



Chair's Summary 12th System Council meeting

Virtual meeting, 3-4 March 2021

Dear System Council Members, Active Observers, and invited guests,

It is highly gratifying to see that the support for CGIAR reform shown by the Council when we last met in person in Chengdu in 2019 has not waned during 2020 - if anything it has grown stronger. By unanimously endorsing a new Integrated Operational Structure for One CGIAR at our 12th meeting, Funders and Country constituencies drove one more vital step in the transition to One CGIAR. This demonstrates with actions our unflinching resolve to continue working towards becoming a more relevant and stronger solution provider for our funders, partners and stakeholders.

Setting the scene for our deliberations, the Council reflected on the global conversations of our time, in particular the increasing profile of the interlinked challenges of climate change, biodiversity loss and food security. Far from being overshadowed by the continuing COVID-19 pandemic, these themes are right at the heart of conversations at major global events and in governments — and increasingly in mainstream media. It was observed that while the pandemic has unfortunately increased poverty and hardship for many, agriculture is also starting to be recognized for its 'shock-absorber' role and the continued part it can play as part of the solution towards resilient food systems and building forward better.

Getting the 'form' to deliver on the 'function'

What CGIAR will offer through the November 2020 approved 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy is at the nexus of the global challenges of climate change, biodiversity loss and food security, with particular capacity and opportunities to contribute at the ever-important policy level.

What we saw in this meeting was how a transformative integrated operational structure for CGIAR will best:

- Facilitate collaboration within CGIAR and with its global, regional and local partners, broadening the diversity of people, skills and ideas required to deliver on the opportunities set out in the 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy;
- Leverage and strengthen CGIAR's 50 years of rich history and the strong brands and expertise of its Centers and Alliances, whose campuses will be the 'nerve centers' of CGIAR's global footprint;
- Rise to the shared ambition set out in Chengdu as now defined in the 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy; and
- Meet the required urgency to match that of the Sustainable Development Goals.

Council members recognized the breadth of steps taken to consult, engage and collaborate across CGIAR to develop a compelling and coherent Integrated Operational Structure. Particularly, thanks were expressed to Center/Alliance Directors General for their commitment and insights through the Design Working Groups process, with the expertise of many of CGIAR's senior staff also heavily involved.

With valuable inputs shared by Council members to enhance the journey to the agreed destination, and reflections on lessons learned from previous change experiences, it was highlighted that wide-reaching communication will be a cornerstone of an effective transition. The Executive Management Team ('EMT') and the System Board resolved to expand and focus efforts in this regard, including through more communication with CGIAR staff and deepened dialogue with host and partner country representatives, drawing on Council peers to support these conversations.

We acknowledged that there remain some questions to be answered on detailed elements, but that implementation of the structure will provide appropriate authority and accountability to empower its leaders to explore these questions and take the required decisions. To that end, the EMT was encouraged to move forward expeditiously with senior leadership appointments in the One CGIAR structure, in particular the key science leadership roles, to take forward priority work on shaping the One CGIAR initiatives to commence in 2022.

Along with my Council colleagues I expressed confidence that the EMT, under the oversight of the CGIAR System Board, can carry forward the momentum in its implementation, empowered by the backing of CGIAR's Funders and regional partners.

We were aligned on the importance of CGIAR's overarching governance, risk and strategy documents being reflective of One CGIAR unified governance and the 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy - building on the important decisions by the CGIAR System Board and Center and Alliance Boards in 2020 – and we supported a timetable to adjust these as key pillars of good governance and transparency. The Council reaffirmed its sincere hope that Centers who have not yet taken decisions towards One CGIAR will continue to consider this, and encouraged continued dialogue in this regard, stressing that the door remains open.

Continued focus on the 'function' remains a priority

The Council was encouraged by an update from the EMT on the process to develop CGIAR's 2022-2024 Investment Plan and Initiatives since the formation of the Investment Advisory Groups earlier this year. We recognized the importance of the credible and comprehensive process that is underway and encouraged focused priority-setting, anchored in the needs of those CGIAR serves, in areas where transformative change can truly be effected. A clear message was heard on the importance of the next milestone anticipated in June 2021 of a strong, focused prospectus of initiatives - complemented by compelling evidence of the impact of investments to date – as essential tools to support Funders' dialogues in their own constituencies on their investments in CGIAR.

Strong messages of support were also heard in response to a 'Funder Champions Group' call to colleagues to join a shared ambition of:

- 100% participation from System Council members in supporting CGIAR research and innovation;
- Prioritization of pooled funding mechanisms in support of CGIAR research initiatives;
- Striving for \$1+ billion in pooled funding for 2022-2024 period;
- Pledging early, where possible, to build momentum for investments; and
- Helping position CGIAR, and investment in Food Systems Research and Innovation in key political processes

Two 'Spotlight Sessions' during the meeting also provided rich information and insight on how CGIAR is continuing its important work throughout the transition through:

- Gaining traction globally by building on the growing recognition of the role of innovation, research, science/policy, and food system transformation, in delivering targeted economic growth. The communications effort around CGIAR's 50th anniversary, focusing on 50 innovations that have changed the world is being complemented by increased political visibility with high-profile leaders speaking about CGIAR and the new 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy, with the continuing raising of CGIAR's profile recognized and applauded by Council members.
- Making inputs to 'game-changing solutions' showcased through a number of
 examples of the innovations delivered by CGIAR in its rich 50-year history, and which
 align with the impact areas of the 2030 Research and Innovation Strategy. Our
 insightful discussions on CGIAR's strategic engagement in UNFSS and other global fora
 emphasized the importance of ensuring that agri-food systems transformation is wellembedded in climate change dialogues, and that CGIAR's expertise in policy advice is
 amplified to contribute most effectively.

Colleagues, this meeting was another pivotal moment on the journey we set out on in Chengdu. The ongoing efforts of members and the unanimous support expressed by the Council for this most recent milestone is essential to continuing that journey with purpose and momentum. A collection of those voices of support will be shared with all in the spirit of open communication.

Finally, I thank the EMT and the System Board for their leadership and the Council members for your steadfastness in support – focusing on the big picture but holding us to account to get the details right at the same time. We are proud to stand on the shoulders of the dedicated work that our scientists have delivered over the years. Now is the time build on that work in a meaningful and professional way and rise to the challenges of our time.

DECISIONS

SC/M12/DP1: Meeting Co-Chair

The System Council <u>appointed</u> Adriana Ivette Herrera Moreno, voting member from Mexico as the non-voting Co-Chair for the meeting, pursuant to Article 5.2 of the CGIAR System Framework.

SC/M12/DP2: Adoption of the Agenda

The System Council adopted the Agenda issued on 18 February 2021 (document SC12-01).

SC/M12/DP3: An Integrated Operational Structure for One CGIAR

The System Council <u>endorsed</u> the operational structure, thus providing confirmation to CGIAR's board members, staff and partners that the System Council membership is fully supportive of the intended institutional arrangements, as CGIAR moves to organize itself in a more powerful and interconnected manner, to deliver on the new 2030 CGIAR Research and Innovation Strategy (SRG Recommendations 1 and 4), supported by increased financial investments in CGIAR (SRG Recommendation 5).

<u>SC/M12/DP4</u>: Embedding One CGIAR in system-wide key frameworks and governing instruments

The System Council <u>endorsed</u> the timetable and approach to updating key frameworks and governing documents to delivery alignment with One CGIAR concepts, as set out in meeting document SC12-03.

SC/M12/DP5: System Council Reconciliation

The System Council <u>agreed</u> to revisit the reconciliation of the System Council in 2022, when the elements of One CGIAR can be used as an important basis for defining appropriate methods and processes for the reconciliation of Funder and other seats of the System Council.

ACTIONS

SC/M12/AP1: Implementation of the Integrated Operational Structure for One CGIAR

The System Council <u>requested</u> that the Executive Management Team incorporate the rich inputs provided on implementation of the operational structure into detailed transition planning, to be overseen by the System Board.
