CLEMSON TO FACE IOWA STATE IN 2021 CHEEZ-IT BOWL

Clemson will attempt to close its resilient 2021 campaign on a winning note on Wednesday, Dec. 29, when the Tigers face the Iowa State Cyclones in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl. Kickoff at Camping World Stadium is set for 5:45 p.m. ET.

Clemson enters the contest at 9-3 and in search of its 10th win of the 2021 season. A win would give Clemson 11 consecutive 10-win seasons, placing the Tigers alongside Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21) as the only programs ever to reach double-digit wins in 11 straight seasons.

Clemson's shot at another 10-win season was salvaged by a committed Tiger team that overcame adversity by going on a 7-1 run after a 2-2 start through September. Entering October, 28 different Power Five teams including Clemson had two or more losses. Of that group, only Utah (10-3) and Clemson (9-3) rebounded to enter bowl season with at least nine wins.

The Cheez-It Bowl will be Clemson's first bowl game in Orlando since 2014, and the circumstances come with a multitude of historical parallels. That year, Offensive Coordinator Chad Morris left to become the head coach at SMU in advance of Clemson's Russell Athletic Bowl date with Oklahoma. Clemson promoted Tony Elliott and Jeff Scott into co-offensive coordinator roles and hired Brandon Streeter as its quarterbacks coach, and the group led a masterful performance in a dominating 40-6 win against the Sooners.

This year, following the departures of Elliott and Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables for head coaching jobs at Virginia and Oklahoma, respectively, the bowl game in Orlando will represent the coordinator debuts of

Streeter (offensive coordinator), Wes Goodwin (defensive coordinator) and Mickey Conn (co-defensive coordinator).

The game will feature two head coaches with immense mutual respect. In the spring of 2019, Dabo Swinney tabbed Iowa State's Matt Campbell to be a keynote presenter at Clemson's high school coaching clinic.

"You are always searching for people in our profession that are doing it the right way and they're leading from the heart," Campbell said. "What I saw when I got to Clemson and the kindness and the care and the love and the passion that [Swinney] led with and continues to lead with, I think that was a huge eye-opening experience of, 'Man, you can lead a football program the right way.'"

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to win 10 games for a school-record 11th consecutive season. Clemson would become only the third program in history ever to post 11 consecutive 10-win seasons, joining Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21). Clemson would be the first school to win 10 games in 11 straight seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

- Clemson attempting to win 10 games in a season in which it started 2-2 or worse for the second time in school history, joining the 2014 Tigers that rebounded from a 2-2 start through four games (and a 1-2 start through three games) to finish 10-3 with a bowl win in Orlando. Beyond the 2014 team, the only other Clemson team to reach even nine wins after starting .500 or worse through four games was its 2009 team, which started 2-2 and finished 9-5.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 3-1 all-time in the Cheez-It Bowl across the game's various monikers. Clemson lost to Texas Tech in the Tangerine Bowl in 2002 but defeated Colorado in the Champs Sports Bowl in 2005 and beat Oklahoma in the Russell Athletic Bowl in 2014.

- Clemson facing Iowa State for the first time in school history.

- Clemson facing its 107th different opponent in program history. Clemson is 64-38-4 all-time in its first meeting with its 106 existing opponents, including a 15-1 mark in first meetings since 2003. Clemson has won 17 of its last 19 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 6-4 all-time against teams in the Big 12 Conference at the time of the game, including winning its two most recent meetings in 2014 and 2015, both against Oklahoma in postseason play. Six of Clemson's nine previous games against the Big 12 have come against teams no longer in the conference (two against Missouri, two against Texas A&M and one each against Colorado and Nebraska).

- Clemson attempting to even its all-time record against schools *currently* in the Big 12 Conference at 7-7.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 26-22 all-time in bowl contests. A 26th bowl win would tie Nebraska and Ohio State for 10th-most in FBS history.

- Clemson attempting to win at least one bowl game in eight of its last 10 seasons. A win would make Clemson 10-4 in bowl games since 2012, including College Football Playoff National Championship Games.

- Clemson attempting to win its 15th consecutive December game, dating to Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship Game victory against Virginia Tech. Clemson (14-0) is one of three schools to be undefeated in December since 2011 with a minimum of five games played, a list that also includes Alabama (12-0) and Penn State (7-0).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 26-13 all-time in December games, including postseason play.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to earn his 150th career win in his 14th season (including an interim stint in 2008) to move past Barry Switzer (149) for sole possession of the third-most wins through the first 15 seasons of a coaching career in FBS history.

- Swinney (149) attempting to join Urban Meyer (165) and Bob Stoops (160) as the only coaches in FBS history to win 150 games in the first 15 seasons of a head coaching career.

- Swinney attempting to earn his 150th career win in only his 186th career game as head coach. He would be the sixth-fastest coach in FBS history to 150 wins, trailing

only Urban Meyer (176), Gil Dobie (180), Barry Switzer (180), Fielding Yost (184) and Joe Paterno (184). He would be the fourth-fastest in the modern era.

- Swinney attempting to join Bobby Bowden as the only head coaches ever to lead an ACC program to 150 career wins. Of Bowden's 377 career wins, a conference-record 173 came during the Seminoles' membership in the ACC.

- Swinney making his 18th bowl game appearance (including CFP National Championship Games) as head coach to tie Bobby Bowden's ACC record (18) for the most career bowl appearances leading an ACC program. (Note: Only 18 of Bowden's 32 total career bowl appearances came during Florida State's years of ACC membership.)

- Swinney (10) attempting to earn his 11th bowl victory to tie Bowden's ACC record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

- Clemson attempting to score at least 30 points in six consecutive games for the first time since the first 11 games of the 2020 season.

- Clemson attempting to reach 250 rushing yards in three consecutive games for the first time since a four-game streak against Florida State, Louisville, Boston College and Wofford in 2019.

- Clemson attempting to rush for at least three touchdowns in four consecutive games for the first time

since 2019 against Louisville, Boston College, Wofford and NC State.

- Clemson attempting to average 6.0 or more yards per carry in three consecutive games for the first time since a five-game streak in 2019.

- Clemson (five) entering the game as one of two teams in the country not to allow an offensive touchdown in at least five games this season.

- Clemson attempting to record a sixth game this season without allowing an offensive touchdown to tie the 1959 Tigers for the second-most in a season since 1954.

- Clemson attempting to hold four straight opponents below 100 rushing yards for the first time since a five-game streak to end 2010.

- Clemson attempting to hold four straight opponents to 50 or fewer rushing yards for the first time on record back to 1954.

- Clemson attempting to secure multiple takeaways in a fourth consecutive game for the first since 2020 against Virginia, Miami (Fla.), Georgia Tech and Syracuse.

- Clemson entering the game having allowed 24 points off turnovers this season. However, 21 of those points have come off of two pick-sixes and a strip-

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sack fumble return, so the Clemson defense has only surrendered three points on possessions following a Clemson turnover this season. The only offense to score following a Clemson turnover this year was South Carolina State, which turned a Michel Dukes fumble at the Clemson 36 into a field goal.

- Clemson (one) attempting to score another defensive touchdown to give the Tigers multiple defensive touchdowns in 12 straight seasons. The last time Clemson had fewer than two defensive touchdowns in a season was 2009, Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, when the Tigers supplemented a single defensive touchdown with six special teams touchdowns.

- Clemson attempting to hold three consecutive opponents without a sack for the first time since 2015, against Wake Forest, South Carolina and North Carolina.

- Four Tigers — OT Jordan McFadden, OL Walker Parks, LB James Skalski and QB DJ Uiagalelei — needing one more start to become the only four Clemson players to start every game this season on offense or defense. Every other Clemson offensive or defensive starter has missed time or played as a reserve at some point this season.

- Tight end Davis Allen (seven) needing three touchdown receptions to become the sixth tight end in Clemson history with at least 10 career touchdown catches, joining Jordan Leggett (18 from 2013-16), John McMakin (12 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (12 from 2009-11), Brandon Ford (12 from 2009-12) and Bennie Cunningham (10 from 1972-75).

- Cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. attempting to become the first Clemson player with multiple games with two interceptions in a single season since DeAndre McDaniel against Georgia Tech and Miami (Fla.) in 2009. McDaniel is now a defensive analyst on Clemson's staff.

- Defensive end K.J. Henry attempting to record at least a half-sack in four straight games for the first time in his career. His 3.5 sacks this season are tied for his single-season career high from 2020.

- Safety Andrew Mukuba, the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year, entering the game credited by the Clemson coaching staff with nine pass breakups this year. He needs one more to take sole possession of the Clemson single-season true-freshman record presently shared with Robert O'Neal (1989) and Justin Miller (2002).

- Defensive end Myles Murphy (7.0) needing three more sacks to become the first Clemson player with double-digit sacks in a season since Clelin Ferrell in 2018 (11.5).

- Murphy (five) needing two forced fumbles to tie Levon Kirkland, Keith Adams and Vic Beasley (seven each) for seventh-most forced fumbles in a career in Clemson history. Murphy has two forced fumbles this season and needs one more to tie his career high set as a freshman in 2020.

- Running back Kobe Pace attempting to rush for a touchdown in three straight games for the first time in his career.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (336 career points) needing 14 points to join Travis Etienne (468 from 2017-20), Chandler Catanzaro (404 from 2010-13) and Greg Huegel (379 from 2015-18) as the only players in school history to reach 350 career points.

- Potter (51) chasing No. 6 Greg Huegel (54 from 2015-18) and No. 5 Aaron Hunt (55 from 2000-03) on Clemson's leaderboard for career field goals made.

- Potter attempting to kick multiple field goals in five consecutive games for the first time in his career. Potter went 3-of-3 against Louisville, UConn and South Carolina and 2-for-2 against Wake Forest.

- Potter entering the game having converted his last 11 field goal attempts, the longest streak of his career. If he were to hit his next three field goals, he would tie Obed Ariri (14 straight in 1980) for the third-longest streak of consecutive field goals made in school history, trailing Chandler Catanzaro's school-record 20-field-goal streak from 2011-12 and Greg Huegel's 16-field-goal streak in 2015.

- Potter entering the game having scored in 41 consecutive contests. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season. He served as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018.

- Potter (93 points in 2021) needing seven points to become the first player in Clemson history to score 100 points in three consecutive seasons. Potter scored 118 points in 2019 and 115 points in 2020.

- Potter (19-of-23) needing one more field goal to post only the 11th 20-field-goal season in school history and the first since 2015 (Greg Huegel, 27).

- Potter attempting to add to his Clemson record (six) for career field goals of 50 yards or more.

- Potter attempting to add to his single-season (11) and career (25) school records for field goals of 40-plus yards.

- Running back Will Shipley (10) needing one more rushing touchdown to pass C.J. Spiller (10 in 2006) for sole possession of the second-most rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972. He needs three rushing touchdowns to tie Travis Etienne (13 in 2017) for the Clemson class record.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for 100 yards in three straight games since Travis Etienne's school-record six-game streak in 2019.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson true freshman with four 100-yard rushing games in a true freshman season since 2006 (C.J. Spiller, school-record five).

- Shipley (four) attempting to rush for multiple touchdowns in a fifth game this season to pass Travis Etienne (four in 2017) for the most games with multiple rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 2000.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson true freshman with three consecutive 100-yard rushing games since the NCAA established permanent freshman eligibility for the 1972 football season.

- Shipley (27.1) entering the game on pace for Clemson's highest kickoff return average in a season among qualified players since C.J. Spiller in 2009 (32.8).

- Linebacker Trenton Simpson (6.0) needing two sacks to become the first Clemson linebacker with eight sacks since Isaiah Simmons recorded 8.0 sacks in his Butkus Award-winning campaign in 2019.

- Punter Will Spiers, wide receiver/holder Will Swinney and linebacker James Skalski each playing in their 69th career games to extend their school record for most career games played. Among accessible data and responses from FBS Sports Information Directors, the 69 games played by each member of the trio is believed to be a modern FBS record.

- Spiers starting his 69th game to add to his school and national record for career starts. Swinney's career total as Clemson's primary holder parallels Spiers' run as starting punter.

- Spiers (24) sitting four qualifying punts shy of Bradley Pinion's school record for punts downed inside the 20 in a single season (28 in 2014). With 105 career punts downed inside the 20, Spiers already holds Clemson's career record by a wide margin, leading No.

- Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei (four) needing one more rushing touchdown to surpass his single-season career high (four in both 2020 and 2021).

With a berth in the Cheez-It Bowl this season, Clemson extended its school-record bowl streak to 17 years. Clemson's 17-year bowl streak is the longest in the ACC and the fifth-longest in the country.

Clemson's 17-year streak dates back to a 19-10 Champs Sports Bowl win against Colorado to close the 2005 season. At 17 years, the streak more than doubles Clemson's previous longest streak, which covered seven seasons from 1985-91.

Though Clemson did not make a bowl appearance in 2004, Clemson has been bowl eligible in 23 consecutive seasons, dating back to a 1999 appearance in the Peach Bowl.

BOWL SUCCESS UNDER SWINNEY

Clemson has posted a 10-7 bowl record under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, including a 9-4 mark in its last 13 bowl games dating back to the 2012 season.

Clemson's nine bowl wins since 2012 have not come against run-of-the-mill opponents. Eight of Swinney's nine bowl victories in that span have come against head coaches with national championship victories to their credit at various levels of NCAA play, including two wins each against Nick Saban, Urban Meyer and Bob Stoops, as well as single victories against Les Miles and Brian Kelly. Four of those coaches have won FBS titles, while Kelly was a two-time champion at the Division II level.

CLEMSON VS. NEW OPPONENTS

Iowa State will be the 107th different opponent faced by Clemson all-time. Clemson holds a 64-38-4 all-time record when facing an opponent for the first time.

Including first meetings with UConn and Iowa State, the 2021 season marks the fourth time in five years in which the Tigers will face an opponent for the first time in school history. It marks the first time since 2014 that Clemson has faced two different schools for the first time in a single year.

Clemson has won 15 of its last 16 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent, dating back to 2003. The team's lone debut loss in that time frame came against South Florida in the 2010 Meineke Car Care Bowl in Charlotte, N.C., the last game before Clemson embarked upon its active streak of 10 consecutive 10-win seasons.

THE SHACK SHEALY BOWL

Shack Shealy holds the distinction of being the only Clemson Tiger ever to have served as head coach at his alma mater. And, yet, Shealy also holds the distinction of having been an Iowa State Cyclone as well.

Shealy lettered at Clemson from 1896-99 but later played two years at Iowa State. Shealy was a four-year starter at right guard, end and, his senior year, in the backfield. Following the departure of College Football Hall of Famer John Heisman, Shealy coached Clemson for one season, leading the Tigers to a 3-3-1 record in 1904 with wins against Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee.

ON THIS DATE

- **Dec. 29, 1978:** Clemson defeated Ohio State, 17-15, at the Gator Bowl in Danny Ford's first game as head coach and Woody Hayes' final game at Ohio State. The winning touchdown was scored by freshman Cliff Austin, who would score another important touchdown in a national championship victory three years later. Charlie Bauman made the key play with an interception of an Art Schlichter pass with just two minutes left. He ran the return out of bounds on the Ohio State sideline and was punched by Hayes.

- **Dec. 29, 2014:** Clemson concluded the season with its 10th victory, a 40-6 win over No. 24 Oklahoma. Cole Stoudt earned MVP honors by throwing for 319 yards and three touchdowns as the Tigers' 34-point win tied a school record for victory margin over a ranked opponent. The win gave Clemson three straight bowl wins over opposing coaches that had won the national championship, a first in college football history.

- **Dec. 29, 2018:** Clemson appeared in the Cotton Bowl for the first time since Jan. 1, 1940. Clemson defeated Notre Dame, 30-3, in a College Football Playoff semifinal game that represented the first matchup of undefeated teams in CFP history.

CLEMSON ANNOUNCES STAFF CHANGES

Head Coach Dabo Swinney and Clemson Football announced on Dec. 14 a number of staff changes finalized by the Clemson University Board of Trustees Compensation Committee that afternoon.

Defensively, Clemson promoted Wes Goodwin from Senior Defensive Assistant to Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers Coach and added the role of Co-Defensive Coordinator for Safeties Coach Mickey Conn. Cornerbacks Coach Mike Reed added the role of Special Teams Coordinator previously held by Conn, while Recruiting Coordinator/Defensive Tackles Coach Todd Bates has added the title of Assistant Head Coach.

Offensively, Clemson promoted Brandon Streeter to Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach. Clemson named Kyle Richardson, who had served as Director of High School Relations and Special Assistant to the Offense, as Passing Game Coordinator/Tight Ends Coach.

"I'm just really, really excited about the people that we have in place," Swinney said. "I've always taken a lot of pride in developing our players and developing our team, but I also take a lot of pride in developing our staff."

Goodwin is in his 10th overall season at Clemson spanning two tenures with the Tigers. As a defensive analyst from 2012-14 and as senior defensive assistant from 2018-21, Goodwin served in a critical off-field role for former Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables, overseeing defensive breakdowns and opponent scouting, assisting with on-campus recruiting and also serving as one of the program's primary liaisons to NFL scouting personnel and coaches.

Goodwin first arrived at Clemson in 2009, serving as a graduate assistant from 2009-11. He joined the staff on a full-time basis in 2012 in Venables' first season at the helm of the defense and oversaw the team's secondary for its 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl win against LSU. In the final season of his first stint at Clemson in 2014, Clemson finished as the nation's top-ranked unit in total defense, third down percentage, first downs allowed and tackles for loss, all while ranking in the top five in many other statistical categories.

Between his stints at Clemson, Goodwin spent three years with the NFL's Arizona Cardinals, serving as an as-

sistant to head coach Bruce Arians. Cardinals squads for which Goodwin worked compiled a 28-19-1 record, including a 13-3 NFC West championship season in 2015 in which Arizona reached the NFC Championship Game.

"Wesley is one of the best young defensive minds I've had the opportunity to work with," said Arians, who led his Tampa Bay Buccaneers to a title in Super Bowl LV last season. "He was with my staff for three years in Arizona and I saw him grow defensively, and offensively, that whole time. He has a bright, bright future. One thing is for sure – they are going to be an attacking type of defense and I know he is going to do great things with this opportunity."

A native of Grove Hill, Ala., Goodwin, who will turn 37 on the eve of the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, graduated from Mississippi State, earning his undergraduate degree in 2007 and Master's degree in 2009 while working as a student assistant and graduate assistant for the Bulldogs.

Conn is in his sixth season on Clemson's staff and his fifth in an on-field coaching capacity. Since his initial arrival at Clemson in 2016 following his acclaimed high school head coaching career at Georgia's Grayson High School, Clemson is 60-8 and has produced a Top 15 unit in total defense in every season.

In 2017, Conn transitioned from his off-field senior defensive assistant position to an on-field role coaching Clemson's safeties. In the time since, he has led four different safeties — Tanner Muse, K'Von Wallace, Nolan Turner and Andrew Mukuba — to a total of five All-ACC selections. This season, his guidance helped Mukuba earn ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year as well as consensus Freshman All-America status after helping the young safety become the first true freshman defensive back to start a season opener at Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.

Two of Conn's pupils, Muse and Turner, earned All-America honors in 2019 and 2020, respectively, marking the first time Clemson had a safety honored by NCAA-recognized All-America selectors in consecutive seasons since 1981-82, when Terry Kinard parlayed first-team honors by the AP and FWAA in 1981 into unanimous All-American honors in 1982. Conn and Reed were named Defensive Backs Coaches of the Year by FootballScoop for 2019.

Reed has helped the Tigers to a 109-15 record, six ACC Championships, four national championship game appearances and national titles in 2016 and 2018 since joining the Tigers in 2013.

Prior to joining the Tigers, Reed spent six seasons as defensive backs coach at NC State from 2007-12. He served on the Philadelphia Eagles' coaching staff from 2002-06, helping the Eagles to at least 10 wins in four of his five seasons and contributing to teams that made three consecutive NFC Championship Game appearances and earned a berth in Super Bowl XXXIX.

Reed has produced 12 All-ACC selections at cornerback in his nine seasons at Clemson, including six first-team selections and four first-team picks in the last three years. This season, Reed's starting cornerback duo of Andrew Booth Jr. and Mario Goodrich swept first-team All-ACC honors, becoming the first pair of cornerbacks from a single school to both earn first-team honors since North Carolina's Dre Bly and Robert Williams in 1997.

Bates is in his fifth season at Clemson after joining the Tigers in 2017. Between his tenures at Jacksonville State (2014-16) and Clemson (2017-20), every primary starter under his guidance over the last eight years has earned at least one career all-conference selection.

Clemson has ranked in the Top 10 in the nation in sacks in all five of Bates' seasons with the Tigers. This year, both Tyler Davis and Bryan Bresee collected All-ACC honors, one year after Bresee was a Freshman All-American and earned ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2020.

In addition to his success developing Clemson's defensive interior, Bates has been recognized as one of the nation's premier recruiters. In 2019, he was named Rivals' Recruiter of the Year for his contributions to Clemson's 2020 recruiting class that ranked No. 1 nationally according to ESPN, No. 2 according to Rivals and No. 3 according to the 247 Composite. He was named as Clemson's recruiting coordinator following the 2019 season.

Streeter is in his seventh full season as a full-time assistant coach at Clemson after rejoining the program prior to the 2014 Russell Athletic Bowl. Clemson is 89-10 since his return, including six ACC titles, six College Football Playoff berths, four national championship berths and two national titles.

During his tenure, Streeter has helped produce two different Heisman Trophy finalists, including two-time finalist and 2016 runner-up Deshaun Watson, as well as 2020 runner-up Trevor Lawrence. Watson was a two-time winner of the Davey O'Brien and Manning Awards as the nation's top quarterback, while Lawrence ended his career 34-2 as a starter, the third-best winning percentage

by a starting quarterback with at least 30 career starts since Division I split in 1978.

In addition to his role as Quarterbacks Coach, Streeter served as the team's recruiting coordinator from his arrival in December 2014 through the end of the 2019 season. In that time, he helped Clemson produce Top 10 classes in five out of those six recruiting cycles. That role transitioned to Bates in 2020 upon Streeter's transition to Passing Game Coordinator for the last two seasons, including a 2020 campaign in which Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Richardson is in his sixth season on Clemson's staff after having served in numerous capacities, including tenures as Senior Offensive Assistant and Director of Player Development and Freshman Transition.

Richardson has been a key off-field contributor to Clemson's offensive success since his arrival in 2016. Clemson's balanced attack has resulted in the Tigers being one of only three teams in the country with at least 16,000 cumulative rushing yards and at least 23,000 total passing yards across those six seasons.

Prior to coming to Clemson, Richardson was one of South Carolina's most successful high school coaches during his tenure at Northwestern High School in Rock Hill, S.C. From 2011-15, he led the Trojans to a 58-13 record, including four region championships, three state title game appearances and state championships in both 2013 and 2015.

Richardson, 43, earned his undergraduate degree from Appalachian State in 2001 and has two Master's degrees, including a Master's in athletic leadership from Clemson.

"I am excited and energized by this deserved opportunity for so many members of our staff in new roles," Swinney said. "But most of all, I'm happiest for our players. More than anybody, they know what this group of coaches is capable of, and our players' excitement to see them in these roles has been amazing."

The promotions and changes come following the departures of Brent Venables and Tony Elliott, both of whom parlayed Clemson's immense success in their combined 21 seasons at Clemson into Power Five Conference head coaching jobs this month. Clemson's current staff will coach the Tigers in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, where Clemson will face the Iowa State Cyclones in Orlando, Fla. on Wednesday, Dec. 29.

to go be head coaches and some of our younger staff and peripheral staff that may have some opportunities to go with them as well, but those changes create opportunity here. And, man, I'm just really, really excited about the people that we have in place.

"I've always taken a lot of pride in developing our players and developing our team, but I also take a lot of pride in developing our staff. Sometimes it's not feasible to promote from within, but these were really easy decisions for me, just like it was an easy decision for me in 2014 to name Tony [Elliott] as the play caller and Jeff [Scott] to be a co-coordinator.

"I'm super excited about Wes being the defensive coordinator and Mickey being the co-coordinator, and I'm similarly excited for the opportunity to promote Mike Reed to be the special teams coordinator and Todd Bates to be our assistant head coach to fill that void that Tony left behind. We have a wonderful staff.

"Offensively, there's nobody more deserving than Brandon Streeter. Unlike Tony and Jeff in 2014, he's called a lot of plays in his day. He was a coordinator when I hired him, and he left being a coordinator to come to Clemson. What an amazing job he did with Deshaun Watson, an amazing job he did recruiting and developing Trevor Lawrence and what he's done from a passing game standpoint. Last year, we passed for more yards per game than any Clemson team ever. He's just so deserving, so well-prepared. He's had opportunities to go to the NFL, he's had multiple opportunities to go be an offensive coordinator in the SEC and elsewhere, but 'Street' has stayed here and has been patient knowing an opportunity would come — and that time has come. I'm really excited for him to take the reins and lead us into this bowl game and into the 2022 season.

"And I'm also excited to hire Kyle Richardson. Man, Kyle was one of the best high school coaches in the entire Southeast. Talk about a guy that's been patient. I hired him, I think he was coming off his third straight state championship appearance, and the same thing as Streeter: he's had opportunities and he's stayed here for a chance to coach at Clemson. He is one of the brightest and most well-prepared guys that we have to step into

this role and be the tight ends coach and passing game coordinator. He has got a great acumen for football. He brings great leadership ability from being a head coach for a long time. This is a great next step for him. He's done a lot of different things within our program in support staff roles, and I'm just really excited to see him have this opportunity just like when I hired Mickey a few years ago but we hadn't had any change that gave us an opportunity to get him on the field until now. I'm so thankful that he stayed patient and thankful that now I've got the opportunity to hire him.

"Our staff is set. We'll have some other things that will take place as far support staff and things like that that we are restructuring, but I'm really happy for them. Thad Turnipseed, I can't say enough about him. He's got a great opportunity with Brent and I'm happy for Brent because Thad can help him for sure. I'm so thankful for Thad; he's been with me now for many years, and what an unbelievable job he did in helping me navigate so many different things from an external affairs standpoint, facilities, you name it. He's got a chance to really go be the chief of staff for Brent and really help him in a lot of areas that Brent wants them to grow in. Happy for Thad and his wife, Melissa, and I'm thankful for them.

"Moving forward, I am excited and energized by this deserved opportunity for so many members of our staff in new roles. But most of all, I'm happiest for our players. POSTGAME NOTES

- Clemson and South Carolina resumed a rivalry that had been contested for 111 consecutive years prior to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Before its interruption, it was the nation's second-longest uninterrupted series.

- By virtue of the 2020 interruption, Clemson played consecutive games at South Carolina in the series for the first time since 1959. Clemson played the first 57 games in the now-118-game series on the road on "Big

Thursday" during the annual State Fair until the series transitioned to the home-and-home format in 1960.

- The game was Clemson's 23rd shutout of South Carolina all-time and its first since Danny Ford's Tigers shut out South Carolina, 45-0, in 1989. All 23 of Clemson's shutouts in the series have come in Columbia.

- The game was Clemson's 228th shutout in 1,287 all-time games (17.7 percent).

- The shutout was Clemson's eighth under Dabo Swinney and its first since a 49-0 shutout of The Citadel in 2020. It was Clemson's second road shutout under Swinney, joining a 58-0 win at Miami (Fla.) in 2015.

- Clemson recorded its fifth game without allowing an offensive touchdown this season to tie the 1981 and 1989 Tigers for the third-most in a season since 1954.

- Clemson did not allow a first down until 18 minutes into the game. Clemson led 17-0 prior to surrendering a first down.

- Clemson held South Carolina to 43 rushing yards and has now held three straight opponents below 100 rushing yards for the first time since 2018 against Florida State, Louisville and Boston College.

- Clemson has also now held three straight opponents to 50 or fewer rushing yards for the first time since 1991 against Maryland, South Carolina and Duke.

- Clemson's three points allowed over its last two meetings with South Carolina are its fewest allowed in a two-game span against South Carolina since allowing only two points against the Gamecocks across the 1959 (27-0) and 1960 (12-2) games.

- Including a 38-3 win in the teams' last meeting in 2019, Clemson has now outscored South Carolina 68-3 in the teams' last two meetings.

- Clemson entered the contest having won its last four games in the series against South Carolina by at least 21 points (49 points in 2016, 24 points in 2017, 21 points in 2018 and 35 points in 2019). Clemson's fifth consecutive win of 21-plus points added to the longest streak of 21-point victories in the series by either team.

- Clemson has now scored at least 30 points in five consecutive games for the first time since the first 11 games of the 2020 season.

- Clemson rushed for 265 yards and improved to 72-1 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson has now reached 250 rushing yards in consecutive games for the first time since a four-game streak against Florida State, Louisville, Boston College and Wofford in 2019.

- With a 6.2-yards-per-carry average in the game, Clemson has now averaged 6.0 or more yards per carry in consecutive games for the first time this season.

- Clemson has now rushed for at least three touchdowns in three consecutive games for the first time since last season against Miami (Fla.), Georgia Tech and Syracuse.

- Clemson allowed zero sacks. Clemson has now allowed zero sacks in consecutive games for the first time since the second and third game of the season against South Carolina State and Georgia Tech.

- Running back Will Shipley rushed 19 times for a career-high-tying 128 yards with a touchdown. He had previously rushed for 128 yards against Florida State on 25 carries earlier this season.

- With his 10th rushing touchdown of the season, Shipley tied his position coach C.J. Spiller (10 in 2006) for second on the leaderboard for rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972. He now trails only Travis Etienne (13 in 2017) in that category.

- Shipley has now recorded back-to-back 100-yard rushing games for the first time in his career.

- Shipley became the first Clemson true freshman with three 100-yard rushing games in a true freshman season since 2006, when C.J. Spiller had a freshman-school-record five 100-yard games.

- Shipley became the first Clemson freshman with back-to-back 100-yard rushing games since redshirt freshman Wayne Gallman against Syracuse and Wake Forest in 2014. He became the first true freshman to accomplish the feat since C.J. Spiller against NC State and South Carolina in 2006.

- With Shipley's performance, Clemson has produced a 100-yard rusher five times this season. Clemson is now 56-2 when having a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

- Shipley opened the scoring on a 29-yard touchdown run on Clemson's opening drive.

- Shipley's touchdown run culminated a seven-play, 73-yard opening drive for the Tigers. Clemson has now scored on its opening drive in four consecutive games.

- Running back Kobe Pace rushed seven times for 58 yards with one touchdown.

- Pace scored on a 34-yard touchdown run in the second quarter. It was his sixth rushing touchdown of the season and of his career.

- Shipley and Pace combined for 186 rushing yards. Since both were held out against UConn as a precaution on Nov. 13, the duo has combined for 489 yards on 69 carries (7.1 avg.) in its last two games against Wake Forest and South Carolina.

- With Shipley and Pace both reaching the end zone on the ground, Clemson has now had two different players both rush for a touchdown in consecutive games for the first time since Travis Etienne and Trevor Lawrence both scored via rush in the final two games of 2020 against Notre Dame and Ohio State.

- Running back Phil Mahaf added his third rushing touchdown of the season and of his career on a six-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter.

- Wide receiver Dacari Collins recorded a career-long 37-yard reception in the second quarter.

- Wide receiver Will Brown caught a career-long 26-yard pass in the third quarter.

- Cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. recorded two interceptions and a pass breakup.

- Booth became the first Clemson player with multiple interceptions in a game since Mario Goodrich (two)

against Pittsburgh on Nov. 28, 2020.

- Booth recorded Clemson's first takeaway of the game, picking off a Jason Brown pass in the first quarter.

- Booth became the first Clemson player with an interception in consecutive games since last season when Nolan Turner accomplished the feat against Georgia Tech and Syracuse.

- Booth added his second interception in the second quarter, giving him his single-season career-high third of the season.

- Booth joined Marion Reeves (two in 1971) and Willie Underwood (two in 1980) as the only Clemson players to record two interceptions in a game against South Carolina.

- Thanks to Booth's two interceptions, Clemson won the turnover margin, 2-1, and now has a 67-4 record when winning the turnover margin since 2011.

- Defensive end K.J. Henry recorded a sack and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. On the play, he tied his single-season career high with 3.5 sacks on the year and recorded the first forced fumble of his career.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter finished 3-of-3 on field goals, converting field goal attempts of 29, 47 and 49 yards.

- On a 47-yard field goal in the third quarter, Potter (336 career points) passed Aaron Hunt (329 from 2000-03) for fourth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career points. Potter also passed Hunt for third in career kicking points in school history.

- On that field goal, Potter (51) also became the eighth kicker in Clemson history to record 50 career field goals.

- With his third field goal, Potter (51) tied Jad Dean (51 field goals from 2003-06) for seventh-most career field goals in Clemson history.

- Potter, who was 3-for-3 on field goals against Louisville and UConn and 2-for-2 against Wake Forest, has now kicked multiple field goals in four consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- Potter's second field goal of 40-plus yards was his 11th of the season, breaking Chris Gardocki's single-season Clemson record of 10 in 1989. The same field goal also gave him the Clemson record of 25 field goals of 40 yards or more in his career, breaking Chandler Catanzaro's mark of 24 from 2010-13.

- Potter is now 19-of-23 on field goal attempts this season, a single-season career high for field goals made and one field goal shy of entering the Top 10 in a single season in school history.

- Potter has now converted his last 11 field goal attempts, the longest streak of his career. His previous career-long streak prior to the current streak was eight.

- Punter Will Spiers started his 68th game to add to his school record for career starts. Wide receiver/holder Will Swinney's career total as Clemson's primary holder parallels Spiers' run as starting punter.

- Spiers, Swinney and linebacker James Skalski each played in their 68th career games to extend their school record for most career games played.

- Clemson has now held the lead in its all-time series with South Carolina for 44,935 consecutive days (123 years and 10 days). South Carolina won the series opener in 1896 before Clemson evened the series in 1897. Clemson won the third game in the series on Nov. 17, 1898 to take a 2-1 series lead that Clemson hasn't relinquished.

- Clemson and South Carolina faced one another at night for the 16th time in the rivalry's history. The win improved Clemson to 11-5 in night games against South Carolina all-time and gives the Tigers a 7-3 mark in night games in Columbia.

- Including the season opener against Georgia, Clemson played its second SEC opponent of the year and has now played multiple SEC opponents in the regular season 10

times in the last 12 years. The only years in that span in which Clemson did not face two SEC opponents were in 2015 and 2020, years in which Clemson was scheduled to play Notre Dame in non-conference play (and the latter of which was altered by the COVID-19 pandemic).

- Captains for the contest were wide receiver Will Brown, offensive tackle Jordan McFadden, placekicker B.T. Potter, and safety Nolan Turner.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson improved to 72-42-4 all-time against South Carolina. Clemson's 72 all-time wins against South Carolina are the program's most against any opponent.

- Clemson has now recorded seven consecutive wins against South Carolina for the first time since a seven-game streak from 1934-40, matching the longest winning streak in the series by either team all-time.

- Clemson moved its all-time road record against South Carolina to 53-32-3. Clemson's 53 road wins at South Carolina are more than double its most all-time road wins against any other opponent. Clemson's second-most road wins against an opponent is 26 at Wake Forest.

- Clemson earned a fourth straight road win against South Carolina for the first time since defeating the Gamecocks on the road six straight times across the 1989-99 seasons.

- Clemson improved to 13-5 against SEC opponents in the College Football Playoff era. Clemson is now 7-2 against SEC East foes since 2014 and 6-2 against the SEC West since the start of the 2016 season.

- Clemson improved to 11-1 in its last 12 regular season games against SEC opponents, dating to 2014.

- Clemson finished its 2021 road slate 3-2 in true road games.

- Clemson improved to 30-4 in true road games since 2015.

- Clemson won its sixth consecutive non-conference road game, dating to 2015. All of Clemson's non-conference road wins in that span have come against SEC opponents, including South Carolina (2015, 2017, 2019 and 2021), Auburn (2016) and Texas A&M (2018). The sixth straight non-conference win in a true road game is Clemson's longest streak since becoming a charter member of the ACC in 1953.

- Clemson improved to 116-13 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney. The win made Clemson 93-3 against unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season.

- Clemson moved to 4-1 in night games this season and 21-4 in night games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson is now 40-7 at night since 2015.

- Clemson finished its fifth perfect November under Dabo Swinney. Swinney's 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2019 teams also posted 4-0 marks in November. Clemson has now won 19 of its last 20 November games.

- Clemson improved to 76-6 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season. All six of Clemson's regular season losses in that span have been decided by a final margin of 10 or fewer points.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney earned his 149th career win in his 14th season (including an interim stint in 2008) to tie Barry Switzer (149) for the third-most wins through the first 15 seasons of a coaching career in FBS history.

- Swinney improved to 8-5 all-time against South Carolina. He became the first Clemson coach with seven straight wins against South Carolina, surpassing the six straight wins secured by Jess Neely from 1934-39.

- Swinney joined Frank Howard (13) as the only Clemson coaches to defeat South Carolina eight times.

- Clemson is now 65-4 when scoring first since 2015.

- Clemson led 17-0 at halftime. Clemson has now won

95 of its last 97 games, including each of its last 58, when leading at halftime.

- Clemson improved to 117-2 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Clemson now has a 115-2 record when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011.

-- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

ONE OF THE ERA'S WINNINGEST PROGRAMS

Clemson's recent success has been particularly pronounced since the start of Clemson's six-year streak of College Football Playoff appearances dating to 2015. Alabama and Clemson rank No. 1 and 2 in the country in wins in that span, with the two teams combining for five out of six national championships in that time frame.

10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson entered 2021 riding a streak of 10 consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's 10th consecutive 10-win season in 2020 made Clemson only the third program in FBS history to produce a "double-double" — double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, shared by Florida State (1987-2000) and Alabama (2008-21). With a win in the postseason, Clemson can keep its streak alive and become only the third program ever to produce 11 consecutive 10-win seasons.

The Tigers have 17 10-win seasons in school history, with 10 coming under Dabo Swinney.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Each of Clemson's last four senior classes have placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 13 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

Even though the Tigers entered the final week of the season still alive in the conference title race for "A"nother "C"lemson "C"hampionship, Clemson's six-year reign atop the ACC ended in 2021.

With a sixth straight conference title in 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships, five more than Florida State, which ranks second with 15.

That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

In 2020, Clemson and Oklahoma's six-year streaks of outright titles made the two programs the first among current Power Five programs to win at least six straight outright titles since Oklahoma (12 from 1948-59) as part of the now-dissolved Big 8 Conference.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 26 conference

championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers.

NO. 1 FOR NO. 1 RECRUITS

As Clemson was in the midst of the winningest decade in school history and tied for the third-winningest decade in major college football history, Head Coach Dabo Swinney would frequently point out that Clemson accomplished its goals by finding the right fits for its program in recruiting rather than chasing recruiting rankings.

Swinney often noted that Clemson accomplished its immense success in his tenure despite never signing the No. 1 recruiting class in the country. That changed in 2020, when ESPN ranked Clemson's 2020 group as the nation's top recruiting class. Clemson also recorded its highest rankings in both Rivals (No. 2) and 247 Sports (No. 3) history.

Clemson has signed the nation's consensus top player in two out of the last four recruiting cycles, welcoming quarterback Trevor Lawrence in 2018 and defensive tackle Bryan Bresee in 2020.

Clemson and LSU are the only teams in the country to sign Rivals' No. 1 recruit twice in a three-year span since Dabo Swinney was named head coach at Clemson.

Clemson, LSU and Alabama (two each) are tied for the most No. 1 recruits signed since 2009 per Rivals' rankings. Clemson, Georgia and USC (two each) are tied for the most in that span per the 247 Composite.

Prior to the Class of 2022 currently still being recruited, Clemson's recruiting classes finished in the top 15 of at least one of three primary recruiting services (ESPN, Rivals and 247 Sports) every year since 2011. Clemson is one of only seven schools to produce a Top 15 class in each of the 11 previous recruiting cycles, a group that also includes Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, LSU, Notre Dame and Ohio State. After that group, the next longest active streak of Top 15 classes is six (Florida).

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's pristine recent track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson finished 13th in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-17 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, Clemson ranked 3.5 on average, a ratings bump of nearly 10 full spots. Each of those Clemson classes won at least 50 games in their four-year window.

ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .805, sitting as one of only 14 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

CHASING WIN NO. 150

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 149-36 in 185 career games and needs one more win to reach 150 career victories.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, only 15 have ever reached 150 career wins in 200 games or less. Fourteen of the 15 are College Football Hall of Famers, with the 15th — Urban Meyer — likely to be inducted upon meeting eligibility requirements.

The fastest Swinney could reach 150 victories would be 186 games with a Cheez-It Bowl win. That would make him the sixth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins — two games behind Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno — and the fourth-fastest in the modern era.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+ FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, is the only coach to reach 150 career wins as Clemson's head coach. He recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

According to data furnished by Sports Reference, only five active coaches (now four with the dismissal of Gary Patterson at TCU) entered the year with at least 150 career victories as an FBS coach (excluding wins coaching at other levels). All four active coaches

needed at least 205 games to reach 150 career wins.

FIRST 13+ SEASONS

Dabo Swinney is tied for the third-most wins through the first 15 years of a head coaching career in FBS history. With a win against Boston College on Oct. 2, he passed rival-turned-friend Steve Spurrier, who won 142 games in his first 15 seasons at Duke and Florida. With a win at Louisville on Nov. 7, he moved past current ACC Network analyst Mark Richt (145).

The most impressive part of Swinney's appearance on this list? Swinney is in only his 14th season (and his 13th full season) in 2021.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has had Clemson among the sport's final four teams in each of the last six seasons, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils had two championships, a second-place finish and two semifinal losses in their run. Nick Saban's Final Four history includes three championships, two runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss (and this year's College Football Playoff pending), while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and two semifinal losses.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 19th overall season at Clemson in 2021, including his 13th full season as head coach (and his 14th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2020, there have been nearly 400 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims), but only one such tenure at Clemson. Clemson and Duke are the only schools in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 11 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

A FAMILIAR NO. 1

A year ago, Clemson opened the 2020 season at No. 1 atop both polls, marking the program's second straight top preseason ranking. With the top selection in the AP Poll, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Seeing Clemson at No. 1 had become familiar in recent years, as 2020 represented the sixth straight year in which Clemson appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll. Dabo Swinney joined Nick Saban (13) as the only coach in AP Poll history (since 1936) to lead a team to at least one No. 1 ranking in six consecutive years. Clemson, Alabama (14 from 2008-21) and Miami (seven from 1986-92) are the only programs to appear at No. 1 in at least six consecutive years.

CHAMPIONSHIP HERITAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. Every Clemson signing class under Swinney except for the most recent Class of 2021 has at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every signing class from 2012-20 earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

RESPONDING THE RIGHT WAY

At the end of September, Clemson sat at 2-2 with a bevy of injuries, and the Tigers' season seemingly sat at a very early crossroads.

Clemson has since rebounded from that 2-2 start by winning seven of its last eight games to enter bowl season at 9-3 and in position to potentially extend its historic streak of 10-win seasons.

"I really think that this has been one of [Swinney's] best coaching jobs," Wake Forest Head Coach and ACC Coach of the Year Dave Clawson said. "Sometimes when everything goes your way, things run themselves. This has not been a year that everything bounced their way, and you can tell he's never lost his team. They've gotten better."

Swinney routinely cited the foundation of the program and its success being paved through adversity throughout the season. He often cited the ability to teach lessons in a season like this that resonate differently at 4-3 than they do at 15-0. He noted that though his team has had disappointment, true football adversity was something most of his team had not faced.

So Swinney, who said he's "really had a lot of fun coaching this group and coaching this season," challenged his squad to respond and finish the right way.

"They've rallied, they've battled," Swinney said. "The foundation of our program has won the day for us."

On Oct. 1, 28 different Power Five teams had two or more losses. Of that group, only Utah (10-3) and Clemson (9-3) rebounded to enter bowl season with at least nine wins.

CARDIAC CLEMSON

In rattling off 10 consecutive 10-win seasons from 2011-20, Clemson's dominance resulted in the Tigers playing only 32 games decided by one possession, the 13th-fewest in the FBS in that span (with many of the teams ranked lower having not played at the FBS level throughout that entire timeframe). Despite the few opportunities, no team had a better record in one-score games in that span than Clemson, which was 27-5 in games decided by eight or fewer points from 2011-20.

The Tigers diverged a bit from their runaway-game reputation in 2021, as cardiac Clemson had six of its 11 games against FBS opponents this year be decided by eight or fewer points (and eight of the 11 be decided by 10 or fewer points). Clemson nearly played another one-possession game against Florida State on Oct. 30 until a defensive touchdown on a desperation lateral play on the final play of the game gave Clemson a 10-point victory margin over the Seminoles.

Clemson's six one-score games in 2021 are tied for 17th-most in the country, and Clemson's eight games with a margin of 10 or fewer points are tied for seventh nationally. Clemson's ranking in one-score games was substantially higher before Clemson closed the regular season with wins of 27, 21 and 30 points against UConn, Wake Forest and South Carolina, respectively.

Clemson's proclivity for nail-biters in 2021 was particularly pronounced in conference play. Seven of Clemson's eight ACC games were decided by 10 or fewer points, Clemson's most such games in a conference season since the formation of the ACC in 1953.

Clemson's seven such conference games in 2021 outpaced their last four years combined, as the Tigers played only six ACC total regular season games decided by 10 or fewer points from 2017-20, going 4-2 in those contests in that span.

DEALING WITH ATTRITION

Clemson's attrition was on display in its 27-17 loss at No. 23 Pitt on Oct. 23 and continued as its season progressed. By Head Coach Dabo Swinney's accounting, Clemson finished that Pitt game without the services of 18 scholarship players.

"You can't really do anything about injuries," Swinney said after the game. "It's some of the craziest stuff I've ever been a part of since I've been in college football. It's crazy some of the things we've dealt with."

Of note offensively:

- At running back, Clemson had planned to redshirt Phil Mafah, but an injury to Will Shipley and the departures of Lyn-J Dixon and Michel Dukes pressed him into action. Former walk-on Darien Rencher was Clemson's third running back behind Kobe Pace and Mafah during Shipley's absence. Pace and Shipley missed the UConn game, as Rencher and Mafah were the only scholarship running backs to play in the game.

- At receiver, three of Clemson's four listed co-starters at wide receiver were unavailable at Pitt, leaving Clemson with only five receivers who came to Clemson as scholarship signees. The lone healthy listed co-starter was Justyn Ross, who missed all of 2020 following surgery to correct a career-threatening spinal condition. Ross was potentially lost for the season with a foot injury against UConn, so in a crucial 21-point ACC win against CFP No. 10 Wake Forest, Clemson started two true freshmen (Beaux Collins and Dacari Collins) and super senior original walk-on Will Swinney at receiver.

- On the offensive line, Clemson has had eight different players start at least one game, including Matt Bockhorst, who started at three different positions in three straight games before being lost for the season to injury. That group includes Mason Trotter, who started at center against Syracuse while returning from a broken hand and learned of his start the morning of the game after presumptive starter Hunter Rayburn entered

COVID protocol that morning. Clemson also lost the services of rotational depth linemen John Williams and Tayquon Johnson before the season ever started, and lost highly regarded freshman Dietrick Pennington for the season after Clemson's second game.

STRENGTH OF RECORD

One of the metrics used by the College Football Playoff committee to evaluate teams is Strength of Record, described by SportSource Analytics as such: "The Strength of Record (SoR) Rating is a measurement of a team's performance against the average margin of victory of the opponent. For example, if a team plays an opponent that wins by 7 points on average and they beat that team by 10 points, then they would have SoR Rating of +17 for that game. Each game is also adjusted for home and away factors. When viewed as an overall rating, it tells you that a team typically performs better (if positive) or worse (if negative) against opponents than teams typically perform against them."

Clemson ranks fourth in the ACC and 20th in the nation in Strength of Record in 2021.

Clemson's lone losses this year came in one-score games against No. 3 Georgia and No. 18 North Carolina State and a 10-point loss to No. 13 Pitt, three teams that have a combined 32-6 record (all AP rankings current).

Clemson has lost only 10 games since 2015 and only six games since 2018. Six of Clemson's 10 losses since 2015 have come against AP Top 5 teams.

Including current records for 2021 and final records for teams in previous seasons, the opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 102-24, a winning percentage of .810. Since 2018, opponents responsible for Clemson's defeats have a combined final record of 63-9 (.875).

WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

In Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, the Tigers have routinely responded well following dips in the AP rankings.

Under Swinney, Clemson is 28-6 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2021 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign. Before a loss to Georgia to open 2021, Clemson had won its previous 17 games when entering ranked lower in the AP Poll than in its previous game.

Clemson is also 29-7 in games following a loss under Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Losses to Top 5 opponents Ohio State and Georgia across the 2020 and 2021 seasons ended a streak of 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, which had been the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history. Previously, Clemson's last time losing back-to-back games had come in 2011.

ACC WINNING STREAKS

Clemson has won 58 of its last 63 games vs. ACC opponents, a time frame that features ACC Championship Game wins against North Carolina (2015), Virginia Tech (2016), Miami (2017), Pitt (2018), Virginia (2019) and Notre Dame (2020). Clemson has an active winning streak against 11 of its 13 ACC counterparts, with at least three games comprising each of those 11 streaks.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

Prior to a loss at NC State in late September, Clemson had won 36 consecutive games against teams unranked in the AP Poll, the program's second-longest such winning streak since the inception of the poll in 1936. Prior to the loss to NC State, Clemson's last defeat at the hands of an unranked squad had come in 2017 at Syracuse.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson is 116-13 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney, including wins in 93 of 96 games against those unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season.

On Nov. 30, the Atlantic Coast Conference announced its 2021 All-ACC Team, including 10 selections from Clemson, second-most in the conference. Clemson has now produced double-digit All-ACC selections in each of the last seven seasons.

Clemson collected four first-team selections, all from the defense, as defensive tackle Tyler Davis, linebacker James Skalski and cornerbacks Andrew Booth Jr. and Mario Goodrich all earned first-team nods. Three Clemson players were selected to the second team, including offensive tackle Jordan McFadden, defensive end Myles Murphy and placekicker B.T. Potter. Clemson also secured two individual honors, including wide receiver Justyn Ross sharing the Brian Piccolo Award after his inspiring comeback in 2021 as well as true freshman safety Andrew Mukuba collecting Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Ross became Clemson's fifth Piccolo Award winner since the award's institution in 1970, and Mukuba joined Dexter Lawrence (2016) and Bryan Bresee (2020) as Clemson's third ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year since the league created the honor in 2006. Shipley's early-career performance is another entry in Clemson's recent history of feature backs declaring their arrival immediately. Clemson was led in rushing yards in each of the previous seven years by either Wayne Gallman (2014-16) or Travis Etienne (2017-20), both of whom led Clemson in rushing in their freshman seasons (Gallman's redshirt freshman season in 2014 and Etienne's true freshman season in 2017). The last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing in a season was 2013 (Rod McDowell), when Shipley was in

fifth grade.

Shipley recorded career highs with 25 carries and 128 rushing yards in Clemson's 30-20 win against Florida State on Oct. 30. He added his second and third 100-yard games on Nov. 20 against Wake Forest and Nov. 27 at South Carolina.

Shipley's three 100-yard games give Clemson 27 100-yard rushing games by Clemson true freshmen since the NCAA established permanent freshman eligibility for the 1972 football season.

Don King holds the Clemson single-game rushing record for a true freshman with 234 at Fordham on Nov. 8, 1952 when the NCAA permitted freshman eligibility during the Korean War.

Asked for the proper pronunciation of his name, Clemson quarterback DJ Uiagalelei will walk you through the syllables of his surname of Samoan descent:

"ooh-ee-AHN-guh-luh-lay"

But he'll also offer a helpful tip:

"Or you can just call me 'Big Cinco.'"

In his two starts in 2020, Uiagalelei completed 59-of-85 passes for 390.5 yards per game with four touchdowns and no interceptions. His 162.1 pass efficiency rating in those two starts was nearly 11 points higher than Lawrence's 151.5 mark in his 11 starts as a first-year freshman.

COMEBACK CINCO

In Uigalelei's first career start in October of 2020, Clemson trailed Boston College at home, 28-10, with 1:02 remaining in the first half. With no timeouts, Uigalelei led a 10-play, 42-yard drive in 55 seconds to get a B.T. Potter 50-yard field goal before half. The drive jumpstarted Clemson's comeback 34-28 victory, as the Tigers scored 24 unanswered for the win. Of note:

- Clemson trailed by 18 points in the first half, making the win Clemson's largest home comeback victory in school history.

- The win tied for the second-largest comeback win in school history at any location, matching an 18-point comeback at Maryland in 2011, which had also stood as Clemson's largest comeback win under Dabo Swinney.

This year, Uigalelei helped engineer fourth-quarter comeback wins in back-to-back games against Florida State on Oct. 30 and at Louisville on Nov. 6. Against Florida State, Clemson led going into the fourth quarter but fell behind on a strip-sack recovered for a touchdown with fewer than eight minutes to play. Uigalelei and Clemson engineered a three-play, 58-yard touchdown drive to reclaim the lead with fewer than three minutes to play in the win.

A week later, Clemson trailed 24-17 entering the fourth quarter but outscored the Cardinals 13-0 in the final frame to earn the victory. The wins gave Clemson fourth-quarter comeback victories in back-to-back games for the first time in the Dabo Swinney era.

It was the first time since 2005 that Clemson played consecutive games that it won with a fourth-quarter comeback. In the season opener that year, Clemson defeated Texas A&M, 25-24, after kicker Jad Dean kicked a 42-yard game-winning field goal with two seconds remaining for the win. A week later, Clemson faced a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit against Maryland, but used a 51-yard Charlie Whitehurst touchdown pass and a 38-yard touchdown run by Reggie Merriweather to outscore the Terps 14-0 in the final frame for a 28-24 win.

Uigalelei is one of seven Clemson quarterbacks since 2000 to engineer multiple fourth-quarter wins (tied or trailing) and one of four to do so at least three times.

Uigalelei's explosiveness in the vertical passing

game and his deft decision-making in the running game made highlight reels from 2020, but his ability to protect the ball was elite in his debut season as well.

In 2020, Uigalelei became only the second FBS player since 2000 to throw at least 115 passes and record at least five passing touchdowns and no interceptions, joining Georgia Southern's Shai Werts from 2018.

Uigalelei's first career interception came on his 12th pass of the 2021 season opener, the 129th pass attempt of his career. His interception-free streak of 128 passes concluded only 37 attempts shy of the Clemson record for most pass attempts without an interception to start a career, held by Cullen Harper (first 165 passes of his career that spanned 2005-07).

He ranks second in Clemson records in career interception percentage among qualified passers.

DJU'S RIVALRY DEBUT

Uigalelei made his debut in the Clemson-South Carolina rivalry in 2021 and led the Tigers to a 30-0 road win in Columbia. ROSS' RETURN

Wide receiver Justyn Ross missed the 2020 season after surgery following the diagnosis of a congenital fusion in his spine. Ross participated in spring ball in a non-contact capacity with an eye toward full participation in fall camp, a plan that was successful in current NFL receiver and former Clemson star Mike Williams' return from a neck injury in 2016 en route to becoming the No. 7 overall pick in the NFL Draft.

Ross played his first game action in exactly 600 days in the season opener against Georgia, recording Clemson's first reception of the season to a standing ovation from Clemson faithful in Charlotte and finishing with four catches for 26 yards.

Ross missed the back end of the season following surgery to repair a stress fracture in his foot. Even though he missed the entire 2020 campaign, Ross will leave Clemson tied for fifth in school history in career touchdown receptions and 10th and 11th in school history in career receiving yards and career receptions, respectively.

Ross had two of the most productive first two seasons by a Clemson player in school history, recording 1,865 receiving yards and 17 touchdowns from 2018-19. His 17 touchdowns through two seasons were the most through two years in school history, and his 1,865 yards in those years trailed only Sammy Watkins (1,927) and Artavis Scott (1,866) during the first two years of a Clemson career.

Davis Allen took ownership of Clemson's starting tight end position heading into Clemson's fourth game this season. In game six, with fellow tight end Braden Galloway sidelined with a concussion, Allen was a focal point of Clemson's offense (and special teams) in a 17-14 win at Syracuse.

Allen recorded eight receptions for 49 yards, including a spectacular highlight-reel grab to convert a fake punt pass from punter Will Spiers and extend an eventual touchdown drive. His eight receptions were one shy of the Clemson single-game record for a tight end, shared by Brandon Ford (2012) and John McMakin (1970).

KEEPING OFFENSES OUT

Through the first three weeks of the season, Clemson did not allow a touchdown on defense, the nation's only team able to make that claim.

Clemson surrendered its first offensive touchdown of the season with five seconds remaining in the first quarter at NC State, ending a streak of 194:55 to open the season in which Clemson did not allow an offensive touchdown. The touchdown came on the 38th drive faced by Clemson's defense this season and was Clemson's longest season-opening streak without allowing an offensive touchdown since 1950, a year in which Clemson similarly did not allow an offensive touchdown until the first quarter of the season's fourth game.

Clemson's streak in the first three games was the first time it held three consecutive offenses without a touchdown at any point in a season since midseason 1990 (Appalachian State, Duke and Georgia). It represented the first time Clemson had not allowed an offensive touchdown in any of its first three games of a season since 1950, when Clemson shut out Presbyterian, Missouri and NC State in the season's first three contests.

Clemson authored its fourth touchdown-free performance on defense this season on Nov. 13, when the only seven points surrendered by the Tigers against UConn came on a kickoff return. Clemson surrendered its first *rushing* touchdown of the season in the third quarter against Boston College, the Tigers' fifth game of the season. A week after the performance against UConn, Clemson held Wake Forest to 36 rushing yards. Clemson's 15 rushing yards allowed over that two-week span were Clemson's fewest allowed in a two-game stretch on record back to 1954. The previous two-game best in that timeframe was 20 against South Carolina State and Florida State in early 2014.

THE BRUISE BROTHERS

Behind Clemson's headline defensive line is a pair of hard-hitting veteran linebackers that led Head Coach Dabo Swinney to coin the duo as "The Bruise Brothers."

Middle linebacker James Skalski, the only player ever to play in (and win) five ACC Championship Games, returned for his sixth season at Clemson in 2021 following an all-conference performance in 2020. He took a mid-career redshirt in 2018, playing four games including the ACC Championship Game, Cotton Bowl and National Championship Game in what he and others called "the sweetest gig on the team" before becoming a full-time starter in 2019. The physical presence of No. 47 led Swinney to call him "a war daddy" and call his participation in practices and scrimmages "just unfair."

Skalski's running mate at the second level of the defense continues to be fifth-year linebacker Baylon Spector, whose strong performances in 2020 included an ACC Linebacker of the Week selection for his play against Virginia.

"[Spector] and Skalski, it's a reflection of how they practice. I'm telling you, every single rep at practice is a game rep to those two guys. They put a ton of work in every week to get themselves ready to play," Swinney said. "I know how hard they've worked. It's the unseen grind. That's a ton of work that they've put in."

"I call them The Bruise Brothers. Those two right there, it's something to watch and it's fun to see."

The duo's success is not merely a function of their physicality and hard work. Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables praised the cerebral nature of their play as well.

"They've developed some really good chemistry together. They're always having side chat conversations when I'm trying to talk with the whole defense and I'm having to correct at practice, and I look over and they're coaching each other. Sometimes that bothers me, I'll be honest, [smiling] but I absolutely love it because it's always about the details of what we're talking about," Venables said. "They're like two coaches, really, out on the field."

SPECTOR AND SKALSKI SHOW OUT

When his running mate James Skalski exited Clemson's late-September game at NC State early with an injury, linebacker Baylon Spector stepped up.

Spector recorded a team-high 19 tackles, the most by a Clemson player in a single game under Dabo Swinney, one ahead of Spencer Shuey's 18 tackles against Georgia in 2013. Spector's career high in tackles prior to the 19-tackle performance was 13 against Virginia in 2020. Spector's 19 tackles against NC State were the most by a Clemson player since 2002, when John Leake recorded 21 stops against Maryland.

In late October, Skalski nearly matched Spector's feat, putting up a career-high 18 tackles at Pitt.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE SPECIALISTS

- **B.T. Potter, PK:** Clemson's cannon-legged 2020 Lou Groza Award semifinalist has been remarkably consistent on both his shortest kicks and his longest kicks throughout his career. He is 183-for-184 on PATs, and his 122 consecutive PATs prior to his first miss shattered Clemson's school record (88 by Mark Buchholz from 2007-08). Potter, who has been one of the nation's foremost touchback specialists throughout his career (see below), is also 6-for-8 on field goal attempts of 50 yards or more during his Clemson tenure, setting Clemson's record for career field goals of 50 yards or more. His lone misses in that range came on attempts of 61 and 58 yards. He is Clemson's career record holder in both 40-yard field goals (25) and 50-yard field goals (six).

- **Will Spiers, P:** Already a four-year starter at punter entering his "Super Senior" campaign in 2021, Spiers already holds school records for starts by a punter, career punts, punts downed inside the 20 and total punting yards. His 2020 season was his best to date, as his 44.0-yards-per-punt average in 2020 represented the second-best single-season mark in school history. He averaged at least 50.0 yards per punt in three-straight games against Miami, Georgia Tech and Syracuse in 2020, a career-long streak and a Clemson record with a minimum of three punts per game.

- **Will Swinney, H:** Spiers is not the only four-year starter "Super Senior" among Clemson's special teams corps. The 2021 season will be Swinney's fifth as Clemson's primary holder, and the 2021 Peter Mortell Holder of the Year finalist has held for more placekicks than any player in Clemson history. Since 2017, Clemson has scored 557 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs. Swinney, a 2020 William V. Campbell Trophy semifinalist, has held for 550 of those 557 points, and including a receiving touchdown vs. Louisville in 2018 and a rushing touchdown vs. UConn in 2021, he's touched the ball for 561 total points for

Clemson in his career. Clemson's only seven kicking points not held by Will Swinney in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew. Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

- **Jack Maddox, LS:** Maddox is in his second year as Clemson's starting long snapper after earning the job in the spring of 2020. A native of Acton, Mass., his attention first turned to Clemson after visiting his uncle, who is a professor at the university. He walked on at Clemson, and in August 2020, he was en route to Clemson's Applied Science Lab when Head Coach Dabo Swinney approached him and asked him if he'd already paid his fall tuition. Upon Maddox confirming that he had, Swinney told him he'd have a little extra money in his pocket that semester, as Maddox was being placed on scholarship.

- **Quinn Castner, PK:** Castner joined Clemson's program in August 2020. At 140 pounds, the 5-foot-5 walk-on became the 15th player below 150 pounds to appear on Clemson's roster since 1944. He became a viral sensation for his 2020 debut against The Citadel once Dabo Swinney, after exaggerating Castner's vitals as "5-foot-3 and 80 pounds... maybe," told the following anecdote about Castner and Clemson's current culture: "I put him out there and gave him a chance to kick one off, and listen, he ain't kicked one deep in the end zone yet since he's been here... So I put the first [team] kickoff out there and said, 'All right, boys, we've got a little wind, I'm putting my man Quinn out there. Y'all know this is coming out and y'all need some dadgum practice...' Potter booms 'em out of the end zone and I wanted them to get a little work, so I got my man Quinn out there, and what does he do? He kicks that sucker four yards deep in the end zone, and the whole team went crazy. They just *loved* it, and, I mean, that's *special*."

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson played 102 players against South Carolina State in the second game of the 2021 season, its third-most in a game under Dabo Swinney. Clemson played 90 against UConn on Nov. 13, just shy of cracking the Top 10 in Swinney's tenure.

YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Including four new debuts vs. UConn on Nov. 13, 22 first-year freshmen have already made their debut for Clemson this season. Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's four most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

In the season opener against Georgia, Clemson started two true freshmen in the first game of a season for the first time under Dabo Swinney. Marcus Tate earned the nod at left guard, becoming only the third true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener at Clemson since 1973, joining center James Farr (1980) and tackle Mitch Hyatt (2015). Meanwhile, safety Andrew Mukuba became the first Clemson true freshman to start at defensive back in records back

to 1973. It marked only the second time in that span Clemson started two first-year freshmen in a season opener, joining the 1980 opener against Rice.

Clemson's recent track record of prolific offense and stingy defense has helped Clemson produce nine of its 11 best single-game yardage differentials in school history since 2014. Only Clemson's plus-467-yard margin in total yards against The Citadel in 1954 and its plus-464-yard margin against Wake Forest in 2000 predate the 2014 season among the Top 10 yardage margins in Clemson annals.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson's distribution of talent throughout its offense and its willingness to adapt to how defenses are game planning has resulted in the Tigers fielding one of the nation's more balanced offenses in recent years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 56 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 22 such games since the start of the 2018 season are among the five most in the country.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

A LEGEND RETURNS

Among the lengthy list of moments that have led to Clemson's recent seat among college football's oligarchy, one came at Union County High School in Lake Butler, Fla. on Feb. 1, 2006. It was that day that a five-star running back named C.J. Spiller publicly supported the vision of his recruiter, a young wide

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receivers coach named Dabo Swinney, by committing to Clemson on National Signing Day.

Spiller spent four years building a sparkling on-field and off-field legacy at Clemson, and now, Clemson has welcomed Spiller back as one of its 10 full-time assistant coaches.

In February, 33-year-old Spiller officially assumed leadership of Clemson's running backs.

"[Spiller] is one of the greatest ambassadors that we've had for our program for a long time and now for him to be able to come back and be able to sow seeds into these young men and teach all the things he's learned throughout his career, there's not a guy on this staff that's more committed and more ALL IN for Clemson than C.J. Spiller, that's for sure," Swinney said.

Spiller joined Clemson's staff on a full-time basis after joining the program as an unpaid coaching intern in 2020 while pursuing his Master's degree in athletic leadership. Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Spiller was one of the most decorated players in Clemson history, earning selection last month for induction in the College Football Hall of Fame Class of 2021.

"It doesn't happen very often that you're able to coach at your alma mater, especially in your first gig, and for me to have that opportunity, I don't take it lightly," Spiller said.

Spiller's historic Clemson playing career covered 2006-09, including a senior campaign in which won ACC Player of the Year and was a unanimous first-team All-American en route to finishing sixth in Heisman Trophy voting. That year, he joined Reggie Bush as the only players in college football history with 3,000 rushing yards, 1,500 yards in kickoff returns, 1,000 receiving yards and 500 yards in punt returns. He became the fourth Clemson graduate among the Tigers' 10 full-time assistant coaches, at the time joining Brandon Streeter (1999), Tony Elliott (2002) and Tyler Grisham (2009).

YARDS PER PLAY

Clemson shattered its school record for yards per play in 2018 at 7.35, the program's first time exceeding seven yards per play in a season. That record stood for barely 12 months until Clemson broke it again in 2019 by averaging 7.38 yards per play. Clemson then averaged 6.69 yards per play in 2020, giving Clemson its top three yards-per-play averages in school history all within the last three years.

In 2018-19, Clemson became only the third school since 2000 to average 7.35 or better yards per play in back-to-back seasons, joining Alabama, which did it across 2018-19, and Oklahoma, which was in the midst of a four-year streak across the 2016-19 seasons.

Collectively, Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play across the 2018-20 seasons, joining Oklahoma (7.9) and Alabama (7.8) as the only programs to average at least seven yards per play across those three seasons.

650-POINT SEASONS

Before scoring 522 points (tied for second-most in the country) in a pandemic-truncated 2020 season, Clemson scored 659 points in 2019, concluding the season only five points shy of tying the school record of 664 set in 2018.

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

A year ago, Clemson recorded 23 takeaways in 2020, tied for fourth-most in the country. It marked Clemson's second straight season finishing in the Top 10 in the nation in takeaways. The Tigers have been among the nation's leaders in takeaways since 2018.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Clemson's offense and defense have both been dominant in possessions following turnovers since the 2018 ACC Championship Game. Since that time, the Tigers hold a 325-90 advantage against opponents in points off turnovers.

Clemson enters the Cheez-It Bowl having allowed only 24 points off turnovers this season. However, 21 of those points have come off of two pick-sixes and a strip-sack fumble return, so the Clemson defense has only surrendered three points on possessions following a Clemson turnover this season. The only offense to score following a Clemson turnover this year was South Carolina State, which turned a Michel Dukes fumble at the Clemson 36 into a field goal.

Points off turnovers accounted for the difference in two Clemson wins in October. Clemson won the points-off-turnovers battle, 6-0, in a six-point win against Boston College and then won that margin, 7-0, in a three-point win at Syracuse.

Clemson also won the points off turnover margin, 14-0, against CFP No. 10 Wake Forest on Nov. 20. Clemson's defense held Wake Forest's prolific offense to zero points off turnovers despite Wake Forest getting three possessions off takeaways in the game.

-- NOTABLE --

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Clemson has matched its on-field success in recent years with national acclaim for its success in the classroom. Of note:

- Clemson set a program record in APR in the NCAA's most recent national figures released in May 2020, recording a multi-year APR score of 993 for the 2018-19 academic year. The performance marked the third straight year Clemson broke its program record in the metric after breaking its 992 from 2017-18, which had broken its 987 mark from 2016-17.

- Clemson's 993 multi-year APR ranked fourth in the Power Five and fifth among FBS programs, trailing only Washington (999), Ole Miss (997), Northwestern (995) and Air Force (995). That metric covered a four-year span in which Clemson matched its off-field success with on-field accolades that included a 55-4 record, four College Football Playoff appearances and two national championships.

- The NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual APR Public Recognition Award, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports. From 2009-10 through 2018-19, only 37 of the 130 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition since the 2009-10 academic year. Only 30 of them earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern programs were the only ones to earn the award nine or more times in that 10-year span. Clemson would have earned a 10th APR Public Recognition Award for 2019-20 after recording a perfect 1000 for the term, but the NCAA suspended national APR reporting as a function of the COVID-19

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pandemic.

- Prior to the NCAA suspending APR reporting, Clemson was one of only six FBS programs with an active streak of having earned an APR Public Recognition Award in each of the last three academic years, a group that also included Air Force, Boston College, Navy, Northwestern and Washington.

- With its most recent award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson was the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

In addition to the APR honors, in November 2019, the AFCA announced that Clemson had repeated as Academic Achievement Award winners, making Clemson the only school in the country to earn the award across both of the 2018-19 seasons. Clemson had earned the award a year earlier as well in the midst of major college football's first 15-0 season since 1897.

TIGERS DOMINATE FALL 2020 SEMESTER

In the face of one of the most abnormal learning environments in the history of the university, Clemson's student-athletes responded to academic adversity impressively last fall. Among Clemson's academic achievements for the Fall 2020 semester were:

- A program-record 74 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better, including 11 perfect 4.0s. Among the freshmen, seven of Clemson's eight summer enrollees earned a 3.0 or better in their initial semester on campus, as did three of the four summer preferred walk-ons.

- Seventeen current football student-athletes graduated in December, including Elijah Turner, who earned a second degree by securing a Master's in athletic leadership and graduating with a perfect 4.0 GPA. Twelve different majors were represented by this year's graduates.

- Three players completed their undergraduate degrees in three years (K.J. Henry, Trevor Lawrence and Xavier Thomas) after all enrolled in January 2018. In recent history, the only other scholarship players to graduate from Clemson in this time frame were

Christian Wilkins (2.5 years), Deshaun Watson and Artavis Scott (three years).

- Eight of the 17 fall graduates did so with honors, completing their degrees with a cumulative GPA over a 3.0: Matt Bockhorst, Peter Cote, Justin Foster, K.J. Henry, Trevor Lawrence, Darien Rencher, Will Spiers and Elijah Turner.

- Clemson entered 2020 bowl season with 23 graduates on the roster. Included in this number were double graduates Nyles Pinckney (Sociology and Criminal Justice) and Elijah Turner (Communication and Athletic Leadership).

ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

Over the previous three seasons, Clemson games accounted for the four most-watched college football games and five of the 10 most-watched games since 2018.

Clemson once again drew the nation's attention in its 2021 season opener. Via ESPN PR: "The top-five faceoff between Georgia and Clemson averaged 8,863,000 viewers, making the matchup the second-most-viewed Kickoff Saturday game in the past 20 years (Florida State vs. Alabama, 2017). The contest ranked in the top five regular season college football games on ABC the past five years."

The interest in watching Clemson play hasn't been limited to television broadcasts. Clemson continues to provide one of the marquee in-venue experiences in all of sports, as Clemson entered 2021 having been ranked in the Top 20 in the nation average home attendance at Memorial Stadium for 40 straight seasons. Clemson finished third nationally in cumulative total attendance in 2020.

LOUD AND PROUD DEATH VALLEY CROWD

In a 2021 campaign in which Clemson played far more close games than its crowd had become accustomed, Clemson's home crowd made an impact all year long.

In six home games in 2021, Clemson opponents false started 24 times. After forcing four false starts in the first two games (one by SC State, three by Georgia Tech), Clemson and its crowd lured opponents into 20 false starts across Clemson's final four home games.

Clemson played its first home prime-time game of the season on Oct. 2, hosting Boston College for a 7:30 p.m. game at Death Valley. Clemson's announced crowd of 79,159 people made its impact in a 19-13 win, helping force five false starts by the Eagles.

Death Valley repeated the feat on Nov. 13, as UConn false started five times in a 44-7 Clemson win. Death Valley also helped cause Florida State to false start four times in a 30-20 Clemson win on Oct. 30.

On Nov. 20, Clemson fans helped force Wake Forest into six false starts as the Tigers defeated the CFP No. 10-ranked squad by three touchdowns. The six false starts by Wake Forest tied for the most by an opponent at Death Valley since 2014.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – No. 3 Clemson and No. 5 Georgia played only the fourth season opener between two AP Top 5 teams since 2000, as Georgia won a defensive slugfest with the Tigers, 10-3, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

James Skalski finished with a game-high 14 tackles as the Clemson held Georgia's offense to just three points. The lone touchdown of the contest came in the second quarter, when quarterback DJ Uiagalelei threw his first career interception to snap his interception-free streak of 128 consecutive passes, which Georgia's Christopher Smith returned 74 yards for a touchdown.

Clemson's stout defense allowed only 256 total yards. The 10 points surrendered also marked the eighth time in history that Clemson held an AP Top 5 opponent to 10 or fewer points. It was Clemson's first loss when holding an opponent fewer than 23 points since 2010.

Clemson was led offensively by wide receiver Joseph Ngata, who finished the game with six catches for 110 yards, and quarterback DJ Uiagalelei, who was 19-for-37 with 178 yards passing. Ngata recorded his first career 100-yard game.

Clemson was hampered offensively by a 7-1 deficit in sacks. The Tigers ultimately got the board with 9:08 left in the fourth quarter on a 22-yard field goal from B.T. Potter.

True freshman guard Marcus Tate and true freshman safety Andrew Mukuba both started, marking only the second time since 1973 that Clemson has had two true freshmen start a season opener (tight end Jeff Wells and center James Farr in 1980).

The loss concluded Clemson's streak of 127 consecutive games since losing back-to-back contests, the longest such streak in ACC history.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Five different Tigers found the end zone and Clemson amassed 262 passing and 242 rushing yards, as the sixth-ranked Tigers downed SC State, 49-3. A stadium full of 78,609 fans gathered to celebrate Clemson's first home contest of the season, as well as tributes to 9/11 first responders and C.J. Spiller's College Football Hall of Fame induction.

DJ Uiagalelei finished the day 14-for-24 for 171 yards and a touchdown while also scampering for 23 yards and two touchdowns on five carries. Will Shipley led the Tigers' ground game, carrying the ball 80 yards on eight carries for two touchdowns. Thirteen different players caught a pass, led by Justyn Ross, who scored his first touchdown since the 2019 ACC Championship Game vs. Virginia prior to missing the 2020 season.

Clemson's defense held SC State to 235 total yards of offense and held an opponent without an offensive touchdown for the second-straight game. Ruke Orhoro and Jeremiah Trotter, Jr. tied for the team lead in tackles with five each, while Trotter led the team in solo tackles with four. Clemson tallied one sack on the day but combined for 10 tackles for loss.

The bulk of the Tigers' offense came in the first quarter, when Clemson put up 28 consecutive points in the opening frame. The Tigers jumped out to a 35-0 lead with just under 7:00 left in the second quarter, before the Bulldogs got on the board just before half with a 27-yard field goal.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Clemson freshman running back Will Shipley scored two touchdowns as No. 6 Clemson Tigers used a late defensive stand to hold on for a 14-8 victory over Georgia Tech. The victory was the Tigers' 30th consecutive home victory, the 24th home winning streak of 30 or more games in FBS history.

The game saw a one hour and 52 minute lightning delay with 0:32 to play in the first half, spanning 5:03 p.m. to 6:55 p.m., including an observed halftime.

After Shipley's first touchdown in the first quarter, Georgia Tech kept the Tigers close throughout, getting on the board first with a field goal after the lightning delay. The Jackets scored all eight of their points after the delay, and recovered an onside kick with 1:19 to play in the game and the Tigers ahead by eight. However, the Clemson defense held as the Yellow Jackets were stopped on fourth-and-goal at the two-yard line, marking a third straight game for Clemson without surrendering a touchdown on defense.

The Yellow Jackets added two final points on a safety with 0:07 seconds to play in the contest.

Shipley scored the lone touchdown in the first half on a three-yard run that capped an eight-play 39-yard drive, and his second touchdown came in the fourth quarter on another three-yard run that capped a 14-play 66-yard drive.

Brent Cimaglia would make two field goals of 22 yards for Georgia Tech.

With his two rushing touchdowns in the game, Shipley became the first Clemson player to rush for multiple touchdowns in consecutive games as a true freshman since Travis Etienne in 2017. He finished the night with 21 carries for 88 yards and two touchdowns.

RALEIGH, N.C. – No. 9 Clemson fell, 27-21, to NC State in double overtime. Clemson mounted a late touchdown drive to force overtime and led briefly in the extra session before NC State halted the Tigers on 4th-and-5 in double overtime after a touchdown.

DJ Uiagalelei started the scoring for the Tigers with a 32-yard strike to Justyn Ross, who leaped and toe-tapped in the back of the end zone. The Wolfpack answered two drives later when Devin Leary hit Emeka Emezie on a 17-yard score. Both teams remained scoreless until midway through the third quarter, when Leary hit Devin Carter to give the Wolfpack a 14-7 lead with 9:19 to play.

The Tigers answered with 10:52 to play in the fourth quarter, when Will Shipley took a handoff five yards on tie the game at 14-14. NC State kicker Christopher Dunn missed a potential game-winning 39-yard field goal wide left as time expired in regulation.

Clemson scored first in the extra session when Uiagalelei connected with Ross on a 9-yard post route. The Wolfpack answered on the ensuing possession when Leary connected with Thayer Thomas for a 2-yard touchdown.

NC State then notched the eventual game-winner when Leary and Carter connected for a 22-yard strike in the back corner of the end zone before an NC State stop on the ensuing Clemson possession.

Baylon Spector led the Tigers defense with 19 tackles, surpassing Spencer Shuey's 18 tackles against Georgia in 2013 for the most by a Clemson player in a single game under Dabo Swinney. Andrew Mukuba and R.J. Mickens also had double-digit tackles; both players had 10 stops.

Defensively, the Tigers tallied nine tackles for loss, four sacks and forced three turnovers, including K.J. Henry pouncing on a fumble with 49 seconds remaining deep in Clemson territory to secure the win.

Running back Kobe Pace got the Tigers on the board first with a 59-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, part of his career-high 125 rushing yards and 210 all-purpose yards.

The rest of Clemson's scoring came from Potter, who made field goals of 18, 35, 40 and 42 yards to tie his career high of four field goals set in 2020 at Notre Dame.

The Tigers held a 13-6 halftime lead after Boston College scored on two field goals by Connor Lytton. The Eagles would score their lone touchdown of the game on a 3-yard run by Patrick Garwo on their opening drive of the second half to tie up the game, the first rushing touchdown surrendered by Clemson in 2021.

The last two of Potter's four field goals gave Clemson a 19-13 lead with a little more than four minutes to play. The Tigers stopped Boston College with 2:14 to play on fourth down, but went three-and-out on the ensuing possession. The Eagles then drove deep into Clemson territory. On 2nd-and-10 from the 11-yard line, a wild snap got past Boston College quarterback Dennis Grosel. Henry fell on the loose ball to give possession back to Clemson and all but end the contest and give Clemson the homecoming victory.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. – B.T. Potter's 40-yard field goal with 9:22 remaining proved to be the difference, as Clemson held on to defeat Syracuse, 17-14. Syracuse placekicker Andre Szmyt's 47-yard game-tying field goal attempt sailed left with 38 seconds to play, allowing the Tigers to seal the victory.

Clemson controlled the clock offensively, tallying 32:59 of possession. Kobe Pace tallied 76 yards and a touchdown on 14 carries, and quarterback DJ Uiagalelei was 21-of-34 for 181 yards and a score through the air, and added 26 yards on the ground.

Defensively, Clemson forced four three-and-outs, piled up six tackles for loss, broke up eight passes and tallied two sacks. Cornerback Mario Goodrich recorded four pass breakups, one shy of the school record.

Joseph Ngata capped a 12-play 87-yard drive with 1:03 to play in the first quarter, as he hauled in an acrobatic catch in the end zone. Syracuse answered on the next drive with a 91-yard drive to tie the score at 7-7.

After trading punts, Clemson took over with 2:06 to play in the half on its own 32-yard line. The Clemson drive appeared to stall out before punter Will Spiers hit Davis Allen for 17 yards on 4th-and-5. Uiagalelei hit Justyn Ross over the middle to bring the Tigers to the two-yard line, when Pace punched it in with just nine seconds to play in the half.

Following Potter's 40-yard fourth-quarter field goal, the Orange's Trebor Pena scored with 7:18 to play in the game on a 62-yard pass from Garrett Shrader to cut the Tigers' lead to 17-14. After a Syracuse stop, the Orange went on a 14-play, 63-yard drive to get into field goal range, but Szmyt's attempt missed left and gave the Tigers the ball to run out the final 38 seconds.

PITTSBURGH – The Tiger defense held No. 23 Pitt 21 points below its season scoring average, but Clemson fell on the road at No. 23 Pittsburgh, 27-17. The game marked Clemson's first road game at Pitt in series history and represented Clemson's first set of back-to-back games north of the Mason-Dixon Line since 1952.

The Tigers started quickly, with Phil Mafah capping an eight-play, 80-yard drive with a touchdown in the first quarter. Kenny Pickett threw two touchdowns in the final 3:18 of the first half — one each to Jordan Addison and Taysir Mack — to give Pitt a 14-7 halftime lead.

The Panthers added to the lead early in the second half when SirVocea Dennis picked off a DJ Uiagalelei shovel pass and took it back 50 yards to put the Panthers ahead, 21-7.

In the third quarter, B.T. Potter added three points for Clemson on a drive led by quarterback Taisun Phommachanh, as Potter hit a 42-yard field goal to cut the Panthers' lead to 21-10. Pitt would add field goals of 44 and 34 yards to extend the lead to 27-10.

Upon reentering the game for Phommachanh, Uiagalelei recorded his third rushing touchdown of the season on a six-yard run that capped a five-play, 72-yard drive. However, upon receiving the ensuing kickoff, Pitt ran off the remaining 7:56 with a 15-play, 49-yard clock-killing drive to end the game and give the Panthers the win.

Linebacker James Skalski led the Tigers defensively with a career-high 18 tackles.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Will Shipley capped a three-play, 58-yard drive with a 21-yard go-ahead touchdown run with 2:53 to play and Barrett Carter scored on a fumble recovery on a desperation lateral to give Clemson a 30-20 comeback win against Florida State.

Shipley recorded his first 100-yard game of his career as he finished with 128 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 25 carries.

B.T. Potter opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 47-yard field goal. Florida State answered with a one-yard touchdown pass from Jordan Travis to Jashaun Corbin, but Myles Murphy blocked the extra point, Clemson's first blocked placekick since 2020 and first blocked PAT since 2018.

Phil Mafah's 63-yard scamper set up an 11-yard touchdown from DJ Uiagalelei to Davis Allen to give the Tigers a 10-6 advantage. But on the first play of FSU's ensuing drive, Lawrance Toafili caught a wheel route for a 75-yard touchdown after Toafili rolled over a Clemson defender and kept his feet on his way to the end zone.

An 83-yard drive capped by Shipley's first touchdown of the game gave Clemson a 17-13 lead at the half.

After a scoreless third quarter, Jermaine Johnson strip-sacked Uiagalelei, recovered the fumble and ran six yards for a touchdown to give Florida State a 20-17 lead with 7:39 remaining, setting the stage for Shipley and Carter's eventual heroics.

Clemson held Florida State to just 65 yards rushing and 241 yards of total offense. Murphy led the unit with five tackles, a blocked PAT and two of the Tigers' season-high six sacks.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. – Facing first-and-goal from its own two-yard line with 1:18 to play, Clemson's defense came up with a game-winning goal line stand to earn a 30-24 road win at Louisville, giving the Tigers back-to-back fourth-quarter comeback wins for the first time since 2005.

DJ Uiagalelei scored the go-ahead touchdown on an eight-yard touchdown run up the middle with 4:12 to play, one of three touchdowns for which he was responsible. B.T. Potter's third field goal stretched the lead to six before the game-winning stand.

The teams traded touchdowns on their opening possessions. After a Louisville touchdown, Uiagalelei connected with Beau Collins for a 46-yard touchdown to culminate a three-play scoring drive. Collins finished with 106 yards on six catches, becoming the first Clemson true freshman with 100 receiving yards since Justyn Ross against Alabama to end 2018.

A touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to tight end Davis Allen tied the game 17-17 at halftime, but Clemson trailed 24-17 entering the fourth quarter after Malik Cunningham's second touchdown run of the game. Clemson then outscored the Cardinals 13-0 in the final frame to earn the win.

Linebacker Trenton Simpson led the defense with 10 tackles and 2.0 sacks, both career highs. Offensively, Uiagalelei completed 18-of-30 passes for a season-high 220 yards with two passing touchdowns in addition to the go-ahead rushing touchdown.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Clemson held UConn's offense to just 99 yards in cruising to a 44-7 win at Memorial Stadium. Clemson improved to 7-3 with the win, while UConn fell to 1-9 following the schools' first all-time meeting in football.

Defensively, Clemson registered six sacks from six different players in holding the Huskies' offense to just 1.7 yards per play on the afternoon. Clemson held UConn to -21 yards rushing, tied for its second-fewest allowed in school history. The Tiger defense did not allow an offensive touchdown for the fourth time in 2021.

DJ Uiagalelei threw for a season-high 241 yards and a touchdown, and the Tigers ran for three more. Phil Mafah led the way rushing with 49 yards and a touchdown, while Dacari Collins had six catches for 97 yards.

UConn's Brian Brewton muffed the opening kickoff but picked up the ball and returned it 99 yards for a touchdown to give the Huskies an early 7-0 lead.

B.T. Potter connected on the 49-yard field goal to cut the score to 7-3. With fourth and goal from the six-yard line on the following possession, the Tigers faked the field goal and Will Swinney ran it in for the touchdown to put the Tigers up 10-7. A 20-point second quarter including two touchdowns and two more Potter field goals helped put the game out of reach by halftime.

Clemson held UConn to 0-of-14 on third downs, its first time holding an opponent without a third down conversion since 1992 against North Carolina.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Clemson finished with an undefeated home record for a fifth straight season, defeating Wake Forest, 48-27, at Memorial Stadium. Wake Forest entered the game 13th in the AP Poll, 12th in the Coaches Poll and 10th in the College Football Playoff rankings.

A trio of underclassmen stood out offensively. Sophomore Kobe Pace romped for 191 yards and a pair of touchdowns on the ground, while freshman Will Shipley accounted added 112 rushing yards, two rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown. Freshman Beaux Collins added 137 yards and a score on four catches. Between Shipley and Collins, the game marked the first time on record that a 100-yard rushing game and 100-yard receiving game were recorded by Clemson true freshmen in a single game.

Clemson's defense recorded 10 tackles for loss, eight sacks and three takeaways while holding Wake Forest to just 36 yards rushing on 31 carries.

Clemson ran out to a 10-0 lead and led 17-10 at the half thanks to a touchdown run and a touchdown pass by Shipley as well as a 50-yard field goal by B.T. Potter, his school-record-setting sixth 50-plus-yarder of his career.

But Clemson took full control in the third quarter, as two Pace touchdown runs bookended a highlight-reel one-handed catch-and-run touchdown by Collins. Clemson led 38-10 after the third frame. Wake Forest was able to engineer two touchdown drives in the fourth quarter, but Clemson added another 10 points in the frame to send another senior class out undefeated at home.

COLUMBIA, S.C. – Clemson closed the regular season with a 30-0 road win against South Carolina, the Tigers' record-tying seventh consecutive win in the series. The Tigers shut out the Gamecocks for the first time since 1989 to finish the regular season with a 9-3 record.

It was the fifth time Clemson held an opponent without an offensive touchdown this season, as the Tigers held South Carolina to just 206 yards of offense and only 43 yards rushing on 20 carries.

Offensively, Clemson rushed for 265 yards on 43 carries and scored all three touchdowns on the ground. Freshman Will Shipley led the way with 128 yards on 19 carries, his second straight game with more than 100 yards rushing. Kobe Pace added 58 yards, including a 34-yard touchdown, and Phil Mafah ran for 43 yards and a score.

The Tigers set the tone early, as Shipley went 29 yards for a touchdown on the opening possession. Two drives later, Andrew Booth Jr.'s first of two interceptions on the day gave Clemson a short field, leading to a 29-yard field goal by B.T. Potter.

In the first half, Clemson outgained South Carolina, 258-75 and held the Gamecocks to just three first downs to take a 17-0 lead into the break.

The Tigers added to the lead on a Potter field goal on the first possession of the second half. On Potter's third field goal of the day, he set the Clemson record for field goals of 40-plus yards for both a season and a career.

Mafah scored Clemson's final points from six yards out with 2:30 to play to bring the final score to 30-0.

Clemson's defense held one last time, with Jeremiah Trotter Jr. tackling Zeb Noland at the Clemson 3-yard line on a scramble as time expired to keep the Gamecocks out of the end zone and off the scoreboard.
