Camptonville Exceeds Expectations!

As donations have been tumblin' in, the Center's walls have come a tumblin' down!

\$14,857! Thanks to the *amazing generosity* of Camptonville folks and friends, we've really exceeded all expectations of raising enough money to match the \$5,000 anonymous gift to renovate the front of the Community Center. Over 30 people, businesses, and a local foundation donated a total of \$9,857 – which added to the \$5,000 match, gives us \$14,857 to get the front of the Center repaired and looking good!



We didn't waste any time getting started!
On Saturday, November 19th, while folks were inside enjoying coffee and homemade goodies, 12 people set to work outside tearing off the aging stucco and boarding. The dry rot was less than expected in most areas. However, the downhill-facing corner of the Center has dry rot all the way up to the top of the front wall. Several people knowledgeable in construction say that it all can be repaired.





Once we've assessed the damage, we'll develop a plan along with a list of needed materials. We'll start reconstruction and hope to build a new roof over the front porch in January and February, weather and volunteer labor permitting.

There's a whole lot more to be done! We need to open up the front and one side of the building to check for any further dry rot.

We can still use all the help we can get – both experienced and those with a strong back!



From the Yuba River Ranger District: **Permits for Christmas Trees and Residential Burns**

Christmas tree cutting permits are available

online at recreation.gov/tree-permits. Permit holders can choose between varieties of pine, fir, and cedar with a trunk diameter of six inches or less. Permits are \$10/tree, with a max of two trees per household.

Residential burn permits can be obtained online at burnpermit.fire.ca.gov. Remember to keep your piles 4' x 4' or smaller, never leave a fire unattended, keep a water source on hand, and make sure the fire is dead out before leaving the area. Always check beforehand to determine whether it is an allowable burn day.

- 5. Consider becoming a Fire Lookout Volunteer with the recipient.

I hope I've offered a few suggestions of "gifts of time" that will make a tremendous difference in the life of the giftee and create a treasured memory that will last long past the moment itself.

TNF Seeks Public Input on North Yuba Landscape Resilience Project

The Tahoe National Forest is seeking public input on the North Yuba Landscape Resilience Project draft environmental impact statement (DEIS). The 275,000-acre project is a vegetation and fuels management proposal designed to reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfire, create fire adapted communities, improve forest health, and promote mature and old growth forest characteristics that are resilient to fire, drought, insects, and disease.

We are hosting two public open houses to answer questions and provide guidance for submitting written comments. Public open houses are:

- December 1, 5:30-6:30 pm, Camptonville School Auditorium
- December 7, 5:30-6:30 pm, Downieville Community Hall (327 Main St.) Information about the project and how to comment are available at the Project website: www.fs.usda.gov/project/?project=59693. Comments must be postmarked no later than midnight, January 3, 2023.



Damp Earth Art Show - A Wet, Winning Day!

These past few months, I worked in conjunction with the Sierra County Arts Council to present a "Damp Earth Art Show" in Downieville, Saturday, November 5th. We sent out "A Call For Artists" in October, and waited to see who would submit their artwork. Surprisingly, I received art from 43 different artists, including ten from Camptonville and two from Pike! Other contributing artists were from Downieville (8), Sierra City (5), Goodyear's Bar (1), The Ridge (5), Lake Wildwood (1) the East Side (7), and the Bay Area (3).

The mediums represented were acrylic paintings, watercolors, oils, photographs, poetry, ceramics, fabric, felted and naturally-dyed wool, glass paint, rocks, wood, and an assemblage of natural and man-made found objects. The art was required to reflect the theme of "Damp Earth," including rain, snow, deluges, mists, showers, drops, water, rivers, clouds, storms, blizzards, growth, springtime, etc. Each of the 43 artists interpreted this theme uniquely!

The director of the Arts Council, B.J. Jordan, coordinated all the publicity for the Art Show in the local papers and on the Arts Council website, sierracountyartscouncil.org. She also made a heated building available for the show (The Native Daughters Hall, built circa 1860), and had the display panels put up. The Arts Council also donated \$600 in prize money.

First Place (\$300) went to Mary Hurst for her acrylic painting, "The Great Equalizer." Second Place (\$200) went to Kimi Barnes for her Deer Skull assemblage, "Yuba." Third Place (\$100) went to Bobby Wheeler for his relief carving, "A Helping Hand."

Over 100 people attended the show during the course of the four hours it was open, including many from Camptonville. We got rave reviews the whole day, and lots of requests to hold a show again next year. To top it off it RAINED the whole day of the show! Our wishes came true! The idea behind the Damp Earth Art Show is that with our collective wishes and hopes, along with art, photographs, and poetry, we might help rain to fall. Who knows if it helps, but positive thought never hurts!

An Introduction to Our Local Trees – Conifers

Do you know the trees in your yard? They are a huge part of our environment and they give so much: shade, windbreak, beauty and serenity, lumber to build, and wood to heat our homes. Each species



has its own character and is worth knowing individually. This article, and future *Courier* issues, will include a brief summary of our local trees and shrubs, from a non-technical and humanistic perspective.

Starting with the conifers, the two most common trees in this area are the Douglas Fir and the Ponderosa Pine, which happen to achieve the largest size.

The Douglas Fir is not a true fir. Its genus is Pseudotsuga, which means false Hemlock, and it shares the dark, somber look of a Hemlock. The Douglastree, as it is known by foresters, has one-inch long needles, and always has a lot of dark, needle-clad twigs drooping downward. The cones are about 2 1/2 inches long, and covered with flat, three-pronged, or tri-dentate, scales. The Douglas Fir is the best of the softwoods in heat value as firewood. The Ponderosa Pine is the common local pine, and has yellow-green needles six to nine inches long and cones about four inches long. Most properties have lost a few Ponderosas to the bark beetles, may they rest in peace. Also high on our list of common local tree species is the Incense Cedar, which has flat "sprays" of bright, medium-green needles, and one-inch long cones that flare outward like the petals of a flower. Cedars have very light wood that resists rot, a strong taper from the base to top, and soft, fibery, reddish-brown bark that forms vertical ridges.

These are the three most common conifer, or cone-bearing, trees in our area. For those who have taken their trees for granted and never looked at them, you can go out in your yard and identify them, based on the descriptions given here, and forever be beyond the level of awareness where everything that has needles is a pine.

In the next issue will be a discussion of the less common conifers.





The Meraki award and recognition is intended to provide financial support to women pursuing their dream of business ownership and who demonstrate a passion and commitment to that dream. Women-owned businesses that meet the criteria can apply. One \$5,000 grant award will be provided at the March 4, 2023 Day for Women event at Hard Rock Hotel and Casino Sacramento at Fire Mountain in Wheatland.

"The Day for Women event was inspired by the women who have gone before us, the women who will go after us, and all women in Yuba-Sutter who have dedicated themselves to the betterment of others and the community," says Jackie Sillman,

We know and often speak of systems in the body, such as the circulatory system, digestive system, respiratory system, and so on. We may forget that we also have a "healing system" in our body.



The chi or energy that floats throughout our body has its own intelligence, and it knows how to heal the body/mind. This healing is increased and improved through Qi Gong exercises.

Qi Gong is a beautiful and fun way to move the chi through the acupuncture meridians to bring about better health, increase strength and balance, and boost the immune system, to name a few. In the body, the soft flowing, gentle movements stimulate the acupuncture meridians that serve the organs in the body. These movements bring fresh oxygen and blood to muscles, bones, and joints, and help nourish those areas and release tension and stress in the body. Along with the movements, we use deep breathing techniques to "push" the chi through the meridians. It helps us to improve focus and be in the present.

The movements and deep breathing naturally bring about increased focus and concentration, or meditative movement, to our practice. Qi Gong is a graceful meditation in movement. We quickly find out that this focus or meditation comes automatically, it's never forced, but an innate part of the Qi Gong practice.
