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Community Wildfire Protection Plan Meeting – June 13th

By Cathy LeBlanc Please save the date! Have your voice heard! Our local Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) meeting will be held at the Camptonville Community Center on



Thursday, June 13th at 6:30 pm. If you're concerned about reducing local wildfire hazard, improving emergency access, and increasing firefighting capacity, please attend.

The Yuba Watershed Protection & Fire Safe Council (YWP&FSC) was awarded a US Forest Service grant to update the Yuba Foothills CWPP. This Plan is a crucial document for fire protection. It enables YWPFSC and local partners to leverage resources to fund local forest health, resilience, and fire safety efforts. The scheduled community meetings are a great opportunity for local residents and property owners to have input into the Plan.

Deer Creek Resources has been hired to conduct wildfire hazard analyses and collect stakeholder input and other data relevant to updating the CWPP. Community meetings will be held in each of the five Yuba County foothill fire districts to share information and gather community input.

Other local fire districts' meetings are scheduled for earlier in June, with details available from Sandie at YWPFSC: 530-723-3799, or by emailing info@yubafiresafe.org.

Moonshine Road Neighbors Test Emergency Alert System

On May 3rd, 14 folks from the Moonshine Road Firewise group held our second annual clean-up day at our little firehall, then met to talk over what we need to make our area more firesafe. As we continue working on our Firewise USA application, we stressed how important it is to sign up for a free Fire Mitigation Review from the Yuba Watershed Protection & Firesafe Council (YWP&FSC). These can be arranged at yubafiresafe.org (see pg 8).

Some expressed concern about how they would be alerted if there were a local fire or other emergency – especially when phone and cell service is lacking, they're inside, or they're sleeping. Since several of us have loud cast-iron "school bells" and air horns, we decided to test how well

folks could hear them.

We scheduled the test for May 15th, when eight neighbors rang bells or airhorns in sequence from 6 to 6:30 pm, then we all replied with what we could hear. By far, more people heard the air horn blasts. The next time our committee meets, we'll decide on our next steps. While an air horn or bell won't tell you what the problem is, it will at



Hello Camptonville! My name is Lora Miller, and I'm currently training as the new Rural Health Advocate for Camptonville Community Partnership. I'm originally from



Sacramento, though I've lived in a few different states and moved to the foothills about 15 years ago.

Getting settled here with my daughter, she asked me why we moved to California to go "camping"? I found the question funny, but very accurate for the situation at the time. As a child I spent a lot of time and most summers here in the foothills. Many of my favorite memories were made camping with my entire family at Sly Creek while also visiting with family who grew up here in the hills. So, to answer my daughter's question, I immersed her in our natural surroundings, the lakes, wild plant life, animal watching, gardening, livestock, and stargazing.

Being of indigenous lineage, I also found it important to teach her life skills such as fire making, shelter building, safe water practices, food procurement from field to table, and solar power for cooking. Starting at such a young age, she learned she was blessed to have been provided this open space, free of city ailments, along with all the beauty and peace our small towns have to offer.



future generations. I'm excited to have this new opportunity and to advocate for such a unique town and the larger foothills region.



Sierra Buttes/Lakes Basin Art Exhibit and Book Release Reception – June 9th By Laurie Oberholtzer, Director, Sierra County Land Trust

The Sierra County Land Trust, Historical Society, and Arts Council will unveil the results of a year-long joint project of art and writing inspired by the Sierra Buttes and the Lakes Basin on **Sunday June 9th**, **1 pm** in an opening reception at the **North Yuba Hall**, **318 Commercial Street in Downieville**. Many of the writers, artists, and photographers featured in the book and the exhibition will be present at the event. The exhibit will be **open to the public through Sunday, June 16th**, **noon to 3 pm daily**.

The book, *The Sierra Buttes and the Lakes Basin* – *Protecting the Sierra One Place at a Time,* highlights the importance of the Lakes Basin and other high elevation watersheds in mitigating climate change as well as combatting the potential for catastrophic wildfire in our wildland-interfacing communities.

Lead Artist **Katie O'Hara-Kelly** was responsible for the overall layout and artistic decisions. Having been a naturalist with the National Parks and art educator in Sierra County for 27 years, she continues to produce an illustrated nature blog: *northyubanaturalist.blogspot.com*. She says: "I'm in love with the Lakes Basin and feel so privileged to have it in my backyard! It's my home away from home!"

Project coordinator Laurie Oberholtzer added: "We hope the project will assist residents in spreading the story of the importance of protecting this special place and of doing our part to reduce climate change impacts statewide and wildfire impacts locally."

Letters from Camptonville – May, 1862

The temperature is rising, pollen is abundant, and spring is coming to an end. Over the season, Rollin C. Smith was settling into Camptonville very nicely; however, he cannot seem to establish himself in one place. Throughout the six months he's been here, he has lived in a hotel, with a private family, in a full-service boarding house, and most recently with the Postmaster. They are now keeping house together as bachelors. This situation is quite amusing to him as he described uniting his fortunes as far as cooking and other housework. By the time he returns home, he claims he will "save the unnecessary expense of getting a wife." Well, we will just see about that!

*Excerpts from Postmarked Vermont and California, 1862-1864.

Wednesday, May 28, 1862

Dear Father and the others,

If you knew how much a letter is worth and how carefully it is read you would write much oftener then you do. Just think I am alone, no friends near me, and with the exception of Buck not a person I ever saw before.

Thursday, May 29, 1862

I have two propositions to go into business. One is to buy out a Pony Express between here and Brandy City, a distance of eight miles, and have half-interest in the Post Office. The other is to go to San Francisco and go into the meat and vegetable business.

Shall keep this place as long as I can at \$100 per month for it is sure pay and not any risk to run; but it is the worst work I've ever done – not much like Vermont schools to manage. Think nothing of thrashing half a dozen a day and laying it on good at that.

I have given up housekeeping and gone to boarding. The Postmaster got tired of it and so did I, besides he wanted to go into a more thickly settled part of town where his grocery would amount to more. So we board at the Hotel. I still room with him and that saves me two dollars a week. My board costs me a dollar a day. It is the best that I can do and I am satisfied with it for I do not get as dirty as I did when I was cooking.

Everyone here says there is something fascinating about California, and so it seems for they all stay about five times as long as they intended to when they came. The girls all think they are gods as soon as they get into this state, and the men are fools to uphold them in their belief, and that gives them quite a different turn then at home. If Hattie were here she would be wearing long dresses and go to school dressed in silk, and have at least half a dozen beaux. But long dresses do not shield my girls from getting their hair pulled if they need it.

I am going to sing tonight. I am assisting the Welsh people in getting up a concert for July 4th. Some of them are as fine singers as I ever heard and they are by all odds the most respectable people in California.

The dry season has fairly set in. The gardens look fine and the apples are as big as walnuts, but they say they are a month behind hand.

With love to all I bid you an affectionate good night.

Ever lovingly your boy, Rollin

That's all for this month, folks. Let's hope their July 4th concert comes together nicely! Join me next month to find out if Rollin will finally decide what business endeavor is right for him. Thank you for all the support and encouragement; I love sharing this story. Camptonville has been a special place for a long time, and I am privileged to be a part of this beautiful town.

I frequently close my column with the reminder of "go to YubaFireSafe.org and schedule your free Wildfire Mitigation Review," but I don't recall ever detailing the reasons I make that recommendation. Let me outline some of the benefits of the program and why I promote it.

At the request of the homeowner, the **Wildfire Mitigation Review (WMR)** is conducted by a trained volunteer at no cost. The advisor is a "new set of eyes" looking at the home and property from many aspects of fire safety. The advisor will help determine whether emergency personnel can find your home and get to it (signage/access routes...) They will assess the home's strengths and vulnerabilities, looking at specific parts of the home and making recommendations for improvements that will increase its ability to withstand a fire. Lastly, the advisor will look at the defensible space and make recommendations for fuel reduction treatments.

The review is done with the homeowner present, so they are able to discuss possible improvements and options. A packet of information is provided, covering everything from home hardening to evacuation planning.


Along with immediate informational benefits, having the Review also makes the homeowner eligible to apply for a **Defensible Space Cost Share Grant**. This program provides up to 50% reimbursement (maximum of \$2000) of eligible defensible space improvement costs around a residence, including pruning of trees, removal of ladder fuels, weed eating, and more.

We also offer a limited number of no-cost defensible space clearing work awards for low income, disabled, and elderly residents. Go to: yubafiresafe.org/defensible-spaceassistance for eligibility requirements.

A Word From Our Fire Chief

Summer is here and so is fire season! Here's advice from Tedd Sapp, CVFD's Acting Chief, for preparing your home:

*Burn permit time is here. Keep a shovel, bucket, and/or hose nearby. Catch embers before they get away.

*Clean gutters.

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*Create 300' of defensible space around your home. Clear dry brush and debris. Please do your part to help us help you!

*Keep roads and driveways clear and accessible, including clearing low branches. This helps residents escape and gives our trucks the room to get to you and your property.

*Remove firewood from porches and areas near homes.

*Clear grass and weeds from around the propane tank.

*Keep your driveway and access roads safe and accessible for emergency vehicles.

*Clean your grill; check for gas leaks. Burn briquettes all the way down and dispose of properly.

*Keep at least 48 hours of food and water, meds, flashlights, batteries (NOT CANDLES), phone chargers, and portable radio for SPS events and for fire.

*Keep your vehicles fully gassed up.

*Rivers are fast and cold. Melt continues. Be safe! Your friends and family need you.

Update On Dam Safety

Yuba Water Chief Dam Safety Engineer Tim Truong outlined to the board several maintenance and dam safety projects planned for the years ahead. Yuba Water owns and operates New Bullards Bar, Log Cabin, and Our House dams as part of the Yuba River Development Project, a multipurpose flood risk reduction, water supply, hydroelectric power generation, fish habitat, and recreation project on the Yuba River.

Yuba Water's dams undergo comprehensive external reviews by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the Division of Safety of Dams. In their most recent listing of California's major dams, the state rated all of Yuba Water dams as "satisfactory," the highest rating they issue.

Construction of Yuba Water Agency's new Power Systems facilities on Marysville Road in Oregon House is on schedule, with completion expected later next year. Yuba Water broke ground on the two-year project at 8897 Marysville Road last summer. The new property spans 16 acres and includes a 14,000-square-foot administration building, a warehouse and mechanics shop, 150,000-gallon fire suppression water tank, parking, and more. A school bus stop on Marysville Road adjacent to the property will be updated to ensure families can safely pick up and drop off students.

What's New at Emerald Cove Marina By Shirley DicKard

Lured by the exceptionally high water level at Bullards Bar Reservoir and the huge, new floating building at Emerald Cove Marina, I decided to pay a visit and find out what's new. "The reservoir is at 97% of capacity," Chris, the Rental Manager, told me. And contrary to rumor, the new building is not a restaurant (darn!), but the Marina's new office and store. The current structure is about 50 years old, with oldstyle styrofoam floats (exposed to the water)...

At 3,200 square feet, the new building will provide muchappreciated extra space for staff and storage, and will allow people to check in out of the sun, wind, and rain. The new structure is temporarily moored near the Marina's fleet of nine large rental houseboats and the 80 private houseboats. Later this fall it will be relocated to its permanent position, replacing the current office and store. Watch for a grand opening for the 2025 season.



Yuba Water heard an update on how its financial support of First 5 Yuba County's "Growing Up Wild" program is helping imbue a deeper understanding of the outdoors among Yuba County youth. The free program trains local early educators and caregivers to teach children ages 3-7 about the environment and natural resources with a goal of fostering a love and appreciation for the outdoors. Using a nearly \$19,000 grant from Yuba Water, the Growing Up Wild program has already trained 44 early education providers, potentially reaching hundreds of children.

YES Charter High School In Oregon House

Yuba Environmental Science (YES) Charter Academy, a free public school in Oregon House, will add high school grades starting with 9th grade in the fall of 2024. Students graduating from 8th grade and their families are invited to tour the school and register for the 2024-25 school year.

YES High School will prepare students for college and career. Its program includes college preparation courses as well as three career technical education (CTE) pathways. These were chosen to prepare students to prosper in the local and regional economy. They are Forestry and Natural Resources, Entrepreneurship, and Design, Visual, and Media Arts. By graduation, students will have developed a plan for their college and career and will have completed an internship in the industry of their choice.

YES has a Farm to School program that includes a garden, greenhouse, henhouse, orchard, and berry vines. School meals are scratch cooked in the school kitchen using local and school grown produce.

The proximity of the school to local forests, lakes, and rivers gives access to outdoor sports and extracurricular activities such as mountain biking, kayaking, and disc golf. The small size of the school allows for individualized academic attention.


