The First Lesson

read by The Revd Canon Irving Richards, Priest in Charge of St Stephen, North Evington, Leicester

The first reading is written in the prophecy of Ezekiel, chapter thirty-six, beginning to read at the twenty-second verse.

Therefore say to the house of Israel, Thus says the Lord GOD: It is not for your sake, O house of Israel, that I am about to act. but for the sake of my holy name, which you have profaned among the nations to which you came. I will sanctify my great name, which has been profaned among the nations, and which you have profaned among them; and the nations shall know that I am the LORD, says the Lord GOD, when through you I display my holiness before their eyes. I will take you from the nations, and gather you from all the countries, and bring you into your own land. I will sprinkle clean water upon you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will

put my spirit within you, and make you follow my statutes and be careful to observe my ordinances. Then you shall live in the land that I gave to your ancestors; and you shall be my people, and I will be your God.

Thus says the Lord GOD: On the day that I cleanse you from all your iniquities, I will cause the towns to be inhabited, and the waste places shall be rebuilt. The land that was desolate shall be tilled, instead of being the desolation that it was in the sight of all who passed by. And they will say, 'This land that was desolate has become like the garden of Eden; and the waste and desolate and ruined towns are now inhabited and fortified.' Then the nations that are left all around you shall know that I, the LORD, have rebuilt the ruined places, and replanted that which was desolate; I, the LORD, have spoken, and I will do it.

The Second Lesson

read by Jen Stratford, Chester Cathedral Education Officer

The second reading is written in the letter of James, the fifth chapter, beginning at the seventh verse.

Be patient, therefore, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. Beloved, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! As an example of suffering and patience, beloved, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord Indeed we call blessed those who showed endurance. You have heard of the endurance of Job, and you have seen the purpose of the Lord, how the Lord is compassionate and merciful.

Above all, my beloved, do not swear, either by heaven or by earth or by any other oath, but let your 'Yes' be yes and

your 'No' be no, so that you may not fall under condemnation.

Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain and the earth yielded its harvest

My brothers and sisters, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and is brought back by another, you should know that whoever brings back a sinner from wandering will save the sinner's soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.

The Bishop of Chester

THE LICENSING, COLLATION AND INSTALLATION

The Revd Anthony Lees-Smith is presented to the Bishop of Chester by The Venerable Richard Worsfold, Archdeacon of Leicester and Jo Sykes, former Chair of the Nominations Committee of Chester Cathedral.

Bishop Mark, we present to you The Revd Anthony Lees Smith to be collated as a Residentiary Canon in this Cathedral Church.

The Bishop responds

I thank you for your presentation.

Oaths and declarations

The Bishop reads the Preface to the Declaration of Assent

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each

generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Anthony makes the Declaration of Assent and takes the Oaths of Allegiance and Obedience.

- I, Anthony James Lees-Smith, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.
- I, Anthony James Lees-Smith, swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors, according to law: so help me God.
- I, Anthony James Lees-Smith, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Bishop of Chester

and his successors in all things lawful and honest: so help me God.

The documents are signed.

The Collation

Anthony, a Residentiary Canon is called as a member of the Chapter, led by the Dean, to play a role in the governance and life of the Cathedral, and always endeavour to strengthen the whole corporate life, worship, mission and work of the Cathedral. The Chapter have assigned to you specific responsibility, alongside your colleagues, for leading the Cathedral's mission through education and learning; social engagement; and art, performance and word.

He reads the Deed of Collation, and then prays

Almighty God, loving Saviour of the world, and giver of all good gifts: hear our prayers for this your servant Anthony, called to serve as Canon Residentiary of this Cathedral Church. By your Holy Spirit, may he be strengthened for his ministry. May he be richly blessed, and through his work

may you richly bless your people, to the glory of your name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Bishop Mark receives the mandate and hands it to Carolyn Bruce, Chapter Clerk, saying

Having duly and canonically admitted our well-beloved Canon Anthony Lees-Smith to the office of a Residentiary Canon, I empower and request The Dean to install him in this Cathedral Church.

The Chapter Clerk receives the Bishop's mandate, then during the hymn leads the new Canon to the Dean to be installed.

Please be seated. The Chapter Clerk hands the mandate to the Dean and says

I present to you the mandate of the Bishop requiring you to induct and install Anthony Lees-Smith as a Residentiary Canon.

Members of the College of Canons stand.

Standing by the Canon's stalls, the Dean says

Anthony, as required by the Statutes of this Cathedral Church, I ask you to now make the necessary declaration in the presence of the Chapter before I place you in your stall.

Canon Anthony replies

In the name of the Father, and of the Son. and of the Holy Spirit: I, Anthony James Lees-Smith, duly appointed Residentiary Canon of this Cathedral Church of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary in Chester, declare that, to the utmost of my power, I will safely maintain, and cause to be safely maintained, the possessions, and the rights, liberties and privileges, and whatsoever pertains to this Church, and that I will steadfastly keep, and so far as in me lies cause others to keep, all and every the customs and statutes thereof: and that I will not knowingly hinder whatsoever what may lawfully be done for the advantage and honour of the said Church, but that I will seek to secure and augment the same. I will earnestly discharge the duties given into my care to the utmost of my power.

Placing Canon Anthony in his stall, Dean Tim says

I, Timothy Richard Stratford, Dean, by virtue of the Mandate from the Right Reverend Father in God, Mark Simon Austin Tanner, by divine permission Bishop of Chester, do induct and install you, Anthony James Lees-Smith into the real and actual possession of the canonry and stall, with all the rights, members and appurtenances thereof.

The College of Canons sits. Anthony's colleagues vest him in his Cathedral cope and the Dean says

Anthony, the Lord preserve your going out and your coming in from this time forth for evermore.

Amen.

The congregation is invited to greet Canon Anthony with a round of applause.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all evermore. Amen.
