### CLEMSON SEEKS FOURTH CONSECUTIVE ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

The Atlantic Division champion Clemson Tigers will be in search of another piece of history when the team takes to the field against the Coastal Division champion Pittsburgh Panthers in the 2018 ACC Championship Game. Kickoff from Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte is scheduled for 8 p.m. ET.

A win on Saturday would give Clemson its fourth consecutive ACC title and make the Tigers the first team in the conference's 66-season history to win four consecutive outright titles. Bobby Bowden's Florida State squads earned at least a share of the ACC title in nine straight seasons across the 1992-2000 campaigns but never earned four outright titles in a row. Clemson would be the first Power Five team to win four consecutive conference title games since Florida rattled off four straight SEC Championship Game wins from 1993-96.

The Clemson senior class enters the contest with an ACC-record 52 career wins. Featured among that group is defensive tackle Christian Wilkins, who is expected to play in his 57th career game on Saturday, which would tie fullback Chad Diehl (57 from 2007-11) for the most career games played in school history.

Pittsburgh is the last ACC team with an active winning streak against Clemson, having beaten the Tigers, 43-42, in 2016. With a win over Pittsburgh, Clemson would end a two-game losing streak to Pitt and have an active winning streak of at least one game against all 13 other ACC institutions.

The game will be played on the 10th anniversary of Dabo Swinney being named as Clemson's full-time head coach on Dec. 1, 2008. Clemson is 113-30 under Swinney, including a 109-27 mark in his 10 full seasons.

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson winning its 24th conference championship in school history. The Tigers enter this week with four SIAA championships, two Southern Conference championships and 17 ACC championships to their credit, and their 23 total conference championships are the most among the ACC's current membership.

- Clemson securing its 18th all-time ACC championship. Clemson's currently 17 ACC titles are already the most in conference history, ahead of the 15 earned by Florida State.

- Clemson attempting to become the first team in ACC history to win four consecutive ACC titles outright. Florida State earned at least a share of nine consecutive ACC titles from 1992-2000 but never earned more than three consecutive titles outright.

- Clemson attempting to join the 1993-96 Florida Gators as the only Power Five conference teams to win four consecutive conference championship games.

- Clemson winning its 53rd game in the last four years to add to existing school and ACC records for wins held by Clemson's 2018 senior class. It would tie the 2014-17 and 2015-18 Alabama Crimson Tide for the most wins by a senior class in FBS history. (Note: The 2015-18 Alabama class can push the record to 54 wins with a victory on Saturday).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 13-0 for only the second time in school history, joining the 2015 Tigers, who started 13-0 en route to a 14-1 finish.

- The 2018 Tigers winning a 13th game to take sole possession of third place for the most wins in a season in school history. It would bring the 2018 team one win shy of the team record of 14 wins, set by the 2015 and 2016 Tigers.

- Clemson attempting to earn its first all-time win against Pittsburgh. The Tigers enter this week 0-2 all-time against Pittsburgh.

- Clemson defeating Pittsburgh to give the Tigers a win in their most recent meeting against all 13 ACC institutions.

- Clemson attempting to win a 13th straight game, which would tie streaks from the 1939-40 and 1980-82 seasons for the third-longest winning streak in school history.

- Clemson's 2018 senior class improving upon its current .929 winning percentage since 2015, which far outpaces the school record set by the 2017 seniors (.877, 50-7). The 2018 senior class is attempting to become the first in school history to field a winning percentage of .900 or better.

- Clemson attempting to earn its 101st win of the decade. Clemson, Alabama and Ohio State are the only FBS schools to win 100 games this decade.

- Clemson winning its ninth straight game in the month of December, a streak that dates back to the 2011 ACC Championship Game against Virginia Tech. Prior to the current streak, Clemson had never won more than three consecutive December games.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney earning his 114th career victory to pass Frank Beamer (113) for third-most career wins as head coach of an ACC program. (Note: Beamer's figure reflects his 113 wins after Virginia Tech joined the ACC as a member institution, excluding his victories as an independent or as a member of other conferences).

- Clemson attempting to win eight consecutive games by 20 or more points for the first time in school history. The current seven-game streak of 20-point wins is already a program record.

- Clemson scoring 27 or more points in a 13th straight game for the first time in school history. Clemson's current 12-game streak is already a school record.

- Clemson attempting to reach four sacks in an eighth

game this season, which would match the mark set by the 2015 Tigers for the most in Swinney's tenure.

- Clemson entering the week as one of only two programs in the country in the Top 10 in both total offense (539.1, third) and total defense (283.2, seventh). Clemson's 255.9-yard average yardage differential is the best in the country.

- Clemson entering this week with 74 total touchdowns scored by 21 different players. The 21 different players to score a touchdown this season are tied with the 2013 Tigers for the most in a single season in school history.

- Clemson (74 through 12 games) scoring two touchdowns to pass the 2016 Tigers (75 in 15 games) for the most total touchdowns in a season in school history.

- Clemson adding to its school-record 42 rushing touchdowns this season.

- Clemson (548) scoring 41 points to break the school record for points in season, held currently by the 2016 Tigers (588).

- Clemson (eight) attempting to score 40 points in a ninth game this season to break a tie with the 2012 and 2013 Tigers (eight each) for the most 40-point games in a season in school history.

- Clemson (four) attempting to score 50 points in a fifth game this season to tie the 2013 Tigers for the most 50-point games in a season in school history.

- Clemson (6,469) gaining 531 yards to record the third 7,000-yard offensive season in school history, joining the 2015 (7,718) and 2016 (7,552) squads.

- Clemson (3,076) chasing the 1988 Tigers (3,421, fourth), 1986 Tigers (3,245, third), 2015 Tigers (3,345, second) and 1978 Tigers (3,469, first) on the school's all-time leaderboard for rushing yards in a season.

- Clemson (3,393) needing 607 more passing yards this season to record the fifth 4,000-yard passing season in school history.

- Clemson (298) gaining two first downs to record the eighth season in school history with at least 300 first downs.

- Clemson entering this week with three 600-yard games this season, tied for the team record with the 2012 and 2017 squads (three each).

- Clemson attempting to outrush an opponent for the 12th time this season. The Tigers enter this week having outrushed opponents in 22 of their 26 games since 2017 and are 22-0 when outrushing opponents in that time frame.

- Clemson entering the game as one of five schools (Ball State, Georgia Tech, SMU and Syracuse) with three active 1,000-yard career rushers on its current roster (Adam Choice, Travis Etienne and Tavien Feaster).

- Clemson attempting to produce multiple 100-yard rushers in a game for the third time this season. It would mark the fourth season in school history in which Clemson had produced multiple 100-yard rushers in at least three games (three in 1951, three in 1985, four in 2015).

- Clemson (one in 2018) attempting to return multiple punts for touchdowns for the first time since 2009 (Jacoby Ford vs. Middle Tennessee State and C.J. Spiller vs. Boston College).

- Clemson (43) recording seven sacks to break the team record for sacks in a season (49 in 2016).

- Clemson attempting to three consecutive games with zero sacks allowed for the first time since 2006 vs. Louisiana Tech, Wake Forest and Temple. Clemson has allowed only one sack in its last five contests.

- Running back Travis Etienne rushing for 200 yards for the second time in his career to tie the school record for career 200-yard rushing games (Ray Yauger, 1967-69; Terrence Flagler, 1982-86; Raymond Priester, 1994-97; Andre Ellington, 2009-12).

- Etienne (1,307) needing 221 rushing yards to break

Wayne Gallman's school record for rushing yards in a season (1,527 in 2015). Etienne is only 39 yards shy of passing Raymond Priester (1,345 in 1996) for second.

- Etienne (1,307) rushing for 93 yards to post only the second 1,400-yard rushing season in school history (Gallman in 2015).

- Etienne (32) chasing No. 4 Andre Ellington (33 from 2009-12) and No. 3 Wayne Gallman (34 from 2014-16) on the school's leaderboard for career rushing touchdowns.

- Etienne (33) chasing Wayne Gallman and Andre Ellington (36 each) for fourth on the school's leaderboard for total touchdowns in a career.

- Etienne (19) attempting to add to his existing school record for rushing touchdowns in a single season and record the first season with 20 rushing touchdowns in school history. He is currently seven rushing touchdowns shy of James Conner's ACC record of 26, set in 2014.

- Etienne (120) entering the game 18 points shy of Greg Huegel's school record for points in a season (138 in 2015). Etienne is eight points behind C.J. Spiller's mark for the most by a non-kicker (128 in 2009).

- Defensive end Clelin Ferrell entering the week with 26.0 career sacks, fifth-most among active players in the FBS.

- Ferrell (26.0) chasing No. 4 William Perry (27.0 from 1981-84) and Nos. 2 Michael Dean Perry (28.0 from 1984-87) and Gaines Adams (28.0 from 2003-06) on the school's all-time leaderboard in career sacks.

- Ferrell (10.5) entering the game tied for eighth in school history in sacks in a single season. He is 1.5 sacks shy of tying Vic Beasley (12.0 in 2014) and Kevin Dodd (12.0 in 2015) for sixth-most in a season in school history and 2.0 sacks away from tying Gaines Adams (12.5 in 2006) and Shaq Lawson (12.5 in 2015) for fourth.

- Ferrell making his 42nd career start to pull within one of Levon Kirkland's school record for starts by a defensive end/outside linebacker (43 from 1988-91).

- Wide receiver Tee Higgins (eight) catching two touchdowns to break Deon Cain's school record for receiving touchdowns by a sophomore (nine in 2016).

- Higgins (eight) needing one receiving touchdown to tie Deon Cain for seventh-most receiving touchdowns in a season in school history (nine in 2016). With two receiving touchdowns, he would tie Derrick Hamilton (10 in 2003) for sixth.

- Higgins attempting to become the first Clemson player to post consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Mike Williams against Syracuse and Pitt in 2016.

- Kicker Greg Huegel (52) kicking three field goals to

tie or four field goals to pass Aaron Hunt (55 from 2000-03) for fifth-most career field goals in school history.

- Huegel (203) breaking the school record for PATs with his next successful PAT. He is currently tied for the program's all-time mark with Chandler Catanzaro.

- Huegel (62) entering the game nine PATs shy of matching his own school record for PATs in a single season (71 in 2016).

- Huegel making his 46th career start at kicker to tie Nelson Welch for third-most starts by a Clemson kicker all-time (52, Chandler Catanzaro; 47, Aaron Hunt; 46, Nelson Welch).

- Tackle Mitch Hyatt adding to his school records for most career snaps from scrimmage (3,573) and most career starts (54).

- Defensive lineman Dexter Lawrence (three) blocking his fourth career placekick to tie Jarvis Jenkins' school record for most career blocked placekicks (four from 2007-10).

- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence (22) throwing five touchdowns to tie Cullen Harper (27 in 2007) for sixth on the school's leaderboard for touchdown passes in a single season.

- Lawrence (22) throwing three touchdowns to pass Bobby Gage (24 from 1945-48) and Tommy Kendrick (24 from 1967-69) for ninth-most career touchdown passes in school history. Mike Eppley (28 from 1980-84) would be next on the list at No. 8.

- Lawrence (2,488) chasing No. 10 Woodrow Dantzler (2,578 in 2001), No. 9 Cullen Harper (2,601 in 2008), No. 8 Kelly Bryant (2,802) and No. 7 Cullen Harper (2,991 in 2007) on the school's leaderboard for passing yards in a single season in school history.

- Lawrence (2,488) entering the game 39 yards from breaking Kyle Parker's record for passing yards by a freshman (2,526 in 2009). Lawrence already owns the school record for passing yards by a *true* freshman.

- Hunter Renfrow adding to his school records for career starts by a wide receiver (44) and consecutive games with a reception (40).

- Renfrow (2,061) needing 162 receiving yards to reach Jerry Butler (2,223 from 1975-78) and enter the Top 10 in career receiving yards in school history.

- Renfrow (15) recording his 16th career touchdown reception to tie Terrance Roulhac, Derrick Hamilton and Jacoby Ford (16 each) for 10th-most career touchdown receptions in Clemson history.

- Wide receiver Amari Rodgers (289) needing 11 punt return yards to post the 10th season with 300 punt return yards by an individual in school history. He and Ray-Ray

McCloud (303 last year) would become the first duo to accomplish the feat in back-to-back years.

- Rodgers (289) entering the game 73 yards shy of Darnell Stephens' freshman school record for punt return yards (362 in 1991).

- Rodgers attempting to join Shad Bryant (two in 1938), Don Kelley (two in 1970) and Donnell Woolford (two in 1987) as the only players in school history to record multiple punt return touchdowns in a single season.

- Defensive tackle Christian Wilkins adding to his 42 career starts, already the most by a defensive tackle in school history.

- Wilkins playing his 57th career game to tie fullback Chad Diehl's school record of 57 career games played from 2007-11.

in the ACC Championship Game. In the first two appearances, Clemson played a team it faced earlier that season. But, this year's matchup represents the fourth straight time Clemson has played a team for the first time that season in the ACC Championship Game. The Tigers faced North Carolina in 2015, Virginia Tech in 2016 and Miami (Fla.) in 2017 for the first time.

Clemson first played in the ACC Championship Game in 2009 when Georgia Tech defeated Clemson, 39-34. Both teams rushed for over 300 yards in the game, which was the only FBS game in 2009 in which both teams had at least 300 yards rushing. It remains the only game in Clemson history in which neither team punted.

C.J. Spiller rushed for 233 yards in 20 attempts, scored four touchdowns and had 301 all-purpose yards. Those both remain ACC Championship game records, two of six records Spiller still holds. He was named the game's MVP, the only time a player from the losing team has been honored.

Clemson won the title two years later with a 38-10 win over Virginia Tech in 2011. Virginia Tech was ranked third in the USA Today poll entering the game, and the victory tied for the highest-ranked team Clemson had defeated at the time. Since then, Clemson has defeated a No. 2 Ohio State and a No. 1 Alabama in the 2016 College Football Playoff.

Tajh Boyd had three touchdown passes and one rushing to account for four of Clemson's five touchdowns on the night in 2011, as the Tigers boasted a balanced attack that recorded 217 yards rushing and 240 passing. It was Clemson's first ACC Championship since 1991.

Current professionals Dwayne Allen, Sammy Watkins and Andre Ellington all scored touchdowns for Clemson and the Tigers' defense held Virginia Tech to just 56 yards rushing.

In 2015, the Tigers defeated North Carolina, 45-37, for the championship, a victory that gave Clemson a 13-0 record and a spot in the College Football Playoff for the first time. North Carolina was 11-1 and ranked eighth in the nation entering the game.

Deshawn Watson led a Clemson offense that gained 608 yards in 98 plays, including 319 rushing yards and 289 passing yards. Watson completed 26-42 passes for 289 yards and three scores. He also had 131 yards rushing 24 attempts and two rushing touchdowns. Wayne Gallman had 187 yards in 28 attempts to lead Clemson's ground game. Artavis Scott had seven catches for 96 yards and a score. Gallman also had a career high 68 receiving yards, giving him 255 all-purpose yards.

North Carolina gained 382 yards and scored 21 points in the second half. Their last touchdown came with just 1:13 left. Clemson had a 21-16 lead at halftime.

Clemson won the 2016 ACC Championship game in Orlando over Virginia Tech with a 42-35 victory. Clemson was ranked third in the nation entering that game and Virginia Tech was 19th. Watson helped bolster his case as a Heisman finalist by accounting for five touchdowns in the victory, including three passing touchdowns among his 23-34 passing performance for 288 yards and adding 17 carries for 85 yards and two touchdowns on the ground.

An overview of Clemson's most recent ACC Championship appearance is included in the following section.

## MOST RECENT ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

### Clemson 38, Miami (Fla.) 3

(Dec. 2, 2017 at Charlotte, N.C.)

Fueled by a balanced offensive attack and a stifling defensive performance, No. 1 Clemson won its third straight and 17th all-time ACC Championship, defeating the No. 7 Miami Hurricanes, 38-3, at Bank of America Stadium. With the win, Clemson improved to 12-1 overall, while Miami dropped to 10-2.

Offensively, the Tigers were sparked by quarterback Kelly Bryant, who completed his first 15 passes for 164 yards and finished the game with 252 yards and one passing touchdown on a career-high 23 completions after connecting with 10 different receivers. He was named the game's MVP.

The ground game proved strong as well, as four different Tigers rushed for scores. The Clemson defense held Miami to just 22 yards of offense in the first quarter and 214 for the whole game, while also forcing three Hurricane turnovers in the third quarter alone.

Travis Etienne put Clemson on the board first, darting four yards for a touchdown just under five minutes into the matchup. The score was set up when Bryant connected with Hunter Renfrow on third down for a 23-yard gain a few plays earlier. A Miami 46-yard field goal attempt then sailed wide left, and on Clemson's ensuing drive, Bryant broke free for an 11-yard scoring run that gave the Tigers a 14-0 lead near the end of the first quarter. The junior quarterback was also a perfect 9-9 passing for 124 yards during the first 15 minutes.

Adam Choice upped Clemson's lead to 21-0 two minutes into the second quarter with a one-yard touchdown run. That proved to be the halftime score, and the 21-point advantage was good for the largest halftime lead in ACC Championship game history.

Five minutes into the second half, an Alex Spence 46-yard field goal pushed the Tigers' lead to 24-0, and Ryan Carter forced a fumble that was recovered by Dorian O'Daniel on the Hurricanes' next drive. The Tigers did not score on that possession, but Carter halted Miami again a few minutes later with an interception in Hurricane territory. Clemson then found the end zone, with Tavien Feaster pushing the Clemson lead to 31-0.

Kendall Joseph caused Miami's third turnover of the third quarter when he intercepted a Malik Rosier pass, and Bryant connected with Deon Cain for a 27-yard score two plays later. Miami scored its only points on a 22-yard by Michael Badgley with three and a half minutes remaining in the game.

The 35-point win was the largest victory margin in ACC Championship Game history and Clemson's largest victory margin against a top-25 team in history.

## ACC CHAMPIONSHIP EXPERIENCE

This will be Clemson's fourth straight appearance in the league's championship game, while it will be Pittsburgh's first appearance.

Clemson has 11 players who have played in each of the last three ACC Championship games. Those players include Austin Bryant, J.D. Davis, Judah Davis, Mitch Hyatt, Kendall Joseph, Hunter Renfrow, Milan Richard, Cannon Smith, Trevion Thompson, Christian Wilkins and Jalen Williams. Hyatt, Joseph and Renfrow are the only players to start three ACC Championship games.

When it comes to participation, six active Tigers have played at least 100 snaps in ACC Championship Games. Hyatt leads the way with 231, Joseph has played 183 snaps, Renfrow 180, Wilkins 123. Juniors Clelin Ferrell and Sean Pollard have played 104 and 103, respectively.

Fifty-two players on the current Clemson roster have participated in at least one ACC Championship Game, including 25 who have played in at least two games.

# NOTES

Fourteen current Tigers (including punters and kickers) have started at least one ACC Championship Game, eight have started two and the aforementioned three have started all three.

## ALL-TIME ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Clemson has 17 ACC championships in school history, the most in the history of the conference. Florida State ranks second with 15. The Tigers have won each of the last three titles and will attempt to make it four in a row for the first time in school history, passing three-year streaks from 1965-67 and 1986-88.

If Clemson wins Saturday night, the Tigers would be the first ACC program to win four consecutive ACC titles outright. Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning four straight titles outright.

Clemson has 23 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC.

## SEEKING 13 WINS

A victory Saturday would make Clemson just the fifth ACC team in history to record at least 13 wins in a season. Clemson is the most recent team to win at least 13 after posting a 14-1 record during both the 2015 and 2016 campaigns.

Clemson's 1981 National Championship team was the first ACC team to win 12 games in a season. Florida State accomplished the feat five times between 1993 and 2014, including a streak of three seasons with at least 12

wins from 2012-14. They won a record 14 games (14-0) in 2013, a mark tied by Clemson in 2015 and 2016.

Both Pittsburgh and Miami have posted 12-win seasons in their school histories, but those years came prior to their addition to the ACC.

## GOING STREAKING

Clemson enters this week riding a 12-game winning streak, with all 12 coming this season. UCF (24), Alabama (14), Notre Dame (13) and Clemson (12) are the only schools with active streaks of at least 10 games.

Clemson's current 12-game winning streak marks the program's 10th all-time winning streak of at least 10 games. Recently, Clemson had a 17-game winning streak from 2014-15 that remains the longest in school history. Alabama ended that streak in the 2015 season National Championship game.

The current streak marks the third time Dabo Swinney has had a winning streak of at least 10 games. Danny Ford had three separate streaks of at least 10 games, including a 13-game streak from 1980 through the last game of the 1981 season.

Frank Howard had a 15-game winning streak from 1947-49 and was part of a 13-game streak from 1939-40. The first 10-game winning streak took place under John Heisman from 1899 to 1901.

### SERIES HISTORY VS. PITT

Saturday's game marks the third all-time meeting between Clemson and Pittsburgh. The Panthers won the previous two contests, including a 34-3 win in the 1977 Gator Bowl and a 43-42 win at Clemson in 2016.

A win on Saturday would lower Dabo Swinney's number of teams he's faced but never beaten to four. Currently, Swinney is 0-1 against Pittsburgh, Nebraska, TCU, South Florida and West Virginia.

Pittsburgh won at Clemson in 2016 in the Panthers' first appearance at Memorial Stadium. Clemson is 28-3 vs. first time opponents the last 40 seasons, with Pittsburgh representing one of the three opponent wins in that time.

Pittsburgh's 43-42 victory in 2016 remains the highest scoring game decided by one point in Clemson history.

### LAST MEETING VS. PITTSBURGH

#### Pittsburgh 43, Clemson 42

(Nov. 12, 2016 at Clemson, S.C.)

Chris Blewitt's 48-yard field goal with six seconds remaining lifted Pittsburgh to a 43-42 victory over No. 2 Clemson at Memorial Stadium on Nov. 12, 2016. The Panthers improved to 6-4 while the Tigers dropped their first regular-season game since 2014 and fell to 9-1 overall. The game was Clemson's only loss during its 2016 National Championship season.

The Tigers had a fourth-and-one with just over a minute left that would have sealed the game, but Wayne Gallman was stopped short in Pittsburgh territory. The Panthers drove down the field to set up Blewitt's game-winning field goal.

Deshaun Watson led the way with a Clemson record 580 passing yards on 52 completions, becoming the sixth player in ACC history with 10,000 career yards of total offense and the first to accomplish that feat as a junior.

His passing yards and completions set Clemson single-game records, and the former set an ACC record. Mike Williams added 15 receptions for 202 yards.

The first quarter featured explosive offense from both teams, with Pittsburgh opening the scoring less than two minutes into the game with a 15-yard touchdown pass from Nathan Peterman to George Ashton. The score was the first touchdown Clemson had allowed in the first quarter in 2016. Peterman also connected with James Conner for a 46-yard score midway through the quarter. Both of Clemson's first-quarter touchdowns were one-yard runs by Gallman.

The momentum continued for the Tigers, as Clemson took its first lead of the game early in the second quarter on a 15-yard touchdown pass from Watson to Williams. Pittsburgh marched right back down the field to score on a 55-yard pass, but Chris Blewitt's extra-point attempt was blocked. Watson then fueled a 75-yard touchdown drive late in the second quarter, and Clemson took a 28-27 lead into halftime.

In the second half, Pittsburgh hung tight, as Clemson had an eight-point lead in the fourth quarter. With the Tigers ahead 42-34, Watson threw an interception in the end zone, and the Panthers capitalized with a touchdown. The two-point try was no good, as Clemson maintained a two-point lead.

### FIRST GAME VS. PITTSBURGH

#### Pittsburgh 34, Clemson 3

(Dec. 30, 1977 at Jacksonville, Fla.)

Clemson was ranked 11th in the nation and Pittsburgh 10th entering the 1977 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla. Clemson was making its first appearance in a bowl game since 1959, while the defending national champion Panthers had an 8-2-1 record entering the game.

Pittsburgh quarterback Matt Cavanaugh had been injured in the first game of the 1977 season and was limited for much of the season, but he was healthy for the Panthers in that bowl game. He completed 23-36 passes for 387 yards and four touchdowns. It was a record for passing yards against Clemson that stood for 18 more seasons. Elliott Walker caught three of the touchdowns and had six catches for 121 yards overall.

Clemson's only points came on a 49-yard field goal by kicker Obed Ariri. Steve Fuller completed 10-23 passes for 158 yards and had 13 rushes for 34 yards. Jerry Butler was the top receiver with four receptions for 64 yards. Pittsburgh had 30 first downs and ran 88 plays for 566 yards.

The bowl experience was important for Clemson, as the next year Clemson finished with an 11-1 record, a bowl victory over Ohio State and a No. 6 final ranking in both polls, the highest in Clemson history at that point.

## -- NOTES FROM LAST WEEK --

### POSTGAME NOTES VS. SOUTH CAROLINA

- Clemson's 744 yards were its most against South Carolina in series history, surpassing the 622 yards gained by Clemson in the 2016 contest. It ranks third in a single game in Clemson history, trailing 756 against Wake Forest in 1981 and 754 against NC State in 2012.

- Clemson gained 393 passing yards and 351 rushing yards. It marked Clemson's first time exceeding 300 yards in both categories in a single game since the 2017 season opener against Kent State. It was Clemson's fourth such game under head coach Dabo Swinney (Duke in 2012, NC State in 2012, Kent State in 2017).

- The game marked Clemson's first time posting both 300 passing yards and 300 rushing yards against South Carolina in series history.

- Clemson recorded a school-record three touchdown drives of 95 yards or more, scoring on drives of 95, 97 and 98 yards in the game. It marked Clemson's first time posting multiple drives of 95 yards or more since recording two against Wake Forest on Oct. 7, 2006.

- Clemson recorded a season-high 38 first downs, the second-most in school history and only two shy of the school record of 40 set against South Carolina in 2016.

- Including the 744 yards gained against South Carolina, Clemson reached the 6,000-yard mark on the year to post the seventh 6,000-yard season in team history. All seven 6,000-yard campaigns have been posted under Swinney.

- With 351 rushing yards on the day, Clemson reached

3,000 rushing yards in a season for the sixth time in school history. It marks the team's second 3,000-yard rushing season under Swinney (3,345 in 2015).

- Clemson outrushed an opponent for the 11th time this season. The Tigers have now outrushed opponents in 22 of their 26 games since 2017 and are 22-0 when outrushing opponents in that time frame.

- Clemson scored 27 or more points in a 12th straight game for the first time in school history, adding to its existing school record.

- Clemson scored eight touchdowns to push its season total to 74. The 2018 squad now sits one touchdown shy of the 2016 Tigers (75) for the most total touchdowns in a season in school history.

- During the contest, Clemson reached the 500-point mark on the year post the fifth 500-point season in school history. All five instances have come under Swinney.

- Clemson opened the game with four consecutive touchdown drives. It marked Clemson's first time accomplishing the feat on offense since Nov. 18, 2017 vs. The Citadel.

- On its sixth rushing touchdown of the game, the 2018 Tigers broke the single-season school record for rushing touchdowns, surpassing the mark of 40 set in 2017. Clemson now has 42 rushing touchdowns this season.

- The teams combined for 1,344 yards, the second-largest combined yardage total in Clemson history behind the 1,351 yards combined for by Clemson and NC State in 2012.

- Clemson has now won seven consecutive games by 20 or more points for the first time in school history. The current streak of 20-point wins passes a six-game streak across the final five games of the 1989 season and the 1990 season opener.

- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence completed 27-36 passes for a career-high 393 yards.

- Lawrence also recorded the longest rush of his career on a 32-yard run in the second quarter.

- Lawrence's 393 passing yards are the most against South Carolina in series history, surpassing Deshaun Watson's 347 passing yards in 2016.

- The game was Lawrence's third 300-yard passing

performance of the season.

- Lawrence has now eclipsed 250 passing yards in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- With his passing touchdown, his 22nd of the season, Lawrence passed Woodrow Dantzler (21 in 2001) and Charlie Whitehurst (21 in 2003) for sole possession of seventh on the school's leaderboard for touchdown passes in a single season.

- Running back Adam Choice rushed seven times for 56 yards with a career-high three rushing touchdowns. His six rushing touchdowns this season tie his single-season career high from 2017.

- Wide receiver Tee Higgins caught his team-leading eighth receiving touchdown of the season on a 22-yard pass from Lawrence in the first quarter. It moved Higgins within one touchdown of Deon Cain's school record for receiving touchdowns by a sophomore (nine).

- Higgins' eighth receiving touchdown of the year tied him for eighth-most receiving touchdowns in a season in school history.

- Higgins finished the game with six receptions for 142 yards, his fourth career 100-yard receiving game.

- Higgins' first-quarter touchdown was the culmination of a 95-yard scoring drive, temporarily tying for Clemson's longest of the season (95 yards vs. Furman).

- Clemson eclipsed that mark on its following possession, culminating a 12-play, 97-yard scoring drive with a one-yard rushing touchdown by defensive lineman Christian Wilkins.

- The 97-yard drive was Clemson's longest in its 116-game all-time series against South Carolina. It would later be surpassed by a 98-yard drive later in the contest.

- Clemson recorded five touchdown drives of 10 plays or more, the team's first game with at least four touchdown drives of 10 plays or more since the 2015 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina.

- The rushing touchdown was Wilkins' second of the year. Earlier in the season, he became the first Clemson defensive lineman to rush for a touchdown in the two-platoon era. Now, Clemson defensive linemen have rushed for three touchdowns through 12 games this season (two by Wilkins, one by Dexter Lawrence).

- Wilkins also recorded a sack in the contest, pushing his season total to 5.0 and his career total to 15.0. He has now recorded at least half a sack in each of Clemson's last four games.

- Running back Travis Etienne rushed a career-high 28 times for 150 yards with two rushing touchdowns.

- Etienne has now posted only the fourth 1,300-yard rushing season in school history, joining Wayne Gallman in 2015 and Raymond Priestler in both 1995 and 1996.

- Etienne pushed his season total in rushing yards to 1,307, which now sits fourth on the school's leaderboard for rushing yards in a single season.

- During the contest, Etienne reached 2,000 rushing yards for his career.

- Etienne scored his 31st and 32nd career rushing touchdowns, tying C.J. Spiller (32 from 2006-09) for fifth on the school's leaderboard for career rushing touchdowns.

- Etienne (33) moved into sixth on the school's leaderboard for total touchdowns in a career.

- The game was Etienne's sixth 100-yard rushing performance of the season and the seventh of his career. Clemson now holds a 38-2 record when producing a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

- On a two-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter, Etienne broke Clemson's record for rushing touchdowns in a single season with his 18th of the year. He entered the game tied for the mark with Lester Brown (1978), James Davis (2006) and Wayne Gallman (2016).

- On a 22-yard reception on third down on Clemson's opening drive, wide receiver Hunter Renfrow extended his school-record streak of consecutive games with a reception to 40.

- On the play, Renfrow became the 13th player in school history to reach 2,000 career receiving yards.

- Renfrow caught five passes to pass Mike Williams (177 from 2013-16) for fifth on the school's leaderboard for career receptions.

- Running back Tavien Feaster scored his sixth rushing touchdown of the season on a 13-yard run in the third quarter.

- Clemson held South Carolina without a sack and has now allowed only one sack in its last five games.

- Clemson allowed a touchdown on South Carolina's opening drive, marking the first touchdown allowed by the Clemson defense in the first quarter this season. The lone first-quarter touchdown allowed by Clemson prior to the contest came via punt return at Boston College.

- Prior to the score, Clemson had not surrendered a touchdown on defense in the previous eight quarters. Clemson's defense had not allowed a touchdown when the score of a game had been within 14 points since the fourth quarter of the Syracuse game, a total span of 24 quarters.

- Defensive end Austin Bryant recorded his sixth sack of the season, dropping South Carolina quarterback Jake Bentley for a seven-yard loss in the first quarter.

- Linebacker J.D. Davis made his second start of the season and recorded his first career interception in the second quarter.

- Defensive tackle Albert Huggins added a sack in the fourth quarter.

- Kicker Greg Huegel made his 45th career start at kicker to become only the fourth kicker in school history to start 45 times in a career (52, Chandler Catanzaro; 47, Aaron Hunt; 46, Nelson Welch).

- Huegel went 8-8 on PATs, and on his eighth PAT, he tied Chandler Catanzaro's school record of 203 career PATs.

- Defensive tackle Christian Wilkins played his 56th career game to tie Dorian O'Daniel (2014-17) for second-most in school history. He is now one game shy of tying

fullback Chad Diehl's school record of 57 games played from 2007-11.

- Clemson's captains for the game were tackle Mitch Hyatt, linebacker Kendall Joseph, wide receiver Hunter Renfrow and defensive tackle Christian Wilkins.

## WITH THE WIN

- Clemson completed its seventh undefeated regular season in school history, joining the 1900 (6-0), 1906 (4-0-3), 1948 (10-0), 1950 (8-0-1), 1981 (11-0) and 2015 (12-0) Clemson squads. This year marks Clemson's fifth time finishing a regular season with without any losses or ties.

- Clemson opened a season 12-0 for only the third time, joining a 12-0 record in all 12 games of the 1981 season and a 12-0 mark in the first 12 games of 2015.

- Clemson won the first 12 games of a season for the second time under head coach Dabo Swinney (2015). Swinney became the first coach in Clemson history to coach the school to multiple 12-0 starts, as Danny Ford accomplished the feat once during Clemson's 1981 National Championship campaign.

- The 2018 Tigers have now tied the 1981 and 2017 squads for the third-most wins in a season in school history.

- Clemson won its 12th straight game, which represents sole possession of the fifth-longest winning streak in team history.

- Clemson won its 52nd game in the last four years, adding to existing school and ACC records for wins held by Clemson's 2018 senior class.

- Clemson's 2018 senior class improved upon its current .927 winning percentage since 2015, which far outpaces the school record set by the 2017 seniors (.877, 50-7). The 2018 senior class is attempting to become the first in school history to field a winning percentage of .900 or better.

- Clemson earned its 100th win of the decade, reaching the century mark in wins in a decade for the first time in school history. Clemson's 100-22 record in the 2010s already represents the winningest decade in Clemson history, far surpassing the 87-25-4 mark set in the 1980s. Clemson joined Alabama and Ohio State as the only FBS schools to win 100 games this decade.

- Clemson improved to 70-42-4 all-time against South Carolina. Clemson's 70 all-time wins against South Carolina are the program's most against any opponent.

- Clemson has now recorded five consecutive wins against South Carolina for the first time since a seven-game streak from 1934-40. That seven-game streak stands as the longest winning streak in the series by either team.

- Clemson's 2018 senior class became the 13th class in school history to defeat South Carolina in four consecutive seasons, joining the 1900, 1919, 1930, 1937, 1938, 1939, 1940, 1983, 1991, 2000 and 2005 and 2017 seniors.

- Clemson improved to 19-10-1 all-time against South Carolina at home.

- Clemson won a third straight home game against South Carolina for the first time since defeating the Gamecocks at Death Valley four straight times from 1998-2004.

- Swinney improved to 6-5 all-time against South Carolina and became the first Clemson coach with wins against the Gamecocks in five straight years since Jess Neely accomplished the feat in his final six games in the series from 1934-39.

- Swinney became the fifth coach in Clemson history to defeat South Carolina six times, joining Frank Howard (13), Danny Ford (7), Tommy Bowden (7) and Jess Neely (6).

- Clemson won its 10th consecutive November game, dating back to 2015. It marks the program's longest November winning streak since winning 13 straight in the 11th month of the year across the 1988-92 seasons.

- Clemson won its 15th consecutive game at Memorial Stadium, dating back to a 56-7 win against South Carolina on Nov. 25, 2016. The 15-game streak tied the second-longest home winning streak in Swinney's tenure as head coach, trailing a 21-game home winning streak from 2013-16.

- Clemson finished the season 7-0 at home. It marked Clemson's sixth time in school history winning seven home games in a single season, including 1987 (7-1), 2011 (7-0), 2014 (7-0), 2015 (7-0) and 2017 (7-0).

- Clemson has now gone undefeated at home in back-to-back years for the first time since 2014-15.

- Clemson's senior class improved to 28-1 at Death Valley to tie the 2017 seniors for the best home record in school history.

- Swinney earned his 113th career victory to tie Frank Beamer (113) for third-most career wins as head coach of an ACC program. (Note: Beamer's figure reflects his 113 wins after Virginia Tech joined the ACC as a member institution, excluding his victories as an independent or as a member of other conferences).

- Clemson led, 28-21, at halftime and has now won 63 of its last 65 games when leading at halftime.

- Clemson held a 42-21 advantage after three quarters and is now 83-2 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Clemson broke the 200-yard mark both rushing and passing and has now posted a perfect 40-0 record when both passing and rushing for at least 200 yards under Swinney.

- Clemson is now 53-1 when rushing for at least 200 yards under Swinney.

## -- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

### BEST IN CLASS

Though the team formally celebrated Senior Day against Duke two weeks ago, the 2018 senior class' accomplishments remain cause for celebration.

An attempt to encapsulate the full contribution of Clemson's 2018 senior class may be futile, as the group will eventually conclude its time as Tigers as one of the most successful senior classes in the history of college football. **Currently, the 2018 senior class...**

... holds a 52-4 overall record in the last four years, one of two senior classes in the country to produce 50 wins in that span.

... is already the winningest class in both Clemson and ACC history.

... will become the first senior class in conference history to play in four consecutive ACC Championship games, and with a win, could become the first class in conference history to win four ACC titles outright.

... is attempting to become only the second senior class in the country ever to earn four consecutive College Football Playoff berths.

... has won 43 games against Power Five conference opponents since 2015, the most in the country.

... has been ranked in the AP Top 15 in every poll of their careers, including a Top 10 ranking in each of the last 56 polls, tied for the longest such streak in the country.

... finished 27-1 in Death Valley, tied for the best home record in the country since 2015 and tied with the 2017 Clemson seniors for the most home wins.

... finished 23-1 in ACC Atlantic division play and posted 4-0 marks against five of their six Atlantic division foes, with perfect 4-0 records against Boston College,

## A CENTURY MARK FOR THE DECADE

Head Coach Dabo Swinney can vividly recall the looks he received when he said Clemson was on the cusp of the winningest decade in program history following a 2010 campaign in which the Tigers finished 6-7. In 2017, that vision became a reality with two seasons to spare when Clemson collected its 88th win of the decade in the ACC Championship Game against Miami to surpass the 1980s Tigers (87) for the most wins in any decade in school history.

With a rivalry win against South Carolina to close the regular season, Clemson reached triple digits in wins in a decade for the first time in program history.

## POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and I was like, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" Swinney recounted prior to the 2018 season. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five opponents than Clemson.

## ROCKNE, BRYANT, SWINNEY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney placed himself in the company of two college football legends.

In Clemson's late-September win against Syracuse, Swinney passed the number of total victories earned by Notre Dame's Knute Rockne, the winningest coach by percentage in Division I history. Rockne compiled a 105-12-5 career record from 1918-30 at Notre Dame for a record .881 winning percentage.

Swinney's current .790 winning percentage is 19th-best in Division I history among coaches with a minimum of 10 years experience, trailing No. 18 Nick Saban by fractions of a decimal point (.790). Earlier this year against Wake Forest, Swinney passed Bear Bryant, who had a .780 winning percentage (323-85-17).

## -- TALKING 'BOUT THE POLLS --

### EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

Entering 2018, Clemson had equaled or exceeded its postseason AP and USA Today rankings in comparison to its preseason rankings each of the last seven years. That included quite an accomplishment in 2016, as finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking.

Clemson has exceeded its preseason ranking each of the last seven years in the USA Today coaches poll and has exceeded its preseason ranking in the AP poll six of the seven. Clemson was picked No. 8 in the AP preseason poll in 2013 and finished No. 8. Dabo Swinney is the first head coach in history with a seven-year streak in that area. John Cooper (Ohio State) and Bill Snyder (Kansas State) had five-year streaks.

### POLL STREAKS

Clemson has been ranked in the top 25 of 66 consecutive AP polls dating to the 2014 season, the third-longest active streak in the nation. That includes a streak of 57 straight top-10 rankings, tied for first in the country with Alabama.

### WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

In Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, the Tigers have routinely responded well following dips in the AP rankings. Clemson dropped from No. 2 to No. 3 in the AP Poll on Sept. 17 despite a 31-point win against Georgia Southern the week before. Clemson responded to that most drop with a 28-point road win at Georgia Tech.

Clemson responded similarly in its most recent such contest at Wake Forest after dropping from No. 3 to No. 4. Under Swinney, Clemson is 21-4 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2018 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign. Clemson has now won its last 13 games when entering ranked lower in the AP Poll than in its previous game.

### UNBEATEN

For a fourth consecutive week, no teams dropped from the undefeated ranks last week, as Clemson, Alabama, Notre Dame and UCF all tallied victories to maintain their spotless records. Three of the four will play conference championship games this week.

### DOMINANT DEFENSE

Since the advent of the College Football Playoff in 2014, Clemson has routinely produced one of the nation's elite defenses, a trend that has carried into the 2018 season as well.

Clemson has ranked in the Top 10 in the country in total defense in each of the last four seasons and has ranked among the Top 10 in scoring defense in three of those campaigns. Clemson enters this week's game against Pitt ranked in the Top 10 in the country in both total defense (283.2 yards per game, seventh) and scoring defense (14.0 points per game, fourth).

## GROUND AND POUND

A few hours after being called a finesse team by a national analyst, Clemson rushed for 471 yards in a 63-3 win at Wake Forest on Oct. 6. The rushing total represented the fourth-most yards on the ground in program history and the program's most in a single-game since the team's 1981 national championship season. That figure was later surpassed by Clemson's 492 rushing yards against Louisville.

Clemson's explosiveness and consistency in the running game has put the 2018 Tigers on pace to shatter the team record for yards-per-carry average.

Clemson enters this week having outrushed opponents by an average of 171.6 yards per game this season, the third-best differential in the country and the second-best in the Power Five. ## QUARTERLY DOMINANCE

Clemson has outscored opponents, 548-168, this season for a scoring differential of 380 points, the second-best scoring margin in the country. The Tigers have been particularly dominant in the second and third quarters, producing scoring margins of 146 and 137 points, respectively, in those periods.

Clemson's 18 plays of 50 yards or more through 10 games this season have far surpassed the team's total of 12 through 14 games a year ago. Clemson's 10 50-plus-yard passing plays this year have also passed its six such plays from a season ago.

## RED ZONE SUCCESS

In addition to the explosive element, a portion of Clemson's success this year has been the effectiveness of the offense in the red zone. In 60 possessions inside the opponent's 20, Clemson has 55 scores, including 47 touchdowns and eight field goals. The 47 total

touchdowns are second in the nation to Ohio's 50, and Clemson's red zone touchdown percentage of 78.3 percent ranks fourth in the country.

Clemson has scored 353 points on 60 red zone possessions so far this year, 5.88 points per possession, Clemson's top mark under Dabo Swinney. Swinney's previous best was 5.76 points per red zone possession in 2012. That year, Clemson led the nation in scoring percentage in the red zone at 94.9 percent. Clemson had 43 touchdowns and 13 field goals for 56 red zone scoring possessions out of 59 that year.

Clemson has been balanced when it comes to scoring in the red zone with 29 rushing touchdowns and 18 passing touchdowns, ranking Clemson fifth in the nation in both areas.

Clemson is 38-56 for 278 yards with 18 touchdowns and no interceptions for a 215.6 passing efficiency through the air in the red zone. The 18 red zone touchdown passes are tied with Alabama for fifth-best in the nation. Clemson had just seven red zone touchdown passes a year ago. This season, quarterback Trevor Lawrence is 28-41 passing in the red zone with 13 touchdowns and no interceptions for a red zone passing efficiency of 217.99.

## YOUTH MOVEMENT

Clemson returned a school-record 61 letterman for the 2018 season, making this year's roster the most veteran team in Tiger annals by that measure. However, that experience has not prohibited the team's talented class of true freshmen from making an immediate impact this season.

Thirteen true freshmen (Xavier Thomas, Justyn Ross, Derion Kendrick, K.J. Henry, Trevor Lawrence, Tyler McMichael, Lyn-J Dixon, B.T. Potter, Mario Goodrich, Jordan McFadden, Jackson Carman, Max May and Braden

Galloway) appeared in Clemson's season opener against Furman, matching the team's most in a single game in school history set previously against Wofford in the 2015.

A 14th true freshman, quarterback Ben Batson, made his debut at Wake Forest. Mike Jones, Justin Mascoll, Drew Swinney and Jake Venables pushed that number to 18 by making their collegiate debuts against NC State. Carson Donnelly and Darnell Jefferies extended the figure to 20 with their debuts against Louisville.

Clemson enters Saturday's contest against Pitt having won each of its last 28 Saturday games. Clemson went 12-2 during the 2017 campaign, with its only losses coming on a Friday at Syracuse and a Monday on New Year's Day in the Sugar Bowl.

You have to travel back to Nov. 12, 2016, a total of 749 days prior to this week's contest against Pitt, for Clemson's most recent loss on a Saturday.

Clemson's 28-game Saturday winning streak is the longest active streak in the FBS. In total, Clemson has won 49 of its last 50 Saturday games. Clemson has shut out opponents in the first half five times this season, including a three-game streak against Wake Forest, NC State and Florida State.

Clemson's defensive efforts in the first half have been particularly pronounced at home. Until Syracuse rushed for a one-yard touchdown with 7:31 remaining in the second quarter on Sept. 29, Clemson had not allowed a first-half touchdown at Memorial Stadium since Nov. 12, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh. That marked 686 days between first-half touchdowns allowed at Death Valley, covering 309:52 of game play.

Clemson's status as an elite producer of pro talent has been inarguable in recent years, particularly at wide receiver, where the school has adopted the moniker of "Wide Receiver U" (or #WRU in hashtag form).

An independent analysis by TigerIllustrated.com in August highlighted Clemson's seven wide receivers drafted from 2013-18, the most from any school. It provides a legacy and a foundation upon which Clemson's talented 2018 receiving corps — one co-offensive coordinator Jeff Scott said contains nine plausible starters — to build.

"Get your cameras ready for this year and beyond. Because there's a good chance more history will be made," wrote TigerIllustrated's Larry Williams. "The headlines and cover stories now are about the defensive line. But celebrity status is fast approaching for these receivers."

Etienne's nose for the end zone reached historic levels against Syracuse, Wake Forest and NC State, as he became the first player in Clemson history to record three rushing touchdowns in three consecutive games, becoming only the fourth ACC player to accomplish the feat since 2000. He enters this week with 20 total touchdowns (19 rushing, one receiving), and his 10.0 points per game rank fifth in the country but third among non-kickers.

Despite averaging fewer than 14 carries per game, Etienne reached 1,000 rushing yards on the season on his 117th carry of the season, representing the fewest carries needed by any Clemson running back to reach the 1,000-yard mark in a single in school history. The feat came in his 10th game of the season, marking only the ninth time in school history that a Clemson player has rushed for 1,000 yards in a season in as few as 10 games.

Since joining the program as a walk-on, Renfrow production has been matched in magnitude only by the perceived improbability of his success. He has been named a finalist for the 2018 Burlsworth Trophy, which honors the nation's top college player who started his career as a walk-on.

Against Syracuse, Renfrow became only the 10th player in school history to record 150 career receptions. During the contest, he also surpassed Perry Tuttle for ninth on the team's career receptions list. Tuttle and Renfrow will always be linked in Clemson lore as the recipients of game-winning touchdown passes to secure the program's national championships in 1981 and 2016, respectively.

Between the explosive debuts of C.J. Spiller, Sammy Watkins and Deshaun Watson, Clemson has had no shortage of superlative freshmen in the last dozen years. In 2018, true freshman quarterback Trevor Lawrence has made his case to be considered among that illustrious group.

Lawrence is only the second true freshman and fourth freshman overall in Clemson history to record double-digit touchdown passes.

Lawrence made his first career start against Syracuse, becoming only the sixth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson all-time, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994) and Deshaun Watson (2014). Against Louisville, he earned his fifth win as a starter, breaking Watson's school record for most wins as a true freshman starting quarterback.

## #75 MITCH HYATT, OT

While the return of the members of Clemson's ballyhooed defensive line generated a majority of the team's offseason headlines, Clemson's offensive line returned its own first-team All-American in left tackle Mitch Hyatt. In July, Hyatt was the leading vote-getter in the preseason All-ACC selection process, appearing on a conference-high 130 of 148 possible ballots, 28 more votes than ACC Preseason Player of the Year AJ Dillon.

Hyatt, a three-year letterman out of Suwanee, Ga.,

entered the 2018 campaign with 43 games, 42 starts and 2,885 snaps to his credit, helping Clemson to an ACC title and College Football Playoff berth in each of his first three seasons. Against Louisville, he broke Clemson's all-time record for career snaps from scrimmage.

Neither short on personality nor on production, Clemson returns all four starters on its defensive line in 2018. The group, known affectionately as the Power Rangers following the unit's Halloween costumes of choice in 2016, includes ends Austin Bryant and Clelin Ferrell and tackles Dexter Lawrence and Christian Wilkins.

The group's return alone made college football history. Clemson's 2018 squad will be the first in the sport's history to feature four returning All-Americans on the defensive line.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 2 Clemson opened its 2018 campaign in dominant fashion, defeating the Furman Paladins by a score of 48-7 at Memorial Stadium.

Offensively, the Tigers amassed 531 yards, leading a balanced attack that eclipsed 250 passing yards and 250 rushing yards on the day. On the defensive side of the ball, the Tigers limited the Paladins to just 2.6 yards per play and 163 total yards.

The Tigers opened the scoring midway through the first quarter on a Kelly Bryant 40-yard touchdown pass to Amari Rodgers, marking the first career score for the sophomore wideout. Bryant would later add a 35-yard rushing touchdown as well, while Rodgers would finish the contest with a career-high 141 all-purpose yards, including 87 yards on two punt returns.

Freshman quarterback Trevor Lawrence threw three touchdown passes in his debut, hitting Diondre Overton, Justyn Ross and Braden Galloway for touchdowns in the second, third and fourth quarters, respectively.

Clemson's shutout bid was denied with just over a minute remaining in the game, when Furman scored on a 16-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Darren Grainger to Ryan DeLuca.

Clemson kicker Greg Huegel recorded 11 points in his return from a knee injury, connecting on two field goals (including a career-high-tying 49-yarder) and five of the team's six PATs on the day.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — No. 2 Clemson hung on through a back-and-forth second half for a 28-26 victory over the Texas A&M Aggies at Kyle Field.

Texas A&M still got on the board first, when kicker Daniel LaCamera hit a 40-yarder to give his squad a 3-0 lead 10 minutes into the game. However, the Tigers answered on the ensuing drive, with Bryant scoring on a one-yard run.

Clemson upped its lead to 14-3 with less than a minute gone in the second quarter, when Tee Higgins hauled in a 64-yard touchdown pass from Trevor Lawrence on the freshman quarterback's first play of the night behind center. The Clemson defense blocked a Texas A&M 50-yard field goal attempt with just over five minutes left in the first half to take a 14-3 lead into the break.

Clemson led 21-6 following an eight-yard Bryant scoring pass to Diondre Overton, but the teams traded touchdowns to enter the fourth quarter at 28-13 in favor of Clemson. The rest of the game saw Texas A&M bookend the fourth quarter with a pair of touchdowns, with the latter one coming with just 46 seconds remaining in the matchup and cutting the Clemson lead to just two points. However, safety K'Von Wallace intercepted the Aggie two-point conversion attempt and wide receiver Hunter Renfrow recovered an onside kick attempt to secure the 28-26 victory in front of the largest crowd ever to witness a game in Clemson history.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 2 Clemson improved to 3-0 with a 38-7 win against the Georgia Southern Eagles at Memorial Stadium. The game was played in front of an announced crowd of 79,844 people despite kickoff being moved up three-and-a-half hours because of complications with Hurricane Florence in the mid-Atlantic region.

The teams played to a scoreless tie in the first quarter, as Clemson drives of eight plays, 13 plays and five plays ended in an interception, missed field goal and fumble, respectively. However, Clemson's offense got going in the second quarter, with a pair of one-yard touchdown runs by Travis Etienne and Tavien Feaster bookending a 57-yard touchdown pass from Trevor Lawrence to Justyn Ross to give Clemson a 21-0 lead at halftime.

Clemson added a 37-yard field goal and surrendered its only touchdown in the third quarter before touchdown runs by Etienne (40 yards) and Adam Choice (10 yards) pushed the final score to 38-7.

Etienne finished the contest with a career-high 163 yards on 16 carries. The Clemson offense totaled a season-high 595 yards, including 309 rushing yards and 286 passing yards.

Clemson's offensive balance was on display, as the Tigers rushed for 309 yards and threw for 286 yards. It marked the 36th time that Clemson had gained 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, with the Tigers remaining undefeated in such contests.

ATLANTA — No. 3/2 Clemson opened 2018 ACC play with a 49-21 win over the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta. The win marked Clemson's fourth straight victory over Georgia Tech for just the third time in program history.

Offensively, Clemson was powered by Trevor Lawrence and his receiving corps, as the freshman quarterback completed 13-18 passes for 176 yards and four touchdowns to four different receivers. The Tiger defense did not allow a Yellow Jacket pass completion until late in the third quarter.

The Tigers scored the only points of the first quarter when Clelin Ferrell recovered a Yellow Jacket fumble in the endzone to give Clemson a 7-0 advantage. The second quarter saw Clemson score three times, with all three coming in the form of passing touchdowns by Lawrence.

Georgia Tech got on the board with just two minutes left in the opening half on an 11-yard rush by TaQuon Marshall. However, Clemson quickly got the score back on its third touchdown of the quarter, a three-yard pass from Lawrence to Travis Etienne, who pushed his way into the endzone in the final seconds of the half to bring the score to 28-7 at the break.

Clemson scored three times during the second half, with two coming courtesy of Tavien Feaster and Etienne on the ground, and the third when Tee Higgins hauled in a 30-yard scoring pass from Lawrence.

CLEMSON, S.C. — A Travis Etienne two-yard rushing score with 41 seconds remaining in the game proved to be the difference in the No. 3/2 Clemson's 27-23 win over the previously undefeated Syracuse Orange at Memorial Stadium.

Etienne's touchdown was the culmination of a 13-play, 94-yard drive led by redshirt freshman Chase Brice, who entered the game after quarterback Trevor Lawrence left with an injury in the second quarter. It was the longest drive authored by Clemson for a game-winning touchdown in the final minute in records dating back to 1958. It also came as part of Etienne's career-high 203-yard day on 27 carries with three rushing touchdowns.

After trailing 16-7 at the break on the strength of three field goals by Syracuse's Andre Szmyt and a touchdown run by Syracuse quarterback Eric Dungey, Clemson overcame a halftime deficit in a win for the first time since overcoming a 27-17 halftime deficit in a 38-31 win against NC State on Nov. 4, 2017. The Tigers also recorded their first victory when trailing after three quarters, Clemson's first since the National Championship game against Alabama during the 2016 season in which Clemson overcame a 24-14 fourth-quarter deficit in a 35-31 win.

The game marked only the fourth time in Memorial Stadium history that two undefeated teams had met four or more games into a season.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — Travis Etienne, Lyn-J Dixon and Adam Choice all eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark as the No. 4/4 Clemson Tigers amassed 698 total offensive yards en route to a 63-3 defeat of the Wake Forest Demon Deacons at BB&T Field.

Between Etienne, Dixon, Choice and three other rushers, Clemson ran for 471 yards, the team's most in a single game under head coach Dabo Swinney. Through the air, a balanced effort quarterbacked by Trevor Lawrence powered the Tigers. Lawrence completed 18 of his 21 pass attempts in the first half alone, connecting with nine different receivers to amass 173 yards and two touchdowns in the first 30 minutes.

The Tigers held a 7-0 advantage at the end of the first quarter courtesy of a 59-yard scoring run by Etienne. It was the first of six touchdowns of 50 yards or more by Clemson during the contest, including two by Etienne, two by Dixon, one by Choice and one by receiver Justyn Ross.

Clemson's 60-point win marked the largest margin of victory in an ACC game in school history. It also represented the second straight ACC road game in which Clemson played all 72 dressed players. Four different players appeared at quarterback for the Tigers, including starter Trevor Lawrence, quarterbacks Chase Brice and Ben Batson and wide receiver Hunter Renfrow.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 3 Clemson emerged victorious in a battle of unbeaten teams at Memorial Stadium, defeating the No. 16/15 NC State Wolfpack by a score of 41-7.

Offensively, Clemson was powered by Trevor Lawrence, who was 26-39 for 308 yards and one touchdown. Travis Etienne rushed for three touchdowns for the third straight game, a school first. The Tiger defense, led by Isaiah Simmons' 11 total tackles, held a Wolfpack offense that had been averaging 33 points per game to just the seven points.

The Tigers turned a 14-0 first quarter lead into a 24-0 halftime advantage after converting a Dexter Lawrence fumble recovery into an Etienne touchdown run and a K'Von Wallace interception into a Greg Huegel field goal.

The third quarter scoring opened with just under four minutes left in it, when Etienne ran for his third touchdown of the day, a one-yard rush that put the Tigers up 31-0. The Wolfpack got on the board on the first play of the fourth quarter, when a Reggie Gallaspy Jr. nine-yard rush cut the Tigers' lead to 31-7.

Huegel hit his second field goal of the day and 50th of his career, a 27-yarder, a few minutes later. A two-yard rushing touchdown for Lyn-J Dixon with eight minutes left in the game rounded out the scoring, bringing the final score to 41-7, tied for the second-largest margin of victory over an AP Top 25 team in school history.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Freshman Trevor Lawrence threw for four touchdowns as No. 2 Clemson rolled to a 59-10 victory over Florida State.

Lawrence finished the game with a career-high 314 passing yards, connecting on 20-37 passes. The receiving duo of Amari Rodgers and Tee Higgins combined for four touchdowns and 218 yards, including a career-high 165 receiving yards by Rodgers. On the other side of the ball, the Clemson defense forced seven three-and-outs by Florida State and totaled 14 tackles for loss, including five sacks.

Clemson took a 14-0 lead on touchdown passes of seven and three yards from Lawrence to Higgins. Linebacker Tre Lamar later returned an interception 43 yards to set up a touchdown run by defensive tackle Christian Wilkins. Garrett Williams also scored on a two-yard touchdown run late in the first half.

It was the Amari Rodgers show in the third quarter as the sophomore recorded receiving touchdowns of 58 and 68 yards, respectively. A field goal by B.T. Potter and a five-yard connection from Chase Brice to T.J. Chase made the score 52-3 in Clemson's favor entering the fourth quarter.

In the fourth quarter, Adam Choice became the third Tiger — but first running back — to rush for a touchdown on the day, punching the ball into the end zone on a 15-yard run. A late FSU score brought the final to 59-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 2/2 Clemson produced a season-high 77 points as the Tigers handled the Louisville Cardinals in a 77-16 win at Memorial Stadium. The 61-point margin of victory was the Tigers' largest in school history in conference play, surpassing a 60-point win at Wake Forest earlier in the season.

The run game powered Clemson offensively, accounting for 492 of its 661 total yards, as Travis Etienne, Lyn-J Dixon and Tavien Feaster each eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark. On the defensive side of the ball, Kendall Joseph led the Tigers with 10 total tackles and 1.5 of Clemson's six sacks. Isaiah Simmons and Tanner Muse each intercepted a Cardinal pass, and Simmons returned his for a pick-six.

Ten different players accounted for Clemson's 11 touchdowns on the day. Clemson averaged a school-record 11.6 yards per play, breaking a record that had stood since 1903 (11.2 vs. Georgia Tech). Clemson also set a school record in yards per carry for the second time in 2018. The Tigers rushed for 13.3 yards per carry, surpassing the program record of 11.8, set earlier in the season at Wake Forest.

On his 19th snap of the game, left tackle Mitch Hyatt broke the Clemson record for career snaps from scrimmage, held previously by center Dalton Freeman.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. — No. 2 Clemson clinched the ACC Atlantic Division crown for the fourth consecutive season, defeating the No. 17/14 Boston College Eagles, 27-7.

Hunter Renfrow led the receiving corps with 80 yards on eight catches, both season highs. Defensively, the Tigers held the Boston College offense to just 113 yards, including holding the Eagles 216 yards below their season rushing average.

Clemson opened the scoring on a 30-yard Greg Huegel field goal just under three minutes into the matchup, and it was Boston College that scored next when Michael Walker returned a Tiger punt 74 yards for a score. However, Lawrence connected with Milan Richard on a fourth-and-goal play to retake the lead for the Tigers before the quarter expired.

The second and third quarters saw Clemson add 10 points to its lead, with Huegel hitting his second field goal of the night, a 23-yarder, just over three minutes into the second quarter, and Lawrence finding the endzone with his feet on a six-yard touchdown run just over three minutes into the third quarter.

The Tigers took a 27-7 lead on an Amari Rodgers 53-yard punt return score with 11 minutes remaining in the game. With Rodgers answering Walker's punt return for touchdown earlier in the contest, the game marked the first time in Clemson history that both teams had returned a punt for a touchdown in a single game.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson completed its seventh undefeated regular season in school history by defeating South Carolina, 56-35, on a cold and foggy night at Memorial Stadium.

The Tigers posted a season-high 744 yards of offense against the Gamecocks, the third-highest total in school history. The teams combined for 1,344 yards, the second-largest combined yardage total in Clemson history behind the 1,351 yards combined for by Clemson and NC State in 2012. Clemson recorded a season-high 38 first downs, the second-most in school history and only two shy of the school record of 40 set against South Carolina in 2016.

Trevor Lawrence amassed a career-high 393 passing yards on 27 completions in 36 attempts and helped engineer touchdown drives of 95, 97 and 98 yards among others. His top target was Tee Higgins, who totaled 142 yards with a score in six receptions.

On the ground, Travis Etienne added 150 yards and two touchdowns on 28 carries, and Adam Choice ran for three scores in just seven carries. Defensively, J.D. Davis hauled in his first career interception.

The game marked Clemson's first time posting both 300 passing yards and 300 rushing yards against South Carolina in series history. The victory was also Clemson's 100th of the decade, making the Tigers one of three FBS programs with 100 wins in the 2010s.
