The Liturgy of the Hours – Also known as...

- Fixed Hours of Prayers: (Early Christian Church)
- Liturgy of the Hours (Roman Catholic)
- Divine Hours (Eastern Orthodox)
- Daily Offices (Benedictine)
- Common Prayer (Episcopalian or Anglican)

The Liturgy of the Hours – History

- Time of Jesus (1st century)
- Early Church Fathers (4th century)
- Middle Ages: (13-16th centuries)

Illustrated Books of Hours-best sellers for 250 years

- Illuminated Manuscripts
 - The Visconti Hours, for Giangaleazzo Visconti of Milan by Giovannino dei Grassi, & Belbello da Pavia (1402-1412)
 - The Tres Riches Heures of Jean, Duke of Berry, French landscape (1416)
- Reformation Morning and evening prayer in the vernacular, simplified
- Roman Catholics (16th century) primarily for priests and monastics in Latin. Eight times a day.
- Vatican Two (1962) Liturgy of the Hours revamped. Morning and evening prayers for lay people.
- Contemporary Times (Examples of places that practice the Liturgy of the Hours)
 - o Iona (small island off of Scotland's west coast)
 - o Taize (southern France)
 - Trappist Abbeys of Gethsemane in Kentucky (made famous by Thomas Merton) and Genesee in New York (made famous by Henri Nouwen)
 - o Benedictine Abbey of Regina Laudis, (Bethlehem, Connecticut)
 - o Anglican St. Gregory's Abbey (Three Rivers, Michigan)
- Geographically, theologically, denominationally, and temperamentally diverse Christians can be united by the Liturgy of the Hours.

The Liturgy of the Hours – Practice:

- Teaches us to pray
 - o Immerses us in Scripture
 - o Unites us with all believers who have gone before us and believers around the world
 - o Makes us aware of the passing of time in the liturgical year
 - o Provides words for us in tough times
 - o Regularly draws our attention back to God throughout the day.
 - o As opposed to: "ad hoc, self-directed, disconnected, and subjective prayers". (A.Boers)
