







DARIUS THE GREAT IS NOT OKAY BY ADIB KHORRAM




THE CATCHER IN THE RYE

Looks deeply at the frustrations young people have when they can't rely on adults to change things, while also not knowing how to fix things themselves.



DIG BY A.S. KING

Be ready to go deep with *Dig*—deep into family secrets and sanity, deep into violence and whiteness, deep into reality and magic. If you've ever felt labeled as a thing rather than known as a person, you'll be right at home here. If you've ever felt emotionally scarred by the people nearest you, you'll be right at home here. Nobody reacts to these traumas gracefully—that is, when you're enduring trauma alone. You'll love how author A.S. King fashions a way for those grieving in isolation to thrive together, and for families paralyzed by pain to walk into a new forgiving future for and with each other.




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
THE CATCHER IN THE RYE

THE DOWNSTAIRS GIRL BY STACEY LEE



Jo Kuan is *The Downstairs Girl*, a witty and thoughtful narrator relegated to the margins of 1890s Atlanta—the wrong gender, the wrong race, the wrong level of society altogether. But the barriers that keep Jo down inspire the best in her in matters of the mind and the heart. It's a historical novel that never feels like homework, featuring a clever protagonist who's not too smart to suffer and learn and grow. And the resolution is, like the times were, difficult for many but beautifully open with possibilities and hope.

Young girl with humble beginnings and personal tenacity comes into her own as a woman, and a thinker.




Young protagonist quick with a pen, devoted to her family, and on the cutting edge of what it means to be a woman in her society.




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
ROMEO AND JULIET

Woodson writes of two starcrossed lovers whose love supersedes all.




THE GREAT GATSBY


Wealth and poverty, love and rejection, a critical look at the society in which these elements exist.

PATRON SAINTS OF NOTHING BY RANDY RIBAY



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
HAMLET





THE INQUISITOR'S TALE BY ADAM GIDWITZ

Lovers of story will be drawn into this novel immediately. Enter a rough-and-tumble village tavern, and be swept into an engaging and suspenseful adventure story. Gidwitz makes sure that each villager brings a unique piece of the story—and is not shy about probing the consequences of love and hate, about analyzing the varieties of religious experience, and about disrupting our notion of what medieval times meant for peasants, Jews, and POC. The tale-tellers each conclude their respective stories with a cliff-hanger that demands another tale-teller to breathe new life into the saga. You will not want to put down this tale of cunning vs power, good vs evil, and young vs old. It's a morality tale that's never preachy, a joyful and hopeful story about serious and real matters.



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



Explores class, feminism, and the psychological depths of the bildungsroman.





WE ARE NOT FROM HERE BY JENNY TORRES SANCHEZ

Coming of age is a difficult process for any young person. Some young people, however, are thrust out of their childhoods and into a landscape that is not adulthood, not home, not welcoming, and not safe. In the novel *We Are Not From Here*, Jenny Torres Sanchez depicts such a violent loss of innocence endured by three young Guatemalans. Chico, Pulga, and Pequeña each escape the grasp of a local drug lord, only to have themselves thrown into the predatory dangers of the desert, the law, and La Bestia—the freight train that is their only hope of making it to the United States. A suspenseful and timely narrative told in an imaginative and emotionally rich style.



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



DREAM COUNTRY BY SHANNON GIBNEY


The word "dream" is understood in one of two divergent ways. Either a dream is something optimal, a goal one aspires to; or a dream is something ephemeral, a phantom one never truly experiences. Gibney's *Dream Country* challenges the reader to hold both meanings at once. This novel follows a single family's aspirations and sufferings on either side of the Atlantic—the promises of two countries (Liberia and the United States) drive and frustrate members of a single family tree. Gibney depicts recognizable assimilations into American culture as well as the cost of leaving the African continent. A suspenseful and historically engaging narrative told in varied and mature style.

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
HEART OF DARKNESS

Protagonists enduring the consequences of difficult choices, personally, culturally, and historically.




BELOVED
