Ned Kissig, who moved here from Los Angeles, started the enterprise. He purchased a new navy talkie movie projector outfit and a generator, which he used until PG&E power was brought to town. The hall was remodeled with new doors, ticket booth, and projection room. Ned also took the show on the road to Dobbins and Brownsville, carrying the screen on top of his sedan.

Unfortunately, it all ended in November 1946. All equipment was lost when the lodge burned from a fire started in rented quarters behind the building. Ned became a familiar face in town as he went on to become custodian and bus driver at the school for 27 years, retiring in 1975.

C'ville community celebrates St. Patrick's Day

• "1,2,3 Grow" Parent-Participation Early Childhood

Program: Promotes the healthy development of families with children from birth to five years by providing a free parent-participation early childhood center, parenting workshops, health screenings, and assessments for kindergarten readiness.

- Family Resource Centers (FRCs): We currently run two FRCs that offer connection to resources, free high-speed-internet, work stations, and act as a gateway to the community-building process. One FRC is located on the Camptonville Elementary School site behind the main building, the other FRC is located in Challenge at 10060 Quincy La Porte Road.
- Forest Biomass Business Center: Currently in its development phase, this project will include a community-scale bioenergy plant and other co-located wood processing businesses that will turn sustainably harvested biomass into energy, resulting in improved forest and watershed health, decreased wildfire risk, and increased jobs in our community.
- "Rally Point" and "Foothills Youth Initiative" Youth
 Programs: These youth groups happen twice a month and offer youth 10-18 years old opportunities to socialize with their peers while also learning about various interests, skills, and professions through themed meetings or volunteer presenters. These groups happen in Camptonville (Rally Point) and Challenge (Foothills Youth Initiative).

• Rural Advocacy: CCP has established itself as a major voice/advocate for the rural foothills and regularly attends meetings with various groups and organizations throughout Yuba County and surrounding communities.

The April Letters of Rollin C. Smith

Spring is in the air now, and Rollin is learning how to survive in Camptonville 1862. Last month a homesick Rollin writes to his family faithfully, however he feels they have forgotten him since it took two months for correspondence to travel across the county. With lots of time to miss home and to dwell on his lack of love in his strange new world, he receives a letter from a young woman he met a year prior through a cousin in Connecticut. He begins an intimate correspondence with this young woman named Addie A. Wheaton. Let's see how he courts her from thousands of miles away.

Pittsford, Vt. April 14th, 1862, Dear Rollin,

You wrote that where you are they are mostly
Southerners. I do not like that kind of atmosphere. I would
not stay among them if I could do any better. Save what
money you can earn, keep away from bad places. My
respects to the Postmaster that you live with, hope you will
be good friends. Let politics alone in that place. I see in this
week's paper that Congress has Abolished Slavery in the
District of Columbia. No more this time so good bye my boy.
Father and Mother

Camptonville, Cal. April 16th, 1862, Remembered Friend (To Addie A Wheaton, Madison, Conn.),

I have often thought of you and the many happy hours I spent in your company last summer and often do I sincerely wish I could recall some of them. I have been in this place about nine weeks, teaching a private school and a singing school. Have enjoyed myself as well as can be expected. Closed my school last week and am to take charge of the "Public School" this summer. I am to have \$100 a month, that would look like very large wages in Yankeedom but it is not very large in this country for it costs much more to live that even with large wages a person will have to be very economical.

I am very well pleased with California but not enough so to recommend any one coming here. Camptonville is a small village situated 45 miles N.E. from the City of Marysville and is on the western slope of the Sierra Nevadas — is some larger than Pittford. It is filled up with people from all parts of the globe; there is not a nation, civilized or not that is not represented and the same may be said as regards society, for all grades can here be found, but as a general thing the bad predominates.

There is no church here and since I came has there been any religious service at all but I understand that they sometimes have preaching in the school house. So you can form some kind of an idea of the kind of place I am in. We came here in the "rainy season" but it is clear now and everything promising - fruit trees are in bloom - miners are at work, all business is quite lively and people look happy and contented.

I think the climate of this state is the best feature here. Never saw anything like it. We often have quite heavy snows but it only stays on the ground a day or two.


Friday, April 18th, 1862

This might sound strange to you but it is never-the-less true, I am keeping house. Now you will want to know when and to whom I was married - well I united my fortunes as far as cooking and other housework is concerned with the Postmaster of this place about two months ago, and can say as yet have not regretted the step taken, and enjoy myself much better than I expected. Think by the time I go back East I shall be competent to take whole charge of things, in doors and out, and thus save the unnecessary expense of getting a wife - to say nothing about the trouble of courting.

I went to Marysville last week to be examined for a teachers certificate and had a rather hard journey. It is most of the way through the woods with only here and there a house, and the worst road I ever saw. The stage upset this morning a short distance from here, and several passengers were badly hurt - two are not expected to live.

Addie, I do not know as you will care to write to a person with whom you have had so short an acquaintance but if you can consistently I should be most happy to receive them, and will try to make my next more interesting and instructive. If not commit this to flames as you requested me to do with yours and which I did not do. No indeed, I have read it many times and would be glad to read more from the same source. Yours very respectfully,

Take a Hike on North Table Mountain Ecological Preserve

April is the best time to take a hike on North Table
Mountain! It is the butte that's visible to the north of
Oroville, about an hour and fifteen minute drive from
Camptonville. It is a broad, mainly flat, prairie-like expanse of
flowering grassland, interspersed with tiny creeks, valleys,
and waterfalls. The top of it is capped by an ancient lava
flow. It is one of the few places in California that has never
been impacted by agriculture. Some cattle are allowed to
graze there in the wet months, but apparently cause little
impact on the native wildflowers. North Table Mountain
became an ecological preserve in 1993, when Francis
Carmichael, a local rancher, sold 3,315 acres of it to the State
of California, to be managed by the California Department of
Fish and Game. Now it is open to the public.

When the rains are good the bloom can be unbelievably spectacular. Carpets of yellow, white, purple, magenta, orange, and blue flowers fill the landscape, leaving only the natural deposits of volcanic rocks uncovered! There are over 400 species of wildflowers to be found on Table Mountain, including such wonders as Bitterroot, Meadowfoam, Goldfields, Red Delphiniums, Bird's-eye Gilia, Frying Pans, Kellogg's Monkeyflower, 5ky Lupine, Owl's Clover, Blue Dicks, and Red Maids to name just a few.

There are also a variety of birds to observe including Meadowlarks, Horned Larks, Lark Sparrows, Chipping Sparrows, Savannah Sparrows, and many more.

The hiking is easy, with mild ups and downs. Weekends are super packed with people and cars, leaving weekdays a better choice for serenity. Everyone 16 years or older is required to have a "Lands Pass" that is available on line for a minimal fee at https://wildlife.ca.gov/Regions/2/Wildflower-Viewing.

Go there if you can, before it dries up. It's something you need to experience, especially if you love big skies and wildflowers!







"Be Prepared" - Yuba Watershed Protection & Fire Safe Council

A few weeks ago, we were traveling home via the back roads



out of Oroville and spotted a large billboard that read "Wildfire Season is Coming...8e Prepared." It had a fiery background definitely designed to get one's attention, and it did. I thought about it all the rest of the evening. The Education/Outreach Committee has discussed the idea of designing and installing signs on local roadways to remind the community to "be careful with fire when camping, don't let tow chains drag and spark, and make sure that you have the requisite 100 feet of defensible space around your home."

But by the next day, I admit, it was out of sight, out of mind and so begs the question: do those signs really KEEP our attention focused?

I'm sure for someone seeing the sign for the first $^{\frac{1}{6}}$ time, it registers and maybe, if you frequent that stretch of road, you may even think, "Oh yeah, I

need to get prepared," the next time or two that you drive by it. However my hunch is that, like many other postings, we sadly can become desensitized to the sign and even to the message itself.

So how do we really get folks to take the message of "Be Prepared" seriously?

I have found that despite all the static messages that bombard us, we are still a species that crave and generally respond best to in-person, interactive contact. I see more results (including preparation and proactive behavior) after meeting with homeowners (Wildfire Mitigation Review), or with small groups (Firewise Community planning or Fire Education information), and when I share my story - my experience going through fire.

Yes, Wildfire Season is coming, and as the sign said, "Be Prepared." Visit the website at YubaFireSafe.org to schedule a Wildfire Mitigation review or a neighborhood meeting to launch a Fire Wise Community. You can even arrange a group gathering for fire education. Let's all "Get Prepared" together. Stay fire safe.

A Little Backstory on: Camptonville – a 1997 All-America Cities Finalist!

* * * * *
All-America City

Let me take you back to June 1997 when 10 excited but a bit nervous Camptonville delegates boarded a plane for the All-America City competition in Kansas City, Missouri. As representatives of Camptonville, we were there to compete with 29 other finalists from much larger American cities. Ten winners would go home with the title of "1997 All-America City."

You may wonder how little out-of-the-way Camptonville with only 650 people got selected by the National Civic League to compete? In early 1997, Tonie Hilligoss spearheaded an intricate application process, making a case for why Camptonville should be considered despite not being a city with a formal governance or budget. We were chosen to compete because we exemplified a grassroots approach of building on the strengths of our residents to solve our problems and to create opportunities.

With so many Camptonville folks involved in the process, 10 eventually became our delegates, representing these 1997 organizations: Camptonville School Board (Donna Tate, Tonie Hilligoss, Dick DicKard); Camptonville Volunteer Fire Department (Matt Cooney, Cliff Hilligoss); US Forest Service (Donna Tate); Yuba Community Collaborative for Healthy Children/Camptonville Collaborative (Cathy LeBlanc, Shirley DicKard); Camptonville Outreach Project (Sandy Radoff (Ross)); Students (Ryan Montgomery, age 12, Devan Hilligoss, age 15), and Yuba Watershed Alliance (Tonie Hilligoss).

It wasn't until we got to Kansas City that we felt the full significance of being chosen. The three-day competition felt like a cross between a political convention and a gigantic community fair. We soon realized the huge convention hall was filled, not with competitors, but with compatriots who were just as eager to share what they were doing in their communities. Enthusiasm ran high!

We shared three projects that showcased our spirit. 1)

Building our own Fire Hall through fundraisers and volunteer labor. 2) The "Camptonville Collaborative," (precursor to Camptonville Community Partnership/CCP) for bringing together diverse people, groups, and organizations to work on common goals using Town Hall Meetings and Action Teams.

3) Twilight School, where the school offered its facility for evening programs taught by people in the community who wanted to share their gifts and skills.

Back to Kansas City. The first day we held rehearsals for our 10-minute multi-media presentation to the Jury, explaining why we should be named an All-America City. That evening, delegates handed out gifts from their communities at the Civic Action Fair booths. We gave California wildflower seeds in a muslin bag, hand tied with a poem by Yakshi – handmade by Camptonville folks. The big draw at our booth, however, was the basket of super-long sugar pinecones!

The next day, we took the stage, and everyone had a part in our formal presentation to the jury. We began by stating that Camptonville "is a very small town with very big plans." Nervous? Yes, but glad the hardest part was over. At the Awards Ceremony on the final day, we felt like delegates at a political convention, where the applause was sometimes deafening. (CCP still has our banner at the Resource Center). Everyone cheered us on because we were the smallest there. In fact, Fremont, California adopted us as their little sister community! In the end, it didn't matter that we weren't one of the ten winners. As one of 20 1997 All-America Finalists, we were honored to share with America our small-town approach to community-building and bring the recognition and pride back home.
