CLEMSON SEEKS 10TH WIN OF THE SEASON SATURDAY ON SENIOR DAY

Clemson will attempt to extend the third-longest streak of consecutive 10-win seasons in FBS history on Saturday, Nov. 19, when the 9-1 Tigers host the 5-5 Miami Hurricanes on Clemson's Senior Day. Kickoff at Memorial Stadium is set for 3:30 p.m. ET.

Clemson has won at least 10 games in 11 consecutive seasons. A win on Saturday would be Clemson's 10th of the 2022 season and would allow the Tigers to join record-holders Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21) as the only FBS programs ever to win 10 or more games in 12 consecutive seasons.

Though Saturday's game will not be Clemson's 2022 home finale, Clemson will honor its 2022 senior class prior to the game. In recent years in which Clemson has hosted its regular season finale against South Carolina, the Tigers have opted to instead honor the group in the game preceding that charged rivalry contest. Clemson's seniors are 43-7 in the last four seasons, the third-most wins in the country in that span behind Alabama (45) and Georgia (44). The group will have the opportunity to become the 11th senior class in Clemson history to win at least three conference championships when it faces North Carolina in the ACC Championship Game on Dec. 3.

A win Saturday would allow the Tigers to finish regular season conference play with a perfect ACC record for the ninth time in program history, joining the 1967 (6-0), 1978 (6-0), 1981 (6-0), 1982 (6-0), 1983 (7-0), 2015 (8-0), 2018 (8-0) and 2019 (8-0) seasons.

After an admittedly disappointing performance at Notre Dame, Clemson's defensive front seven responded against Louisville with what Head Coach Dabo Swinney

called in his postgame press conference a "dominant" performance. Clemson (79) ranks tied for fifth in the nation in tackles for loss this season, and Saturday's game will feature two of the nation's top four teams in cumulative tackles for loss over the last 10-plus seasons.

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WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to produce its 19th 10-win season in program history. It would be Clemson's 12th 10-win season under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to win 10 games for a school-record 12th consecutive season. Clemson is presently one of three FBS programs ever to post 11 consecutive 10-win seasons alongside Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21). Clemson is already the only school to win 10 games in double-digit consecutive seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

- Clemson attempting to win at least 10 of the first 11 games of a season for the 12th time in program history, joining the 1948 (11-0), 1978 (10-1), 1981 (11-0), 2012 (10-1), 2013 (10-1), 2015 (11-0), 2016 (10-1), 2017 (10-1), 2018 (11-0), 2019 (11-0) and 2020 (10-1) campaigns.

- Clemson attempting to win its sixth home game of the season to add to its active 11-year streak of winning at least six games at Memorial Stadium. The next longest streak of six-plus home wins in the country entering 2022 was five years (Notre Dame).

- Clemson attempting to win its 40th consecutive home game to extend the longest home winning streak in ACC history. No member of Clemson's roster has lost a home game at Clemson in their careers.

- Clemson (39) attempting to tie the 1907-18 Notre Dame Fighting Irish (40) for the eighth-longest home winning streak in FBS history.

- Clemson attempting to produce only the ninth 40-game home winning streak in FBS history. It would be the first in the FBS since Nebraska from 1991-98 (47).

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to join Alabama's Bear Bryant (57 from 1963-82), Michigan's Fielding Yost (50 from 1901-07) and Texas' Darrell Royal (42 from 1968-76) as the only FBS head coaches ever to preside over the entirety of a program's home winning streak of 40 games or more.

- Clemson attempting to add to its national-best 58-1 record at home in the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).

- Clemson attempting to take the all-time series lead against Miami at 7-6. It would give Clemson the lead in the all-time series for the first time.

- Clemson attempting to even its all-time home record against Miami at 2-2.

- Clemson attempting to win a fourth straight game against Miami for the first time in school history.

- Clemson and Miami playing for the third time in regular season play since 2015, including Clemson handing Miami its worst loss in program history, a 58-0 road victory for the Tigers in 2015, as well as Clemson defeating Miami 42-17 in a battle of Top 10 teams at Death Valley in 2020.

- Clemson attempting to finish with a perfect record in ACC regular season play for the ninth time in program history, joining the 1967 (6-0), 1978 (6-0), 1981 (6-0), 1982 (6-0), 1983 (7-0), 2015 (8-0), 2018 (8-0) and 2019 (8-0) seasons.

- Clemson attempting to join the 2015 (8-0), 2018 (8-0), 2019 (8-0) and 2020 (8-1) squads as the only teams in school history to win eight conference games in a regular season.

- Clemson attempting to win an 11th consecutive game against conference opponents, dating to last season. It would tie for Clemson's fourth-longest streak against conference opponents since the formation of the ACC in 1953.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 36-9 against opponents historically from the ACC Coastal Division,

including postseason play, under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. That figure includes games against traditional Coastal opponents in a divisionless season in 2020. Clemson has won 21 of its last 23 games against the Coastal Division since 2015.

- Clemson facing Miami Head Coach Mario Cristobal for the first time. A win would improve Clemson to 42-5 since 2011 when facing an opposing head coach for the first time.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (159) attempting to tie Oklahoma's Bob Stoops (160) for the second-most victories in the first 15 seasons of a head coaching career in FBS history.

- Clemson attempting to reach 400 yards of offense in consecutive games for the second time this season (vs. Furman and Louisiana Tech).

- Clemson attempting to average 6.0 or more yards per play in consecutive games for the first time since a three-game streak against Furman, Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest earlier this season.

- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in 64 of its 65 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson attempting to end a three-game streak of losing the turnover margin. Clemson has not lost the turnover margin in four consecutive games since 2011.

- Clemson (four) entering the game with its most blocked kicks (including punts) in a season since 2016 (five).

- Clemson attempting to record at least four sacks in consecutive games for the first time since a four-game streak against Florida State, Louisville, UConn and Wake Forest a year ago.

- Clemson (1,241) needing nine tackles for loss to become the first program to reach 1,250 TFLs since 2012. Alabama (1,035) ranks second in that span but has 206 fewer tackles for loss than Clemson.

- Tight end Davis Allen (10) needing one touchdown reception to pass Bennie Cunningham (10 from 1972-75) for sole possession of the fifth-most touchdown catches by a tight end in Clemson history. He is two touchdowns shy of a four-way tie with John McMakin (12 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (12 from 2009-11) and Brandon Ford (12 from 2009-12) for second.

- Allen (three) needing one more touchdown catch to tie his single-season career high in touchdown receptions (four in 2020).

- Allen (three) needing a touchdown reception to make Allen and Jake Briningstool the first tight end duo in Clemson history to each record four touchdown catches in a single season.

- Allen (28) needing one more reception to set a new single-season career high (28 in 2021) and two more receptions to post the first 30-catch season by a Clemson tight end since 2016 (46, Jordan Leggett).

- Defensive tackle Bryan Bresee attempting to post a full sack in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.

- Bresee (8.0) needing two more sacks to join Myles Murphy (17.5), Xavier Thomas (14.5), Tyler Davis (14.0), K.J. Henry (12.0) and Trenton Simpson (10.5) to become Clemson's sixth active player with at least 10 career sacks.

- Linebacker Barrett Carter entering the game with 8.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, two interceptions and two forced fumbles. Before 2022, the last two Power Five players to reach those numbers in all four categories were both Butkus Award winners: Clemson's Isaiah Simmons (2019) and Georgia's Nakobe Dean (2021).

- Carter attempting to record a sack in consecutive games for the second time this season (vs. NC State

and Boston College).

- Carter attempting to become the first Clemson player to post at least 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games since Clelin Ferrell in 2018 against Texas A&M and Georgia Southern.

- Carter attempting to record an interception in consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- Carter attempting to become the first Clemson player with an interception in back-to-back games since cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. against Wake Forest and South Carolina last November.

- Carter attempting to become the first Clemson linebacker with an interception in consecutive games since Isaiah Simmons in the 2019 ACC Championship Game and 2019 Fiesta Bowl.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis (7.0 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks) entering the game within striking distance of his single-season career highs in tackles for loss (9.0 in 2019) and sacks (5.5 in 2019).

- Running back Phil Mafah attempting to record 100

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rushing yards in consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- Mafah attempting to score in consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- Mafah (three in 2021 and 2022) needing one more rushing touchdown to set a single-season career high.

- Defensive end Myles Murphy (six) needing one forced fumble to tie Levon Kirkland, Keith Adams and Vic Beasley (seven each) for seventh-most forced fumbles in a career in Clemson history.

- Murphy (6.5) needing a sack to surpass his single-season career high set in 2021 (7.0).

- Murphy (17.5) needing 3.0 sacks to enter the Top 10 for career sacks in Clemson history by tying No. 10 Chester McGlockton (20.5 from 1989-91).

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (69) needing three field goals to tie or four field goals to break Nelson Welch (72 from 1991-94) for the Clemson record for career field goals.

- Potter (85) needing 15 more points to become the first player in ACC history to score 100 points in four different seasons.

- Potter appearing in his 66th career game to pass Nolan Turner (65 from 2017-21) for sole possession of the fourth-most career games played in Clemson history.

- Potter making his 51st career start at placekicker, pulling him one shy of the Clemson record at that position set by Chandler Catanzaro (52 from 2010-13).

- Potter attempting to score in a 51st consecutive game. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season after serving as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018. The Clemson record is 53 games, set by Chandler Catanzaro from 2010-13.

- Potter attempting to add to his Clemson records for career field goals of 40 yards or more (32) and 50 yards or more (eight).

- Running back Will Shipley (career-high 899 rushing yards this season) needing 101 rushing yards to post the 23rd 1,000-yard rushing season in Clemson history.

- Shipley (12) needing two rushing touchdowns to move into the Top 10 in Clemson history in rushing touchdowns in a single season. He would join an existing four-way tie for seventh (14 each by Fred Cone in 1950, Cliff Austin in 1982, Emory Smith in 1995 and Travis Etienne in 2020).

- Shipley (23) sitting four touchdowns shy of entering the Top 10 in school history in career rushing touchdowns. Cliff Austin and Woodrow Dantzler are currently tied for 10th with 27 each.

- Shipley (two) attempting to become the first Clemson player to record 200 all-purpose yards in three games in a single season since Sammy Watkins in 2011 (three).

- Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei attempting to improve to 21-5 as a starter. He would tie Steve Fuller (21-11-3 from 1957-78) and Mike Eppley (21-5-1 from 1980-84) for the eighth-most wins by a Clemson starting quarterback since World War II.

- Uiagalelei (33) needing two touchdown passes to tie or three touchdown passes to pass Nealon Greene (35 from 1994-97) for seventh-most career touchdown passes in Clemson history.

- Uiagalelei (482) needing 18 completions to become the sixth player in Clemson history to reach 500 career pass completions.

- Uiagalelei (2,179) needing 68 passing yards to surpass his 2,246 yards from 2021 and set a new single-season career high.

- Uiagalelei (19) needing two more passing touchdowns to enter the Top 10 in single-season passing touchdowns in Clemson history by tying Woodrow Dantzler's 2001 season and Charlie Whitehurst's 2003 campaign (21 each).

- Uiagalelei (13) needing three rushing touchdowns to tie Kelly Bryant (16 from 2015-18) for the sixth-most career rushing touchdowns by a Clemson quarterback since 1953.

- Cornerback Nate Wiggins (nine) sitting four pass breakups shy of the Clemson sophomore record for pass breakups in a single season (13), shared by James Lott (1987) and Justin Miller (2003).

-- ON THE OPPONENT --

SERIES HISTORY VS. MIAMI (FLA.)

Saturday's game will be the 13th all-time meeting between Clemson and Miami. With a win, Clemson would take a 7-6 lead in the all-time series and give the Tigers their first series lead against the Hurricanes.

Prior to a neutral site victory by Clemson in 2017 and a home win in 2020, the road team had won five consecutive meetings in the series. From 2004-09, all three meetings between the teams resulted in overtime victories for the road team. The stretch represented just the second time in FBS history that two teams played three straight overtime games in a series.

Prior to 2004, the two schools had not met since the 1956 season, a 21-0 Miami victory. Clemson went on to finish with a 7-2-2 record in 1956 and was ranked 19th in the final AP Poll, while the Hurricanes finished 8-1-1 and were ranked sixth. The Tigers also played in the Orange Bowl that year against Colorado and lost 27-21, and, thus, both of Clemson's losses in 1956 came in the same stadium — the Orange Bowl.

Clemson is riding a three-game winning streak in its series with Miami, including wins in 2015, 2017 and 2020 by a combined score of 138-20.

MEMORABLE SERIES MOMENTS

- **Jan. 1, 1951** - Clemson appeared in the Orange Bowl for the first time and squeaked out a 15-14 win against Miami to complete an undefeated season. Sterling Smith's tackle of Frank Smith in the end zone gave Clemson a safety with under six minutes left in the game and gave the Tigers the victory. Don Wade also had two interceptions in the game. It was Clemson's second undefeated season in the last three years for Frank Howard's Tigers.

- **Nov. 16, 1956** - Vice President Richard Nixon was in attendance for Clemson's game against Miami at the Orange Bowl (then known as Burdine Stadium). Surrounded by security from various agencies, a loud explosion sounded and alarmed the bodyguard along with the Vice President. To everyone's relief, it was discovered that it was just the cannon fired off by a Clemson cheerleader when Clemson kicked off.

- **Nov. 6, 2004** - Clemson scored 21 unanswered points and held No. 10 Miami scoreless in the second half to upset the Hurricanes, 24-17, in overtime at the Orange Bowl. It was Clemson's third win over a top-10 team in

two seasons, as running back Reggie Merriweather, who will call Saturday's game as part of the Clemson Athletic Network, rushed for 114 yards and three touchdowns including the overtime game-winner.

- **Sept. 17, 2005** - Miami defeated Clemson, 36-30, in a triple-overtime contest before a sellout crowd at Death Valley. Clemson tied the score with 15 seconds left on a 27-yard field goal by Jad Dean. Clemson tied the score at the end of the first overtime on a fourth-down touchdown pass from Whitehurst to Curtis Baham. Tyrone Moss scored what proved to be the game-winner in the third overtime on a 25-yard run. It was the first overtime loss in Clemson history after five consecutive wins. The official length of the game was 4:10, the longest game in Clemson history.

- **Oct. 24, 2009** - Kyle Parker hit Jacoby Ford on a 26-

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yard touchdown pass on third-and-11 in overtime to lift Clemson to a 40-37 overtime victory at No. 8 Miami. It tied for the highest-ranked team Clemson defeated on the road in school history. C.J. Spiller gained 310 all-purpose yards to establish a school record. DeAndre McDaniel was named national defensive player of the week for his two interceptions, including one that he returned 23 yards for a score. There were nine lead changes in the game, as neither team scored twice in a row.

- **Oct. 24, 2015** - Clemson tied the program's largest margin of victory against an ACC opponent at the time and handed Miami its worst defeat in history with a 58-0 rout in Sun Life Stadium. The Tigers rushed for over 400 yards in the victory. Clemson would later eclipse that victory margin mark twice in 2018 with a 61-point win against Louisville and a 60-point win at Wake Forest and again in 2020 with a 66-point win at Georgia Tech.

- **Oct. 10, 2020** - Clemson dominated a matchup of AP Top 10 teams at Death Valley in a rain-soaked prime-time matchup that was ESPN's College GameDay's featured game. No. 1 Clemson's swarming defense held the No. 7 Hurricanes to only 210 yards, while Clemson's offense piled up 550 yards, led by Trevor Lawrence's 29-of-41, 292-yard passing performance and Travis Etienne's 222 all-purpose yards. In the process, Etienne became the first non-kicker in ACC history to score 400 points.

FAMILIAR FACES

Miami's visit to Death Valley on Saturday will feature some familiar faces both on the sideline and on the suite level, as the game will include the returns of wide receiver Frank Ladson Jr. and Director of Athletics Dan

Radakovich.

From 2019-21, Ladson caught 31 passes for 428 yards with six touchdowns in 652 snaps over 30 games with eight starts for the Tigers. He transferred to Miami this past offseason and has recorded 27 receptions for 298 yards and a touchdown in 10 games for the Hurricanes this season.

Radakovich served as Clemson's athletic director from 2012-21, helping further elevate Clemson's national prominence. In addition to helping Clemson to two national championships in football and success in numerous other sports, his fundraising and leadership were critical for the construction of the nation's top football facility, Clemson's Allen N. Reeves Football Complex.

Currently, the 2022 Clemson senior class...

... holds a 43-7 record in the last four years, the third-most wins in the nation in that span.

... needs two more wins to become only the eighth four-year class in school history to win at least 45 career games.

... helped Clemson qualify for three ACC Championship Games (including 2022) and, with a victory in Charlotte, can become only the 11th class in school history to win at least three ACC titles in a four-year span. The other senior classes with at least three titles in four years include the 1959, 1967, 1968, 1988, 1989, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021 seniors.

... has won 36 games against Power Five conference opponents, tied with Alabama and Georgia for the most in the country since 2019.

... has ranked in the AP Top 25 for 54 polls, in the AP Top 10 for 49 polls, and in the AP Top 5 for 45 polls. The group was also part of 14 of Clemson's 25 all-time rankings at No. 1.

... is presently 24-0 at Death Valley and has the opportunity to finish 26-0 at home in their careers, which would be one win shy of the school record for home wins set by the 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 senior classes (27).

... can become the third straight Clemson senior class to finish perfect at home, a first in the modern era. Clemson was undefeated at home in its first eight seasons from 1896-1903 but only played five total home games in that span.

In years in which Clemson hosts its annual regular season finale against South Carolina, the Tigers elect to hold Senior Day the game prior to the rivalry contest. -- FROM THE ARCHIVES --

ON THIS DATE

- **Nov. 19, 1935** - Clemson held its first night football practice. Two powerful floodlights were installed at the practice fields, as Clemson coaches wanted more practice time with the players. The extra practice did not pay off however, as Clemson lost its final game that year to Furman, 8-6.

- **Nov. 19, 1958**: Clemson defeated NC State, 13-6, and won its second ACC championship in three years.

- **Nov. 19, 1977**: A 20-yard pass from Steve Fuller to Jerry Butler with just 49 seconds left enabled Clemson to beat South Carolina 31-27. The Tigers had led 24-0, then South Carolina came back to take a 27-24 lead prior to the final Clemson drive. The win earned the Tigers a trip to the Gator Bowl.

- **Nov. 19, 1988** - Clemson gained revenge for a loss at South Carolina in 1987 with a 29-10 victory over the Gamecocks at Clemson. Rodney Williams was masterful in running the Tiger offense in his final home game. He would end his career with 32 wins, setting what was a school record at the time.

- **Nov. 19, 2005** - Clemson defeated a top-20 South Carolina team on the road for the first time in a 13-9 victory. Charlie Whitehurst beat the Gamecocks for the fourth straight year, the first time in the history of the series a starting quarterback had a perfect 4-0 record in the series.

- **Overall**: Clemson is 7-5 all-time in games contested on Nov. 19, including wins in its most recent Nov. 19 contest in 2016 (at Wake Forest).

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- Clemson gained 439 total yards, its fourth 400-yard game of the season and the Tigers' second in their last three games.

- Clemson rushed for 248 rushing yards, its third 200-yard rushing performance of the season (280 vs. Louisiana Tech; 293 vs. Syracuse). Clemson improved to 75-1 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson recorded a 26-15 advantage in first downs. Clemson now has a 122-2 record when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011 and has won its last 62 such contests.

- Wide receiver Antonio Williams recorded career highs in receptions (10) and receiving yards (83) with a touchdown.

- Williams' previous career high in receptions was five, set three times this season. His career high in receiving yards was 76, set this season at Florida State.

- Williams also added 23 punt return yards to finish with a career-high 106 all-purpose yards.

- Williams' 10 receptions were the most by a Clemson player this season and most by a Clemson player since Amari Rodgers' 10 receptions against Pitt in 2020.

- On the play, Uiagalelei (33) passed Kyle Parker (32 from 2009-10) for sole possession of the eighth-most career touchdown passes in Clemson history.

- Uiagalelei completed 19-of-27 passes for 185 yards with one touchdown. He also added 32 yards on a career-high 15 rushing attempts with a rushing touchdown. He also recorded a six-yard reception — the first of his career — on a pass from Williams.

- Uiagalelei improved to 20-5 as a starter. He became the 10th Clemson quarterback since World War II to record at least 20 wins as a starter.

- Clemson opened the scoring on an 11-yard rushing touchdown by Uiagalelei on the game's opening possession. Clemson's 12-play, 75-yard touchdown drive was Clemson's seventh scoring drive on an opening possession in 10 games this season.

- With the rushing touchdown, Uiagalelei (13) passed Rodney Williams (12 from 1985-88) for sole possession of the seventh-most rushing touchdowns by a Clemson quarterback since 1953.

- With his fifth rushing touchdown of the season, Uiagalelei set a new single-season career high in rushing touchdowns, surpassing his four in both the 2020 and 2021 seasons.

- Clemson has scored at least one rushing touchdown in 64 of its 65 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson's 64 games with a rushing touchdown since 2018 are the most in the country. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in 53 of those games, the most in the nation.

- Running back Will Shipley rushed 19 times for 97 yards with a touchdown.

- Shipley scored a highlight-reel 25-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, hurdling a Louisville defender en route to the end zone.

- The rushing touchdown was Shipley's 12th rushing touchdown of the season, giving him a new single-season career high, surpassing his 11 from his freshman campaign in 2021.

- Running back Phil Mafah rushed 10 times for 106 yards, including a 39-yard fourth-quarter touchdown run that helped seal the victory.

- Mafah's 106 yards were a career high, surpassing his 94 against Syracuse three weeks earlier.

- Mafah's 10 carries were the fewest by a Clemson 100-yard rusher since the 2020 ACC Championship Game (10 by Travis Etienne).

- Defensive tackle Bryan Bresee recorded the eighth sack of his career on a third down to end a Louisville first-quarter drive.

- Linebacker Wade Woodaz recorded his first career sack and his first career forced fumble in the third quarter.

- Linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. and safety Jalyn Phillips combined on Clemson's first takeaway of the game on a fumble forced by Trotter and recovered by Phillips. The forced fumble and recovered fumble were the first of Trotter and Phillips' respective careers.

- Linebacker Barrett Carter recorded his third sack of the season in the third quarter. Carter's sack was Clemson's third of the game and was Clemson's 475th since 2012, the most in the nation. Entering Saturday, the next-closest team in the country was Alabama (432).

- In the fourth quarter, Carter recorded his second interception of the season. It was his first since Clemson's second game of the season against Furman.

- With Phillips' fumble recovery and Carter's interception, Clemson recorded multiple takeaways in a game for the first time since a 30-20 win against No. 10 NC State on Oct. 1.

- Carter added his second sack of the game on Louisville's final drive. It was Carter's first multi-sack game of his career and the first by a Clemson linebacker since Trenton Simpson also accomplished the feat at Louisville last season.

- Carter finished the game with eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup. He became the first Clemson player under Dabo Swinney to post at least 2.0 sacks and an interception in a single game.

- Carter became the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in 2011.

- Clemson's four sacks tied for its second-most this season, trailing its five against Syracuse.

- Clemson allowed a 44-yard first quarter run, the first run of 30 or more yards against the Tigers this season. Clemson, Iowa and Washington were the only programs in the nation to enter Saturday having not allowed a run of 30 or more yards this season.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter appeared in his 65th career game to tie Nolan Turner (65 from 2017-21) for the fourth-most career games played in Clemson history.

- Potter made his 50th career start at placekicker, pulling him two shy of the Clemson record at that position set by Chandler Catanzaro (52 from 2010-13).

- Potter became the fourth player at any position to start 50 career games at Clemson all-time, joining punter Will Spiers (69), tackle Mitch Hyatt (57) and placekicker Chandler Catanzaro (52).

- With his third point of the game on a 19-yard first-quarter field goal, Potter (429 career points) became the seventh player (and sixth kicker) in ACC history to reach 425 career points.

- Potter scored in a 50th consecutive game. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season after serving as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018. The Clemson record is 53 games, set by Chandler Catanzaro from 2010-13.

- Clemson outscored Louisville, 7-0, in the "Middle Eight," defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half. Clemson improved to 62-2 since 2015 when outscoring opponents in the Middle Eight. (Note: Clemson also scored an additional touchdown 28 seconds after the Middle Eight to help extend its lead.)

- Clemson offensive lineman Will Putnam led Clemson down the Hill with the American flag prior to the game for Military Appreciation day. His father, Col. Neil Putnam, served 30 years in the United States Army, including 24 years as a member of the Special Forces regiment known commonly as Green Berets.

- Captains for the contest were cornerback Sheridan Jones, safety Jalyn Phillips, offensive lineman Will Putnam and wide receiver Drew Swinney.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson clinched the ACC Atlantic Division outright. The Tigers were already guaranteed to represent the division in the ACC Championship Game by virtue of holding head-to-head tiebreakers in the event of identical conference records.

- Clemson has now produced its 30th nine-win season in school history. It is Clemson's 13th under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, more than doubling College Football Hall of Famer Danny Ford (six).

- Clemson has now won at least nine of the first 10 games of a season for the 16th time in school history,

- Clemson pushed its all-time record against Louisville to 8-0.

- Clemson won in its first eight games against a school for the second time all-time, joining Clemson's wins in the first 29 games of its all-time series with Virginia.

- Clemson improved to 4-0 at home against Louisville all-time.

- Clemson won its 39th consecutive home game to extend the longest home winning streak in ACC history. No member of Clemson's roster has lost a home game at Clemson in their careers.

- Clemson (39) tied the 2005-11 Oklahoma Sooners (39) for the ninth-longest home winning streak in FBS history.

- Clemson has now gone six calendar years without a home loss. Clemson's last home loss was on Nov. 12, 2016 against Pitt.

- Clemson pushed its national-best home record in the College Football Playoff era (since 2014) to 58-1.

- Clemson won its 10th consecutive game against conference opponents, dating to last season. It marks Clemson's fifth conference winning streak of 10 or more games since the ACC's founding in 1953.

- Clemson won a seventh conference regular season game in a season for the 10th time in school history, joining the 1983 (7-0), 2012 (7-1), 2013 (7-1), 2015 (8-0), 2016 (7-1), 2017 (7-1), 2018 (8-0), 2019 (8-0) and 2020 (8-1) campaigns.

- Clemson improved to 48-2 in its last 50 games against ACC Atlantic Division teams, including games against typical Atlantic division foes in the division-free season in 2020.

- Clemson became the first team to win 100 games against Power Five opponents since 2013. Clemson's national-best 100 Power Five wins since 2013 include victories against Boston College (10), Wake Forest (10), Georgia Tech (9), Syracuse (9), NC State (8), Louisville

(8), Florida State (7), South Carolina (7), Notre Dame (3), Ohio State (3), Miami (3), North Carolina (3), Virginia (3), Virginia Tech (3), Alabama (2), Pitt (2), Auburn (2), Oklahoma (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1), Duke (1), Maryland (1) and Iowa State (1).

- Clemson improved to 30-7 in games following a loss under Dabo Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Clemson has not lost back-to-back games in the same season since November 2011.

- Clemson played its 150th consecutive game since losing back-to-back games in a single season. Clemson's 150-game streak dating to 2011 is the nation's longest active streak.

- Clemson improved to 31-6 under Dabo Swinney in games in which the Tigers enter ranked lower in the AP Poll than they did in its previous contest.

- Clemson is now 74-4 when scoring first since 2015.

- Clemson has now won 104 of its last 106 games, including each of its last 67, when leading at halftime.

10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson entered 2022 riding a streak of 11 consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's 10th consecutive 10-win season in 2020 made Clemson only the third program in FBS history to produce a "double-double" — double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, shared by Florida State (1987-2000) and Alabama (2008-21). This week, Clemson will attempt to join those two as the only programs ever to reach 10 wins in a dozen straight seasons.

A win this week would secure Clemson's 19th 10-win season in school history. It would be Clemson's

12th such season under Dabo Swinney.

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Clemson's recent senior classes have placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 13 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

Even though the Tigers entered the final week of the season still alive in the conference title race for "A"nother "C"lemson "C"hampionship, Clemson's six-year reign atop the ACC ended in 2021.

With a sixth straight conference title in 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships, five more than Florida State, which ranks second with 15. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 26 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC.

RETIRING WITH THE ATLANTIC BELT

On Nov. 5, Clemson earned the Atlantic Division's berth in the ACC Championship Game by virtue of holding tiebreakers, but the Tigers and Head Coach Dabo Swinney were emphatic that they wanted to win the division outright, a goal they accomplished with a 31-16 win vs. Louisville a week later.

With the ACC slated to dissolve its divisional format in 2023, it was a point of pride for Swinney that the Atlantic Division crown that had so frequently made its residence in Clemson resided in Clemson for good.

"We went and *won* the division championship," Swinney said after defeating Louisville. "That was actually one of my personal goals. It's always a goal to win the division but it was even a little bit more [of a goal] this year because we're not going to have any more divisions. This is the last one, so it's really fitting that it's here at Clemson."

Including shared titles, Clemson won nine Atlantic Division titles (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2022) since the ACC instituted the division structure in 2005. Clemson also earned an ACC Championship Game berth in a divisionless season impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Clemson played 97 games against Atlantic Division opponents in the divisional era spanning the 2005-22 seasons (including games against traditional Atlantic Division teams in 2020). Clemson went 80-17 (.825) against division teams in that span, including a 14-4 record against Boston College, 12-5 record against Florida State, 8-0 record against Louisville, 6-3 record against Maryland, 15-2 record against NC State, 9-1 record against Syracuse and a 16-2 record against Wake Forest. Clemson finished the divisional era with more ACC Championship Game berths (nine, including 2022) than losses to any single divisional opponent in that span (led by five wins by Florida State).

Clemson's intra-divisional dominance was particularly pronounced in the division's final years. Clemson closed the ACC's divisional era by winning 48 of its last 50 games against Atlantic Division teams.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers. On Nov. 12, Clemson became the first program to reach 100 victories against Power Five opponents since 2013.

Clemson's national-best 100 Power Five wins since 2013 include victories against Boston College (10), Wake Forest (10), Georgia Tech (9), Syracuse (9), NC State (8), Louisville (8), Florida State (7), South Carolina (7), Notre Dame (3), Ohio State (3), Miami (3), North Carolina (3), Virginia (3), Virginia Tech (3), Alabama (2), Pitt (2), Auburn (2), Oklahoma (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1), Duke (1), Maryland (1) and Iowa State (1).

On a year-by-year basis, Clemson has finished the season atop the country in wins against Power Five opponents four times since the institution of the College Football Playoff in 2014, including four of the last seven years. That includes 13 wins against Power Five opponents in 2018, the first team ever to reach that figure.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's pristine recent track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson finished roughly 12th in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-18 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 3.2 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of about eight-and-a-half spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 12 wins a season during their careers.

ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .811, sitting as one of only 13 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

ONE OF THE FASTEST TO 150 WINS

With a win against Iowa State in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Head Coach Dabo Swinney earned his 150th career head coaching win in only his 186th career game.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, only 16 entered 2022 having reached 150 career wins in 200 games or less. Fourteen of the 16 are College Football Hall of Famers, with the 15th and 16th — Swinney and Urban Meyer — likely to be inducted upon meeting eligibility requirements.

Swinney became the sixth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins — two games behind Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno — and the fourth-fastest in the modern era.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+ FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, is the only coach to reach 150 career wins as Clemson's head coach. He recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

FIRST 15 SEASONS

With his 150th career win in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Dabo Swinney moved into third on the all-time leaderboard for the most wins through the first 15 years of a head coaching career in FBS history, moving past College Football Hall of Famer Barry Switzer.

Impressively, Swinney has amassed his total despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year. Swinney went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October.

Swinney can continue to add to his total in his 15th season in 2022.

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 20th overall season at Clemson in 2022, including his 14th full season as head coach (and his 15th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2021, there were more than 400 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims), but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 13 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six

consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils recorded two championships, a second-place finish and three semifinal losses. Nick Saban's Final Four history includes three championships, three runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss, while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and two semifinal losses.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

HISTORY AT NO. 1

In the 2019 and 2020 preseason polls, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Prior to topping out at No. 3 in 2021, Clemson appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll in six consecutive years from 2015-20. TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

Prior to a loss at NC State in late September of 2021, Clemson had won 36 consecutive games against teams unranked in the AP Poll, the program's second-longest such winning streak since the inception of the poll in 1936. Prior to the loss to NC State, Clemson's last defeat at the hands of an unranked squad had come in 2017 at Syracuse.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson is 123-14 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney, including wins in 100 of 104 games against those unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season. Clemson had won 12 consecutive games against unranked teams until being defeated by Notre Dame on Nov. 5.

NO. 0 WR ANTONIO WILLIAMS

Despite a lot of returning experience at the outside receiver positions and at tight end, Clemson's primary weapon in the passing game in 2022 has been true freshman slot receiver Antonio Williams.

Despite not turning 18 until July and not enrolling in January like much of his recruiting class, Williams immediately turned teammates' heads upon his arrival in the summer of 2022. Clemson coaches and players alike complimented his natural route-running and football instincts, and Clemson's coaching staff has said that he is further along than Clemson legend and NFL Pro Bowler Hunter Renfrow was at the same point in his collegiate career.

Williams recorded career highs in receptions (10) and receiving yards (83) with a touchdown in a win against Louisville on Nov. 12 and also added 23 punt return yards to finish with a career-high 106 all-purpose yards. His 10 receptions tied the Clemson single-game freshman record shared by Sammy Watkins (2011 vs. Auburn) and Artavis Scott (2014 vs. Louisville and Boston College). His 10 receptions were the most by a Clemson player of any age since Amari Rodgers' 10 receptions against Pitt in 2020.

NO. 0 LB BARRETT CARTER

Linebacker Trenton Simpson's impressive 2022 campaign has led to semifinalist selections for the Butkus Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy, but the performance of one of his linebacker counterparts, sophomore Barrett Carter, has thrust a new name into conversations about one of the college football's emerging young linebackers.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney has routinely sung the praises of Carter's versatility.

"He's one of the best football players in my 20 years at Clemson," Swinney said. "He's a pure football player. I mean, the guy can play anywhere. He could go play tailback, he could play corner, he can play safety, he can play nickel/sam, he can play Mike, he can play Will.

He's special... He's so smart and he's got unbelievable instincts for the game."

Close observers of Clemson in 2022 quickly recognized Carter's impact in his first year as a starter, but Carter served notice of his arrival to the country with a signature performance against Louisville on Nov. 12. In that game, Carter recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup, becoming the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in 2011.

Carter is one of only three players in the country — and one of only two in the Power Five — with at least 8.0 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, multiple interceptions and multiple forced fumbles this season.

SHIP HAPPENS

Despite Clemson's roster featuring a backfield group that players and coaches have described as a trio of NFL-caliber running backs, sophomore Will Shipley has emerged as a difference maker early in his career and early in the 2022 season.

Shipley recorded multiple touchdowns on the ground in each of Clemson's first three games and has rushed for multiple touchdowns in eight of his 20 career games. This year, he became the first Clemson player in single-game records back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season.

Shipley is already one of six Clemson players since 2000 to record at least seven career games with multiple rushing touchdowns.

SHIP'S MAIDEN VOYAGE IN 2021

Despite missing three games of his debut season due to multiple injuries, Shipley led Clemson in rushing touchdowns (11), total touchdowns (11), rushing attempts (149) and rushing yards (738) as a true freshman in 2021.

Shipley's freshman performance in 2021 was another entry in Clemson's recent history of feature backs declaring their arrival immediately. Clemson was led in rushing yards in each of the previous seven years by either Wayne Gallman (2014-16) or Travis Etienne (2017-20), both of whom led Clemson in rushing in their freshman seasons (Gallman's redshirt freshman season in 2014 and Etienne's true freshman season in 2017). Before Shipley, the last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing in a season was 2013 (Rod McDowell), when Shipley was in fifth grade.

Shipley's 2021 performance ranked second in rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972.

INTERCEPTION AVOIDANCE

In his debut season in 2020, Uiagalelei became only the second FBS player since 2000 to throw at least 115 passes and record at least five passing touchdowns and no interceptions, joining Georgia Southern's Shai Werts from 2018.

Uiagalelei's first career interception came on his 12th pass of the 2021 season opener, the 129th pass attempt of his career. His interception-free streak of 128 passes concluded only 37 attempts shy of the Clemson record for most pass attempts without an interception to start a career, held by Cullen Harper (first 165 passes of his career that spanned 2005-07).

He ranks second in Clemson records in career interception percentage among qualified passers.

"BIG CINCO'S" BIG COMEBACKS

In Uiagalelei's first career start in October of 2020, Clemson trailed Boston College at home, 28-10, with 1:02 remaining in the first half. With no timeouts, Uiagalelei led a 10-play, 42-yard drive in 55 seconds to get a B.T. Potter 50-yard field goal before half. The drive jumpstarted Clemson's comeback 34-28 victory, as the Tigers scored 24 unanswered for the win. Of note:

- Clemson trailed by 18 points in the first half, making the win Clemson's largest home comeback victory in school history.

- The win tied for the second-largest comeback win in school history at any location, matching an 18-point comeback at Maryland in 2011, which had also stood as Clemson's largest comeback win under Dabo Swinney.

In 2021, Uiagalelei helped engineer fourth-quarter comeback wins in back-to-back games against Florida State on Oct. 30 and at Louisville on Nov. 6. Against Florida State, Clemson led going into the fourth quarter but fell behind on a strip-sack recovered for a touchdown with fewer than eight minutes to play. Uiagalelei and Clemson engineered a three-play, 58-yard touchdown drive to reclaim the lead with fewer than three minutes to play in the win.

A week later, Clemson trailed 24-17 entering the fourth quarter but outscored the Cardinals 13-0 in the final frame to earn the victory. The wins gave Clemson fourth-quarter comeback victories in back-to-back games for the first time in the Dabo Swinney era.

Uiagalelei is one of seven Clemson quarterbacks since 2000 to engineer multiple fourth-quarter wins (tied or trailing) and one of three to do so at least four times. He engineered his fourth career fourth-quarter comeback win in Clemson's dramatic double-overtime win at Wake Forest on Sept. 24.

DJU'S RIVALRY DEBUT

Uiagalelei made his Clemson-South Carolina rivalry debut in 2021 and led the Tigers to a 30-0 road win in Columbia. In doing so, he became the 23rd Clemson

quarterback since 1954 to win his first start against the Gamecocks, joining Charlie Bussey (1955), Bill Barbary (1957), Lowndes Shingler (1960), Jim Parker (1963), Jimmy Addison (1966), Ken Pengitore (1972), Mark Fellers (1974), Steve Fuller (1976), Homer Jordan (1980), Mike Eppley (1983), Rodney Williams (1985), Chris Morocco (1989), DeChane Cameron (1990), Dexter McCleon (1993), Brandon Streeter (1998), Woodrow Dantzler (1999), Charlie Whitehurst (2002), Cullen Harper (2007), Deshaun Watson (2014), Kelly Bryant (2017) and Trevor Lawrence (2018).

MAVERICK CLEARED FOR TAKEOFF

In the summer of 2021, a pair of Clemson enrollees faced a difficult decision. Though both had signed as dual-sport scholarship athletes to play football and baseball at Clemson, incoming freshman quarterback Bubba Chandler and wide receiver Will Taylor were both slated as presumptive early-round picks in the 2021 MLB Draft.

When the draft came, Chandler made known his services would be available to MLB teams and opted for pro baseball after being selected in the third round by the Pittsburgh Pirates. However, despite first-round feedback, Taylor told MLB teams he wanted to pursue his dream of playing both sports at Clemson and told Clemson coaches Dabo Swinney (football) and Monte Lee (former baseball coach) of his intent to play collegiately.

"I've heard the term 'life-changing' [money] and that's true, but also it was going to have to be the perfect situation for me to leave this place," Taylor said of his options. "We kind of knew what the college experience was going to be like. We didn't really know what the professional life was like."

The Texas Rangers took a flyer on Taylor in the 19th round, but Taylor was already mentally on his way to carving out a role on Clemson's football team. He won the starting punt return job in Clemson's season opener against Georgia and a week later recorded a 51-yard punt return against SC State.

Taylor's attitude garnered him the nickname "Maverick" from former offensive coordinator Tony Elliott.

"I called him Maverick first [because] he reminds me of a young Tom Cruise from Top Gun. He's got that feistiness to him, that edge to him. I think he likes it too," Elliott said in 2021. "He provides a spark around here. What I think he's done, too, he has garnered the respect of everybody in that locker room. It's obviously tough for him, coming in as a baseball and football guy, so he came in with some challenges. But he came in here and right away showed the guys in the locker room that 'Hey, I'm a football guy. I'll do whatever it takes,' and kind of dispelled all of that."

The electrifying slot receiver who trained as an emergency quarterback in his first year had his freshman football season end prematurely — as his freshman baseball season start late — as the result of an ACL tear in Clemson's fifth football game.

Beyond his multi-sport skillset that has Swinney and his baseball counterparts debating whether his future is as an NFL slot receiver or as an MLB outfielder, Taylor's demeanor, mindset and drive continue to impress them most.

"This kid turned down millions of dollars to play football and baseball and chase his dream," Swinney said. "He's just a natural. He's a gamer. He's got incredible moxie and poise."

-- NO. 80 WR BEAUX COLLINS --

IT'S BEAUX TIME

As a true freshman last season, wide receiver Beaux Collins debuted a touchdown celebration in which he pointed to an invisible watch on his wrist. The message? "It's Beaux Time."

The clever play on the "It's Bo Time" motto of fast food giant Bojangles was on display early this season, as Collins caught a touchdown pass in each of the Tigers' first four games, becoming the first Clemson player to record a receiving touchdown in each of the first four games of a season since freshman phenom Sammy Watkins in 2011.

After being held out of the end zone for the first time in Clemson's fifth game of the season, Collins scored his fifth touchdown of the season in Clemson's sixth game, a prime-time win at Boston College. In doing so, Collins became the first Clemson player to catch a touchdown in five of the first six games of a season since 2012 when DeAndre Hopkins accomplished the feat as part of his ACC-record 18-touchdown campaign.

-- NO. 84 TE DAVIS ALLEN --

ALLEN ASCENDING

With a touchdown reception at Florida State on Oct. 15, tight end Davis Allen became the sixth tight end in Clemson history to reach double-digit career touchdown receptions.

Allen and his tight end running mate Jake Briningstool were key in Clemson's 51-45 double-overtime win against Wake Forest on Sept. 24. Allen caught two touchdown passes among his 36 yards on four receptions while Briningstool posted career highs with six catches for 72 yards and another score. Clemson's highly lauded 2022 group was in search of its own identity and took on the identity of The Avengers.

Injuries have plagued various members of Clemson's 2022 group at various points of their careers. Since Bryan Bresee and Myles Murphy joined the unit in the class of 2020, four of the most high-profile members of the group in the eyes of NFL talent evaluators (Bresee, Murphy, Tyler Davis and Xavier Thomas) have played only eight of a possible 35 games together. Clemson is 8-0 in those contests.

Clemson produced a fully assembled group of Avengers for the first time in 2022 on Oct. 15 at Florida State. Super senior Xavier Thomas made his return on Oct. 8 at Boston College after a foot injury in fall camp cost him the first five games of the season. He recorded 2.0 sacks and a forced fumble in only six snaps against Boston College, earning ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week. One week after Thomas produced two sacks and a forced fumble, Myles Murphy matched the stat line with two sacks and a forced fumble at Florida State to retake the lead as Clemson's active career sack leader.

One week later, Tyler Davis posted 2.0 sacks vs. Syracuse, becoming the third different member of the group in as many weeks to record 2.0 sacks in a game.

It marked the first time Clemson has had three different players record 2.0 or more sacks in a game in a three-week span since 2016, when Ben Boulware (vs. South Carolina), Dexter Lawrence (vs. Virginia Tech) and Carlos Watkins (vs. Ohio State) accomplished the feat.

Clemson has ranked in the Top 15 in the country in total defense in each of the last eight seasons and has ranked among the Top 25 in scoring defense in each of those campaigns (including four Top 5 finishes in the category). The 2021 season was Clemson's sixth time finishing in the Top 10 in both categories in the last eight years.

WELCOME BACK, POTTER

Head Coach Dabo Swinney joked on Signing Day in February that Clemson's biggest signee of its 2022 recruiting class wasn't a freshman or a transfer, it was placekicker B.T. Potter, who opted to use his extra year of eligibility and return for his super senior fifth season. Potter was a Groza Award semifinalist in 2019 and entered 2022 as a prime candidate for that award, as he is Clemson's school record holder in career points by a kicker, career field goals of both 40-plus and 50-plus yards, field goal yardage and career PATs. He also ranks among the leaders in Clemson history in career points and field goals.

Potter is the only player in Clemson history to score 100 points in three different seasons, has been one of the nation's foremost kickoff specialists and holds the Clemson record for consecutive PATs made (122 from

2018-20).

Potter's 69 career field goals have covered a school-record 2,561 yards. He surpassed the 2,000-yard mark on made field goals in Clemson's season opener at Georgia Tech. With a 35-yard field goal at Boston College on Oct. 8, Potter broke the Clemson career field goal yardage record of 2,370, set by Nelson Welch from 1991-94.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like Colquitts punting at Tennessee, Swinneys holding at Clemson are becoming a dynasty of their own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 558 of those 565 points.

The only seven Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, now Clemson's starter at the position in 2022. Drew is joined on the roster this season by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, who could claim the role in future seasons. Clay's arrival creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

-- LESSONS FROM 2021 --

SUCCEEDING DESPITE ATTRITION

Attrition unlike any Clemson had faced in the Dabo Swinney era reared its head in 2021. By the time Clemson wrapped up its 2021 Cheez-It Bowl win, for various reasons, the Tigers were without the services of 30 scholarship players from the start of the season.

Clemson had 48 different players record at least one start in 2021, eight more than its 40 different starters in 2020's erratic and unpredictable pandemic-impacted season. Only 23 Clemson players played in every game, and only six started every game (including kicker and punter).

RETURNING EXPERIENCE

The 2021 Tigers faced a perfect storm of injuries, attrition, adversity and inexperience in key positions but battled to finish 10-3 in what Head Coach Dabo Swinney called a victory for the team's culture. Clemson continued its historic 10-win-season streak despite only four offensive or defensive players starting every game and despite the Tigers ending the season with an incredible 30 scholarship players unavailable.

But for all the strife those injuries created in 2021, Clemson has benefited from them greatly in 2022. Entering fall camp, Clemson returned 53 lettermen among its 81 returning players that have appeared in at least one game at Clemson, and while Clemson returned 15 of its 22 primary offensive and defensive starters from 2021, a total of 36 different returning players entered 2022 having started at least one career game for the Tigers.

STRENGTH OF RECORD

Clemson has lost only 11 games since 2015 and only seven games since 2018. Six of Clemson's 11 losses

since 2015 have come against AP Top 5 teams, and those six were all College Football Playoff participants that season.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 111-28, a winning percentage of .799. Since 2018, opponents responsible for Clemson's defeats have a combined final record of 72-13 (.847).

Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

GROUND GAME

Before being outrushed by Florida State on Oct. 15, Clemson had outrushed opponents in 10 consecutive games, dating to last season. Before Florida State in Clemson's seventh game of 2022, the most recent team to outrush Clemson in a game was Louisville on Nov. 6, 2021. The streak was the program's longest under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

In that 10-game span, Clemson outrushed opponents by an average yardage margin of 188-51 per game.

According to research assistance furnished by Stats Perform, Clemson's streak of scoring in 36 consecutive red zone drives was the program's longest of the last 12 seasons.

OWNING THE "MIDDLE EIGHT"

Since 2015, Clemson has frequently won one of the hidden "games within the game" on each side of halftime. SportSource Analytics tracks the "Middle Eight," the section of the game defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half. Clemson has outscored opponents in that time window 64 times since 2015, posting a 62-2 record in those contests.

After finishing -30 in that category in a three-loss campaign in 2021, Clemson has rebounded in the category in a big way in 2022.

Clemson's Middle Eight performance has been critical in its most complete performances. Clemson surged to a 30-20 victory against No. 10 NC State on Oct. 1 thanks to a 14-7 advantage in the Middle Eight that turned a four-point deficit (after a late second-quarter Wolfpack touchdown) into a 10-point Clemson lead. A week later, Clemson outscored Boston College, 14-0, in the Middle Eight. On Oct. 15, Clemson outscored 17-0 in that window to seize control of a tight game at Florida State.

In four of the last five seasons, Clemson led all Power Five conference teams in average players per game. Prior to the 2021 season in which Clemson's playing rotations were limited by significant attrition, the last time Clemson did not lead Power Five teams in that category was in 2016, when Clemson finished second in that category.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson played 90 players in its 48-20 win against Louisiana Tech, one shy of cracking the Top 10 under Swinney.

YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Twenty-two first-year freshmen made their debut for Clemson in 2021 and another 22 have debuted for Clemson already in 2022.

Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's four most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

In the 2021 season opener against Georgia, Clemson started two true freshmen in the first game of a season for the first time under Dabo Swinney. Safety Andrew Mukuba became the first Clemson true freshman to start at defensive back in records back to 1973, and

guard Marcus Tate became only the third true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener at Clemson since 1973, joining center James Farr (1980) and tackle Mitch Hyatt (2015).

In 2022, true freshman Blake Miller added himself to the list, as his physical and mental preparedness impressed Clemson's veterans, including fellow offensive lineman Walker Parks.

"Blake came in in January, and we had to check his birth certificate because we thought he was 25 years old," Parks said. "That might be the most developed freshman we've ever seen, out-lifting dudes and out-running dudes... He's a great player, he's smart, picks things up fast and he's physical."

By starting the season opener against Georgia Tech, Miller became only the third true freshman offensive tackle to start a season opener for Clemson since 1944 (Hyatt in 2015, Phil Prince in 1944).

THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

Clemson reliably produced a Top 30 national ranking in third-down conversion percentage every year from 2015-20, including three Top 15 rankings and two Top 10 finishes in that category. Then in 2021 with its offensive line and corps of playmakers besieged by injuries, Clemson plummeted to No. 87 in third-down conversion percentage.

This season, Clemson is back to its old ways on the money down, again ranking in the Top 25 in the nation at 45.95 percent.

Clemson has reached 500 yards in 50 of those contests, including efforts of 521 and 559 yards, respectively, against Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest this season.

Clemson's recent track record of prolific offense and stingy defense has helped Clemson produce nine of its 11 best single-game yardage differentials in school history since 2014. Only Clemson's plus-467-yard margin in total yards against The Citadel in 1954 and its plus-464-yard margin against Wake Forest in 2000 predate the 2014 season among the Top 10 yardage margins in Clemson annals.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson's distribution of talent throughout its offense and its willingness to adapt to how defenses are game planning has resulted in the Tigers fielding one of the nation's more balanced offenses in recent years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 57 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 23 such games since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

From 2018-21, Clemson was one of only two programs in the nation to both rush for at least 11,000 rushing yards and pass for at least 15,000 passing yards. Clemson was also the only program in the country to rush for 150+ rushing touchdowns and throw 120+ passing touchdowns in that span.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

YARDS PER PLAY

Clemson shattered its school record for yards per play in 2018 at 7.35, the program's first time exceeding seven yards per play in a season. That record stood for barely 12 months until Clemson broke it again in 2019 by averaging 7.38 yards per play. Including Clemson averaging 6.69 yards per play in 2020, Clemson's top three yards-per-play averages in school history have all come within the four previous seasons.

In 2018-19, Clemson became only the third school since 2000 to average 7.35 or better yards per play in back-to-back seasons, joining Alabama, which did it across 2018-19, and Oklahoma, which was in the midst of a four-year streak across the 2016-19 seasons.

Collectively, Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play across the 2018-20 seasons, joining Oklahoma (7.9) and Alabama (7.8) as the only programs to average at least seven yards per play across those three seasons.

650-POINT SEASONS

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Clemson's offense and defense have both been dominant in possessions following turnovers since the 2018 ACC Championship Game. Since that time, the Tigers hold a 377-117 advantage against opponents in points off turnovers, including a 45-24 margin in that category in 2022.

In 2021, Clemson allowed only 27 points off turnovers. However, 21 of those points came off two pick-sixes and a strip-sack fumble return, so the Clemson defense surrendered only an incredible six points on possessions following Clemson turnovers last year. The only offenses to score following a Clemson turnover in 2021 were South Carolina State, which turned a fumble at the Clemson 36 into a field goal, and Iowa State, which turned an interception at the Clemson 28 into three points.

This season, the Tigers won the points-off-turnover battle, 21-3, against Louisiana Tech and also added a touchdown after a turnover on downs, accounting for 28 points in Clemson's 28-point win. Clemson also won the points-off-turnovers margin by a 10-0 mark against No. 10 NC State in a 10-point win.

Of Clemson's 24 points allowed off turnovers this season, only 10 have been surrendered by the Clemson defense, as 14 came on a 90-yard scoop-and-score by Syracuse and a 96-yard interception return by Notre Dame.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson following:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson's fixation on finishing has led to the Tigers owning the fourth quarter, with Clemson holding a 125-2 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson is the only Power Five school to be undefeated since 2017 in games in which it holds a lead at halftime.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the summer of 2022, of 328 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 13+ full years as head coach, 322 (98 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.

- Clemson's 999 APR in that span tied Ole Miss for the FBS lead and finished tied for second nationally across all of Division I, trailing only Columbia University of the Ivy League. Clemson lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included four ACC titles, four College Football Playoff berths, two national championship game berths and the 2018 national championship.

- Clemson, Air Force, Navy, Northwestern and Washington are the only FBS programs to produce a 985+ multi-year APR in each of the last four reported cycles.

- Clemson is the only program in the country to have finished in both the Top 10 percent of NCAA APR data AND the AP Top 25 in 10 of the last 11 academic cycles.

- Clemson is the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson's national academic success has understandably resulted in the shattering of its own internal metrics:

- Clemson posted a program-record 3.11 cumulative GPA in Spring 2022, including a record 81 of 109 players earning a 3.0 or better, far exceeding the previous spring record of 63. Of the 81 with a 3.0 or better, 14 earned a perfect 4.0.

- According to current projections by Clemson's academic staff, 31 different players on Clemson's current roster are expected to have completed their degree program prior to bowl season. Entering the bowl season of its 2018 national championship campaign, Clemson's roster featured 26 graduates, the most of any bowl team that year.

ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

From 2018-21, Clemson games accounted four of the five most-watched college football games and five of the 12 most-watched games in that span.

The interest in watching Clemson play hasn't been limited to television broadcasts. Clemson continues to provide one of the marquee in-venue experiences in all of sports, as Clemson enters 2022 having been ranked in the Top 20 in the nation average home attendance at Memorial Stadium for 41 straight seasons.

DEATH VALLEY RENOVATIONS

Clemson's home opener against Furman on Sept. 10 also represented the debut of a substantial number of enhancements to Memorial Stadium and the gameday experience at Death Valley. Among the most recent updates:

- Clemson's videoboard got its first major upgrade since 2005, with nearly five times the surface area of the previous board, which was last updated before the 2012 season. The new video system, affectionately and unofficially nicknamed "DaboTron," measures 126 feet wide by 56.5 feet tall, eighth-largest in the NCAA. It also sits 20 feet off the ground, giving fans a 365-day open view into the stadium. The new board also features color LED fixtures on the inside and custom portal LED lights for the team entrance. Ribbon boards on the north, south, and west, along with new corner video boards in the west were also upgraded to be higher quality, easier to read, and more immersive.

- The eight main stadium light poles were updated to an LED system, which allows for individual light fixture control, spotlighting of Howard's Rock, and higher-quality field lighting.

- A Tiger has sat atop the video board since the 1970s, and a new Tiger will debut this season, measuring nearly 17 feet wide, with eyes that light up and a tail

that wags. The Tiger will also be able to be raised and lowered out of the board as needed. Later this season, the previous Tiger is expected to be available as an interactive element at Tigertown Tailgate. Fans will be able to take a photo with the Tiger and have the tail wag and eyes light up.

- The west side of the stadium received a facelift with the addition of IPTAY's Masters Club, a 688-seat premium area on the concourse level. As part of this renovation, concessions and restrooms in the west were relocated and expanded to the terraces, allowing easier pedestrian flow and access.

- Clemson Athletics partnered with Kulture City to make all its venues and all the programs and events that those venues host sensory inclusive. This new initiative promotes an accommodating and positive experience for all guests and fans with a sensory issue that visits athletic events at Clemson University. Clemson is the first school in the country to be Sensory Certified at every venue. Memorial Stadium, Historic Riggs Field, Littlejohn Coliseum, Jervey Gym, Doug Kingsmore Stadium, and McWhorter Stadium will all carry the Certification and will have available sensory bags, noise canceling headphones, fidget tools, verbal cue cards, and strobe reduction glasses to guests, at Guest Services Stands while attending Events in Clemson Athletic Venues.

- As part of the stadium facade updates, Clemson installed new signage honoring the all-time greats, championship years, and backlighting the traditional "Clemson Welcomes You To Death Valley" signage.

Clemson will begin Phase II of renovations following the 2022 season, including a new gameday locker room and a complete reimagining of Lot 5 and the Tiger Walk experience as a 365-day destination for Clemson fans.

NEW CONTRACT FOR SWINNEY

Clemson Director of Athletics Graham Neff announced on Sept. 8 that Clemson and Dabo Swinney had agreed to a new, enhanced contract. The terms of the agreement, approved by the Clemson University Board of Trustees Compensation Committee that day, extended Swinney's contract through the 2031 football season.

The contract reflects both Swinney's status as one of the nation's elite coaches and Clemson's continued commitment to its storied football program. Swinney, who has led Clemson to two of its three national titles in school history, is one of only two active head coaches with multiple FBS national championships.

Clemson's football success has mirrored Clemson University's continued ascent as one of the nation's premier public universities. As Clemson has made six College Football Playoff appearances in the last seven years, the University set records in applications, fundraising and numerous academic benchmarks while being named in August as one of the nation's three most-trusted public universities.

Quotes from key figures are included below:

Director of Athletics Graham Neff: "I am appreciative of the support from the Board of Trustees to President Clements to ensure we can continue to build on a firm foundation, as Clemson football and Coach Swinney's leadership are a key driver for our university. Coach Swinney and his family's impact on our community and department cannot be understated, and his success and stability nationally is truly uncommon. It is critical that Clemson continue to invest in our football program, and ensure our head coach is at Clemson for a long, long time. The best is yet to come."

Head Coach Dabo Swinney: "It is hard for me to believe I am in my 14th full season as your head coach, and I remain eternally grateful and honored for

the opportunity to continue coaching and developing young people of excellence at Clemson. This agreement is representative of what has been collectively built here and the success we've had both academically and athletically. It is a reflection of the ALL IN commitment of so many people, including our players, our staff, our fans, our administration and our University leadership. While I am certainly proud of our accomplishments on the field, the most rewarding part remains the relationships forged within this program and the ability to positively impact those around us. I am appreciative of the leadership of President Jim Clements, our Board of Trustees and Director of Athletics Graham Neff, and I am thankful for their continued faith in me as well as their steadfast commitment to the future of Clemson Football. Our core mission remains unchanged: Graduate our players, equip them with the tools they need for life, give them a great college experience, and win championships. I do not take for granted the Clemson Family's unwavering love and support and its faith in our program to carry out that mission every day. It is a blessing to be your head coach and to call Clemson our home."

Clemson University President Jim Clements: "Over the past 20 years, Coach Swinney has impacted our football program, our university and the entire Clemson area community, in profound ways. The culture of success and achievement he has instilled in our student-athletes, through both on-field victories and academic accomplishments, is truly remarkable," said Clemson President Jim Clements. "I'm excited Dabo, Kathleen, and their family will remain part of the Clemson Family for years to come."

ALL-ACC SELECTIONS IN 2021

Clemson's 10 selections to the 2021 All-ACC Team were second-most in the conference. Clemson has now produced double-digit All-ACC selections in each of the last seven seasons.

Clemson collected four first-team selections, all from the defense, as defensive tackle Tyler Davis, linebacker James Skalski and cornerbacks Andrew Booth Jr. and Mario Goodrich all earned first-team nods. Three Clemson players were selected to the second team, including offensive tackle Jordan McFadden, defensive end Myles Murphy and placekicker B.T. Potter. Defensive end Xavier Thomas, defensive tackle Bryan Bresee and safety Andrew Mukuba rounded out the selections with third-team honors.

Las Vegas Raiders wide receiver Hunter Renfrow enjoyed a career year, catching a team-high 103 passes for 1,038 yards and nine touchdowns, including two scores in a playoff-clinching prime-time win in Week 18. Renfrow joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Tim Brown and Jerry Rice as the only wide receivers in Raiders history to record 90 or more catches in a season.

Los Angeles Chargers wide receiver Mike Williams posted career highs in receiving yards (1,146) and receptions (76) while adding nine touchdowns. And despite playing two fewer games than the year before, Cincinnati Bengals wide receiver Tee Higgins put up career numbers with 74 catches for 1,091 yards and added six touchdown catches for a second straight regular season before catching two touchdowns in Super Bowl LVI.

Clemson has had 11 receivers drafted since the 2013 NFL Draft, tied for the most in the country.

ATLANTA — No. 4 Clemson defeated Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Labor Day night. Clemson's special teams had a superlative performance, as Carson Donnelly and Wade Woodaz both blocked punts to give Clemson multiple punt blocks in a single game for the first time since 2007.

Clemson's defense made an impact on the game's first play from scrimmage, as pressure from defensive end K.J. Henry resulted in safety Andrew Mukuba's first career interception.

In the second quarter, after its first punt block, Clemson opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by running back Will Shipley. Clemson then drove 67 yards in eight plays and extended the lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from quarterback DJ Uiagalelei to wide receiver Beaux Collins. Clemson would carry a 14-3 lead into halftime.

Georgia Tech drew to within four on a 13-yard touchdown pass early in the third quarter. The Tiger offense provided a quick answer to take a 17-10 lead, as B.T. Potter hit a 29-yard field goal with 5:41 to play in the third quarter, capping a 12-play, 63-yard drive.

The field goal started Clemson's run of 27 unanswered points down the stretch to earn the win. Potter converted field goal attempts of 29 and 32 yards, and the first-team offense added rushing touchdowns by Uiagalelei and Shipley before ceding to the second unit, when true freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik led Clemson 66 yards and found Will Taylor in the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass, pushing the final margin to 41-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5/4 Clemson scored touchdowns on five of its first six drives in a 35-12 win against Furman. Clemson debuted new renovations to Memorial Stadium, including its 7,100-plus-square-foot videoboard, on a cool, overcast afternoon.

The win was Clemson's 35th consecutive victory at home, only the 15th home winning streak of 35 games or more in FBS history.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 21-for-27 passes for 231 yards for a career-high 166.7 passer rating. Clemson rushed for 147 yards on 28 carries, led by Will Shipley, who scored two touchdowns.

Clemson's defense held Furman to 12 points, forced two turnovers and recorded two fourth-down stops. The unit registered nine tackles for loss. Five different Clemson players registered at least seven tackles, including LaVonta Bentley, who had three tackles for loss.

Clemson scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions with two touchdown runs by Shipley bookending a two-yard touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Jake Briningstool, giving the Tigers a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter. The teams traded touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half to enter halftime with a 28-9 Clemson advantage.

Clemson opened the second half with a stop on Barrett Carter's first career interception. On the ensuing drive, Beaux Collins toe-tapped a nine-yard pass from Uiagalelei in the right side of the end zone to give Clemson a 35-9 lead. Furman added a field goal with 48 seconds to play in the third quarter, and a scoreless fourth quarter resulted in the 35-12 final score.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Sophomore running back Will Shipley rushed 12 times for a career-high 139 yards and two touchdowns as Clemson used a 35-point second half in a 48-20 victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson gained 521 total yards, including 280 on the ground, and forced four turnovers, leading to 21 Tiger points.

The Tigers' defense kept the Bulldogs out of the end zone for the first three quarters and held Louisiana Tech to only six total rushing yards. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei was 17-of-29 for 221 yards and two scores through the air and picked up 62 yards on the ground on nine carries.

Clemson scored on eight of its 13 drives, not including running out the clock on its final possession. With the game set at 13-6 entering the second half, Clemson exploded for three touchdowns, including a twice scoring 32-yard touchdowns on one-play drives.

Shipley's performance made him the first Clemson player on record back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season. He averaged 11.6 yards per carry and became the first Clemson player to average at least 10 yards per carry on at least 10 attempts since Travis Etienne in the 2020 ACC Championship Game against Notre Dame.

R.J. Mickens, Jeremiah Trotter Jr. and Malcolm Greene all recorded interceptions in the contest, while Kevin Swint recorded his first career fumble recovery on a wild snap.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. – No. 5 Clemson earned a dramatic double-overtime win at No. 21/16 Wake Forest, 51-45. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 26-of-41 passes for a season-high 371 passing yards and a career-high five touchdown passes in the win.

Clemson accumulated 559 total yards. The Tigers converted 16-of-23 third downs, breaking the school record of 15 third down conversions set against Western Carolina in 1983.

Clemson ran out to an early 14-0 lead on touchdown passes from Uiagalelei in the first quarter. Two Wake Forest touchdowns and two B.T. Potter field goals brought the halftime score to 20-14.

A prolific third quarter by Wake Forest with three touchdown passes gave the Demon Deacons a 35-28 lead entering the fourth quarter. Down 38-35, Potter nailed a 52-yarder with 4:01 remaining in regulation and the Clemson defense then held to force overtime.

The teams traded touchdowns and two-point conversions in the first overtime. Uiagalelei then hit Davis Allen for Allen's second touchdown of the game in the second overtime. A beleaguered Clemson secondary then sealed the win with a fourth-down pass breakup on Wake Forest's possession to give the Tigers their first road overtime win since 2009.

CLEMSON, S.C. – In the first Top 10 matchup in the 90-game history of the Clemson-NC State rivalry, No. 5 Clemson defeated No. 10 NC State at an electric, sold-out Memorial Stadium. Clemson recorded its 37th consecutive home win, tying the longest home winning streak in ACC history.

Clemson's defense recorded three sacks and two turnovers while holding NC State to only 34 rushing yards on 21 carries, the Wolfpack's worst yards-per-carry average (1.6) in ACC play since 2016. Offensively, quarterback DJ Uiagalelei passed for 209 yards and a score and ran for a career-high 73 yards and two touchdowns in the victory.

The teams traded long drives and 20-yard field goals on their opening possessions. NC State took a 10-6 lead in the second quarter, but Uiagalelei drove Clemson 75 yards in 1:20 in a two-minute situation to give Clemson a 13-10 halftime lead.

Coming out of halftime, Clemson forced an NC State three-and-out as Barrett Carter and Myles Murphy both registered sacks. On Clemson's ensuing possession, Uiagalelei rushed 39 yards inside the NC State 10-yard line. Uiagalelei then completed a seven-yard touchdown pass to Jake Briningstool, increasing Clemson's lead to 20-10 early in the third quarter.

Toriano Pride Jr. later recorded his first career interception, setting up B.T. Potter's third field goal of the night to increase Clemson's lead to 23-13. A sneaky playaction bootleg by Uiagalelei for his second rushing touchdown of the night extended the lead to 30-13 until a late NC State touchdown brought the final score to 30-20.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. – No. 5 Clemson scored touchdowns on either side of halftime to pull away from Boston College, 31-3, at Alumni Stadium. The Tigers held the Eagles to 34 rushing yards, piled up 11 tackles for loss and four sacks, broke up eight passes and registered 13 quarterback hurries in the victory.

The Tigers scored 28 unanswered points in the game's final 31 minutes to earn the victory. Clemson shut out the Eagles in the second half, allowing just 86 total yards after halftime. Clemson's three points allowed were its fewest surrendered in its series with Boston College since 1952 when the Tigers shut out the Eagles at Braves Field.

Defensive end Xavier Thomas earned the Leather Helmet Award as the game's most valuable player after a career-high-tying 2.0 sacks in the victory despite playing only six snaps in his return to action from a foot injury suffered in fall camp.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei threw for 220 yards and three scores and led the Tigers in rushing for a second consecutive game with 69 yards on 12 carries.

Running back Will Shipley gave Clemson a 10-3 advantage with 45 seconds to play in the first half. Coming out of half, the Tigers came up with a quick stop and then Uiagalelei led the Tigers 73 yards on five plays, hitting Joseph Ngata in stride for a 38-yard score. Clemson added to its lead on the first play of the fourth quarter, as Uiagalelei found Beau Collins alone in the end zone for a 10-yard score to push the lead to 24-3.

Uiagalelei hit Brannon Spector for a 13-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, his third touchdown pass of the day to his third different receiver. Uiagalelei had a key rush during the series, picking up 40 yards on third-and-3 to help set up the score.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – No. 4/5 Clemson scored 17 points in a two-minute span on either side of halftime to take command of a 34-28 win at Florida State. Running back Will Shipley tallied a career-best 238 all-purpose yards (121 rushing, 48 receiving, 69 kickoff return).

Defensively, Clemson allowed touchdowns on two of the first three drives before settling in and holding the Seminoles scoreless for its next six drives, which included three fourth-down stops. Myles Murphy had six tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and two sacks.

DJ Uiagalelei accounted for four total touchdowns (three passing, one rushing), was 15-of-23 through the air for 203 yards, and added a five-yard rushing touchdown.

After Florida State struck first, Uiagalelei avoided a sack, stepped up in the pocket, and threw a 59-yard touchdown to Antonio Williams on Clemson's second drive.

The Seminoles took a 14-7 lead on a 15-play, 93-yard touchdown drive, but Clemson responded with 27 consecutive points to take a 34-14 lead, as tight ends Jake Briningstool and Davis Allen added scores in addition to Uiagalelei's touchdown on the ground. B.T. Potter also added field goals 47 yards and 34 yards, and with his second extra point of the game, he passed Chandler Catanzaro (404 from 2010-13) to become the highest-scoring kicker in Clemson history.

The Seminoles scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to bring the score to 34-28. Brannon Spector then recovered a Florida State onside kick attempt, enabling Clemson to run out the clock for the win.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5 Clemson overcame four turnovers and an early 14-point deficit to earn a 27-21 win against No. 14 Syracuse at Memorial Stadium. The victory was Clemson's 38th in a row at home, breaking the ACC record set by Florida State from 1992-2001.

Running back Will Shipley had another career day, recording 242 all-purpose yards including a career-high 172 rushing yards on a career-high 27 carries with two touchdowns to spark Clemson's 293 rushing yards. Clemson's defense recorded a season-high five sacks and shut out the Orange in the second half as Clemson scored 20 unanswered points for the win.

Clemson took a 7-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Shipley on its opening possession. Syracuse responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive to tie the game at seven.

Clemson's next two possessions resulted in turnovers. Ja'Had Carter intercepted DJ Uiagalelei to terminate one possession, and on Clemson's next drive, the Tigers drove to the Syracuse three-yard line, but Carter returned an Uiagalelei fumble 90 yards for a 14-7 Syracuse lead. A Garrett Shrader touchdown run later in the quarter pushed the Orange to a 21-7 lead. BT Potter cut the Clemson deficit to 21-10 with a 44-yard field goal before halftime.

A scoreless third quarter was not without drama. After Uiagalelei's second interception of the day, Clemson inserted Cade Klubnik at quarterback. Klubnik and the Clemson ground game led Clemson to touchdown drives of 80 yards and 61 yards to give Clemson a 24-21 lead. An additional Potter field goal and a game-winning interception by R.J. Mickens sealed the 26-21 victory.

The win was Clemson's first in a game in which it trailed by 11 or more points in the fourth quarter since the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl against LSU.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. – Notre Dame took advantage of a pair of non-offensive touchdowns and an interception deep in Tiger territory that led to another score to defeat No. 5/5 Clemson, 35-14, at Notre Dame Stadium. The loss snapped Clemson's nation-leading 14-game winning streak. Earlier in the evening, by virtue of Pitt's win over Syracuse, Clemson clinched a place in the ACC Championship Game, which takes place in Charlotte on Dec. 3.

With 9:08 left in the first quarter, Notre Dame's Prince Kollie returned a blocked punt 17 yards for a Notre Dame touchdown. The Irish would score another touchdown with 38 seconds left in the first half, making the score 14-0 at the half.

Cade Klubnik entered the game at quarterback with 1:30 left in the third quarter, but an interception on his first pass attempt gave Notre Dame the ball on the Clemson 14-yard line. The Irish scored three plays later to take a 21-0 lead.

DJ Uiagalelei returned at quarterback on Clemson's following possession and led the Tigers 56 yards before Benjamin Morrison intercepted his pass and returned it 96 yards for a touchdown, increasing Notre Dame's lead to 28-0 with 12:58 left to play. Running back Will Shipley got the Tigers on the scoreboard with 10:14 left in the fourth quarter, punching the ball into the end zone with a one-yard rushing touchdown.

Notre Dame added one more touchdown with 4:16 left in the fourth quarter, and Clemson scored the game's final points when Uiagalelei threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Joseph Ngata.

The contest marked Clemson's first time since 2007 surrendering touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams in a single game.

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 12 Clemson clinched the final ACC Atlantic Division crown outright with a 31-16 victory against Louisville on Nov. 12. The win extended Clemson's home winning streak six full calendar years since its last home loss.

Wide receiver Antonio Williams registered a career-high 106 all-purpose yards including 83 yards on a Clemson-freshman-record-tying 10 receptions and added a six-yard pass completion as well. Running backs Phil Mafah (106 yards) and Will Shipley (97) led the Tigers to 248 rushing yards on the day.

Clemson's defense registered four sacks and nine tackles for loss. Linebacker Barrett Carter posted eight tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, two sacks and an interception. He became the first player in the country to register at least 3.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and an interception in a game between Power Five teams since 2011.

DJ Uiagalelei opened the scoring with an 11-yard rushing touchdown on Clemson's opening drive, and a B.T. Potter field goal extended the lead to 10. A touchdown run by Tiyon Evans got the Cardinals on the board early in the second quarter, but a touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Williams put Clemson up 17-7 at the half.

Shipley extended Clemson's lead on a highlight reel 25-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, hurdling a defender at the 10-yard line and splitting two more for the score. After a Louisville field goal, Mafah helped seal the victory in the fourth quarter with a 39-yard touchdown for Clemson late in the fourth quarter. Louisville threw a touchdown pass on the game's final play to bring the final score to 31-16.
