CLEMSON TO FACE CHARLOTTE FOR THE FIRST TIME IN SCHOOL HISTORY

Top-ranked Clemson will return home for its third home game in the first four weeks of the season on Saturday, Sept. 21, when the team hosts the Charlotte 49ers. Kickoff at Memorial Stadium is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. ET.

In the midst of the 150th season of college football, Saturday's contest will be Clemson's 150th game under the leadership of Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Swinney's 149 career games as head coach are the second-most in school history, trailing the 295 games coached by College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard across the 1940-69 seasons.

With a 119-30 career record, Swinney enters the contest with a career winning percentage of .799, the 17th-best winning percentage of any coach in major college football history with at least 10 years of experience. Swinney passed Bob Stoops (.798) with Clemson's victory at Syracuse last week. With a win this week, Swinney can improve his career winning percentage to .800 and become the 17th coach (minimum 10 seasons in major college football) to reach that career mark all-time.

Swinney's impact at Clemson, however, has not been confined to the win column. Last week, Swinney was named honorary head coach of the 2019 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team for his leadership in the community and his commitment to giving back. Along with his wife, Kathleen, Swinney and Dabo's All-In Team Foundation have given back nearly \$5 million to programs and initiatives throughout South Carolina since 2009.

Clemson is in the midst of a school-record 18-game winning streak dating to the 2018 season opener.

Clemson's domination in that span has been powered in part at the line of scrimmage, where Clemson holds a 68-19 edge over opponents in sacks in that time frame. Clemson's +49 margin in sacks since 2018 is by far the top differential in the country, as no other program can boast a sack differential greater than +33 since 2018.

Three items of note in 280 characters or less:

🔥 In the midst of a nation-wide "CFB150" celebration of college football's 150th season, @ClemsonFB will celebrate a 150 milestone of its own on Saturday, as Dabo Swinney will become only the second person in school history to serve as head coach for the Tigers in 150 games.

🔥 Three games into 2019, Clemson has already recorded two 600-yard games offensively. Clemson's single-season school record for 600-yard games is three, set in the 2012, 2017 and 2018 seasons. Clemson's eight 600-yard games since 2017 are tied for fourth-most in the country.

🔥 Clemson hammered Syracuse to the tune of 15 tackles for loss and eight sacks last week. It was Clemson's 11th consecutive multi-sack game, as no team has held Clemson to one sack or fewer since Oct. 20, 2018 (one vs. NC State).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to win its 19th consecutive game, dating to the start of the 2018 season, to extend the longest winning streak in school history and second-longest winning streak in ACC history.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 12-2 all-time in games as the AP No. 1-ranked team. Twelve of Clemson's 13 games played at No. 1 all-time entering Saturday have come during the Dabo Swinney era.

- Clemson entering the week as the only team in the country with three wins against Power Five conference opponents to its credit.

- Clemson attempting to win a 14th consecutive game by 14 points or more, which would tie for the third-longest streak in the AP Poll era (since 1936).

- Clemson attempting to win its 18th consecutive game at Memorial Stadium, dating back to a 56-7 win against South Carolina on Nov. 25, 2016. The current 17-game streak is the second-longest home winning streak in Clemson history, trailing only a 21-game Memorial Stadium winning streak from 2013-16.

- Clemson facing Charlotte for the first time in program history.

- Clemson facing an opponent for the first time for a third straight season, joining the team's debut against Kent State in a 56-3 win in 2017 and Clemson's 38-7 victory against Georgia Southern in 2018. Prior to this three-year run of new opponents, Clemson had most recently faced a new opponent in 2014, facing both Louisville and Georgia State for the first time and earning victories in both contests.

- Clemson facing its 105th different opponent in program history. Clemson is 62-38-4 all-time in its first meeting with its 104 existing opponents, including a 13-1 mark in first meetings since 2003.

- Clemson attempting to extend its non-conference home winning streak to 20 games. The active 19-game streak is already the longest in school history.

- Clemson attempting to tie its longest unbeaten streak in non-conference home games in school history, trailing a 20-game unbeaten streak from 1978-84 that included 18 wins and two ties.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney coaching his 150th game as head coach of the Tigers, joining Frank Howard (295) as the only head coaches to lead Clemson in 150 career games.

- Swinney attempting to push his all-time record in non-conference play as a head coach to 44-13, which would extend his non-conference record in regular season play to 35-8.

- Swinney attempting to improve to 30-3 all-time in non-conference home games.

- Clemson attempting to win its 21st consecutive regular season non-conference game. Clemson's current 20-game streak against non-conference opponents in the regular season dates to a 73-7 win against South Carolina State on Sept. 6, 2014. No member of Clemson's current roster has lost a non-conference game in regular season play.

- Clemson attempting to push its winning streak in Saturday games to 33 to extend the longest Saturday winning streak in school history. Clemson's current 32-game run of consecutive Saturday victories is the longest active streak in the country.

- Clemson attempting to win its 21st consecutive game in the month of September, dating back to 2014. The current streak is already the longest in school history.

- Clemson attempting to record 600 yards of offense for a third time this season to match the 2012, 2017 and 2018 squads for the most in a single season in school history.

- Clemson attempting to post 600 yards of offense in back-to-back contests for the first time in school history.

- Clemson attempting to score 40 points in back-to-back games for the first time since the South Carolina and Pitt games in 2018.

- Clemson attempting to add to its active 18-game streak of scoring 24 or more points, already a school record. Clemson has recorded double-digit streaks of 24-point games twice in school history (18 from 2018-19, 15 from 2016-17).

- Clemson attempting to hold opponents to single digits in points in back-to-back games for the first time since the Boston College and Duke games last season.

- Clemson attempting to intercept a pass in an eighth straight game for the first time since a nine-game interception streak across the first nine games of the 2016 season.

- Clemson attempting to produce two 100-yard receivers in consecutive games for the first time since 2016, when Deon Cain and Mike Williams reached the 100-yard mark against Syracuse and Williams and Artavis Scott did so a week later against Pitt.

- Clemson following up a 15-tackle-for-loss performance against Syracuse in search of multiple 15-tackle-for-loss games in a single season for only the third time in school history (1996 and 2004). Clemson has never accomplished the feat in back-to-back games.

- Clemson coming off of an eight-sack performance against Syracuse and attempting to record eight sacks in multiple games in a single season for only the second time in school history (vs. Furman and Maryland in 1996).

- Clemson attempting to record multiple sacks in a 12th consecutive game for the first time since Games 3-14 of the 2016 season. It would be Clemson's sixth multi-sack streak of 12 games or more since 1980 (18 from 1991-92, 17 from 1998-99, 15 from 2012-13, 14 from 2000-01, 12 in 2016).

- Running back Travis Etienne attempting to reach 200 rushing yards in a game for the third time in his career to break the school record for career 200-yard rushing games (two each by Ray Yauger, 1967-69; Terrence Flagler, 1982-86; Raymond Priester, 1994-97; Andre Ellington, 2009-12). Presently, Flagler is the only player in school history to post two 200-yard games in a single season, a feat Etienne can match with another 200-yard day in 2019.

- Etienne (2,758) chasing No. 9 Woodrow Dantzler (2,761), No. 8 Terry Allen (2,778) and No. 7 Kenny Flowers (2,914) on Clemson's all-time rushing yardage leaderboard.

- Etienne (2,758) needing 242 rushing yards to become the seventh player in school history to record 3,000 career rushing yards.

- Etienne (40) needing one rushing touchdown to tie or two touchdowns to pass Travis Zachery (41 from 1999-2001) for the second-most career rushing touchdowns in school history.

- Etienne (42) continuing to chase C.J. Spiller (51), Travis Zachery (50) and James Davis (49) on the school's all-time leaderboard for total touchdowns.

- Etienne (252) needing 10 points to pass kicker Chris Gardocki (261 from 1988-90) for ninth on Clemson's all-time scoring list. Etienne already ranks fourth on the list among non-kickers.

- Etienne attempting to average 10.0 yards per carry in a game on at least five attempts for the 11th time in his career to tie Colin Kaepernick for the most by any FBS player since 2000.

- Etienne (3,369) entering the week 200 all-purpose

yards shy of passing Artavis Scott (3,568) to enter the Top 10 in career all-purpose yards in school history.

- Wide receivers Tee Higgins and Amari Rodgers attempting to record back-to-back 100-yard receiving performances for the first time in their careers. The last Clemson player to record consecutive 100-yard receiving games was Justyn Ross in two College Football Playoff games last season.

- Higgins (15) needing one receiving touchdown to tie Terrance Roulhac (16 from 1983-86), Derrick Hamilton (16 from 2001-03) and Jacoby Ford (16 from 2006-09) for 10th in school history career touchdown receptions. Perry Tuttle ranks ninth with 17 from 1978-81.

- Higgins (91) entering the game nine receptions from reaching 100 career catches.

- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence attempting to add to his single-season career-high three rushing touchdowns. He would join Kelly Bryant (2017) as the only Clemson quarterbacks since 2000 to rush for a touchdown in each of the first four games of a season.

- Lawrence attempting to record consecutive 300-yard passing games for the third time in his career, joining his back-to-back 300-yard efforts against NC State and Florida State and in two College Football Playoff games.

- Lawrence (six) attempting to join Tajh Boyd (18), Deshaun Watson (13) and Charlie Whitehurst (eight) as the only players in school history to record at least seven career 300-yard passing games.

- Lawrence entering the game with 10 passing touchdowns of 50 yards or more in his career. With his next touchdown pass of 50-plus yards, he will break a tie with Deshaun Watson for sole possession of second-most by a Clemson quarterback since 1950. Tajh Boyd holds Clemson's top mark in that category since 1950 with 17.

- Lawrence (4,111) needing to throw for 249 yards to pass Steve Fuller (4,359) for ninth-most career passing yards in school history.

- Lawrence (494) throwing six passes to become the 12th player to attempt 500 career passes for Clemson all-time.

- Lawrence (318) needing 16 completions to pass Rodney Williams (333) for eighth on Clemson's all-time pass completions leaderboard.

- Lawrence (35) breaking a tie with Nealon Greene (35 from 1994-97) for the sixth-most passing touchdowns in school history with his next touchdown pass.

- Lawrence (4,343) needing 272 combined rushing and passing yards to pass Homer Jordan (4,614) and enter the Top 10 in career total offense in school history.

- Lawrence (39) chasing No. 10 Nealon Greene (43) and No. 9 Steve Fuller (44) on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for total touchdown responsibility.

- Rodgers attempting to catch two touchdown passes in back-to-back games for the first time in his career. He would be the first Clemson player to do it since Deon Cain against Boston College and Louisville in 2016.

- Linebacker Isaiah Simmons attempting to become the first Clemson player with back-to-back games with at least 2.0 sacks since Clelin Ferrell in the second and third games of the 2018 season.

- Defensive end Xavier Thomas attempting to record at least half a sack in a fourth consecutive contest for the first time in his career.

SERIES HISTORY VS. CHARLOTTE

As a nod to play-by-play announcers of a previous era, former Dallas Stars broadcaster Ralph Strangis used to proclaim in scoreless games, "The score? There is no score."

The series history of Clemson and Charlotte? There is

no series history of Clemson and Charlotte.

Those wishing to gain insight into the full series history of contests between Clemson and Charlotte will be able to witness it in person on Saturday, as the Sept. 21 contest will represent the schools' first all-time meeting.

CLEMSON VS. NEW OPPONENTS

The 2019 season and Clemson's debut against Charlotte marks the third straight year in which the Tigers will face an opponent for the first time in school history. In 2017, Clemson recorded a 56-3 victory in the school's first all-time meeting with Kent State. Last season, Clemson opened its all-time series with Georgia Southern with a 38-7 win.

Charlotte will be the 105th different opponent faced by Clemson all-time. Clemson holds a 62-38-4 all-time record when facing an opponent for the first time.

Clemson has won 13 of its last 14 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent, dating back to 2003. The team's lone debut loss in that time frame came against South Florida in the 2010 Meineke Car Care Bowl in Charlotte, N.C., the last game before Clemson embarked upon its active streak of eight consecutive 10-win seasons.

Included below is a list of Clemson's first meeting with all 104 opponents in school history in chronological order, with home games listed in **bold**.

AT HOME IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY

Clemson has been right at home in non-conference contests at Memorial Stadium in recent years, compiling victories in 19 straight non-conference home games. Clemson's active 19-game non-conference winning streak at home is the longest such winning streak in program history. Clemson has won those 16 games by an average score of 44-12, with 15 of the victories coming by margins of 14 points or more.

With a win this week, Clemson can tie its longest unbeaten streak (including ties) in non-conference home games in school history, matching a 20-game unbeaten streak from 1978-84 that saw ties against Boston College and Georgia interrupt winning streaks of 12 games, four games and two games.

Since joining the ACC as a charter member in 1953, Clemson is 121-32-4 at home against opponents from other conferences. That includes a 29-3 mark in non-conference games at Death Valley under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

SWINNEY VS. THE TAR HEEL STATE

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney has a 25-2 all-time record against all teams from North Carolina. That includes a 15-0 mark at Death Valley.

Swinney's only losses to teams from North Carolina were at North Carolina in 2010 (21-16) and at NC State in 2011 (37-13). He has won 20 games in a row against ACC teams from North Carolina. The Tigers have scored at least 40 points in 10 of those 20 and have scored at least 33 in 17 of those 20.

Though this game will be played in South Carolina, including four ACC Championship Game wins in Charlotte, Swinney is 12-2 in games played inside the state limits of North Carolina with 10 wins in a row.

POSTGAME NOTES VS. SYRACUSE

- Clemson won its 13th consecutive game by 14 points or more, which is now tied for the fifth-longest streak in the AP Poll era (since 1936).
- Clemson outgained Syracuse, 612-187. The 425-yard difference in total yardage represents the sixth time since 2017 that Clemson has outgained its opponent by at least 425 yards and the second time in that span it has done so against a Power Five opponent (+449 at Wake Forest in 2018).
- The 187 yards allowed by Clemson were the fewest gained by Syracuse since Nov. 29, 2014, when Boston College held Syracuse to 128 yards.
- Clemson allowed only 15 rushing yards, Clemson's third time holding an opponent to 15 yards or fewer on the ground in its last 11 games.
- Clemson posted 15 tackles for loss, tied for the fifth-most in a game in school history and the most under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. It was Clemson's most since recording 15 tackles for loss vs. Utah State on Oct. 16, 2004.
- Clemson recorded eight sacks, tied for the eighth-most sacks in a game in school history.
- Clemson's eight sacks surpassed its six sacks against Syracuse in 2017 for the most by Clemson in the eight-game series history between the two schools.
- Six of Clemson's eight sacks came in the first half, Clemson's most in a single half since a seven-sack second half against Auburn on Sept. 9, 2017.
- Clemson has now recorded multiple sacks in 11 straight games, dating to last season. It was Clemson's nation-leading 16th multi-sack game since 2018.
- Clemson did not allow a touchdown in the contest, Clemson's first time doing so since holding Notre Dame without a touchdown in the Cotton Bowl last season.
- Clemson's 612 yards of offense represented its second 600-yard game of the season (632 vs. Georgia Tech). Three games into the season, Clemson is already one 600-yard game away from matching the school record for 600-yard games in a single-season (three in 2012, 2017 and 2018).
- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence completed 22-of-39 passes for a career-high 395 yards with three passing touchdowns.
- Lawrence's 395 passing yards broke his previous career high of 393 against South Carolina in 2018 and represent the 11th-highest single game total in school history.
- Lawrence also rushed for 42 yards on four carries. His 42 yards matched his career-high rushing total, set against South Carolina in 2018.
- The 300-yard passing game was Lawrence's first of the season and the sixth of his career.
- On his fourth completion of the game, a 16-yard pass to Amari Rodgers, Lawrence became the 11th player in school history to record 300 career pass completions.
- During the contest, Lawrence became the 13th player in school history to reach the 4,000-yard career mark of total offense. He also became only the 10th player in school history to reach 4,000 career passing yards.
- On a one-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, Lawrence added to his single season career-high in rushing touchdowns (three) and joined Kelly Bryant (2017) as the only Clemson quarterbacks since 2000 to rush for a touchdown in each of the first three games of a season.
- Lawrence's third touchdown pass of the game,

- a seven-yard pass to Frank Ladson Jr., tied him with Nealson Greene (35 from 1994-97) for sixth-most career passing touchdowns in school history.
- Wide receiver Tee Higgins recorded seven receptions for 150 yards, all in the first half.
- The 100-yard receiving game was Higgins' first of the season and the fifth of his career. His most recent 100-yard game prior to Saturday was against South Carolina on Nov. 24, 2018.
- Higgins' 150 yards through two quarters were the most first-half receiving yards by a Clemson player since Sammy Watkins' school-record 177-yard first half against Wake Forest on Oct. 25, 2012.
- Wide receiver Amari Rodgers caught four passes for 121 yards with a career-high-tying two touchdown catches.
- Rodgers caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from Lawrence in the first quarter. The touchdown was his first since a score against Louisville on Nov. 3, 2018. It was his fifth career receiving touchdown.
- With Rodgers opening the scoring, Clemson pushed its record to 41-0 when scoring first since 2015.
- Rodgers scored his second touchdown of the contest on an 87-yard reception in the third quarter. It was the longest career completion for Lawrence.
- Rodgers' 87-yard touchdown was Clemson's second-longest touchdown of the season, trailing a 90-yard run by Travis Etienne against Georgia Tech. The 2019 season now marks only the second time in which Clemson has scored multiple touchdowns from scrimmage of 85 yards or more in a single season (two in 2013).
- Rodgers' 87-yard touchdown was the second-longest by Clemson at Syracuse in school history, trailing a 91-yard pass from Tajh Boyd to Sammy Watkins in 2013, and longest overall since Boyd hit Watkins for 96 yards at Virginia on Nov. 2, 2013. Rodgers' reception ties for the fourth-longest pass play in school history.
- Higgins (150) and Rodgers (121) each tallied more than 100 receiving yards in the game, representing just the 12th such instance in school history and the second involving Higgins (178 with Deon Cain's 140 on Nov. 18, 2017).
- Running back Chez Mellusi recorded a 57-yard touchdown run on his lone carry of the game. It was his first career rushing touchdown.
- Linebacker Isaiah Simmons recorded a career-high two sacks among his 3.5 tackles for loss. Both sacks effectively ended Syracuse drives, as one came on a third down which led to a Syracuse punt and another came on fourth down.
- With 1.5 sacks in the contest, linebacker James Skalski pushed his season sack total to a career-high 2.5.
- Defensive end K.J. Henry recorded his first career pass breakup in the first quarter and his first career sack on a half-sack in the second quarter.
- Defensive end Xavier Thomas recorded a sack and has now posted at least a half-sack in three straight games for the first time in his career.
- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis recorded the first full sack of his career in the second quarter. He posted a half-sack in the season opener against Georgia Tech.
- Linebacker Chad Smith recorded his first sack of the season in the third quarter, his first sack since Nov. 3, 2018, against Louisville.
- Cornerback Mario Goodrich recorded his first career interception in the third quarter, one play following a Syracuse interception that gave the Orange the ball on the Clemson nine-yard line.
- With Goodrich's interception, Clemson has now intercepted a pass in seven straight games for the first

time since posting a nine-game interception streak across the first nine games of the 2016 season.

- Kicker B.T. Potter converted field goal attempts of 40 and 37 yards, his first career game with multiple field goals.

- In his 31st career game for Clemson, safety Nolan Turner made his first career start.

- The game was Syracuse's first sellout since its 1998 season opener against Tennessee. The two sellouts share a family connection, as the 1998 Tennessee Volunteers were quarterbacked by Tee Martin, whose son (Rodgers) scored Clemson's first touchdown on Saturday. That 1998 Tennessee squad went on to win the national championship.

- Captains for the contest were running back Travis Etienne, long snapper Patrick Phibbs, linebacker Chad Smith and safety K'Von Wallace.

WITH THE WIN

- Clemson won its 18th consecutive game, dating to the start of the 2018 season. It represents Clemson's all-time longest winning streak, surpassing a 17-game streak across the final three games of the 2014 season and the first 14 games in 2015.

- Clemson's 18-game winning streak now stands in sole-possession of the second-longest streak in ACC history.

- Clemson won its eighth straight true road game and did so in the location of its most recent road loss (2017 at Syracuse). It represents Clemson's fourth road winning streak of eight games or more all-time, joining eight-game streaks from 1947-48 and 1978-79 as well as the school-record 12-game streak from 2015-17.

- Clemson earned its 20th victory in its last 21 true road games and its 33rd victory in its last 36 games away from home, including neutral sites.

- Clemson won its 13th consecutive ACC regular season game, the third such streak in school history, joining streaks of 20 from 1981-84 and 14 from 2015-16 (Note: Clemson also won 13 straight Southern Conference games from 1938-41 prior to the formation of the ACC). It marks Clemson's 15th straight victory against ACC opponents, including postseason play.

- Clemson earned its 100th win since the start of the 2011 season, the year that began Clemson's active eight-year streak of consecutive 10-win seasons.

- Clemson improved to 11-2 all-time in games as the AP No. 1-ranked team. Twelve of Clemson's 13 games played at No. 1 all-time have come during the Dabo Swinney era.

- Clemson improved to 6-2 all-time against Syracuse, including a 3-1 all-time record in games played at Syracuse.

- Clemson earned its fifth consecutive victory in a road opener dating back to 2015. Prior to the 2018 and 2019 seniors, the 1989 senior class had been the most recent Clemson group to win every road opener of its career. The five-game winning streak in road openers pulled Clemson within one of its school record of six, set across the 1984-89 seasons.

- Clemson won its first ACC road game of the year for a fifth straight season. Clemson's last loss in its first ACC road game of the year came at the hands of top-ranked Florida State in 2014.

- Clemson is now 41-25-1 all-time in its first conference road game of the season since the formation of the ACC in 1953.

- Clemson pushed its winning streak in Saturday games to 32 to extend the longest Saturday winning streak in school history. Clemson's current 32-game run of consecutive Saturday victories is the longest active streak in the country.

- Clemson won its 20th consecutive game in the month of September, dating back to 2014. The streak already stood as the longest in school history.

- Clemson led 17-6 at halftime and has now won 69 of its last 71 games when leading at halftime.

- Clemson led 27-6 entering the fourth quarter and improved to 90-2 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Clemson now has a 90-2 record when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011.

- Clemson is now 57-1 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson pushed its record to 43-0 when both passing and rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson pushed its streak of consecutive wins when holding teams under 23 points to 71 straight games (dating to 2010).

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney improved to 36-17 all-time in true road games, tying Danny Ford (36-15-1) for the second-most road wins in school history. Frank Howard holds the school record with 77 career road wins.

-- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

Clemson has a 100-15 record since starting its current stretch of 10-win seasons in 2011. Only Alabama (106-10) has more wins the last eight-plus years. The Tigers also have the second-highest winning percentage (.870) in that time frame.

10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson entered 2019 riding a streak of eight consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's eighth consecutive 10-win season in 2018 tied the Tigers with the 1985-92 Miami Hurricanes and the 2004-11 Virginia Tech Hokies for the fourth-longest streak in FBS history and made Clemson one of only six programs to accomplish the feat.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, set by Florida State (1987-2000). Alabama is the only other program with an active streak of at least eight straight 10-win seasons.

The Tigers have 15 10-win seasons in school history, with more than half coming in the last eight years under head coach Dabo Swinney. The 2018 season was Clemson's fifth with at least 12 wins, with Swinney sitting at the helm for four of them.

A CENTURY MARK FOR THE DECADE

Head Coach Dabo Swinney can vividly recall the looks he received when he said Clemson was on the cusp of the winningest decade in program history following a 2010 campaign in which the Tigers finished 6-7. In 2017, that vision became a reality with two seasons to spare when Clemson collected its 88th win of the decade in the ACC Championship Game against Miami (Fla.) to surpass the Tigers of the 1980s (87) for most wins in any decade in school history.

With a rivalry win against South Carolina to close the 2018 regular season, Clemson reached triple digits in wins in a decade for the first time in program history. Included below are the schools that have accomplished that feat.

Clemson has a 106-22 record in the decade of the 2010s. That computes to an .828 winning percentage, the best for any decade in school history and the first time Clemson has won more than 80 percent in a single decade.

In the 1980s, Clemson had a .767 winning percentage (87-25-4), the nation's fifth-best winning percentage. Clemson did not have a losing season in any year in the 1980s under Danny Ford, who coached every game in that decade. Dabo Swinney has coached every game in the decade of the 2010s and has eight winning seasons and one losing season (6-7 in 2010).

SENIORS CHASING HISTORY

The 2018 Clemson seniors left their legacy not only in program history but also in the annals of the sport, recording 55 wins to tie for the most wins by any senior class in FBS history.

Throughout the 2018 season, Head Coach Dabo Swinney reminded his players that anything Clemson had done once, they'd done again. The 2019 senior

class will have the opportunity for that maxim to once again ring true.

The 2019 Clemson seniors are 44-3 since 2016, tied with Alabama for the best mark in the country. The group can tie the 2018 seniors for the best four-year mark in school, conference and Football Bowl Subdivision history with 14 wins in 2019 and can own the record outright if it were to repeat with another 15-0 campaign.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers.

ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his decade-plus at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney enters this week with a winning percentage of .799, passing Bob Stoops (.798) for the 17th-best among any major college football head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of head coaching experience. Among the legends he has passed are College Football Hall of Famers Bo Schembechler (.775), Bear Bryant (.780) and Henry Williams (.785), as well as Nick Saban (.791), whose Crimson Tide were defeated by Swinney and the Tigers in the most recent College Football Playoff National Championship.

Swinney (119) is six wins away from reaching 125 career victories as a head coach. Presently, only 96 coaches in major college football history have reached that mark. Other active coaches in striking distance of joining that club this season include Mike Gundy (124), Kyle Whittingham (123) and Bronco Mendenhall (118). Swinney is two wins from matching the career total of Danny Ford, who won 121 combined games at Clemson (96) and Arkansas (25).

GAME NO. 150

In the 150-year anniversary season of college football, Head Coach Dabo Swinney will coach his 150th game as leader of the Clemson program on Saturday when Charlotte comes to Memorial Stadium.

He will become just the second Clemson coach to reach 150 career games. Frank Howard is the program leader with 295 games as Clemson's head coach from 1940-69. Danny Ford ranks third in games coached with 129 (96-29-4).

Swinney has a 119-30 record, so a victory on Saturday would give him an .800 winning percentage for his 12 years (11 full seasons) at Clemson. While Swinney stands to become the 17th coach with at least 10 years of experience to post a winning percentage of .800 or better, only eight coaches have coached at least 150 games at schools presently in the Football Bowl Subdivision while achieving that mark. Interestingly, Clemson holds a 4-0 combined all-time record against the top three coaches on the list.

Swinney also entered the season with a 69-16 record in ACC regular season games, a winning percentage of .812 that sat only .001 shy of College Football Hall of Famer Bobby Bowden's conference record of .813. Swinney passed Bowden in career winning percentage in ACC regular season play during Clemson's 52-14 win against Georgia Tech in the season opener.

EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

Clemson has equaled or exceeded its postseason AP and USA Today rankings in comparison to its preseason rankings each of the last eight years. That included quite an accomplishment in both 2016 and 2018, as it finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking both times.

Clemson exceeded its preseason ranking each of the last eight years in the coaches poll, a streak that will come to an end in 2019 by simple virtue of Clemson opening the season atop the 2019 poll.

With regard to Associated Press voting, Clemson has exceeded its preseason ranking in the AP poll in seven of the last eight years. The lone exception came in 2013, when Clemson was picked No. 8 in the AP preseason poll and finished No. 8.

CHAMPIONSHIP HERITAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. Clemson surpassed its previous record 17-game winning streak from 2014-15 for sole possession of the longest streak in school history with a 41-6 win against Syracuse on Sept. 14.

The current streak marks the third time Dabo Swinney has had a winning streak of at least 10 games. Danny Ford had three separate streaks of at least 10 games, including a 13-game streak from 1980 through the last game of the 1981 season.

Frank Howard had a 15-game winning streak from 1947-49 and was part of a 13-game streak from 1939-40. The school's first 10-game winning streak took place under Walter Riggs and John Heisman from 1899 to 1901.

20-POINT WINS & 14-POINT WINS

Observers will often point to Clemson's 27-23 come-from-behind victory against Syracuse in late September of 2018 as a turning point in the team's 15-0 national championship season. Following that win, in which redshirt freshman Chase Brice led the team to victory after starting the week as the squad's third-team quarterback, Clemson won 11 straight games by at least 20 points. Per ESPN Stats & Info, Clemson's 11-game streak of 20-point wins across the 2018-19 seasons was one game shy of the 2018 Alabama Crimson Tide for the longest streak of 20-point wins in the AP Poll era (since 1936).

POLL STREAKS

Clemson has been ranked in the top 25 of 72 consecutive AP polls dating to the 2014 season, the third-longest active streak in the nation. That includes a streak of 63 straight top-10 rankings, tied for first in the country with Alabama.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy's only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

YOUTH MOVEMENT

One year after Clemson returned a school-record 61 lettermen for the 2018 season, Clemson enters the 2019 campaign with a roster that includes 80 freshmen and sophomores.

However, despite the roster featuring the largest freshman class in Dabo Swinney's tenure at Clemson, the Tigers' youth is not devoid of experience. Last season, the first year of new redshirt regulations allowed Clemson to play a then-school-record 20 true freshmen in 2018. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest.

Clemson opened the 2019 season with another explosive performance in a 52-14 win against Georgia Tech. The Tigers racked up 632 yards of offense on only 79, averaging 8.0 yards per play even despite a methodical 11-play, 42-yard clock-killing drive to conclude the game. Clemson amassed 411 of those yards on 49 carries, a rushing average of 8.4 yards. It was Clemson's fourth game with a yards per carry average of eight yards or better since the start of the 2018 season, tied for the most in the FBS.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Since the start of the 2018 postseason, Clemson's offense and defense have both been dominant in possessions starting following turnovers. Since the 2018 ACC Championship Game, the Tigers hold a 76-7 advantage against opponents in points off turnovers, with the only points coming in the final seconds of an eventual 14-point win against Texas A&M.

The respect for Clemson players among the conference's media was illustrated again during ACC Kickoff in July, when Clemson players comprised 13 of the 27 players on the 2019 Preseason All-ACC squad, while no other program exceeded four.

RETURNING FIREPOWER

Clemson's eye-popping, record-setting offensive campaign in 2018 was authored at the skill positions in large part by underclassmen. The group was led in passing by true freshman Trevor Lawrence (3,280 yards), in rushing by sophomore Travis Etienne (1,658) and in receiving by sophomore Tee Higgins (59 receptions, 12 touchdowns) and freshman Justyn Ross (1,000 receiving yards).

Clemson was one of only three FBS programs to produce a 3,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver in 2018 and one of only 20 teams (including only nine Power Five teams) to accomplish the feat this decade. If Clemson repeats the feat, it would become the first program this decade to produce a player in all three categories in back-to-back seasons.

Clemson is the first Power Five program this decade to return a 3,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver from the year before. The only other FBS program to return such a trio was Western Michigan after the 2014 season.

As noted by ESPN, the 2019 Tigers are the first team to return its leading passer, rusher and receiver from a national championship squad since 2010, when Alabama returned leading passer Greg McElroy, leading rusher Mark Ingram and leading receiver Julio Jones from its 2009 championship squad.

-- NO. 16 QB TREVOR LAWRENCE --

300-YARD GAMES

Clemson's balance and its willingness to take what defenses offer on the ground or through the air sometimes limits opportunities for quarterback Trevor Lawrence to accrue some of the passing numbers put up around the country. But even playing in an offense that values balance, Lawrence has still been able to light up defenses in his young career.

Lawrence posted five 300-yard games in his freshman campaign in 2018, including 300-yard efforts in both College Football Playoff games. He posted his sixth career 300-yard game in Week 3 of the 2019 season, throwing for a career-high 395 yards in a win at Syracuse.

UNPRECEDENTED DEBUT

In a June article examining the statistical context of Lawrence's freshman campaign, 247Sports' Chris Hummer noted, "there is no historical comparison for what Lawrence accomplished as a freshman."

In 2018, despite not starting four games, Lawrence posted the 10th season of 3,000 passing yards, 30-plus passing touchdowns, five or fewer interceptions and a 65.0 or better completion percentage by an FBS quarterback since 2000. It was only the fifth such season by a Power Five quarterback in the time frame,

and the first by a freshman.

INTERCEPTION AVOIDANCE

The ascendance of Lawrence was key in Clemson's record-setting explosiveness in 2018. But often lost amid the barrage of big plays was Lawrence's ability to keep the ball in Clemson's hands.

Lawrence set a single-season Clemson record by closing the 2018 season with 169 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Lawrence threw an interception on his 13th pass attempt of the season opener against Georgia Tech, ending a streak of 182 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Lawrence's streak ended five attempts shy of the school record held by Tajh Boyd (187, 2012-13).

While mild panic has emerged from national observers about Lawrence's five interceptions thus far in 2019, Lawrence still holds Clemson's career interception rate record and is the only quarterback in school history with at least 100 passing attempts to throw an interception on fewer than two percent of his passes.

200-YARD RUSHING GAMES

Travis Etienne wasted no time rewriting history in 2019. He recorded a career-high 205 yards in the season opener against Georgia Tech, the 17th 200-yard rushing game in Clemson history. It was Etienne's second career 200-yard day, tying him with Ray Yauger, Terrence Flagler, Raymond Priester and Andre Ellington for the most in school history.

Etienne's 12 carries were the fewest by any Clemson player in the midst of a 200-yard performance, undercutting Buck George's 15 attempts in Clemson's first individual 200-yard rushing day in school history in 1952.

100-YARD RUSHING GAMES

Etienne posted his first career 100-yard rushing performance in Clemson's third game of the season in 2018, rushing for 162 yards in a victory against Georgia Southern. It was his first of eight 100-yard rushing games that season, one shy of Wayne Gallman's single-season school record of nine from 2015.

With nine career 100-yard rushing performances, Etienne needs three more 100-yard rushing games to enter the Top 5 in school history in the category. He currently sits eight games shy of Gallman's school career record of 17 from 2014-16.

DOING MORE WITH LESS

Etienne posted school records in rushing yards (1,658) and rushing touchdowns (24) in 2018 despite recording only 204 carries. His record-setting campaign in 2018 resulted in his selection as a Doak Walker Award finalist, as he joined C.J. Spiller (2009) as only the players in Clemson history to be named as a finalist for the honor.

The award eventually went to Wisconsin's Jonathan Taylor, who turned in a superb season of his own with 2,194 yards and 16 touchdowns on 307 attempts. Taylor averaged 7.15 yards per carry and averaged a touchdown every 19.1 carries; on 104 fewer carries, Etienne averaged 8.13 yards per carry and a touchdown every 8.5 carries.

If Etienne had received the same number of carries as Taylor and maintained his per-carry averages for rushing yards and rushing touchdowns, the resulting pace would total 2,495 yards and 36 rushing touchdowns, higher totals than every Heisman running back since Barry Sanders in 1988.

10.0+ PER CARRY

Etienne's explosive 2019 season opener resulted in an average of 17.1 yards per carry against Georgia Tech, the second-best single-game average of his career (19.1 vs. Louisville in 2018).

The game marked the 10th time in Etienne's career that he averaged at least 10 yards per carry in a game with

at least five rushing attempts. His 10 qualifying games tied him with Wisconsin's Melvin Gordon and Maryland's Ty Johnson for the second-most such performances by any player since the turn of the century. Another game with 10 yards per carry on five or more attempts would tie him with Colin Kaepernick for the most by any FBS player since 2000.

ETIENNE VS. THE NATION

Since becoming Clemson's starting running back entering the 2018 season, Etienne has accrued 1,992 rushing yards and a national-best 27 rushing touchdowns. In that time frame, Etienne has single-handedly outrushed 21 FBS programs, including eight Power Five schools.

TOUCHDOWN STREAKS

Running back Travis Etienne concluded the 2018 season having scored at least one rushing touchdown in each of Clemson's final five games of the season. He totaled nine rushing touchdowns (plus one receiving touchdown) in those final five contests. He opened the 2019 season with a career-high-tying three-touchdown performance.

Etienne accounts for two of the eight-longest streaks of consecutive games with a rushing touchdown in school history.

COMEBACK KID

Since his arrival at Clemson in 2017, Amari Rodgers has been hailed by coaches and teammates as one of the program's hardest workers. The work ahead of Rodgers was substantial on March 25 this season, when the junior wide receiver from Knoxville, Tenn., tore his ACL during spring practice.

Rodgers attacked his rehab with his trademark work ethic, returning to action 166 days later in Clemson's Week 2 game against Texas A&M, receiving a thunderous roar from Death Valley following his first reception.

A week later, Rodgers re-announced his presence nationally, catching four passes for 121 yards with two receiving touchdowns in a 41-6 prime-time win at Syracuse. His performance included touchdown receptions of 16 and 87 yards, the latter of which tied for the fourth-longest pass play in program history.

Rodgers' performance at Syracuse came with an odd historical parallel. The game was the first sellout at Syracuse since 1998, when Rodgers' father, Tee Martin, quarterbacked Tennessee to a win at Syracuse at the beginning of a national championship season.

TOUCHDOWN STREAK

While teammate Justyn Ross led Clemson with 1,000 receiving yards in 2018, no Clemson receiver found the end zone more than Tee Higgins. The Tennessee native recorded 12 receiving touchdowns, tied with two different seasons by Sammy Watkins for the second-most in a single season in school history.

Higgins is primed for an assault on some of the greats presently populating Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career receiving touchdowns. His 62-yard touchdown grab in the season opener was his 15th career touchdown reception, placing him one score outside the Top 10 in school history.

Higgins closed the 2018 campaign with at least one touchdown in each of Clemson's final four games. With a touchdown in the first game of 2019, he pushed his consecutive games streak to five, tied for the second-most in school history. He was six feet away from extending the streak to six in the second game of the season at Texas A&M, when he was brought down at the Texas A&M 2-yard line on a highlight-reel 29-yard reception.

-- OFFENSIVE LINE --

SACKS ALLOWED

Clemson is powered up front in 2019 by one of the most senior-laden offensive lines in school history. Alongside sophomore left tackle Jackson Carman, Clemson's line includes four senior starters in left guard John Simpson, center Sean Pollard, right guard Gage Cervenka and right tackle Tremayne Anchrum.

In the season opener, Clemson started four senior offensive linemen in a game for the first time since the 2011 South Carolina game, when Phillip Price, David Smith, Antoine McClain and Landon Walker started alongside junior Dalton Freeman. The last time Clemson had four senior starters on the offensive line for the majority of a season was 2007, when sophomore Thomas Austin was joined by seniors Barry Richardson, Chris McDuffie, Brandon Pilgrim and Christian Capote.

Dating back to last season, Clemson's offense has allowed only seven total sacks in its last 11 games, including holding teams to zero sacks in seven of those 11 contests.

Clemson's protection for quarterback Trevor Lawrence has taken on an almost-mythical quality, according to Syracuse Head Coach Dino Babers, whose own prolific defensive line was held without a sack against Clemson in 2019.

"[It's like] Game of Thrones. He's got a castle, he's got a moat, he's got some dragons. That dude's *protected*," Babers said prior to the contest.

-- DEFENSE --

NO-NAME NO MORE

The college football world became well-acquainted and familiar with the faces that populated Clemson's 2018 defensive line. In addition to producing four picks in the first four rounds of the 2019 NFL Draft, Clemson's 2018 defensive line featured some of the most gregarious names and faces in the sport in Christian Wilkins, Clelin Ferrell, Dexter Lawrence and Austin Bryant.

The average observer may not know the names and faces of Clemson's 2019 unit as well, but the unit has served notice of its arrival with an impressive start to the season. Included below is a quick collection of quotes from Dabo Swinney about each of Clemson's listed starters or co-starters on the defensive line:

- **DE Justin Foster:** "He's just an old salty dog. He's just steady. You can count on him. He's tough."

- **DE Xavier Thomas:** "Xavier Thomas, geez. That guy is a special talent, but he's got to be a down-in, down-out special player."

- **DE Logan Rudolph:** "Nobody's game planning for Logan Rudolph. Nobody knows who he is, but you will."

That guy is a *football player*."

- **DT Tyler Davis:** "It's not often you see a D-tackle show up and start. To see a guy start [as a true freshman] and really play at a high level... even though we've had that precedent here, that's still pretty unique."

- **DT Nyles Pinckney:** "He's a fourth-year guy and he looks that way. He just carries himself that way and has played some good football for us."

- **DT Jordan Williams:** "Tool-wise and ability-wise, he's got it all."

STOPPING THE RUN

Clemson held Texas A&M to 2.0 yards per carry on 27 carries in Week 2, the lowest yards-per-carry average allowed by Clemson since holding Boston College to 0.3 yards per carry on Nov. 10, 2018. A week after the Texas A&M game, Clemson then held Syracuse to 0.4 yards per carry in prime time.

The games represented the 18th and 19th times since 2014 that Clemson has held an opponent to 2.0 or fewer yards per carry, second-most in the country. Clemson is 18-1 in those contests.

POINTS PER POSSESSION

Since Brent Venables joined Clemson as defensive coordinator prior to the 2012 season, Clemson has allowed only 1.16 points per possession, the second-fewest country in that span. No program has given up fewer points per possession since 2018, as Clemson's 0.79 points allowed per possession since the start of last season makes Clemson the only program in the country to allow fewer than a full point per drive to opponents.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

In addition to Clemson's elite on-field performance in 2018, the squad simultaneously posted one of the best academic semesters in the program's history. The squad posted team records in average GPA and number of players earning a 3.0 or better, all while collecting the AFCA Academic Achievement Award for the first time in Clemson history.

In the spring of 2019, the NCAA announced APR metrics for the 2017-18 academic year as well as public recognition awards for the Top 10 percent of programs in each sport at every level. Clemson set a program record with a 992 APR for the 2017-18 academic year, third-best in the FBS, earning NCAA recognition for the eighth time in the last nine years.

Clemson is one of only 34 of the 130 FBS programs to earn at least one APR recognition since the 2009-10 academic year, one of only 28 to earn it multiple times, and one of only three programs to earn the award eight-plus times in that span.

ACC: WE DO THIS

Arguments about conference strength were once again en vogue during the 2019 offseason, with various pundits and commentators offering opinions on the state of the ACC and the national landscape.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney has repeatedly contended that the quality of Clemson's conference competition has been central to its postseason success.

"This league doesn't take a back seat to anyone. It's a very competitive league," Swinney said at ACC Kickoff in July. "At the end of the day, I think the credit goes to this conference; I think that's why we've been so successful in the postseason."

Entering the 2019 season, the ACC:

- Has won more football national titles than any other conference since 2013 (three of the last six).

- Has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in each of the past six years.

- Matched its league record with 11 bowl teams in 2018, including Boston College, Clemson, Duke, Georgia Tech, Miami, NC State, Pitt, Syracuse, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest. The 11 bowl teams tied for the most among any conference.

- Is the only conference to send every team to at least one bowl game over the last three seasons. In addition, the ACC is tied for the most bowl teams (32) among all conferences over the last three years (11 in 2016, 10 in 2017, 11 in 2018).

- Has produced 19 postseason wins since the 2016 season, the most of any conference.

Those facts aren't lost on Swinney, who has actively contested narratives questioning the ACC's strength.

"The rhetoric used to be, 'Well, an ACC team's never going to win the national championship because they don't play anybody. So when they get to the postseason and they've gotta play the big bad boys, they can't beat them,'" Swinney said. "Well, now we win, and [they say] the only reason we win is because we don't play anybody. So you can't have it both ways."

CLEMSON, S.C. – Behind a career-best 205 rushing yards from Travis Etienne, the No. 1/1 Clemson Tigers defeated the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets, 52-14, at Memorial Stadium on Aug. 29. Clemson rushed for 411 yards, its most in a season-opener since 1957 and the most allowed by Georgia Tech since 1975.

Quarterback Trevor Lawrence opened the scoring for the Tigers with a six-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Lawrence completed 13-of-23 pass attempts for 168 yards and one touchdown on the day and added three carries for 24 yards with the rushing touchdown.

Etienne found the end zone three times among his 12 attempts, including a career-long and school-record-tying 90-yard touchdown run in the opening quarter. It was the longest run by any player in Memorial Stadium history. His third and final score of the night came from 48 yards out in the opening minutes of the third quarter.

Tee Higgins finished with four catches for 98 yards, including a 62-yard touchdown from Lawrence with 4:34 to go in the first half to put Clemson ahead 28-0 after two quarters. Second-half touchdowns by Lyn-J Dixon and Frank Ladson Jr. and a 51-yard field goal by B.T. Potter completed the scoring for Clemson.

Clemson forced four turnovers, including interceptions by Tanner Muse and Denzel Johnson and fumble recoveries by Baylon Spector and Xavier Kelly. The four takeaways were Clemson's most since 2015 against Notre Dame. Isaiah Simmons led the defense with nine tackles.

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 1/1 Clemson extended its winning streak to 17 games, tying the school record set across the 2014-15 seasons, as the Tigers defeated the No. 12/11 Texas A&M Aggies inside a sold-out Memorial Stadium, 24-10.

Quarterback Trevor Lawrence completed 24-of-35 passes for 268 passing yards and one passing touchdown along with his second rushing touchdown of the season. Lyn-J Dixon led the ground attack, posting 79 yards on 11 attempts and one touchdown.

One year after Clemson's top-ranked scoring defense allowed 501 yards at Texas A&M, Clemson held Texas A&M to 289 total yards on Saturday. It included holding quarterback Kellen Mond to 236 passing yards (97 through three quarters) after Mond accounted for 430 yards in the team's meeting in 2018.

After a scoreless first quarter, Texas A&M opened the scoring on a 16-play drive that ended with a 32-yard field goal. But Clemson responded with three scoring drives to end the half. Lawrence connected with Justyn Ross for a 30-yard touchdown in the second quarter. After a 29-yard field goal by B.T. Potter, Lawrence rushed for his second touchdown of the season with 33 seconds remaining in the second quarter to push the lead to 14 at the break.

Dixon added a rushing touchdown in the second half to bring Clemson's point total to 24. Texas A&M's lone touchdown of the day came on a Jalen Wydermyer touchdown reception with only six seconds remaining, snapping a streak of 11 consecutive wins by 20 points or more, one shy of the most by any team in the AP Poll era (since 1936).

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — No. 1/1 Clemson set a new school record with its 18th consecutive victory, defeating the Syracuse Orange, 41-6, at The Dome in Clemson's first road test of the season. It was a charged atmosphere, representing the third-largest crowd in facility history and Syracuse's first home sellout since 1998.

Quarterback Trevor Lawrence completed 22-of-39 passes for a career-high 395 yards with three passing touchdowns. His 395 passing yards represented the 11th-highest single game total in school history.

Clemson had two receivers post 100-yard games. Tee Higgins recorded 150 yards on seven receptions, all in the first half, the most by a Tiger in a half since Sammy Watkins' school-record 177-yard first half against Wake Forest in 2012. Amari Rodgers added 121 yards on four catches, including touchdown receptions of 16 and 87 yards.

Clemson led throughout, with Rodgers opening the scoring. Twice, Clemson gifted Syracuse the ball inside Clemson's own 10-yard line following turnovers, but Clemson forced an interception and turnover on downs on the resulting possessions.

Despite the gaudy offensive numbers, the story of the game was Clemson's stout defense, which held Syracuse out of the end zone and helped Clemson outgain Syracuse, 612-187. Clemson finished with 15 tackles for loss, its most in the Dabo Swinney era, including eight sacks, tied for the eighth-most in a game in school history.
