The Golden Fire

Over 100 firefighters and 11 aircraft worked together to stop the progress of a blaze, dubbed the Golden Fire, south of Camptonville (near Highway 49) in Yuba County that started just after 6 am on May 20 and grew to about 25 acres by noon.

Sheriff Deputies assisted in helping residents evacuate safely, going door-to-door and using hi-low sirens to alert residents to the danger. CodeRED emergency alerts were also used to notify residents within evacuation zones. Zonehaven provided the community with critical evacuation updates based on designated zones within the

county. Details on your specific zone can be found at https://community.zonehaven.com.

Yuba County Office of Emergency Services (OES) staff worked to coordinate services and provide updates to the community.

How Were You Notified?


To be notified of emergencies and evacuations, you must sign up for **CodeRed** and **ZoneHaven**. Most people living near the recent Golden Fire were able to rely on CodeRed and ZoneHaven to monitor the fire's progress and know when to evacuate. If you haven't signed up, please do so now – this is only the beginning of fire season!

Firefighters

First, know which ZONE you live in. (https://community.zonehaven.com). This map shows that in the Golden Fire, Zone YUB-EO12-A had a Mandatory Evacuation; YUB-E097, an Evacuation Warning; and YUB-E013, YUB-E012B, YUB-E015, YUB-E014, YUB-E044 had Evacuation Advisories. To find your zone, click on your location on the Zonehaven map, then sign up for alerts in the pop-up box. OES has handy refrigerator magnets to write your zone on.



Updates from the Yuba River Ranger District

- Our Camptonville office is closed until further notice.
- You can still contact the Yuba River Ranger District at 530-362-8259, Monday-Friday, 8:30 am-4:30 pm. In-person appointments can be made for some services.
- The Nevada City Supervisor's Office is open 9 am-4:30 pm, Monday-Friday, 530-265-4531.
- Most campgrounds are open. Reservations can be made at www.recreation.gov.

Residential Burn Permits are SUSPENDED in Nevada, Yuba, and Placer counties as of May 23, 2022. This means that NO residential burning of any kind, EVEN IF YOU HAVE PREVIOUSLY OBTAINED A RESIDENTIAL BURN PERMIT.

At this time, campfires are still allowed in the fire rings and BBQ pits provided within the USFS campgrounds.

From Cal Fire: While outdoor burning of landscape debris by homeowners is no longer allowed, Cal Fire is asking residents to take that extra time to prepare your home for wildfire by creating defensible space and hardening your home ahead of wildfires. Here are some tips to help prepare homes and property:

- Clear all dead and or dying vegetation to 100 feet from around all structures.
- Landscape with fire resistant plants and non-flammable ground cover.
- Find alternative ways to dispose of landscape debris, like chipping or hauling it to a biomass energy or green waste facility.

Election Day is Tuesday, June 7

Camptonville's polling place is the Alcouffe Center in Oregon House, from 7 am-8 pm, on June 7.

You can mail your ballots for free. They must be postmarked on or before June 7. You can also drop ballots off at our polling place at the Alcouffe Center on June 7.



Saving for Retirement

Everyone needs to save for their future, but knowing how to do so successfully can seem like a mystery. Most schools don't offer personal finance courses on saving, investing, retirement, or taxes. Full retirement benefits are available at the age of 67 years, and the average life expectancy in the United States is 78.7 years. Social Security is designed to replace 40% of pre-retirement income. To make up the 60% gap in income during your golden years, everyone needs to save and invest over the course of their working years. Most experts agree that \$1,000,000 is the average benchmark amount for Americans to retire.

To help you reach this goal, the U.S. Government has several tax advantaged savings accounts available to you. If you have an employer, you are eligible for the following:

- 1) 401(k): This is a retirement plan offered through an employer, so you will have to verify your eligibility. You can contribute an amount of your income to the 401(k), which is deducted from your taxable income. Your employer may match a certain portion of your contributions.
- 2) Individual Retirement Plan (IRA): An IRA is eligible for individuals with earned income. The amount contributed cannot be more than the amount you earn. The contribution limit is \$6,000 a year, or \$7,000 if you are 50 years old or over and is tax deductible.
- 3) Roth IRA: The contributions limits are the same as an IRA. Unlike an IRA, you'll pay taxes on the amount you contribute to a Roth IRA. However, the money grows taxfree in the account, and no income tax will be due on Roth IRA withdrawals in retirement. A Roth IRA does not require that you take distributions in retirement.

If you're self-employed, you can establish one of the following types of retirement plans for your business. They allow you to deduct both contributions and start-up costs of the plan for yourself and your eligible employees. You can even start one of these plans if you are a sole proprietor!

- 4) Simplified Employee Pension (SEP)
- 5) Simple IRA
- 6) Simple 401(k)














Remembering Bill Ramirez; Saying Goodbye to Barbara

Nestlings and Fledglings!

This month, lots of baby birds will hatch out from their eggs. Except for waterfowl, most nestlings are altricial (born in an undeveloped state), and require care and feeding by their parents. Usually nestlings remain in the nest for approximately 2-3 weeks. The bigger the bird, the longer the nesting period. When a nestling grows its flight feathers and is ready to leave the nest, it takes its first flight (fledges), and flutters to the ground. A bird that has just fledged is called a fledgling. Since these young fledglings cannot fly, most will live on the ground for a week or more, while their flight feathers continue to grow and their wing muscles get stronger. The parents will continue to feed the fledglings on the ground, until they are able to fly. Once fledglings can fly and feed themselves, they are called juveniles.

IF YOU FIND A FLEDGLING ON THE GROUND, PLEASE JUST LEAVE IT ALONE!

If you pick it up, your human scent will make it easier for it to be found by a predator. The parent birds will continue to care for the fledgling until it can fly. If you have a cat, keep it inside and away from the fledgling.

The best thing to do is to leave wild things wild!

There is a local group of experts, Wildlife Rehabilitation & Release, that can care for injured or abandoned birds, but only those found in Nevada County. If necessary, please call them for more information at 530-432-5522 or check out their website at www.cawildlife911.org.



"The Art of the Deal"

During a recent visit my sister, an antiques dealer, took me along on one of her "treasure



hunts." Watching her at thrift shops is like observing a Zen Master. She can pick the one item from amongst the mountain of offerings that will become the next day's big showcase price tag. It's quite the education. I asked her how she does it. She says that it's important to know your products and what people are interested in and then decide what will sell and at what price. It sounds so "magical."

As we wandered aisles, she pointed out labels and sometimes barely visible signatures. I began to realize that what she was doing really wasn't magic; it was an "art," and really similar to what we do at Yuba Watershed Protection and Firesafe Council:

Know your product (fire education), what people are interested in (home hardening, defensible space, and protecting the community), and then decide what will "sell" (what are people willing to "buy" literally and figuratively) and at what "price."

As a retired educator, I see the product I offer as "education." I definitely don't know it all, but I know who to ask to ensure that I'm providing good, reliable information to residents.

I listen to what folks want. As major fires in California increase, more people want to know how to protect their families, homes, and property. Wildfire Mitigation Reviews allow advisors like myself to evaluate the risk and tailor suggestions to each homeowner's specific needs.

What sells and how much? It's rewarding to see the "lightbulb" come on when we talk about work or techniques that can make a big difference in reducing fire risk in or around an individual's home. Some of these might be very simple changes to what people are already doing, many at low or no cost. It's a good day when we help another home owner become "Fire Safe."

"The Tricky Yuba" Documentary Film By DeDe Cordell, YWA

The Yuba Water Agency recently premiered its new documentary, "The Tricky Yuba," at the Lee Burrows Center for the Arts in Marysville. The film highlights Yuba Water's history, the reason for its formation, its significant accomplishments and what's next for the agency.

"The project was really born from a desire to document the agency's history from those who lived it," said Willie Whittlesey, Yuba Water's general manager. "We started talking about this around our 60th anniversary, and we felt that if we waited much longer, we could lose the ability to gather that history from those who lived it."

"The Tricky Yuba" is named after a W. T. Ellis quote referring to the historically flashy and unpredictable nature of the Yuba River, which contributed to catastrophic and destructive flooding in Yuba and Sutter counties in 1955, 1986, and 1997.

As the film describes, flooding drove the formation of Yuba Water and the construction of New Bullards Bar Dam on the North Yuba River in the 1960s to reduce the risk of flooding in the region, and the continuing threat of flooding drives much of the work Yuba Water does to this day. But the story is full of twists and turns, challenges, and emotion, which the documentary conveys through the personal stories of people who have lived it.

"Our hope is that this film will help the people of Yuba County – the people we serve – understand who we are, why we exist, why we matter, and how bright the future really is for this community," said DeDe Cordell, communications manager for Yuba Water.

The 53-minute documentary was created by Yuba Water in association with J Comm, Inc., and includes perspectives from some of the agency's board of directors, past and present, and other elected officials, agency partners, Yuba County residents, local historians, and more.


Yuba Water Honored as Champion for the Environment
