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### Community Center Happenings in March





## The Backstory of the Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department and Auxiliary

In the summer of 1989, Linda Hofstra Haas and I worked together, and Linda was a volunteer with the Camptonville Fire Department. At lunch one day we were talking about the fire department, and she mentioned there were so many things that were needed for the rescue rig. I asked her what kind of things were needed, and she said "backboards." I'm not sure where my next comment came from because I had never done a fundraiser of any kind; but I said "let's do a fundraiser and see if we can make enough money to get a backboard." We went to Ed Verguson, who owned the local bar, to see if he had any ideas. Ed had been involved in some fundraisers with other organizations, so with his guidance and the two of us calling our friends to help, we ventured into scary unknown territory. I remember telling Linda if we made a \$100 profit, I would consider the event a success. We made a profit of \$2,985.65!! This led to a surge of volunteers for the following year, a trend that continues to this day.


We met with then Chief Russ Connelley and asked for a wish list for the fire department. His only wish was an actual building to house the fire truck and rescue rig — which until then were parked outside in an open field. The only building was a small North San Juan-affiliated Moonshine firehall built by Moonshine Road volunteers in 1985 — much too small for our growing department. I laughed and said you are kidding right? Nope! Fast forward MANY years and, under the leadership of Richard Tardiville, and with the contributions of a large group of volunteers dedicating their blood, sweat, and tears, and most of us giving up many weekends, a building was erected at what is the current firehall.

The Auxiliary went on to file for State and Federal status as a non-profit 501(c)(3), making us the first in Camptonville's recent history to achieve that status. The Auxiliary continues strong to this day, with 11 "Pink Ladies" who put on the popular annual Fire Department Picnic fundraiser to raise money for fire department equipment and training. This year will be our 30th year!

This would not have happened if not for the resilience and determination of this community. The amount of volunteerism and dedication it took and takes to support our fire department is absolutely beyond words. It makes me proud to be a part of such a vibrant community! 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



Leaving the house 15 minutes later than I'd planned because my mother called just as I was walking out the door and then arriving upon a bad accident that I might have been in had I left on time. Or forgetting something at home and having to turn back only to find out that I'd left the garage door open. Such was the situation a few months back. The Yuba County Government Center in Marysville, where the Fire Safe Council had been sharing a small office with the Resource Conservation District Board, received word that our office was needed and that we would have to move. At first it was shock. Then it was "where do we go?," pitching ideas and looking at possible spaces that we could get into, even if it was temporary. The idea of having to move all our furniture, equipment, and educational materials to storage or to one of our homes was staggering. And all this was happening during the holidays. And then, as you may often hear someone say, "When God closes a door, He opens a window."

And the "window" presented itself. At first it was a glass half empty and then it became a glass almost full. Our new space came with a bit more room and better proximity to where the paid employees and the volunteers lived and best of all, closer to the Foothill communities that we serve.



#### **Early Bloomers!**

Believe it or not, some local plants are blooming right now, in the beginning of March! Down at Bridgeport, (the South Yuba River State Park) the Pipevine/Dutchman's Pipes flowers are in full bloom. These exotic, pipe shaped, brown and green flowers are one of the earliest blooming, local, native wildflowers. They usually blossom in February. Their camouflage colors makes them somewhat hard to detect, but not for insects. These plants are not carnivorous, but they have an odor that attracts carrion-feeding insects that crawl inside the pipe-shaped flower and pollinate the blossom.

In Camptonville, back in January, the local male willows started making their flower buds or "pussy willows." These buds stayed fuzzy and gray for months, until the weather warmed up. Right now they are in full bloom throughout our area. Willows are dioecious, having separate male and female plants.

Willow flowers are arranged in "catkins." The Britannica online dictionary states, "A catkin is an elongated cluster of single-sex flowers bearing scaly bracts and usually lacking petals." Willows have male and female catkins on separate plants. Each male willow catkin has 270 flowers with two stamens each. Each stamen is loaded with yellow pollen which is wind borne to the female catkins. Each female willow catkin has 142 flowers with one pistil each. The females are greener and less feathery in appearance than the male catkins. Once they bloom, the male and female plants are easy to distinguish from each other.

The local White Alders also have blooming catkins right now. In contrast to willows, alders are monoecious, having both sexes on one plant. The beautiful tassel-like hanging catkins are male catkins that produce pollen. The female part of the alder is a cone, not a catkin. Most people are familiar with the little, dry, brown cones on alder trees. This year's tiny, new, female cones, that will grow into full-sized cones, can be seen just above the male catkin.

Another early bloomer is Manzanita. Right now their flowers are fully opened and fragrant. Pollinators such as bees and hummingbirds are already feasting on their nectar. Manzanita blossoms hold on tightly to their pollen, to keep it from washing away in the winter rains. When a bee buzzes a "middle C" buzz inside a flower, the pollen explodes off the anthers and sticks to the bee's belly! This is called buzz pollination or "sonification." If you hang around any of these blooming plants, you might be surprised at what comes to pollinate them. If you have the time, spend an hour with some flowers!

#### **More Adventures** of Rollin C. Smith

It is time for another adventure with our friend Rollin C. Smith. I wonder what is going on this month? Last we heard, Rollin is settling in nicely in Camptonville, and has become a school teacher. He is struggling to find affordable accommodations, and missing his home and family in Vermont. The weather has been very wet, making the town a working mud pit putting most of Camptonville indoors and unable to work. Let's see how he is holding up...

#### Camptonville March 20th, 1862

Dear Father,

I am getting along with my school better than I thought I should when I commenced. I am gaining the confidence of my patrons and hope I shall get the public school as soon as the new officers are chosen but of course I do not know.

Aside from my school I have a singing class which I enjoy very much, and am being paid a little more than I was before. Have 13 singers at five dollars each for twelve lessons, ladies free of course and they come in and take great interest. The class numbers about thirty persons and others come in so it makes about fifty in all. And a more robust and intelligent class of people seldom get together in one house. We use the Dulcimer but have sent to San Francisco for a set of Jubilees.

I am still with the Postmaster and am seated in his office. He is away this evening and I take care of the business for him. I have taken the Postmasters Oath and also the Oath of Allegiance to the U.S. A Postmaster in this state pays a little more than in Vermont. This pays over \$100 a month.

#### Friday Eve March 21st

The weather is quite warm. Everybody is busy making their gardens and things in general are taking quite a different appearance then what I have seen here before.

#### Monday Eve March 24th

This country or people are very healthy. I know of no one who is sick here and the doctors have nothing to do. Sunday was spent by me in making calls and viewing the surrounding country. Perhaps you will say I had much better be at church, well, perhaps you think right but as it is about 45 miles to the nearest church I know of, think I am excusable in staying at home.

All kinds of provisions are high. Hay is worth \$60 per ton, butter .50 per pound, flour about \$24 per barrel etc etc so you see it costs something for a man to live. Had to pay .25 a piece for washing shirts and other things in proportion. My board and washing costs about \$5 a week. Californians are not behind New York City in dress. Nothing but the best kind of everything is brought here for sale. Flour, for instance, unless it is marked double extra could not be given away.

Several of the boys have written me for advice about coming to this place. I can give them no encouragement at all and would not advise them to try it for although California has more facilities for making money then Vermont yet it also has ten times the number of chances for spending it and a person has more inclination to sow it then at home. The smallest piece of money in use here is a dime and very few of them. With Love, Rollin

That's all for March. I hope everyone will stay tuned next month when Rollin begins his love letters to a girl he met only once briefly back in Vermont. I would like to thank everyone who has expressed their joy in reading my debut article last month. The pleasure is all mine, sharing this man's personal history of this amazing little town.

#### **Homeland Return**

The Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe has a time-limited opportunity to purchase a land parcel encompassing 232 acres (roughly one square kilometer) located on a historic Nisenan Village site called Yulića near Nevada City. This is the Tribe's best opportunity to re-establish a homeland in more than half a century and we need everyone's help to make it happen. A fundraising goal of \$2.4 million includes the purchase price, government-mandated improvements, and an operating endowment. Phase 1 of fundraising is \$1.5 million by April 4, 2024. If the Tribe is unable to raise the funds in this small window of time, the owner must list the property on the open market.

The Tribe was federally recognized by the Executive Order of President Woodrow Wilson in 1913, and voted to organize as a Tribal government under the Indian Reorganization Act (IRA) in 1935. The Tribe resided on a 75-acre Rancheria in Nevada City, California until 1964 when the US illegally sold the land. In violation of federal law, the government treated that land sale as having terminated the Tribe. Since that time, the Tribe has been without a homeland and has suffered the impacts of historical and generational trauma, poverty, and near erasure.

In 2014, the Tribe created a nonprofit – the **California Heritage: Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP).** It's mission is to Preserve, Protect, and Perpetuate Nisenan Culture. Today, the Tribe continues its 45-year battle to restore Federal Recognition.

This unique opportunity will allow the Tribe to return to their land and re-establish:

- Housing for Elders and other Tribal members
- Ceremonial spaces
- Reconnecting traditional practices for today's Tribal members
- A community center for Tribal meetings
- Cultural education and activities for Tribal members and the public
- An interpretive center
- A performance pavilion
- Cultural arts and crafts facilities and classes
- Wellness center, traditional healing spaces
- Environmental protection and education
- Gardens, Indigenous food, traditional medicinal and craft plant cultivation


