
- To apply to register to vote online: covr.sos.ca.gov. You can pick up a paper voter registration application at the Elections Office, library, DMV, or a US Post Office. Also, at the May 19th Camptonville Plant Sale and Flea Market, voter registration materials will be available.
- If you're not sure if you are registered at your current address, there's no penalty for registering again. To check your registration status in Yuba County, go to: www.co.yuba.ca.us/departments/elections/registered.aspx .
- After the voter registration deadline, you can "conditionally" register and vote at the Yuba County Elections office.

In Camptonville, we'll vote on candidates for:

- County offices, including our 5th District Supervisor. Camptonville candidate's statements are on Pages 6 -7, and online: www.co.yuba.ca.us/departments/elections/current.aspx .
- State Assembly District 3
- State Senate District 4
- US 3rd Congressional District

State-wide ballot measures will have an impact on water projects, motor vehicle fees, funding for greenhouse gas reduction, and rainwater capture systems. The League of Women Voters is one source for a quick guide to ballot measures: lwvc.org/news/our-positions-june-5-2018-election-ballot-measures .

Here's one more observation on voting from a somewhat surprising source -

Vân-Ánh Vanessa Võ comes to Camptonville – June 2nd

Prepare to be mesmerized by the extraordinary beauty of Vanessa Võ's musical explorations. This unique Vietnamese musician, now a Bay Area resident, performs a blend of traditional folk and contemporary composition. Her technical mastery extends to the dan Tranh, a 16-string zither, the bamboo xylophone known as the T'rung, the single-string dan Bau, and her own thrilling vocals. She is an Emmy Award winner for her soundtrack to the documentary "Bolinao 52" and an Academy Award nominee for her soundtrack to the film "Daughter of Danang." Vanessa Võ has recorded with the incomparable Kronos Quartet and has been a featured artist at Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center in New York as well as the London Olympic Festival in 2012.

Those are some credits! Now friends, she will be in our little town of Camptonville as part of Artistic Director Terry Riley's Sri Moonshine Music Series. What a gift, and such a rare opportunity. Vanessa Võ's music is so beautiful, so brilliant, and so accessible and yet unlike anything you have ever experienced. She strikes a chord deep in your heart and you will not leave this incredible evening unmoved.

Her music was described on NPR's "All Things Considered" as "bluesy." In addition, "The music is rhythmically compelling, it weaves a story through the notes; a walk in mysterious woods or whatever the imagination can conjure up." Critic Molly Sheridan noted that "Võ draws a strong connection between American jazz and the improvisation involved in traditional Vietnamese music." This is not to be missed!

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"Stop the Bleed" Free Training – May 9th By Kimberlee Adams, RN, BSN, MPH

Trauma Program Manager, Mercy San Juan Medical Center Hello Camptonville!

I am the Trauma Program Manager at Mercy San Juan Hospital and will be coming to Camptonville on **Wednesday**, **May 9th** to teach your school faculty and surrounding community the *Stop the Bleed* class.

The Stop the Bleed campaign is a joint effort by the National Security Council, the medical community, and law enforcement who convened to figure out a way to increase the survival rates due to preventable bleeding. They convened as a direct result of the Sandy Hook elementary school shooting. They came up with the concept of STOP THE BLEED, simple steps taught to the first responders and civilians to control bleeding based on military research. These simple steps empower bystanders and responders to control bleeding and save lives.

As the trauma program in your "catchment" area, we are governed by the American College of Surgeons which has taken on the effort to educate 300 million Americans with necessary skills and awareness. Being a rural community, medical help isn't always "just around the corner." We believe this information can really make a difference for you. After this training we will be leaving a *Stop the Bleed* kit for your school and community.

Tuesday, June 5th Voting Information for Camptonville Voters (95922)

- Election Day: Tuesday, June 5th.
- Polling Place: Camptonville School, from 7 am to 8 pm.
- Voter Information Guide will be mailed starting April 26th.
- Vote by Mail Ballots will be mailed starting May 7th.

Voting by Mail: Frequently Asked Questions from the Yuba County Elections website www.co.yuba.ca.us/departments/elections/vbm.aspx When do I have to return my Vote by Mail ballot?

- If returning your ballot to a polling place on Election Day, it must be received by 8 pm on Election Day.
- If returning your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by the Elections Office no later than three days after the election.

Are ballots postmarked by Election Day counted? If your ballot is postmarked on or before Election Day and received by the elections office no later than three days after the election, it will be processed to be counted.

I heard Vote by Mail ballots are only counted if a contest is close. Is that true? No. All valid Vote by Mail ballots are counted. Because voters are cautioned that *Vote by Mail ballots returned to the polls on Election Day will not be included in the election night results*, this has been misunderstood to mean they are not counted at all. This rumor is likely due to a misunderstanding of how Vote by Mail ballots must be processed. Because signatures on Vote by Mail ballots must be verified before the ballots can be counted, ballots received within 1 - 2 days of Election Day may not be counted and included in semi-final results reported election night. It may take up to one week to verify all signatures on Vote by Mail ballots returned close to, or on, Election Day before the votes cast can be counted and included in the final, official results.

I sent my Vote by Mail ballot back. Can you confirm you received it? You can check whether your Vote by Mail ballot has been received by using the Vote by Mail Ballot Status Lookup, posted for each election under "Current Election." You may also call the Elections Office at (530) 749-7855 and staff will check for you.

The people of California have a right to the initiative process! That's the law. Only the courts can decide if an initiative is legal. Fletcher illegally killed an initiative that would have allowed the


people of Yuba County to share in the proceeds from ground water transfers. The other four members of the Yuba County Water Agency were voted out two years ago.

Having lived in the Foothills for nearly twenty years, with family roots dating to the late 1960's, I love our incredible community. I also see the everyday challenges happening around us. During the last several years, poverty increased by 30%, the dropout rate climbed to 18%, unemployment is stuck at 9%,



meth/opioid use is considered our #1 health issue, the District 5 HH median income is only \$34K, and we have unsustainable CalPERs indebtedness of \$143M. Why? An absence of fair, committed leadership, a "no-questions-asked mentality," and a lack of focus on what matters to the people.

We've hardened our heart and left people behind. We must address poverty through education and training: Get mobil GED programs into the far corners of the District and increase vocational training in our schools and adult learning. We must dedicate comprehensive resources for people to overcome drug problems. We must make broadband/mobile available to all and ensure top-notch technology is a magnet to attract new business. Without it, we'll never attract light manufacturing or sustainable companies to Yuba County.

We must better support our agricultural commerce and introduce new ag revenue into the county coffers. We need to jump start our approach to wildfire and emergency communications: Install sirens, locate dedicated wildfire water storage, and adopt a program whereby residents donate their firesafe clean-up hours to earn matching grant dollars to address the big firesafe projects.

Over the last four years, there has been too much focus on eliminating Cannabis by criminalizing property rights. This must change. We must support legal, reasonable, revenue-generating outdoor growing.

I don't profess to have all the answers. I know they are out there, within your hearts and minds. Some decisions won't please everyone, but I will always seek input from all affected. I will work tirelessly for you, my neighbors, to earn your trust and to make District 5 a better place than it is today. Let's make Yuba County shine!



Lois Alma Butz, 93, passed away at home in Celestial Valley on April 8, 2018. The last of four generations of the Butz family to live in the Valley, she often said that there might be better places to live but she didn't know of any and she wasn't looking.

Lois liked hard work, corny jokes, and cowboy poetry. Tearing down a motor, building cabinets and cedar decks, hunting deer, or weeding asparagus were routine, but facing a new and complicated task was fun. Once an "impossible" project was resolved, she loved to recite: "Somebody said it couldn't be done...so he buckled right in with the trace of a grin...he tackled the thing that couldn't be done and he did it!"



pants became the first woman to have a career working at a saw mill. She was also the first woman member of the volunteer fire department in North San Juan. Later on she played a key role in getting the NSJ Senior Center off the ground.

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Whether at Senior Center lunches or with friends and family gathered around her kitchen table, Lois shared endless jokes and stories, songs, and poems that she knew by heart. At any time she could pop up with something silly: "On the other hand, she had a wart!"

Lois is survived by her sister, Thelma Gates-Jackson of Grass Valley, and a zillion friends and relations. Memorial contributions may be sent to the volunteer fire department in North San Juan or Camptonville. A celebration of life will be scheduled in June at the North San Juan fire station. News from the Yuba River Ranger District





The Forest Service spent April preparing for another busy recreation season. Seasonal employees have been brought on, and one by one recreation areas are opening up to serve the public. Bullards Bar Reservoir campgrounds opened April 13th, bringing with it over 20 miles of trails for hiking, horseback riding, and mountain biking. The Highway 49 campgrounds up to Rocky Rest were opened on April 27th providing access to over 20 miles of recreation trails for this area. More areas are scheduled to open up as snow melts and maintenance is completed. Opening day for fishing on all rivers was April 28th.

The Yuba River Ranger District hosted its third Every Kid in the Woods event the last week of April. This event hosted over 250 fourth graders at our Oregon Creek Day Use area, giving kids the opportunity to learn about water safety from the Army Corp of Engineers and about the food chain and how it impacts wildlife, from the Yuba River Wildlife Crew. During this event every fourth grade student received an Every-Kid-in-a-Park Pass which gives the student and their family free access to hundreds of parks, lands, and waters for an entire year. If your fourth grade child was unable to attend the event, it is not too late. Just go to everykidinapark.gov to get a voucher for a free Every Kid in a Park Pass, or go to your local Ranger Station.

The Yuba River Ranger District is in the beginning planning stages of a project on public lands to treat the fuels and timber around the Camptonville and Trapper area (South of 49, east of Camptonville and west of Goodyears Bar). You will probably see increased Forest Service traffic this summer and the next.

Late season storms have come through as expected and left 16.27 inches of rain for the month of March. April is a little behind with only 7.01 inches of rain measured as of April 19th.

On Thursday morning, I went down to refill our bird feeders and saw this unbelievably beautiful bird on one of the hummingbird feeders. WOW! I was so excited! I took a bunch of pictures, and then looked it up in my field guide. It turned out to be a Hooded Oriole, which I had never seen before! Apparently, I was super lucky to have seen it, as this is not its usual habitat.

When I went back down to the feeders, there were TWO brightly colored birds. At first I thought the second bird must be another Hooded Oriole, but it turned out to be a male Bullock's Oriole!

The two orioles were taking turns at the hummingbird feeder. I am so curious as to why and how they showed up here together. Both the Hooded Oriole and the Bullock's Oriole overwinter in southern Mexico, and sometimes as far south as Costa Rica. They have flown approximately 3,000 miles from their winter habitat to our neighborhood.

Bullock's Orioles nest in our neighborhood every year. This is their normal habitat. Typically, males arrive in mid-April, a week or two ahead of the females.

At this time of year, Hooded Orioles are common in northwestern Mexico, parts of the American southwest, as well as the coast and southern end of California. Riparian areas that have palm trees are their preferred habitat. Apparently the range of these orioles has expanded into suburban areas and ranches in the foothills of the Sierra, where palms have been planted.

Both of these orioles hung around for most of the day on Thursday, but I haven't seen them since. I feel so privileged to have seen these two extraordinary birds together at our feeder! .

Meet Your Local Artisan Wood Worker – Denise Stratton

Ever since she was a little girl hammering nails into wood with her father, Denise wanted to be a carpenter. She has been working with wood passionately ever since. After graduating from high school in Oregon, she enlisted in the Navy. Stationed in Orlando, Florida, she was a carpenter on a submarine.

After her stint in the Navy, Denise relocated to Washington and purchased a partnership in a petting zoo. She also took odd jobs wherever she could. Two years later, while working for a contractor doing trim work, she had a bad accident. When the ladder she was on broke, she fell down a flight of stairs, incurring significant injuries. After the first of what would become eight surgeries, she

sold her partnership in the petting zoo and returned to Oregon where she obtained her Contractors License.

In 1995, Denise and her then partner traveled in their trailer to Camptonville for the summer to look for gold. They fell in love with the area and never left. For the next two years, they lived at the Willow Creek Campground until moving into a rental owned by Frank and Bonnie Jaynes. They later bought the house and property on which Denise currently resides. At the time, the house was just a simple A-frame structure. With help from friends, Denise completely remodeled it, inside and out, refinishing the walls, adding a loft for her sleeping area, and a sunroom with a beautiful window seat and picture window. She built a new kitchen, bath, and laundry room, then replaced the flooring and built a banister. To provide a view of her six acre property which butts up to Bullards Bar, she reconstructed the deck around the house and created areas for entertainment, relaxation, fun, and games. She built a large deck area around her above ground swimming pool with a hot tub, and also a large covered car port and storage shed. She constructed the stairway leading up to the porch deck with Yuba River rocks which she collected.

In 1998, Denise served as a volunteer firefighter in Camptonville for about one year. In 2002 she bought the Rebel Ridge Market, in need of major repair, and replaced the flooring, counters, and refrigeration system. She sponsored fundraising activities as well as other events. Denise sold the business in 2004.

While she no longer works professionally as a carpenter, she still does work for herself and as special favors for friends and the community such as creating picnic and custom tables for events, decks, and other furniture. Denise's workshop houses a wide array of woodworking tools and equipment for any wood project imaginable. The chop saw, which easily cuts angles, is her favorite tool. Loving and using only wood from the local mill because of its beauty, she proudly "keeps it local."



Denise is also passionate about gold panning. She used to dredge for gold before it became illegal. Now she happily uses a gold pan, sluice box, and metal detector. For the past 15 years, Denise has volunteered on the Firefighters Auxiliary which supports the Volunteer Fire Department. Annually, she and other Auxiliary members participate in the Firefighter benefit picnic. She also is quick to help neighbors in their time of need. Denise loves living in Camptonville because of the people, community,

forest, and country life. Denise fondly refers to her recently deceased mother as her "hero" who gave her inspiration and courage. Having parents who accepted and understood who she was, was the most rewarding aspect of her life.

Vouchers to Replace Woodstoves!

The Woodsmoke Reduction Pilot Program is an upcoming incentive program that provides vouchers to replace non-EPA certified wood-burning stoves and fireplace inserts with either an EPA certified woodstove or insert, a natural gas or propane stove, or an electric heating device.

For certain communities designated by the state and for low-income households, the vouchers may cover the entire cost of the replacement (up to \$3,500). A standard voucher of \$1,000 is available to all households in Yuba County, regardless of location or income, to put toward the replacement cost.

The Program will begin in May, 2018. Applications will be available from the district when the program begins. To apply, fill out an application and take a photo of your old device. Send the completed application and photo to the air district by email Fraqmd@fraqmd.org, mail, or drop off at Feather River Air Quality Management District, 541 Washington Avenue, Yuba City, CA 95991.

For those who do not have access to the internet, applications will be available at the following businesses: • Brian Price, Burgee Dave's, Camptonville • Ace Hardware, Oregon House • Ray's Hardware, Brownsville.

Vouchers will be issued first come, first served, and expire four weeks from the date they are issued. Within the four weeks, the applicant must shop around from the list of participating retailers, select a replacement device, and give the voucher to the retailer. Installation is not required to be completed within four weeks. Vouchers are only good at participating retailers and for installations done by licensed contractors; do-it-yourself installations are not allowed under this program.

Spring Weather's Warming Up, ... But Colds Are Hanging On

New friends, field trips, and lots of outdoor fun going on at 1, 2, 3 Grow now that spring has sprung. Unfortunately, we still have lots of colds and coughs and runny noses going on, too. Of course, childhood colds are scarcely unusual. **It is** called the common cold, and that's part of how we develop our immune system. Most children average six colds a year. Colds can, however, be exhausting, annoying, and occasionally downright frightening, especially when they make breathing difficult.

Some cold-like illnesses are caused by bacterial infection and usually are accompanied by fever, but most fevers are the result of viral infections and last two to three days. With a newborn, even a fever of 100.2 merits a call to the doctor. Even though viral infections are not treated with antibiotics, there are steps one can take to reduce symptoms, and fever of 103 in children six months or older deserves that doctor call, as well.

Colds, with or without fever, are caused by viruses and affect the respiratory system, most commonly the nose and throat. They usually last about seven days. They can get scary, however, when the airways get irritated and inflamed, causing increased mucus production, coughing, and difficulties both breathing and swallowing. Things you can do to help:

- Give infants and toddlers clear liquids every hour. Just like adults, children need lots of liquid to fight infection.
- Coughing is often worse at night or when napping. Put something under the mattress to raise baby's head and allow her to sleep at an incline to make breathing easier.
- Reduce activity and encourage lots of rest. Stay calm yourself. Rock, pat, and sing to soothe baby's distress.
- Suctioning nose and throat can help infants be able to breathe and suck more easily.
- For infants over nine months old, there are over the counter medications to relieve cold symptoms. Read all directions carefully, and measure doses and times accurately.
- Colds are highly contagious and spread easily. Wash hands often and practice good hygiene.

Croup is an infection that obstructs breathing and has a characteristic heavy barking cough. It often starts out as a typical cold. Approximately five percent of children seen in the emergency department for croup require hospitalization. The following are the Mayo Clinic's recommendations for when to see a doctor. You should seek immediate medical attention if your child:


- Makes noisy, high-pitched breathing sounds (stridor) both when inhaling and exhaling
- · Begins drooling or has difficulty swallowing
- Seems anxious and agitated or fatigued and listless
- Breathes at a faster rate than usual
- Struggles to breathe
- Develops blue or grayish skin around the nose, mouth or fingernails (cyanosis)[*]

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CCP's Bioenergy Project Update and Thank-Yous





Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) is working to develop a small-scale forest biomass energy facility in Camptonville, California, to promote economic, environmental, and forest health on public and private forested lands throughout the region. Our project is one of several in the Sierra Nevada working with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and Pacific Gas & Electric under CA Senate Bill 1122.

For those of you following our progress, this has not been a trouble-free process for a small community-driven organization. There have been many delays along the way, the latest being PG&E's reluctance to cooperate with the CPUC's regulations under the BioMAT program. Our project, which was awarded \$4.99 million by the California Energy Commission (CEC), has not yet received the funding, in part due to these delays. We want to thank local Supervisor Randy Fletcher, CA Senator Nielsen and Assemblyman Gallagher for their letters of support for this project. We expect to hear the CEC's decision in mid-May.

Some good news is that on March 21, 2018, the project received its Conditional Use Permit from Yuba County, bringing us one important step closer to construction. We have begun to implement work on the USFS Wood Innovations grant we recently received and have partnered with renewable energy project developer Phoenix Energy to conduct the facility's late-stage development and construction. This grant will enable the bioenergy project to complete late-stage milestones towards an anticipated late 2020 commercial operation date.

The bioenergy facility will serve as anchor tenant at the Forest Biomass Business Center (FBBC) and utilize 30,000 bone-dry tons a year of woody biomass from public and private forested lands to produce electricity for export to Pacific Gas & Electric. It will also produce thermal energy for export to co-located businesses that need heat or cooling. YCWA Program Helps Foothill Fire Protection District Purchase Emergency Equipment

The Foothill Fire Protection District will be able to better treat sudden cardiac arrest in the Yuba County foothills and areas near New Colgate Powerhouse and New Bullards Bar Reservoir with the help of a grant from Yuba County Water Agency.

The \$5,000 grant, as part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will help the Foothill Fire Protection District purchase three new automated external defibrillator kits, also known as AEDs. An AED is a portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart. It can potentially stop an irregular heartbeat and allow a normal rhythm to resume following a sudden cardiac arrest.

"The Foothill Fire Protection District provides critical, life-saving services to the areas around New Bullards Bar and New Colgate Powerhouse," said YCWA Board Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher. "We are so appreciative of their quick response capability, and we are happy to support them by funding this new equipment."

This is the second agency to benefit from YCWA's Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, which was created in January 2018. These grants are designed for first responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$5,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of rescue equipment or specialized personnel training. Grant funding requests must be connected to YCWA's missions of flood risk reduction, water supply reliability, hydropower generation, groundwater management, fisheries enhancement, and recreation in and around New Bullards Bar Reservoir.


