# Membership of CGIAR's Standing Panel on Impact Assessment (SPIA)

# Purpose

This document presents the background, decision request and rationale related to membership of SPIA as outlined in the document following this cover note, namely a nomination by the SPIA Chair to extend the membership of Dr. Sujata Visaria and Dr. Monica Biradavolu for an additional three-year term, and to appoint Dr. Jennifer Burney, Dr. Susan Godlonton and Dr. Jenny Aker as new SPIA members for an initial three-year term, all with effect from 1 July 2024.

The proposal for the new members has been consulted with and supported by the System Council's Standing Committee on Strategic Impact, Monitoring and Evaluation (SIMEC) at its 32<sup>nd</sup> meeting.

# Action Requested

The System Council is therefore requested to consider and if thought appropriate to approve the:

- Extension of **Dr. Sujata Visaria as SPIA Member** for an additional three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024;
- Extension of **Dr. Monica Biradavolu as SPIA Member** for an additional three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024;
- Appointment of Dr. Jennifer Burney as SPIA Member for an initial three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024;
- <u>Appointment</u> of **Dr. Susan Godlonton as SPIA Member** for an initial three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024;
- <u>Appointment</u> of **Dr. Jenny Aker as SPIA Member** for an initial three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024.

#### **SPIA Chair nomination for SPIA Members**

# **Background**

- The CGIAR System Council approved the Terms of Reference (TOR) of CGIAR's Standing Panel on Impact Assessment (SPIA) with effect from 12 May 2023 (Decision Ref: SC/M18/DP3). <sup>1</sup>
- 2. As set out in Section 4.1 of the SPIA TORs, "SPIA will consist of a core of at least 6 members, one of whom serves as SPIA Chair. SPIA membership may be grown as needed to lead on the delivery of different components of the approved workplan ..."
- 3. At the 18th System Council meeting held on 11 and 12 May 2023, the System Council approved Scenario 1 of the new operational model, workplan, and multi-year budget (2023-2030)<sup>2</sup> of SPIA, pursuant to paragraph 7.6 of the SPIA TOR. The approved budget ceiling includes honorarium payments for up to 13 SPIA members, including the Chair. This approved expansion in SPIA members is necessitated by the ambitious new workplan, especially the scaled country studies program. With a more decentralized operational model, SPIA members will to a greater degree than in the past have defined and delegated responsibilities related to components of the SPIA workplan.
- 4. According to Section 4.7 of the SPIA TORs, "The members of SPIA will be identified by the SPIA Chair based on role specification, criteria and key competencies desired for SPIA members, as approved by the System Council, with those persons identified by the SPIA Chair, in consultation with SIMEC, being confirmed by the System Council."
- 5. According to Section 4.3 of the SPIA TORs, "SPIA members, including the Chair, will serve an initial three years, with the possibility of renewal up to three additional years without further extension. To the extent possible, membership terms will be staggered to ensure a gradual refreshing of members".
- 6. SPIA currently has six members as shown in the table in Section 14 below. Three members, Sujata Visaria, Monica Biradavolu and Kelsey Jack will end their current term on 30 June 2024. Dr Kelsey Jack has renounced renewing her term.
- 7. In line with the above procedures, Sujata Visaria and Monica Biradavolu were presented to System Council as SPIA members on 26 May 2021 and were approved on 10 June 2021 (decision SC/M13/DP5<sup>3</sup>), for a three-year term commencing on 1 July 2021 and ending on 30 June 2024. SPIA now wishes to extend their membership for an additional three-year term until 30 June 2027.

- 8. In view of the above approvals and procedures, and in view of the new demands that have been made to SPIA by System Council with the approval of Scenario 1 of the new operational model namely to:
  - a. expand the number of countries where the reach of CGIAR-related innovations and policy influences is systematized, quantified and tracked over time
  - b. generate new causal evidence of impact on CGIAR's five impact areas
  - c. continue to support CGIAR in improving the generation and use of rigorous impact evidence),

SPIA aims to have nine or ten members by end of 2024. Towards this aim, SPIA now wishes to appoint three new members to lead part of the SPIA program of work as a first step toward this target panel size. Subsequently, SPIA intends to nominate additional members in Q3 or Q4 2024 to reach the full target end-of-year size.

The key criteria considered for selection of the new candidates include:

- a. track record in capacity building for impact assessment;
- b. proven ability to work with and engage social and biophysical scientists to identify opportunities for studying CGIAR impacts and design strong studies;
- c. excellent publication record, demonstrating methodological innovation and rigor in establishing impact of CGIAR innovations;
- d. a broad understanding of the work of CGIAR and the challenges involved both in establishing impacts of AR4D and in the use of such impact evidence for policy making.
- 9. Following consultation with SIMEC on the proposed new membership during a meeting on 13 March 2024, the SPIA Chair presents the candidacies for approval by System Council pursuant to Article 4.7 of the SPIA TOR.

# **Decision requested**

- 10. On the recommendation of the SPIA Chair, the System Council is requested to confirm that the following persons be appointed as SPIA members for an additional three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024, without further extension:
  - a. Sujata Visaria
  - b. Monica Biradavolu
- 11. On the recommendation of the SPIA Chair, the System Council is requested to confirm that the following persons be appointed as SPIA members for a three-year term with effect from 1 July 2024, with the possibility of renewal up to three additional years without further extension:
  - a. Jennifer Burney
  - b. Susan Godlonton
  - c. Jenny Aker



12. Diversity among the Panel is an important element for SPIA in selecting new members. It is key to maintain substantive diversity of topical and methodological expertise so that SPIA can effectively carry out its broad workplan. In addition, SPIA also considers the origin, gender and current affiliation of its members.

<u>Sujata Visaria</u> contributes across all SPIA objectives and helps steward the continuation of the multi-year workplan activities, assuring optimal returns to investment made. Her deep experience in Asia and emerging markets, and her strong theoretically grounded and empirically rigorous research on value chains, financial access and marketing arrangements, help guide the orientation of the SPIA country work in Asia. Dr. Visaria furthermore contributes significantly to the design and oversight of the causal impact studies.

Monica Biradavolu's qualitative methods skills, training in sociology and connections to experts in mixed (qualitative-quantitative) methods help expand SPIA's capacity to provide guidance to Initiative Design Teams. Dr. Biradavolu brings a particular expertise on gender, and social inclusion more broadly. As part of a pluri-disciplinary team, she has done pathbreaking work on measurement innovations around women's agency, combining qualitative methods with machine learning approaches to design new rigorous and scalable measures. Dr. Biradavolu's competencies complement the contributions and expertise of the other SPIA members.

<u>Jennifer Burney</u> would bring a new disciplinary background and desired skillset to SPIA as she holds a PhD in Physics and has established expertise in remote sensing and earth observation applied to agricultural topics. She would lead this measurement and methodological component of the SPIA agenda.

<u>Susan Godlonton</u> would be a member from the Global South, as she is a national of South Africa. She has maintained very close institutional connections with collaborators and organizations in the Sub-Saharan Africa region, including within the CGIAR. Her extensive work experience in the domain of the economics of development, health and labor markets and unique professional networks throughout Africa would enable her to make immediate and valuable contributions to SPIA and align with CGIAR poverty and livelihoods impact area.

Jenny Aker would bring strong impact assessment expertise, including at the interface of information and communication technologies (ICTs) and agriculture. She has specific interest in working with the SPIA use of evidence team. Her collaborations with CGIAR researchers, NGOs and funders give her a broad network that will serve SPIA well. Her know-how on the application of ICTs in impact assessment and evidence communication dovetails with CGIAR's digital and data transformation and the SPIA learning studies on digital innovation.



- 13. Appendix 1 sets out further information on the part of the SPIA work program that would be led by the extended and the new members and the rationale for the selection.
- 14. As approved, SPIA would have a broad thematic and geographic composition, as shown in the table below (extended members are shown in green, and new members are added in red at the end of the table).

The Panel composition as approved would be underrepresented by Panel members from the Global South as well as male Panel members.

As a byproduct of the call for expressions of interest for the SPIA country studies, we have identified several valid new candidates from the Global South as potential Panel members. This pool includes four male candidates: a nutritionist from a university in East Africa, an East African economist based at a university in Scandinavia, a South Asian economist based at a university in Australia and an economist from a university in West Africa. While we are eager to pursue nominations of Panel members drawn from this qualified pool, we must wait until the country subcontracts have been decided before putting forward new nominations from within this group in Q3 or Q4 2024, to avoid any potential conflict of interest.

# Candidates nominated by SPIA Chair for extended membership

<u>Sujata Visaria</u> - Reader of Finance at Bayes Business School, City, University of London, UK and Associate Professor of Economics, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology

Sujata Visaria contributes across all SPIA objectives and helps steward the continuation of the multi-year workplan activities, assuring optimal returns to investment made. Her base and deep experience in Asia and emerging markets, and her strong theoretically grounded and empirically rigorous research on value chains, financial access and marketing arrangements, help guide the orientation of the SPIA country work in Asia. Dr. Visaria furthermore contributes significantly to the design and oversight of the causal impact studies.

Dr. Visaria has a strong publication record (including multi-disciplinary journals) and brings insights regarding incentives by different actors in value chains, credit markets, marketing arrangements, and policymaking. She combines these insights with rigorous empirical methods to test optimal designs for contracting arrangements and market structure. Her research spans work in (her native) India and various emerging markets in South East Asia. Before moving to HKUST, Dr. Visaria was an Assistant Professor of Economics at Boston University and a Visiting Assistant Professor at the Ford School of Public Policy and Ross School of Business, University of Michigan. She is a Research affiliate at the Bureau of Research and Economic Analysis of Development (BREAD) and at the Innovation for Poverty Action (IPA) in the small and medium enterprises initiative.

Dr. Visaria received her MA from the Delhi School of Economics and completed her PhD in Economics at Columbia University.

# Monica Biradavolu – CEO of Qualanalytics, USA and India

Monica Biradavolu is the CEO of Qualanalytics and a well-recognized mixed-methods impact assessment expert. Dr. Biradavolu expands SPIA's capacity to respond to new asks resulting from the OneCGIAR reform, and in line with the overall SPIA mandate. Her qualitative methods skills, training in sociology and connections to experts in qualitative-quantitative methods help expand SPIA's capacity to provide guidance to Initiative Design Teams. Accounting for the broad range of research areas and topics covered by the research initiatives, this necessarily implies using a variety of methods to provide rigorous evidence of impacts for testing key assumptions underlying theories-of-change, stage-gating, learning and accountability purposes. Dr. Biradavolu brings a particular expertise on gender, and social inclusion more broadly. As part of a pluri-disciplinary team, she has done pathbreaking work on measurement innovations around women's agency, combining qualitative methods with machine learning approaches to design new rigorous and scalable measures. Dr. Biradavolu's competencies complement the contributions and expertise of the other SPIA members.

Dr. Biradavolu has published widely in top health, nutrition, sociology and multidisciplinary journals, plus a book with a sociological study of entrepreneurs and innovators. She has done impact assessment research using both qualitative and mixed-methods approaches in Asia,



the Middle East and Sub-Saharan Africa. She is also well recognized for her qualitative methods trainings. Prior to her current position, she was an Assistant Research Professor in the Department of Sociology and Assistant Director of the Center on Health, Risk & Society at the American University. She was also a Research Scholar at the Global Health Institute at Duke University and a postdoctoral associate at the Center for Interdisciplinary Research on AIDS at Yale University.

Dr. Biradavolu completed her BA in Sociology at the University of Delhi, India and received her MA and PhD in Sociology from Duke University, US.

# Jennifer Burney – Professor, School of Global Policy and Strategy, UC San Diego, USA

With a background in physics, Jennifer Burney is a recognized expert in remote sensing and earth observation. As a member of SPIA, she will primarily be responsible for implementing the remote sensing and earth observation elements of SPIA's TORs and provide essential expertise in this domain as well as familiarity with broader impact assessment methods.

Prof. Burney is strong in all four areas. She holds a PhD in Physics from Stanford University and has published extensively on the relationship between climate change and food security, often with a focus on the agricultural sector.

# Susan Godlonton - Associate Professor, Williams College, USA

As a national of South Africa, Susan Godlonton has significant research experience in Sub-Saharan Africa. As a member of SPIA, she will work closely with the Chair on the implementation of SPIA's TORs, including in ways that leverage her unique professional networks that span the Global North and South.

Prof. Godlonton is strong in all four areas. She holds a PhD in Economics from the University of Michigan and has published extensively on the economics of development in Africa, including on topics of health, labor and agriculture. She previously worked at IFPRI.

# <u>Jenny Aker – Professor of Development Economics, Tufts University, USA and Senior Researcher, Wageningen University, The Netherlands</u>

As a member, Jenny Aker will work closely with the SPIA Chair on the implementation of SPIA's TORs with a specific focus on use of evidence. Jenny has specifically expressed interest in helping SPIA to translate rigorous evidence of reach and impact for use in decision making. She has worked closely with CGIAR centers and researchers and other CGIAR stakeholders and funders. She is highly qualified to lead SPIA's efforts to promote the use of evidence as part of its core mandate.



Prof. Aker is strong in all four areas. She holds a PhD in Agricultural and Resource Economics from the University of California, Berkeley and has published extensively on the economics of agricultural development in Africa, including the impacts of ICTs on individuals, households and markets.

In July 2024, Prof. Aker will transition from Tufts to Cornell University, but she will retain her affiliation with Wageningen University in the Netherlands.
