## Sri Moonshine Music Series Returns September 28th: Kala Ramnath -- North Indian Violinist and Vocalist By John Deaderick

Our locally produced extraordinary line-up of world class musical artists continues September 28th with the return of North Indian violinist Kala Ramnath. If you were fortunate enough to be present at the *Elements* concert two years ago (can it really be that long?), you heard Kala's mystical violin magic along with George Brooks on sax and Gwyneth Wentink on harp. We are indeed lucky to have her return for a solo -- with tabla accompaniment -- performance. She is widely recognized as among the greatest of Classical Indian violinists.

In addition to violin, she studied Mewati vocal technique with Maestro Pandit Jesrai. This has brought a unique emotionalism to her playing style, so much so that her instrument is known as The Singing Violin. Should our lucky stars continue to shine brightly on this night, perhaps she will sing for us, as her evocative voice is so very beautiful. She is incredibly adaptive and diverse, comfortably creating musical alliances with artists from different genres around the globe, incorporating elements of Western Classical, Jazz, Flamenco, and traditional African music into her rich and varied repertoire.

Sri Moonshine Series Artistic Director and master raga singer (among his many other gifts) Terry Riley says that she is his favorite violinist -- no small praise, indeed. So, dust off your vinyl copy of Sgt. Pepper and give another listen to George Harrison's "Within You, Without You" and prepare to be mesmerized. See you there! 7 – 9:30 pm, \$5 at the door




Since editing the April issue of *The Courier*, I became a grandmother for the first time! What a joy to see a new generation of my immigrant family take root here in Northern California!

# Come See What Your Fire Department Donations Have Done!

A HUGE THANK YOU to our community for supporting the Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department (CVFD). Combining your donations with a Yuba Water Agency grant and loan, CVFD has been able to acquire a new (to us) rescue apparatus, *Rescue 6340*. The 1985 relic we were using had to be taken out of service due to safety concerns. Rescue 6340 houses all of our medical, vehicle extrication, and low angle rope rescue equipment as well as seating five personnel. It is our most used piece of equipment.

While brand new rescues start at \$175,000 and can exceed \$200,000, our purchase was a 2007 Ford: \$73,000 through Brindlee Fire Apparatus.

- \*Camptonville Fire Auxiliary (the women who host CVFD's annual fire department picnic fundraiser)



#### **Lakes Basin Happenings!**

Although it takes a little more than an hour to get up to the Lakes Basin from Camptonville, it's really worth the drive! Right now the wildflowers are blooming, birds and their juvenile offspring are flying around, insects are busy pollinating the flowers, chipmunks and squirrels are busy gathering and eating seeds, a tortoiseshell butterfly migration is happening, the mosquitoes aren't too bad, and the lakes are definitely swimmable! It's paradise!

One of my favorite hikes is the Grassy Lake Trail out of the Lakes Basin Campground. It starts in a beautiful wetland, drops down to a flower-filled, wet-meadow area, and then climbs up through the forest to rocky slopes and on to Long Lake. The

wildflowers along the trail can be astounding! Right now you should find some leopard lilies in bloom, as well as paintbrush, yampah, arrowleaved groundsel, monkshoods, horsemint, columbine, goldenrod, arnica, and rein orchids!

The view is spectacular on the way up to the lake and at the lake itself. The trail continues across the Long Lake dam up to more rocky slopes, and then loops back down for a mile or more to the Long Lake/Bear Lakes trailhead. From there, you should proceed on the road for about 1/2 mile to a footpath on the left. Take the footpath through a beautiful, flower-filled aspen grove back to the Lakes Basin Campground and the Grassy Lake trailhead where you started. The total distance for this hike is about 5 miles.


Get out there if you can and enjoy this beautiful wild area, right in our own backyard!





# Yuba Water Agency funds trauma intervention training in support of local first-responder agencies

The **Yuba-Sutter Trauma Intervention Program (TIP)** will be better able to support victims of crime and survivors of tragedy with the help of a grant from Yuba Water Agency.

The \$10,000 grant, recently approved by the agency as part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will allow the nonprofit organization to purchase necessary training and materials for its volunteers who provide direction and emotional support to victims. Each TIP volunteer receives 55 hours of training before their first response, and participates in monthly training.

"It has been an honor to bring the Trauma Intervention Program to our community," said Lou Binninger, program director. "Being present in someone's tragedy is a sacred experience. When TIP is involved, hurt people get better care here than elsewhere in America. We are grateful for all the community volunteers and contributions to support our mission."

The Yuba-Sutter TIP is a self-funded organization that was

established in 1994 to support local law enforcement, hospital and ambulance services, and responds to all 911 requests with immediate on-scene support for victims of crime and survivors of tragedy. Since its creation, the organization has responded to more than 11,000 calls.

"These well-trained volunteers respond 24 hours a day, seven days a week to help victims of tragedy," said Yuba Water Agency Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher. "They are first responders in every sense of the word."

Like all Bill Shaw grants, the agency is able to make these funds available because the first responders may be called upon to provide emergency support to the agency's facilities and staff, or to people recreating at its lakes or on the Yuba River.





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### Wild Pigs and Water

The Camptonville Water
Department has received
reports that wild pigs have

been seen in the Pike City area recently. Now why would this cause any concern, you might ask? First, be aware that in Camptonville we get our water primarily from a small springfed creek. Wild pigs like to root around and wallow in wet areas. Their wallowing disturbs springs and creeks, creating a potential threat to the water supply. In addition to this threat, their rooting and wallowing behavior also disturbs riparian areas and reduces habitat suitability for native and endangered wildlife species. Wild pigs are known to cause extensive damage to crops and rangelands.

Wild pigs are hosts to over 35 types of parasites. Of the 30 diseases that wild pigs carry, 20 can be transferred to humans. Additionally, they are known carriers of five major waterborne pathogens that can contaminate drinking water: Escherichia coli (E. coli), Campylobacter, Salmonella, Cryptosporidium, and Giardia.

Hunting of these pigs is allowed by California law, with proper permits and/or permission from private landowners. In addition to limiting the growth and spread of these animals, hunting of this invasive species will help control the threat they pose. AND, they are quite tasty!

## Meet the New Watershed Coordinators!

Earlier this year, Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) with South Yuba River Citizens League (SYRCL), the United States Forest Service (Tahoe National Forest, TNF), Yuba Water Agency (YWA), and Sierra Nevada Conservancy (SNC) submitted a grant application to the California Department of Conservation's Watershed Coordinator program. The purpose of the program is to support large landscape projects by funding watershed coordinator positions. Watershed coordinators will focus on facilitating the coordination of priority projects across the designated landscape outlined in the grant application.

Through this grant, CCP and the partners will establish the **Yuba Watershed Forest Collaborative Project**. The project area is just over 1,300 square miles and includes the North, Middle, and South Yuba River sub-watersheds in parts of Yuba, Nevada, Sierra, and Placer counties. The area also includes several large, severely burned swaths of land in the Yuba River watershed.

We had over 25 people apply for the positions. We are excited to announce that we hired two great watershed coordinators! Please meet **Allison** and **Andrew:** 

\*\*\* Allison Thomson grew up in the area and has over five years of experience in forestry and stream restoration. She comes with an appreciation of the value of working landscapes and their important role in sustaining rural communities and ecosystem processes.

\*\*\* Andrew Salmon recently graduated from UC
Berkeley with a Master's degree in Environmental
Planning with a focus on watershed restoration and
Sierra Nevada forest ecology. He has spent the last two
summers studying and conducting research in our own
Sierra Nevada mixed conifer forests.

While they will work as a team, Allison will focus on supporting CCP's bioenergy facility project and Andrew will focus on the forest restoration projects. With matching funds from our great partners, Yuba Water Agency and Sierra Nevada Conservancy, Yuba Watershed Forest Collaborative Project will be able to fund these two positions for almost four years. We are looking forward to Allison and Andrew coming on board September 4th!

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#### Forest Service Report: Campfire Restrictions/ Seasonal Employment

Our hearty winter blessed us with a slow fire season. In August of last year we had two large active fires burning in Northern California extreme enough to declare a natural disaster; this year we celebrate clear blue skies and at times temperatures below 85 degrees at the peak of the day. That being said, the Tahoe National Forest finally implemented fire restrictions on Wednesday, August 21st. Campfires are only allowed in designated campgrounds, and the use of gas or propane barbeques or camp stoves are allowed in dispersed areas, with possession of a CA Campfire Permit, which can be obtained at Yuba River Ranger District or at *PreventWildfireCA.org*.

The US Forest Service will be accepting applications for seasonal spring and summer jobs in California from September 16th to September 30th. Positions are available in multiple fields, including fire, recreation, natural resources, timber engineering, visitor services, and technology. Seasonal employment with the Forest Service is a great way to give back to communities, learn new skills, and perform meaningful work.
