

I hope you're staying cool and hydrated on these hot summer days.


Thankfully, our foothill area is blessed with rivers, lakes, and streams. Water is life-giving and never so much as during these dry months.

Ten of us gathered at Saturday Coffee on June 8th to exchange ideas on how to make our Community Center look nice and function as a park and recreation area for children, families, and adults. Everything needs to be easy to maintain, safe to use, and kept natural looking.

Here are suggestions from the group:

- Deer proof/drought tolerant landscaping
- More shade •
- A simple children's play area
- Spaces for games (like volleyball/pickle ball/croquette/bocce ball)
- Increased parking area
- Picnic tables
- A BBQ area
- A flat stage area on the uphill side in the back
- Lighting and water faucets for the back area (including a water mister)
- Portable fire pit
- A disc golf basket
- A water play area with a sprinkler/shower

The next steps are: get back together to develop a plan with prioritized goals; clear out the blackberries on the downhill side of the building to see how much space is available; and engage a landscape architect to begin a discussion on how to best accomplish our goals.

Community Wildfire Protection Plan Follow-up

Hello Camptonville! Now that we have concluded the initial Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) meetings, we want to say thank you for your time and attendance in helping to keep our communities safe during this, and future, wildfire seasons.

Camptonville Community Partnership worked with the Yuba Watershed Protection and Fire Safe Council (YWP&FSC) to coordinate, schedule and set up CWPP meetings in five fire districts here in the rural foothills. Each meeting was beneficial, providing fire insight to our small rural communities, as well as providing knowledge and resources for fire prevention of our own properties. Deer Creek Resources shared valuable information on how to keep fire from getting near our homes, then provided mapping sessions within each district's population to gather beneficial information for each of our communities. YWP&FSC provided information on various resources and free services such as the Residential Chipping Program, Defensible Space Cost Share Program, and Defensible Space Assistance Program, just to name a few. If you were unable to attend this meeting or have additional feedback to provide regarding your wildfire concerns and priorities for our community, please take the time to fill out YWP&FSC's survey at the following link: https://arcg.is/bavHb0. We want to keep our communities updated for future meetings regarding the data gathered by Deer Creek Resources and how it will be utilized, so please keep an eye out for future updates later in the year.

Thank you to Deer Creek Resources for all of the information provided and for collecting data regarding what our communities see as valuable. And a final thank you to our communities for showing up and being present to provide such insight.

Let's continue to practice safe, responsible habits during this and every fire season. Together, we can and will continue to build a fire-wise community.


Thank you for such a fun year and we look forward to seeing you all in July and the next school year! Happy summer to everyone!

The theme for this month's *Camptonville Courier* is *Water*. I thought, how fitting. Doesn't the idea of jumping in the cool, clear water sound great?



I agree, but I am here to remind you that the water is cold and fast! I know it is not sexy, but, wear a lifejacket, you will look great in it! Have your kids wear lifejackets. The water is faster and colder than you think it is.

And do not – no matter how badly you want to – do not build a fire at your "campsite" – fire season is already here, and your cute little "campfire" can get out of control faster than you think. A puff of wind can pick up embers and catch nearby dry grass, and before you know it, it is too big to put out on your own.

That reminds me, if you see smoke, call it in!

And, as always, we need volunteers! We are all volunteers! Our roster has 12 volunteer firefighters listed, but only about five at a time can make it to calls. We need you!

And residents and neighbors, we need your help. Help us help you. Make sure your driveways and roads are trimmed back so our firetrucks can reach you. Keep your land as cleared as possible. Take care of the dried leaves and grass. If you have burn piles, don't let them just sit and get dry. Put a hose on every spigot. Make sure you have 100 feet of defensible space around your home. Thanks, and stay fire safe!

Camptonville History Resource Now Online By Jesse Golden

Visit camptonville.com to click a "History" link and access the book, *The History of Camptonville*, created by teachers and students at the Camptonville Union School in 1966. Thanks to the Camptonville Historical Society for making a copy available for scanning!

The 164-page book includes illustrations by students and teacher Rachel Bachrach. The introduction details the process of creating the book, and concludes, *Whatever are the blessings of modern technology, one thing that is all-toooften lost, in those cases where it once existed, is a sense of social continuity, tradition,...history. It seems to us that the production of such books as this one, can produce monuments to the pioneering history of the American people that no technology, no megalopolis, can totally obliterate.*

The chapter titles are intriguing, though in need of updating: *The Land Before the White People; The Indians; White Settlement; Later History of Camptonville; Camptonville* – *Present and Future; Families.* There's also a mining chronology, a bibliography, a topical index, and an index of names.

The online copy is readable, but not yet in a textsearchable format, and is posted in several sections. If anyone would like to volunteer to do a little software work, it would be great to have the sections combined into a single, searchable book – contact me c/ocvillecourier@gmail.com to discuss.

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Early Childhood Explorations with 1,2,3 Grow By Eugene Salganik, CCP

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

Rollin Smith's Letters from Camptonville, 1862

It is now July 1862 in Camptonville. The town anxiously anticipates the celebration of the 86th Anniversary of American Independence. Festivities will include a



concert of local choirs, starring our very own Rollin Smith leading The Cambrian Choir of Camptonville. Rollin has put in much practice time with his singers and hopefully, all goes well. I wonder how many will attend, and where the event was held; unfortunately, we get no details in that regard. We do know that controversy will be apparent considering the political division throughout the community and the country at large. Strong political ideals mixing could be a recipe for trouble! Come let us find out.

Camptonville, July 2, 1862

My dear mother, I have often written to father directing my message to all of course and it occurred to me this morning that perhaps my mother would be glad to hear from her boy. I am having a vacation this week to let the girls prepare for the Fourth but am not idle by that means for I am now in company with the Postmaster here and we have discharged the clerk and I stay in the office. I have two weeks more to teach and that will close my career in that profession.

I do not know but father will be disappointed in not getting any money from me this summer but I can not very well send him any for I want to use it all and more too. I am to pay eight Hundred dollars for my interest in this concern — pay two hundred down and run my face for the rest.

Our business consists of the post office and a stock of stationery and Yankee notions &c worth about \$500 and a Pony Express Route to the adjourning towns that have no post office. Besides we are agents for 120 daily papers, 50 weekly, and any quantity of other reading matter, so you will see that we have something to do. My part of the work is to stay in the office and tend to both mail and express, and if you should be in want of anything in our line just call on "Bearse and Smith" and I shall be pleased to wait on you.

The good people of this town are making great preparations for the Fourth. I am going to sing at the concert as you will see by the papers which I sent father a short time ago. And as I do not dance shall not go to the ball in the eve.

Now please write me even if it is a short one and I shall prize it I assure you. Nothing more—love to all. Your affectionate son, Rollin

Camptonville, August 1st, 1862

My dear father, I have been waiting some time to hear from home but no Eastern letters have come to this place yet although there are fifteen mails due. My school closed the 18th of July and if I ever was glad to get out of a school it was then for it was anything but pleasant to work when there was so much dissatisfaction manifested, and so many were ready to make stock of it. The most fault that was found was by the Georgians who were hopping mad because I sung Patriotic songs. And when I held the flag and helped sing The Star Spangled Banner on the Fourth of July they were mad enough. I was quite sick when I was in Marysville, think it strange that I must have such a time when I get out of the mountains. I have been to Marysville five times and have been sick each time. Can lay it to nothing else then the change of water and sudden change in climate. Yesterday was the warmest day we have had yet, and I hope we shall not have any more like it. The thermometer stood at 102^ in the shade for about six hours. I do not know why

this country is so healthy for it is so very dry and hot in the day, and cool at night.

Perhaps you will think I have a great many enemies in my school but such is not the case. Last week an old Dutchman who had a niece in my school called to pay his school tax and said he heard I had assisted her a good deal out of school hours, and wanted to know what he should pay me for it. I told him not anything, but he said he was much pleased with her progress and would make me a present, which he did, consisting of a twenty, and two five dollar gold pieces. Now that doesn't look very bad, does it?

By the way, I got some photographs taken when I was in Marysville. I do not think they are good ones but they are the best I could do. I had on a thick coat and vest (to make it look better) and the thermometer in the room stood at 104[^]. From your loving son and brother, Rollin

Patricia, also known as Oshala, also loved being a member of the Red Cedar Circle, a local prayer group who meet, sing, and pray together and study Native American Culture.


Summer Fun at the SJR Family Resource Center!


