Fires in Camptonville!


The Story: July 16, 2018

Shortly after 9 pm Monday evening, a report of a vegetation fire was broadcast over our fire radios. As Camptonville firefighters headed to the firehouse, pondering strategy for this reported Celestial Valley fire, additional 911 reports came out of a second "large" fire approaching houses in Camptonville, up the very steep and overgrown Pike City Road. At the same time, a third fire - right in the heart of town - was reported by a firefighter as she was leaving for the firehouse. Reports from campers on Oregon Creek stated it was "a fire larger than a house;" reports from Highway 49 were of the "whole hillside on fire." Clearly, stuff was hitting the fan.

The Cal Fire dispatchers in Grass Valley started a wildland response, sending a fleet of fire equipment towards Camptonville. Camptonville Engine 6371 responded to Pike City Road, assigned to protect houses nearest the fire's edge. Engine 6365 headed to Cleveland Avenue to find locals Ellen McCarthy, Gary Valenta, and Dennis Williams attacking the 20-foot long roadside fire with hoses and garden tools. The Engine 6365 crew knocked down the remaining fire on Cleveland Ave, then quickly headed down to Pike City Road, leaving the locals to mop up Cleveland. Other fire units went searching around town for more fires, thinking "arsonist at work." Fire Chief Brandi Dudek scouted out a vantage point up near the cemetery, made a quick size-up of the Pike City Road fire, and wisely requested a "strike team of engines for structure protection" from Grass Valley. All of this happened within minutes of the first reports.

The two largest fires were ignited on Pike City Road and spread uphill into steep, brush-covered oak woodlands, racing towards houses along the south edge of Camptonville. Looking at the burn scars days later, it was a fast, clean burn uphill from the road's edge; human caused, no question. Pretty much the very same scenario was discussed in training not two weeks prior - one of our worst nightmare scenarios. Camptonville Engines 6365 and 6371 set up defensive positions at the top of the fire. Bystanders pitched in, dragging hose and cutting brush with chainsaws ahead of the fire. Other townspeople spread the word to houses near the fire. With much grit, determination, and a few whispered prayers, CVFD and the people of Camptonville held the fire at bay until neighboring fire departments could arrive and help with the attack. 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Cell Phone Tower in Camptonville?

Are you aware that Verizon is proposing to construct a cell^u phone tower in Camptonville? The location is a vacant piece of property in the Rebel Ridge area off Marysville Road and directly across from the little red store that is no longer in operation. If this proposal goes through, Verizon will construct a permanent 129 foot tall fake pine tree tower and an associated equipment slab contained in a 900 square foot equipment compound. The compound will be enclosed with a chain link fence and security wire.

The purpose of this article is to educate the community that this is in process, to update on what has already occurred, and to inform community members how they can provide input.

Verizon submitted a request to Yuba County for a conditional use permit (CUP). This is required because the private property is zoned Rural Residential. The County notified residents who reside within 1000 feet of this proposed site by letter, and published the project in the *Appeal Democrat* (which very few people here read), but no notices were put in our local paper, *The Camptonville Courier*. The letter stated that any opposition should be submitted by letter during the Public Comment Period, June 7-26th.

On July 12th, the Planning Department held the Development Review Committee (DRC) Public Hearing at 9 am at the Marysville Government Center. Concerned residents DID indeed attend this public hearing! They spoke about the letters they had submitted and their reasons for opposing this location.

Opposition included: Service will not extend to the town of Camptonville, service will not benefit our local Volunteer Fire Department, tower will only provide better service to Bullards Bar Reservoir, tower will be duplicating service that already exists, surrounding property values will be reduced, and it is a violation of the County's own zoning ordinance (listed below).

Studies show that the majority of people do not want to live or buy property beneath or near a cell tower due to health and safety concerns and aesthetics. There has to be a better location that would benefit the locals better – locations that are not right next to people's work and homes.

Yuba County Zoning Ordinance ARTICLE 4 CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT states: A conditional use permit shall only be granted if it is found that the establishment, maintenance, and operation of the use of the building or land applied for will not, under the circumstances of the particular case, be detrimental to the health, safety, peace, morals, and general welfare of persons residing or working in the neighborhood, or to the general welfare of the County. Residents also expressed health and safety concerns. What about our exposure to the radio frequency electromagnetic fields (RF's) this tower will be emitting? What about our personal and moral beliefs, our general welfare? What about life flight helicopters that frequently land near the project site? A neighbor stated, "Research shows that you should work/live more than 300m (that's about 980 feet) from a tower, for health concerns." Environmental issues included a burial site on or near the property and concerns for migratory birds and other wildlife in the area.

In short, the DRC voted 2-1 in favor of honoring CUP #2018-0005 to Verizon. Although residents brought all their concerns to the DRC public hearing, very few concerns were answered or even discussed.

Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) will appeal this decision to the Board of Supervisors (see article below).

CCP Appeals Verizon Tower Decision

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The Yuba County Water Agency Is Now: The Yuba Water Agency - with new logo

The Yuba County Water Agency announced that it is rebranding as the *Yuba Water Agency*, to provide a simple, easy-to-identify moniker and logo, as the nearly 60-year-old organization seeks to develop a stronger relationship with the people of Yuba County.



The agency was established in 1959 to reduce flood risk and provide a sustainable water supply to the people of Yuba County. In spite of significant investment in the community, the agency is largely unknown by the people it serves.

"For the last 50-plus years, we have flown under the radar, largely unnoticed by the public," said Board Chairman Brent Hastey. "We are in a position to make an even bigger impact in the lives of the people of Yuba County at a much faster pace and want to do a better job of educating people about who we are and what we do."

The agency surveyed Yuba County residents and found that many had not heard of it, or were unclear about the agency's roles and responsibilities. Many mistakenly believed the agency was a department within the government of Yuba County.

"Because of that, we wanted to use this time to make sure that our image is one that people can easily connect with and identify out of the sea of government agencies and organizations they come in contact with on a daily basis," said Hastey.

The agency owns and manages the Yuba River Development Project, which consists of New Bullards Bar Dam and Reservoir, New Colgate Powerhouse, Narrows II Powerhouse, and the two small diversion dams, Log Cabin and Our House, which feed into New Bullards Bar Reservoir.

In order to sell the \$185 million in bonds to build the project, Yuba Water Agency entered into a 50-year contract with PG&E to purchase all of the power generated at New Colgate Powerhouse. PG&E made the loan payment for the bonds, and had all of the responsibility for the costs associated with managing the project.

In 2016, that 50-year contract came to an end. The project had been paid in full. The revenue from power sales is now being reinvested in Yuba County, through the agency's mission areas of flood risk reduction, water supply, fish habitat protection and enhancement, hydroelectric generation, and recreation.

The agency's website address will change to YubaWater.org. The legal name of the agency will remain unchanged as Yuba County Water Agency for contracts and other legal documents. The Yuba Water Agency is a stand-alone public agency governed by a board of seven elected officials to serve the people of Yuba County.

Meet your Local Camptonville Community . . . Mom, Resource Extraordinaire, and Tooth Fairy – Rochelle Bell

Rochelle has spent most of her life helping and caring for others and has continued to do so throughout the 30+ years she has been in Camptonville.

Born and raised in L.A., Rochelle always wanted to be a nurse. One day, she saw a group of "Candy Stripers" (volunteer aides) outside a hospital. She told herself, "That's what I want to do!" In her senior year of high school, she applied but there were no hospital aide openings, only an opening in the dental clinic. Thinking she would still be able to wear the "Candy Striper" uniform, she jumped at the opportunity. While she didn't get to wear the coveted uniform, she fell in love with dentistry. She enrolled in Dental Assisting School after high school and began her Dental Assisting career.

After marriage, divorce, and raising her two sons, she wanted to start a new life. A friend who lived in Camptonville suggested she check it out, saying she would "love it." He was right! After a weekend in Camptonville, she fell in love with the area. What attracted her at that time were fewer people and no traffic. No one locked their cars or homes. She was also struck by the beauty of the trees, river, and wildlife, and lack of crime. It was an easier, slower paced way of life. A year later in 1985, she moved here and it was the best decision she ever made. Both sons soon followed: Andy lives in Grass Valley and Jeff lives in Camptonville.

Life got even better when she found the perfect dental office and became employed as a Dental Assistant for the DicKard and Creasy Dental Practice. Rochelle was involved in all phases of dentistry: private practice, public health, institutional, and teaching other dental assistants. Many people who attended Camptonville School may fondly remember Rochelle as the "Tooth Fairy." For several years around Halloween, she wore her Tooth Fairy costume and visited classrooms with her tooth-capped wand reminding students to brush their teeth after eating candy! As the Dental Health Educator, she taught mothers of children ages 0-5 years how to raise children with no cavities. She retired four years ago after a "wonderful" 40-year career – her greatest achievement, she says.

Eighteen years ago, Rochelle and Rod Bondurant met and became friends while attending a sketching class at Twilight School. They have been together ever since. This relationship has become the most rewarding aspect of her life.

Over the years, Rochelle has volunteered in just about every Camptonville community event and/or activity, including the annual Gardeners' Market, Cemetery Cleanup, and Volunteer Fire Department Picnic. For five years, Rochelle was co-editor of The Camptonville Courier with Rod Bondurant, and continues to volunteer with the paper's monthly fold and distribution.

A Board Member of the Camptonville Historical Society, Rochelle is proud of how the History Museum has developed. For her, it was fun putting it together, discovering and learning about

I don't fish, but I went looking for them in the North Yuba River this week. I found a few "fry" (above) in the shallow, slow waters along the river. I also spotted a medium size fish in some shallow water, but it spotted me too, and zipped right out of that area before I got a photo. Rats!

Fish start as eggs which hatch into larvae. Larvae are not able to feed themselves and carry a yolk-sac in their bellies which provides their nutrition. At this stage they are called "alevins." When developed to the point where they can feed themselves (mainly on zooplankton), the fish are called "fry." When they develop scales and working fins, they are called "fingerlings." This juvenile fingerling stage lasts until the fish is fully grown, sexually mature, and interacting with other adult fish.

It seems like the most common fish in the North Yuba River are Coastal Rainbow Trout, which are native to California, but have been planted locally. There are also non-native German Brown Trout that swim up from Bullard's Bar Reservoir to spawn. On occasion, you might also find a non-native Brook Trout that has flowed out from a higher elevation lake during spring high water.

Maybe all these fish will attract a River Otter to our local stretch of the North Yuba River. I'll keep my fingers crossed!

And come they did! A total of ten agencies sent 13 engines, four water tenders, two dozers, two hand crews, and at least six chief officers. Fire crews worked into the morning hours before all fires were declared contained. No structures were damaged by the fire. No one was injured. Total size of the four burns was about one acre. According to the Cal Fire Incident Commander, work by locals halting forward progress of the fire was key.

According to Fire Chief Brandi Dudek, the cause of the fire remains under investigation. – Mark Jokerst

If you have an emergency, please call 911, not me at my house! Although I love talking with everyone, the 911 dispatch is a much quicker way to get help as they can start a dispatch before your conversation is over. It takes longer if I have to self-dispatch for resources to get started.

The Camptonville volunteers had another very busy month with 11 emergency calls, including: 2 motor vehicle accidents, 2 medicals, 3 public assists, 1 structure fire (in Loma Rica) and 3 vegetation fires.

Our roster stands at 17 Firefighters, including two new recruits and three Probational Firefighters.

We are always looking for new volunteers! Training is Tuesday evenings from 6 - 9 pm, with every third Wednesday in NSJ for medical training. Please stop by and check us out. All training will be provided at no cost to volunteers.

You do not have to be a firefighter to volunteer. We also need support staff such as maintenance at the station, hose cleaning and rolling, and other non-firefighter projects. If interested in donating time and being part of a great team, feel free to give your Chief a call at 288-3303.

Fire! What Should You Do?

I walked out my driveway in thongs and shorts to see a large patch of four-foot tall flames not 200 feet from my house heading towards Yakshi's place. In an event like the July 16th fire, things can develop quickly: perhaps a smooth transition into "containment" like this fire, or perhaps a spreading fire reaching into the heart of town with chaos building by the second.

Begin preparations today: Pack a "GO!" bag with some bare essentials. Have your valuables boxed and ready to grab and go. Do not panic. Breath deep, move deliberately, focus on being calm and effective: family first, neighbors next. If asked to evacuate, please do so without delay, and listen carefully to the instructions on where to go: north, south, east, or west? Don't assume you know the safest route! ASK!

How can you help? The Fire Department appreciates and welcomes citizen assistance on a fire: dragging hose, backing up firefighters on the hose, passing around water and refreshments, spreading the word door-to-door of a spreading fire, assisting disabled or dog-tired firefighters, and assisting our elders and disabled neighbors to escape or seek shelter.

In spite of the heat, wear heavy boots, long pants, and long sleeve shirts. Bring gloves, flashlights, and lots of water. Have something to breathe through in heavy smoke. The list of things you can do to help is endless.

If you are requested to leave the front lines, do know it is only for your own safety (and realize that maybe things aren't looking too good at the moment). Cooperation, assistance, support. Do know the day will come when your on-the-spot assistance will be sorely needed and very much appreciated. Make spaghetti! Camptonville Prepare!

It is a free parent participation preschool for children ages 0 to 5 years. It, too, is located on the school grounds directly behind the Pelton Building. All parents are asked to please check in at the school office before heading down to a morning at preschool.

Parent participation means that parents are an integral part of the daily functioning of the program. They help provide classroom or snack supplies, they work in the garden, they take turns setting up for, or cleaning up after snack, class, and garden activities. Parents do not have to be in the classroom, but they are required to remain on campus. They are welcome to use the Resource Center computers, help out in an older child's elementary school classroom, get together with other parents for a fitness support group, a reading club, quilting or knitting activities, or anything that enriches their adult lives. CCP might even be able to help some of you realize that creative or crafty dream you've had in that regard.

We are in session three mornings a week from 9:30 am to 12:30 pm. Everyone from Camptonville and surrounding communities is welcome and can fill out registration forms on their first day. We let the school get itself in gear for a week before our first class.


Fire restrictions are in effect as of July 17th until further notice. Campfires are still allowed in designated campgrounds and the use of gas or propane BBQs or camp stoves is allowed in dispersed areas with possession of the CA Campfire permit which can be obtained at Yuba River Ranger District or at PreventWildfireCA.org.

Packer Lake Fishing Day: More than 131 kids fished at the 21st annual Packer Lake Fish Day on Saturday, July 21st, sponsored by the Tahoe National Forest, Sierra County Fish and Wildlife Commission, and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.
