SETTING THE SCENE BETWEEN THE TIGERS AND HOKIES

- The Clemson Tigers have opened the season with five-straight wins, including four against Power 5 opponents for the first time since 1934-35. Clemson will look to continue its defensive prowess against Virginia Tech.
- The contest will be televised on ACCN with Dave O'Brien and Chris Spatola calling the action, while Don Munson and Tim Bourret will call the action on the radio waves. The radio call will be available on the Clemson Tigers Network and Tunein.com.
- Live stats will be provided on ClemsonTigers.com and Twitter updates will be available on Clemson's official account (@ClemsonMBB).

CLEMSON BASKETBALL HEADLINES

- Clemson (KenPom: No. 19 overall, No. 2 adjusted defensive efficiency) is ranked fifth nationally in scoring defense (51.4 points per game), which is also tops in the ACC. Field goal percentage defense is ranked 12th nationally (34.9 percent) and ranks first in the ACC. Three-point field goal defense is 36th nationally and first in the ACC (26.1).
- Clemson stopped Alabama on 10-of-its-last-11 possessions and won the Holiday Hoopsgiving tilt with its defense. The Tigers finished on a 10-1 run in the 64-56 victory.
- "We Too Deep": The Tigers' bench has produced 25+ points in all five games (146 overall and 93 over last three).
- Aamir Simms earned Tournament MVP honors after scoring a game-high 24 points (8-13 FG) in the championship game against Purdue (11/26). Nick Honor also received All-Tournament Team recognition.
- Simms was named to the All-ACC Preseason First-Team, becoming Clemson's first since 2016 and second since 2018 to earn preseason league honors.
- Simms was named to the Karl Malone Watch List (Top 20 PF in the country) and became the first Tiger to earn recognition from the Basketball Hall of Fame's preseason award watch lists.
- Simms was named Third-Team All-ACC on March 9. It's Simms' first career ACC postseason accolade.
- Clemson boasted a Top-20 recruiting class in the country for 2020 with the additions of PJ Hall, Olivier-Maxence Prosper and Lynn Kidd. It marked the program's highest recruiting ranking since 2009, according to 247Sports.
- Jonathan Baehre and Clyde Trapp are both healthy after overcoming torn ACL's last year. Baehre re-tore his ACL in December 2019. Chase Hunter has overcome a foot injury that held him to just nine contests his freshman season.
- Nick Honor is eligible for the Tigers' in the backcourt after previously sitting out the 2019-20 season due to NCAA transfer rules. Honor has three seasons of eligibility left after playing his freshman year at Fordham. Honor spent last season on Clemson's scout team.

CLEMSON IN THE AP POLL

- After a 5-0 start to the 2020-21 campaign and four of those victories coming against Power 5 opponents propelled the Tigers into the AP Top 25 for the first time since Nov, 19 2018. The Tigers are ranked No. 24 in the newest AP Poll.
- Clemson was ranked No. 16 after a 5-0 start to the season, but surprisingly dropped out following a five-point loss to Creighton in the Cayman Islands Classic.
- From January 2018 until Nov. 2018, the Tigers had spent 14-straight weeks ranked in the Top 25, the third-longest streak in program history.
- The Tigers are one of two schools in the ACC that boasts a Top 25 basketball and football program.
- Clemson Football is ranked No. 4 in this week's poll. North Carolina football (No. 16) and basketball (No. 22) is the other school.
- The Tigers are one of five programs overall that share both a football and basketball program in the Top 25: Iowa, Ohio State, Texas and North Carolina.

STARTING A SEASON 5-0

- With the 64-56 win over Alabama, it marked the 24th time in Clemson history that the Tigers have started a season 5-0.
- However, it is the first time ever that four-of-those-first-five have come against Power 5 opponents.
- The Tigers posted three Power 5 victories in their first five wins in 1934-35 and 1996-97.

"WE TOO DEEP"

- This has been a common theme with the football program at Clemson in recent years, but the basketball Tigers are attempting their own version in 2020-21.
- Clemson has one of the deepest teams during the Brownell Era this season and will look to play as many as 12 players in most games.
- In a season opening tournament to start, the Tigers played as many as 12 in games against Mississippi State and Purdue.
- Clemson played 14 players in a 37-point win over SC State (Dec. 2).
- By far the most impressive was playing all 15 rostered players in a 16-point win over Maryland in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge (Dec. 9).
- Of the 15 that played, the Tigers had nine different scorers.
- With utilizing that depth, the Tigers have had 14 different scorers this season.
- Seven different players are averaging at least 5.0 points per game this season.
- The Tigers have produced 25+ bench points in five-straight games to start the season and 146 overall in those five games.
- Clemson has produced: 26 vs. Mississippi State, 28 vs. Purdue and 36 vs. SC State, 25 vs. Maryland and 31 against Alabama.
- That is the longest stretch of games during the Brownell Era that the bench has put together 25+ scoring outputs.
- Three consecutive games has happened just once during the Brownell Era and you need to go back to his first season at Clemson.
- The Tigers put together a similar string of games with 25+ points off the bench in December 2010.
- Dec. 19, 2010 vs. UNCG (27), Dec. 22, 2010 vs. College of Charleston (26) and Dec. 27, 2010 vs. Delaware State (26).
- The most bench points scored by a Brownell team at Clemson was 47 on January 1, 2013 against the Citadel.
- The most in a three-game stretch of games scored off the bench is 97 points: 34 vs. SC State (12/23/12); 47 vs. The Citadel (1/1/13); 16 vs. Florida State (1/5/13).
- The last three games for the Tigers, Clemson has scored 93 off the bench.

TIGERS ROLL TIDE IN ATLANTA

- Clemson's insufferable defense prevailed in a 64-56 win over Alabama in the Holiday Hoopsgiving event in Atlanta (Dec. 12).
- The Tigers made stops on 10-of-the-last-11 possessions for Alabama in the game for the eight point victory.
- Clemson limited Alabama to just 13.6 percent shooting from 3-point range (3-for-22).
- It marked just the fifth time since 2014-15 that Alabama had been held to that percentage or less from 3-point range in a game.
- Since 2010-11, Alabama has shot 13.6 percent or worse on just 18 occasions, which spans 340 total games.
- Of those 18 games, the 30.4 field goal percentage Clemson held Alabama to was the second-worst of that batch of games.
- The only game that Alabama shot worse from the field was 28.6 percent in a 49-37 loss at Auburn on Feb. 6, 2013.
- When you dissect it even more, on only 11 of those occasions did Alabama attempt more than 15 threes, and only once did they attempt more than 20.

CLEMSON'S DEFENSE UNDER BROWNELL

- Clemson's defense this season has been otherworldly as they utilize their depth to pick teams up in the full court.
- Head Coach Brad Brownell is known for his meticulous

tactics defensively, and it's a reason why of all full seasons played during the ACC Era, Brownell's teams are prevalent.

- Seven of his teams are in the Top 10 in Clemson history when it comes to scoring defense.
- Nine of his 10 full seasons are in the Top 20 in Clemson history.

TIGERS SHELL SHOCK MARYLAND

- Clemson dominated Maryland in the annual ACC/Big Ten Challenge en route to a 67-51 victory (Dec. 9).
- The Tigers held the Terrapins to just 15 first half points, the seventh time the Tigers have held an opponent to 15 points or less in any half of the Brownell Era.
- The 16-point win was the second-largest victory margin in the series history over the last 32 years for the Tigers.
- Clemson beat Maryland by 29 on Feb. 17, 2009 by a final score of 93-64.
- Clemson posted 25+ bench points for the fourth-straight game and played all 15 players on its roster for the first time this season.

DEFENSE LIVES HERE

- The Tigers defense after their first four games is ranked seventh in the country in defensive efficiency, according to KenPom.
- The Tigers' rating of 85.8 is the second lowest in the country and best in the ACC.
- The rating is an estimate of the defensive efficiency (points allowed per 100 possessions) a team would have against the average D-I offense.
- The Tigers boast the 11th-highest defensive turnover percentage (27.8), which represents the percentage of offensive possessions that end with a turnover.
- Clemson ranks seventh in effective field goal percentage defense (39.2 percent).
- The Tigers have forced 95 turnovers in their first four contests of the season.
- The last time Clemson has forced at least 95 turnovers in five-straight games to start a year was 123 to begin the 2009-10 campaign.
- Clemson forced 27 against Presbyterian, 28 at Liberty, 23 against UNCG, 26 against Winthrop and 19 against Texas A&M.
- Clemson limited Alabama to just 3-of-22 from 3-point range. The Crimson Tide had averaged better than 10 makes a game from beyond the arc.
- Clemson held Maryland to just 15 points in the first half of its 16-point victory on Dec. 2. Only seven times in the Brownell Era have the Tigers limited an opponent to 15 points or less in a single half.

- The Tigers are one of just seven total programs to claim that accomplishment over the span of 2017-19.
- The Tigers join Duke, Virginia, Houston, Michigan, Michigan State and Texas Tech as the only programs who can make this defensive claim.

- Clemson finished 14th nationally in 2018-19 and 7th nationally in 2017-18.
- The Tigers dipped to No. 33 last season, but have utilized its strong numbers and depth this season to get off to a gritty start on the defense end.

CONSECUTIVE GAMES FORCING 20+ T.O.

- In back-to-back games, the Tigers have forced 20+ turnovers against Purdue and SC State.
- Clemson forced 22 Boilermaker turnovers in the Space Coast Challenge championship game (Nov. 26).
- In its home opener, the Tigers forced 24 Bulldog turnovers (Dec. 2).
- The last time the Tigers forced 20+ turnovers in back-to-back games was Nov. 22, 2010 against Seton Hall and Nov. 21, 2010 against Old Dominion.
- Clemson forced 20 in each game during Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands.
- The Tigers can match that season of 20+ turnovers forced in three-straight games. Clemson opened that tournament forcing 21 Long Beach State turnovers (Nov. 19, 2010).

- Clemson beat The Citadel on Feb. 23, 1946 by a score of 76-24. They then opened the 1946-47 season on Dec. 11 and beat Erskine 58-30.

OPENING SEASON WITH TWO POWER FIVE VICTORIES

- Clemson accomplished something the program has not done since the 1951-52 season when the Tigers won the Space Coast Challenge on Thanksgiving Day. The Tigers opened the season by beating Mississippi State and Purdue on consecutive days by 11 points each to win the championship.
- It marked the first time since 1951-52 and just the third time in the history of the program that Clemson opened its season with consecutive wins over teams from Power Five Conference schools.
- In 1951-52, under head coach Banks McFadden, the Tigers defeated Georgia at home on Dec. 1 by a 57-47 score, then four days later defeated the Bulldogs in Athens, 77-54.
- Clemson went on to a 17-7 record that year, its finest under McFadden, and won a then-record 11 Southern Conference games.
- The only other year Clemson accomplished the feat was 1934-35 when the Tigers opened by winning consecutive games in consecutive days at Auburn. That Clemson team went on to a 15-3 record, the best winning percentage in Clemson history (min 15 games).

CLEMSON TOUGH TO BEAT WHEN ALLOWING 50 OR LESS POINTS

- In Brad Brownell's tenure as head coach at Clemson, the Tigers are a combined 47-2 when they allow 50 or less points to its opponent.
- The Tigers have won their last 26 contests in which they have allowed 50 or less points (26-0).
- For the second time in 2020-21, the Tigers held their opponent to less than 50 points. Clemson held SC State to just 38 points in the Tigers' home opener.
- In the 2020-21 season opener, the Tigers held Mississippi State to just 42 points in an 11-point victory.
- The Tigers held Jacksonville to just 39 total points (only 11 in the second half) en route to a 68-39 victory last season.
- In just the Tigers' second game of the 2019-20 season, they held Presbyterian to just 45 points, marking the first time this season they have held an opponent under the 50-point threshold.
- Clemson went 4-0 during 2018-19 in such games.
- The Tigers topped Pittsburgh with a 62-48 victory on the road on Feb. 27.
- Clemson rolled Georgia Tech on the road on Feb. 6, 65-42, and clinching the fewest points allowed in consecutive ACC games in Clemson history.
- The Tigers dominated Wake Forest on Feb. 3, 64-37, holding the Demon Deacons to the lowest point total allowed in an ACC game under Brownell.
- The 37 points ties Georgia Tech from a Feb. 21, 2012, 56-37, Tiger victory.
- The 40th win came on Nov. 20 in the Cayman Islands Classic semifinals with a 64-49 win over Georgia.
- The only losses on the record are losses to Virginia (49-47, Feb. 2, 2011) and Miami (45-43, Feb. 17, 2013).

CLEMSON WINS OVER TOP-6 TEAMS LAST SEASON

- Clemson defeated Florida State, 70-69 for its third top-six win (time of the game) over teams in the AP poll on Feb. 29, and now leads the nation in top six wins. • **T**he Tigers have defeated a third-ranked Duke, fifth-ranked Louisville and sixth-ranked Florida State this season.
- It is the first time since 1979-80 that Clemson has beaten three top-6 teams (top six by one of the two polls) in the same year.
- It is the first time in program history that Clemson has recorded three Top-6 AP ranked wins in the same season.
- Thirty-two different teams have recorded 36 top-6 wins this year. Louisville and Kentucky are the only other teams with two wins over top-6 teams. There have been 11 top-6 wins by ACC teams this year and Clemson has three of them.

BROWNELL'S 20-WIN SEASONS

- Head coach Brad Brownell clinched his fourth 20-win campaign at Clemson with a 75-69 victory over Wright State in the first round of the NIT on March 19, 2019.
- It marks Brownell's second consecutive 20-win season at Clemson.
- Brownell won 25 games in 2017-18 en route to leading the Tigers to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament.
- Brownell was a Naismath National Coach of the Year semifinalist in 2017-18 and won Sports Illustrated College Coach of the Year.
