### CLEMSON BASKETBALL HEADLINES

**CLEMSON vs. McNEESE**  
 • Clemson and McNeese will match up for the first time in school history in the first round of the 2025 NCAA Tournament. See page 5 for more information on the matchup with the Cowboys.

#### CLEMSON BASKETBALL HEADLINES

- Clemson set many school records during the regular season and ACC Tournament. Clemson won a school record 26 regular season games and now a school record 27 wins overall. The Tigers finished a school-best 18-2 in the ACC and finished the year 9-1 on the road in the ACC – the first winning road record in league play since 1986-87. Clemson is third all-time in the ACC with 15 double-digit league wins this season.
- All-ACC: Chase Hunter (First Team); Ian Schieffelin (Second Team); Jaeden Zackery (All-Defensive); Viktor Lakhin (HM).
- The Tigers finished January and February 13-2 (.867) – the best winning percentage in both months combined in school history.
- Chase Hunter became the eighth player to surpass 1,700 points in his career is now third all-time (1,768). Hunter was named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association 2024-25 Oscar Robertson Trophy Midseason Watch List.
- Ian Schieffelin surpassed both Jaron Blossomgame and Elden Campbell in career rebounding at Virginia (3/1) and now has 876 career rebounds. He is averaging 12.8 points and 9.4 rebounds, while adding 2.7 assists per game. One of eight players nationally to average that line. He earned ACC Player of the Week and Oscar Robertson National Player of the Week for his performances during the week of Dec. 9. Schieffelin eclipsed the 1,000-point plateau with a career-high 24 points against Notre Dame (Feb. 26).
- Schieffelin totaled a career-best 20 rebounds in Clemson's win over Kentucky (Dec. 3). It was the most rebounds in a game for a Tiger since Harold Jamison collected 20 on March 4, 1999 against Florida State. Schieffelin added 11 points and four assists in addition to 20 rebounds in the win over Kentucky. He is the only men's division I player in the last 25 years to put up 10+ points, 20+ rebounds and 4+ assists in a win against an AP Top 5 opponent.
- Viktor Lakhin scored 22 points in each win over No. 2 Duke and North Carolina. He finished 18-28 from the field in both games and added 10 rebounds and eight blocks.
- Schieffelin posted 18 points and 13 rebounds, earning MVP of the Sunshine Slam, against Penn State in the title game. Schieffelin added a career-high eight assists, four steals and two blocks.
- Chase Hunter has played in 110 Clemson victories in his career. He's set the new mark for most wins in program history.
- Dillon Hunter is now first in Clemson history in career assist/turnover ratio. He has 144 assists and 50 turnovers in his 99-game career and that 2.88/1 ratio is the best in Clemson history.
- Jake Heidbreder posted a season-high 15 points off the bench in a win over Wake Forest (12/21). He made three 3-pointers and finished 4-for-5 from the floor and a perfect 4-for-4 from the free throw line.
- Chauncey Wiggins posted a season high 17 points on six made field goals and four 3-pointers in a win over Stanford (1/1).
- Chase Hunter posted a career-high 30 points in a loss at Boise State (11/17). He also totaled a career-best 12 made field goals in the effort. He became the 21st player in program history to score 30 in a true road game and it was the 33rd overall occurrence in a true road environment.
- Jaeden Zackery was ACC All-Defensive Team honors in 2024-25. He has 69 steals (2.09/game) – tied for fourth all-time for a single season. His per game average is seventh all-time. Clemson season record is 83 by current McNeese assistant Vernon Hamilton.
- Zackery posted a stat line of 19 points, six rebounds, seven assists, five steals and two blocks in a win over SMU (2/22). He became just the 12th player since 1996-97 in a Division I game to record that line. First in the ACC during that time frame.
- Brownell has led the Tigers to the fourth-most overall wins amongst ACC teams since 2017-18 (168). The Tigers have won 90 games in the league, which ranks fourth in that same time frame.
- Brownell signed a contract extension that runs through 2029. Brownell is the winningest coach in program history with 292 wins as the leader of the Tigers, earning the 2017-18 Sports Illustrated National College Coach of the Year Award. The Tigers have reached the NCAA Tournament four times, including three in the last seven seasons that have culminated in a Sweet 16 appearance in 2018 and an Elite Eight in 2024. They are one of just 24 programs since 2018 to advance to a Sweet 16 and Elite Eight in separate seasons.






### SERIES HISTORY VS. MCNEESE

- Clemson and McNeese will match up for the first time in school history in the first round of the 2025 NCAA Tournament.
- The Tigers are 1-0 all-time against current members of the Southland Conference (1-0 vs. Lamar).
- Clemson will face a 2005 graduate of the university and former graduate assistant (2005-06) and director of operations (2006-07) Will Wade. Prior to those positions, Wade was a four-year student manager for the program for Larry Shyatt (2002-03) and Oliver Purnell (2004-07).
- Wade has been the head coach at McNeese since 2023-24 and previously served as the head coach at LSU (2017-22), VCU (2015-17) and Chattanooga (2013-15).
- On Wade's staff as an assistant coach, is former Tiger Vernon Hamilton. While at Clemson, Hamilton was a four-year starter (2004-07) and ended his career and remains No. 1 all-time in steals average (2.13) and No. 1 in steals (271). He is ninth in career assists (403) and 25th in points (1,238).
- Hamilton earned ACC All-Defensive Team honors in 2006.
- He graduated with a bachelor of science degree in sports management in 2007.

### CLEMSON RANKS FOURTH IN ACC IN WINS OVER LAST 8 SEASONS

- Head Coach Brad Brownell has led the Tigers to the fourth-most overall wins amongst ACC teams since 2017-18.
- The Tigers have won 90 games in the league, which ranks fourth in that same time frame.

### CLEMSON'S NCAA HISTORY

- This is Clemson's 15th appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers have a 14-14 record in games played on the court. Clemson has advanced to the Elite Eight twice (1980; 2024) and the Sweet 16 five of the previous 14 appearances (1990, 1997, and 2018 in addition to 1980 and 2024). Clemson's appearance in the 1990 tournament was later vacated when freshman Wayne Buckingham was ruled academically ineligible. (Had the NCAA Clearinghouse been in place at the time, it would not have been an issue.) Buckingham later graduated from Clemson. Thus the 2-1 record from 1990 is vacated and the official record is 12-13.
- This is Clemson's second consecutive NCAA appearance since its run to the Elite Eight in 2024 last year. Clemson defeated New Mexico, Baylor and Arizona to reach the final

eight.

- Just the second team in Clemson history to reach Elite 8 of NCAA Tournament, first time in 44 years. Accomplished this as a No. 6 seeded team in West regional, same seed and regional as the 1980 Clemson team. According to research by CBS Sports, the 44 years in between Elite 8 appearances is the fourth longest in the history of the tournament. The longest is a 54-year stretch by Loyola (Chicago).
- Defeated No. 3 seed Baylor and No. 2 seed Arizona in the NCAA Tournament. Win over No. 3 seed Baylor was best seed Clemson has beaten in NCAA Tournament since 1980. Then topped that with win over No. 2 Arizona that was the best seed Clemson has beaten in the NCAA Tournament.
- Had three players (PJ Hall, Chase Hunter, Ian Schieffelin) named to NCAA All-Regional team, most in one year in Clemson history. Had just two selections total previously (Larry Nance, 1980, Gabe Devoe, 2018).
- Clemson won its first three games of the NCAA Tournament as the underdog, the first team to do that since 1985.
- The wins over No. 14 Baylor and No. 9 Arizona in the NCAA Tournament marked the first time Clemson has beaten top 25 teams in consecutive games since Jan. 13-16, 2016 when the Tigers defeated No. 9 Duke and No. 8 Miami. Both were recorded on Clemson's then home court in Greenville, S.C. (Littlejohn was being renovated that year).
- Clemson limited New Mexico to just 29.7 percent shooting - the second lowest for a Clemson team in tournament history (Record is 25.8 percent vs. Auburn on 3/18/18). The 29.7 percent shooting for New Mexico was its lowest of the 2023-24 season - by a considerable margin. Their previous low was 35.4 percent in a three point loss to UNLV on Feb. 10.
- Clemson held New Mexico to 56 points, the Lobos fewest points in a game all year. The previous low was 58 in a game against Boise State.
- Clemson held Jamal Mashburn, Jr. (10th) and Jaalen House (11th), two of the top 11 scorers in New Mexico history, to a combined 18 points in 5-25 shooting from the field and 2-14 on three-point shooting.
- The Tigers were led once again by Chase Hunter who finished with 20 points and six assists. Despite leading by 15 points late in the second half, the No. 14 ranked and No. 3 seeded Bears made a run, but the Tigers never relinquished. Hunter netted his third 20-point game of the year and second in a row after a game-high 21 points on 8-of-16 shooting from the floor against New Mexico and another 20-point outing against Baylor.
- Ian Schieffelin totaled his 10th and 11th double-doubles of the season with 16 points and 12 rebounds against New Mexico and 18 points and 11 rebounds against Alabama. With his 11th double-double, Schieffelin is just the second Clemson player to record double figures in double-doubles in a season since 2008-09. Hunter Tyson did it last year with 16, but that is the only other player to do it since Trevor Booker had 13 double-doubles in 2008-09. Schieffelin also had 17 double-digit rebounding games last season and 19 for his career.
- Chase Hunter's (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) three-point play with 25 seconds remaining put the Tigers up five and helped hold off a late run by No. 2 seed Arizona (27-10), as No. 6 seed Clemson prevailed 77-72 inside the Crypto.com Arena to advance to the second NCAA Elite Eight in program history. The Tigers (24-11) are the first to advance to the West Regional final. Clemson led for 37:02 in the game and trailed for just 20 seconds, while the game was tied twice.
- Arizona cut the lead to two with under a minute remaining, but the Tigers used the three-point play from Hunter to push the lead back to five. The Wildcats got a layup with 15 seconds to go to cut it back to three, but Dillon Hunter (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) snuck behind everyone and made a layup with nine seconds remaining to clinch the victory for Clemson.
- Every Tiger that saw the court scored, as Clemson shot 49.2% from the floor as a team and recorded 17 assists on 29 made field goals. The 17 assists are the most for the Tigers in this year's tournament. Clemson held Arizona to 37.3% shooting, just 17.9% from beyond the arc, their lowest three-point percentage of the year. The Bears' 72 points were 15 below their season average, and Clemson held Arizona to just one field goal over an 11-minute stretch in the second half, including 12 straight misses at one point.
- Brownell took Clemson to just its fourth Sweet 16 in program history in 2018.
- Clemson won its first two rounds against New Mexico State and Auburn to advance. The Tigers topped NMSU 79-68 in

round one and then demolished Auburn 84-53 (largest victory margin by a lower seeded team in NCAA history). The Tigers fell to Kansas in the Sweet 16, 80-76.

- Gabe DeVoe put on a show in 2018, recording one of the best tournament performances by a Tiger in Clemson history.
- DeVoe scored the third-most points (75), which produced the best scoring average in Clemson NCAA Tournament history (25.0 per game).
- He scored a career-high 31 points against Kansas in the Sweet 16 - marking the most by a Tiger in his final game since Larry Nance had 34 vs. Temple in a NIT game on March 12, 1981.
- Prior to that performance, Kansas had not had an opponent score 30+ points in a game since Nov. 22, 2016 when Yante Maten of Georgia scored 30.
- In 2011, Clemson won its first round game in Dayton that year against UAB and then lost to West Virginia in Tampa. Clemson made four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances between 2008-11, three under Oliver Purnell and one under Brownell. Clemson made three straight appearances under Rick Barnes from 1996-98.
- When Clemson was chosen for the tournament in 2008 it was the first time in 10 years Clemson had been selected.
- Brad Brownell was the first Clemson coach to take the Tigers to the NCAA Tournament in his first year when the Tigers advanced in 2011. When Brownell and the Tigers defeated UAB in 2011 it broke a five-game NCAA Tournament losing streak.
- Prior to 2018, Clemson last advanced to the final 32 of the NCAA Tournament in 1997 when Clemson reached the Sweet 16 with wins over Miami (OH) and Tulsa at a region in Kansas City. Clemson then lost to Minnesota in double overtime in a game in San Antonio in the round of 16.
- Clemson has 14 NCAA Tournament wins and 11 of the 14 have taken place in the Central, Mountain or Pacific time zones. Clemson has just three wins in the Eastern time zone (Hartford in 1990 and Dayton in 2011).
- Clemson's first appearance was in 1980 and the Tigers advanced to the Elite Eight in that first appearance. Clemson defeated Utah State and BYU (and Danny Ainge) at Ogden, UT, then defeated Lamar (coached by Billy Tubbs) in Tucson, AZ before losing to UCLA (coached by Larry Brown) in the Elite Eight by 11 points.

## FOUR TIGERS HAVE NCAA TOURNAMENT EXPERIENCE

- This marks Clemson's second consecutive trip to the Big Dance and third in the last five years and the fourth in the last eight.
- Chase Hunter was a member of the Tigers' 2024 NCAA tournament team that finished 24-12, including 11-9 in ACC play with a trip to the Elite Eight. He was also a member of the 2021 NCAA Tournament team that finished 16-8 in a COVID shortened season, including 10-6 in ACC play.
- Hunter completed the 2024 tournament averaging 17.8 points, 4.3 rebounds, 5.8 assists, 2.0 steals and 0.8 blocks per game – earning All-West Region honors.
- Hunter scored 21 and 20 points in consecutive wins over New Mexico and Baylor to help the Tigers advance to the Sweet 16. He added 18 in a win over Arizona, including a pivotal bucket late to help seal the win. He shot 50.0 percent from the floor over all four contests.
- In 2021, the Tigers played Rutgers in the first round of the tournament in Indianapolis, falling 60-56. Hunter played 15 minutes, finishing 1-for-5 from the field with two points and one assist. Hall played just nearly two minutes and collected a rebound.
- Ian Schieffelin, Chauncey Wiggins and Dillon Hunter all got their first taste of the NCAA Tournament last season.
- Schieffelin was the Tigers' second leading scorer in 2024, averaging 14.8 points and 9.0 rebounds over four games. He finished 53.7 percent from the floor.
- Wiggins and Dillon Hunter's minutes were limited, but vital. Both finished all four games with zero turnovers, while Hunter added a bucket late against Arizona that sealed the victory.
- Wiggins averaged 3.8 points on 40.0 percent shooting, including 60.0 percent from three. Hunter finished 2-5 from the floor with seven rebounds and three assists and one steal.

## BRAD BROWNELL HAS TAKEN THREE SCHOOLS TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Brad Brownell has taken three different schools to the NCAA Tournament, UNC Wilmington (twice), Wright State (once) and Clemson (now five times). He has posted a 6-7 record, with three victories coming in 2024 when Clemson made a run to the Elite Eight. He is the only coach to take Clemson five times.
- He took UNC Wilmington to the tournament in 2003, his first year, and 2006, his last year. He took Wright State to the NCAA Tournament his first year. He took Clemson in 2011, his first year and now has the Tigers in the Big Dance this year, his 15th season at Clemson.
- Brownell has a 6-7 record in the NCAA Tournament, but four of the seven losses have been by four points or less. In nine of the 13 games he has been the underdog in terms of seeding.
- In 2003, his UNC Wilmington team lost to Maryland on a buzzer shot by Drew Nicholas, 75-73 in a game in Nashville, TN. Maryland was a six seed and UNC Wilmington an 11 seed.
- In 2006, eighth seed George Washington defeated ninth seed UNC Wilmington 88-85 in overtime in a game in Greensboro, NC.
- In 2007, Wright State was a 14 seed against a third-seeded Pittsburgh and Pittsburgh came away with a 79-58 victory.
- In 2011 Clemson was the No. 12 seed against No. 13 UAB in the first round and came away with the victory, 70-52. The Tigers were the No. 12 against No. 5 West Virginia in the next game in Tampa and the Mountaineers won 84-76.
- In 2018 Clemson was the No. 5 against No. 12 New Mexico State in the first round and came away with the victory, 79-68. The Tigers were the No. 5 seed against No. 4 Auburn in the second round and demolished the Tigers 84-53.
- Clemson advanced to the Sweet 16 to play No. 1 Kansas and the Jayhawks won 80-76.

- In 2021 Clemson was the No. 7 seed against No. 10 Rutgers in the first round and fell by a four-point margin, 60-56.
- In 2024, Clemson was the No. 6 seed and defeated No. 11 New Mexico in the first round, No. 3 Baylor in the second round, No. 2 Arizona in the Sweet 16, before falling to No. 4 Alabama by seven in the Elite Eight.

## CLEMSON'S THREE-YEAR RUN

- Clemson has been on quite a three-year run. The Tigers were 23-11 in 2022-23, 24-12 last year and 27-5 so far this year. That is a three-year record of 74-28.
- With the win over Virginia Tech, Clemson set a school mark for total victories in three consecutive years. Clemson won 72 games over the 2006-07 (25-11), 2007-08 (24-10) and 2008-09 (23-9) campaigns. That three year run finished at 72-30.
- Nothing can compare to Clemson's record in ACC play over the last three years. The Tigers have gone 14-6, 11-9 and 18-2 in ACC play over the last three years for a 43-17 (.717) record. That includes a 19-11 ACC road record.
- This is just the second time Clemson has had a winning record in at least three consecutive ACC seasons. Clemson had four consecutive winning league seasons from 2007-08 through 2010-11.
- Clemson finished 18-2 in the ACC this season, third in the league. The Tigers finished 11-9 in 2023-24 and have now gone 29-11 over the last two seasons.
- The .725 winning percentage is the highest in program history over the course of back-to-back seasons in the ACC dating back to 1953-54.

## A RECORD SETTING PERFORMANCE AGAINST THE ACC

- Clemson has had its best performance in Atlantic Coast Conference games this year. Here is a list of some of the more noteworthy accomplishments in league play:
- Posted a 18-2 record, four more wins than the previous Clemson record for any league schedule (14-6 in 2022-23).
- Fifteen of the 18 wins have been by double digits, the most in a season in school history. The previous record was nine double-digit wins among the 14 conference victories in 2022-23.
- Clemson finished its ACC road schedule with a 9-1 mark. It is four more ACC road wins than any previous season. The 1986-87 (5-2), 2022-23 (5-5) and 2023-24 (5-5) all had five ACC road wins.
- The 9-1 ACC road record has a .900 winning percentage, by far a Clemson record for winning percentage in ACC road games. The previous record was the 5-2 mark by Horace Grant's 1986-87 team that posted a .714 winning percentage in ACC road games.
- Clemson has also established a school mark for ACC winning percentage with its 18-2 record, a .900 winning percentage. The previous best were the 10-4 records of the 1986-87 and 1989-90 teams. Those teams won .714 of their league games.

- Clemson won its final eight ACC road games, the longest streak of ACC road wins in school history. It is three more than the previous record of five set in 1986-87. That Clemson team won its first five ACC road games before losing at Duke and North Carolina to end its ACC road schedule.
- When Clemson defeated Boston College on March 5 it gave the Tigers at least one victory over 16 of the other 17 ACC schools. Louisville is the only ACC team Clemson has not defeated this year as the Cardinals defeated Clemson 74-64 in Louisville on Jan. 7.
- Clemson's +11.2 points per game victory margin is also a school record for league games.
- Clemson set a school record for consecutive ACC wins regardless of site with its win over Virginia Tech. Clemson finished the regular season winning eight straight ACC games. The previous mark of seven was set in 1966-67 and 2022-23.

## CLEMSON SETS RECORD FOR MOST WINS IN PROGRAM HISTORY

- Clemson won its 27th game of the season against SMU in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament in Charlotte on March 13.

• The Tigers set a program record for regular season wins against Virginia Tech with their 26th victory, but set a new program standard with its 27th against SMU.

### CLEMSON SETS RECORD FOR WINS IN REGULAR SEASON

- Clemson won its 26th game of the regular season against Virginia Tech on March 8. That set the school record for regular season victories, surpassing the 1986-87 team that had a 25-4 record in the regular season before losing in the first round of the ACC Tournament and the first round of the NCAA Tournament.
- That 1986-87 team ran to a 24-2 record, including 10-2 in the ACC and won its first eight road games and its first 10 games away from home. Clemson was the last team in the nation to suffer a loss away from home that year. The streak was finally broken when point guard Grayson Marshall suffered a sprained ankle at Duke and the Tigers lost, 65-59.
- The victory over the Hokies tied the mark for overall wins on the court in a season.
- The No. 12 ranking in the AP Poll is Clemson's highest entering the NCAA Tournament in school history.

### CLEMSON RANKED 12TH AND 13TH IN BOTH POLLS

- Clemson is ranked 12th in the latest Associated Press and 13th in USA Today Coaches Polls.
- The No. 10 ranking on March 9, 2025 was the highest for the program since a No. 10 ranking in the AP poll on Feb 2, 2009.
- Clemson was last in the top 10 in the polls on Feb. 2, 2009 when the Tigers were 10th by AP. Clemson has not been inside the top 10 since a No. 5 ranking by the AP on November 16, 1997. Clemson's highest ranking ever is No. 2 by the Associated Press on Jan. 20, 1997.

### BROWNELL EXTENDS PERSONAL RECORD FOR WINS IN A SEASON

- Brad Brownell has taken Clemson to a 27-win season for the first time in his tenure. The Tigers won 25 in 2017-18 when the Tigers reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. He also won 25 games as the head coach at UNC Wilmington in 2005-06, his fourth year as a head coach.
- The 27th win extended a personal career best for the Clemson head coach who started his head coaching career in 2002-03.
- He has already set a personal record for conference wins in a season with the 18. He was 15-3 at UNC Wilmington in league play his first year and also in 2005-06.

### MOST DOUBLE-DIGIT WINS IN A SINGLE ACC SEASON

- Clemson won its 15th game by 10 or more points on March 8 against Virginia Tech by a score of 65-47. As of games played on March 8, the below chart shows the most in ACC history.
- The Tigers are now third all-time in ACC history with 15 double-digit league wins. Of course, over time the league has added conference games to the schedule.
- The league played 14 conference games from 1953-54 until 1990-91. The league expanded to 16 games beginning in 1991-92, 18 in 2012-13 and then to a league-high 20 games in 2019-20.

### CHASE HUNTER'S CAREER COMES FULL CIRCLE

- Clemson senior guard Chase Hunter played his final home game on March 8 when the Tigers hosted Virginia Tech. It be completed his Littlejohn Coliseum career in a full circle.
- Hunter's first game as a Tiger was on November 5, 2019 against Virginia Tech. It was a rarity for Clemson to open the season vs. an ACC team, in fact it is the only time it has happened since 1966-67 when Clemson opened the season at North Carolina.
- Hunter started that game on Nov. 5, 2019, played 29 minutes and scored seven points. 1,950 days between games, he played his last home game against Virginia Tech.
- This was his 82nd career game in Littlejohn Coliseum. He scored 867 points, has 205 assists and 199 rebounds.

### DOUBLE-DIGIT ROAD COMEBACKS IN ACC PLAY

- Clemson overcame a 10-point deficit in the second half against Virginia and won the game 71-58 on March 1. It was the first time this season that Clemson has done that in ACC play.
- It was the first time Clemson has done that on the road since Jan. 11, 2020 when it won its first game ever in Chapel Hill. The comeback forced overtime and the Tigers prevailed 79-76.
- This marked the fourth time in Clemson history they have comeback to win a game on the road at Virginia. The first time since Dec. 7, 1996.

### CLEMSON EARNS FIFTH WIN VS. TOP 8 WINNINGEST PROGRAMS

- Clemson won its fifth game against some of the top eight winningest programs in college basketball.
- Clemson defeated No. 1 Kentucky, No. 3 North Carolina, No. 4 Duke, No. 7 Syracuse and No. 8 Notre Dame.

### CLEMSON SETS SCHOOL MARK FOR CONFERENCE WINS AND WIN PERCENTAGE

- Clemson had a 18-2 record in the ACC this year, the most conference wins in a season in school history. It broke the record of the 2022-23 team that finished 14-6 in the ACC.
- It is a significant accomplishment, but it is even more noteworthy when you take into account the winning percentage. Over the years there has been a drastic variation in the number of conference games the Tigers have played from year to year.

### CLEMSON CLINCHED WINNING ACC ROAD RECORD AT FLORIDA STATE ON FEB. 15

- Clemson is 16-2 in the ACC, 8-1 at home and 8-1 on the road. Clemson clinched a winning record on the road in league play with a win at Florida State on Feb. 15 (72-46). Clemson's only ACC road loss so far this year is at Louisville.
- Clemson has had a 5-5 ACC road record each of the last two years, but the program has not had a winning league road record since 1986-87 when Horace Grant led Clemson to a 5-2 league road record. The only other winning season on the road in the ACC for Clemson took place in 1976-77, Tree Rollins' senior year, when the Tigers were 4-2 on the ACC road.
- The win at Florida State sealed Clemson's third winning ACC road record in school history.

- Clemson defeated Florida State by 26 points on Feb. 15 (72-46).

### CLEMSON JOINS ELITE CLUB OF SCHOOLS TO BEAT KENTUCKY, DUKE AND NORTH CAROLINA IN THE SAME SEASON

- Clemson defeated No. 4 Kentucky in the ACC/SEC Challenge on Dec. 3 by a score of 70-66. The Tigers recently defeated No. 2 Duke (77-71) and North Carolina (85-65) over a quick two-game turnaround stretch to beat three of the four winningest programs in Division I history.
- In the history of the AP Poll (since 1948-49) only seven teams have defeated Kentucky, Duke and North Carolina in the same season.
- In addition, Clemson beat all three while two were in the AP Top 5 for the first time since Maryland in 1957-58.

### CLEMSON SWEEPS ACC NORTH CAROLINA SCHOOLS IN REGULAR SEASON

- Clemson accomplished something the program has never done when the Tigers defeated North Carolina on Feb 10 (85-65). The Tigers finished 4-0 against the ACC's North Carolina schools, victories over Wake Forest, NC State, Duke and North Carolina.
- Clemson has beaten all four ACC schools from North Carolina in the same season eight times previously (now nine), including as recently as 2019-20, but done it just once in the last 29 years. But had at least two losses each of those years.
  - Of course we are comparing apples and oranges a bit with this note because teams used to play each league schools twice. The most wins over North Carolina ACC schools in the same year by the Tigers took place in 1976-77 when Clemson had a 7-2 record against these schools. That was Tree Rollins' senior season.

### TIGERS HAVE TWO WINS OVER TOP 5 TEAMS IN 2024-25

- When Clemson defeated No. 2 Duke on Feb. 8, 2025, it gave the Tigers two wins over Top 5 teams this year. This is just the fifth time Clemson has defeated at least two Top 5 teams (either poll) in the same year, and two of the times have taken place under Head Coach Brad Brownell. Bill Foster coached Clemson teams did it three times in the 1970's.
- Earlier this year Clemson beat No. 4 (AP) Kentucky 70-66 at Littlejohn Coliseum and downed No. 2 Duke on Feb. 8 by a score of 77-71. This is the first time Clemson has beaten two Top 5 teams in the same year since 2019-20 when the Tigers defeated No. 3 Duke and No. 5 Louisville. Prior to that you have to go back 1979-80.

### BROWNELL RECORDS FIFTH TOP 5 VICTORY

- Head Coach Brad Brownell recorded his fifth win over a Top 5 team when the Tigers defeated Duke on Feb. 8, 2025. It was his fifth Top 5 win since 2019-20 and his fifth consecutive top 5 win, tied for the third longest streak by any program since at least 1996-97.
- Brownell is now second in Clemson history in career Top 5 wins, trailing only Bill Foster, who had eight Top 5 wins between 1975-84. Other Clemson head coaches to record top 5 wins are Cliff Ellis (3), Bates Locke (2), Larry Shyatt (2), Rick Barnes (1), Bobby Roberts (1) and Oliver Purnell (1).
- Clemson has five top 5 wins over the last six years. The program had just four between 1994-95 and 2018-19.

### CLEMSON CLINCHES THIRD-STRAIGHT WINNING SEASON WITH WIN OVER NO. 2 DUKE

- Clemson improved to 11-2 in the ACC with its victory over Duke on Feb. 8. That meant in a 20-game ACC regular season schedule, Clemson has clinched a winning record for a third straight year. Clemson was 14-6 in the ACC in 2022-23 and 11-9 last season.
- The only other time in history Clemson has had three consecutive winning seasons in ACC play is a four-year streak from 2007-08 to 2010-11. Oliver Purnell was the Clemson coach for the first three years of that run and Brad Brownell for the last year.
- This is the seventh time in Brad Brownell's 15 years at Clemson that the Tigers have had a winning ACC regular season. There were 12 winning league seasons in the 57 years before he came to Clemson.

### CLASSIC CLEMSON VS. DUKE GAMES AT LITTLEJOHN

- Clemson defeated No. 2 Duke at Littlejohn Coliseum on Saturday, Feb. 8. Clemson now has 14 wins over top 25 Duke teams in the city of Clemson and 13 have taken place at Littlejohn, the same total Clemson has over North Carolina. The list includes Clemson's first win over the No. 1 ranked team, on Jan. 9, 1980. Overall Clemson has defeated four top five Duke teams, including most recently under Brad Brownell on Jan. 14, 2020 when the Tigers downed a third ranked Duke team, 79-72. And now a 77-71 victory over the No. 2 Blue Devils.
- Clemson's first win at home over a top 25 team took place on Valentine's Day 1967 when the Tigers won 73-68 over a 14th ranked Duke team at Fike Fieldhouse.
- Clemson's first win over a top 25 Duke team in Littlejohn Coliseum took place on Feb. 21, 1979, a 70-49 victory behind Bill Foster's (Clemson) Tiger PAWS offense. Duke was sixth in the AP poll entering that game.
- Two other wins over ranked Duke teams stand out in terms of importance in the history of Clemson basketball. The Tigers defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time on Jan. 9, 1980 when Clemson coach Bill Foster, defeated Duke coach Bill Foster, 87-82 in overtime. Both teams advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament at seasons end.
- Ten years later on Feb. 28, 1990, Clemson defeated a fifth ranked Duke team that would go on to the Final Four by a 97-93 score. That victory on March 5, 1990 clinched at least a tie for the ACC regular season championship, still the only time Clemson has claimed that championship. Clemson then won the title outright when North Carolina won at Duke on Sunday afternoon.
- Clemson defeated No. 4 Duke 74-47 in a nationally televised game during Trevor Booker's junior year. The 26-point win is Clemson's largest margin of victory over a top 15 team and second-largest victory margin over any ranked team.
- Brad Brownell has five wins over Top 25 Duke teams, including the win over the third ranked Blue Devils team on Jan 14, 2020 – the year was cut short by COVID-19.

## CHASE HUNTER'S SIXTH YEAR AT CLEMSON

- Clemson sixth year player Chase Hunter began his career at Clemson in November of 2019. A look to the list of coaches currently at ACC schools reveals that Hunter has been at Clemson longer than 13 of the other 17 head coaches in the league. That includes new schools Stanford, California and SMU who were not in the league then, but they have all changed their coaches since 2019.
- Only Leonard Hamilton of Florida State, Kevin Keatts of NC State, Jeff Capel at Pittsburgh and Mike Young at Virginia Tech were in the ACC when Hunter played his first game. In fact, Hunter's first game was against Young's Virginia Tech team in the November 2019 season opener.
- Hunter has played 162 games and 107 of those have been Clemson victories. He is Clemson's winningest player in history. Hunter is a veteran of 118 starts and has played 4405 minutes. He has 1,702 points and 424 assists.

## TIGERS WIN THIRD-STRAIGHT BY DOUBLE DIGITS AT GEORGIA TECH

- Clemson defeated Georgia Tech 70-59 on Jan. 14, 2025. It marked the third consecutive victory for the Tigers at Georgia Tech and all have been by at least 10 points. Clemson won by an 81-57 score in 2023-24, and by a 79-66 count in Atlanta in 2022-23.
- This is the first time Clemson has beaten the same ACC team on the road by double digits in three consecutive

meetings.

- The recent win at Georgia Tech was Clemson's 36th all-time ACC road win by at least 10 points. Brad Brownell has been the Clemson coach for 17 of those double digit road wins. Clemson has now won by double digits at Georgia Tech seven times, five under Brownell. Brownell also has three double digit wins at Wake Forest and Boston College, two at NC State and one apiece at Florida State, Pittsburgh, Virginia and Miami (Fla.).

## CLEMSON IS NO. 22 IN THIS WEEK'S NET RANKINGS

- Clemson is ranked No. 22 in the nation in the latest NET rankings.
- Clemson is 5-3 in Quad 1 games. The Tigers are currently 27-6 this year, including wins over San Francisco and Penn State on a neutral court, a home win over No. 4/6 Kentucky, a road win at Pittsburgh and a 77-71 victory over No. 2/2 Duke at home.

## CLEMSON HAS OVERCOME HALFTIME DEFICIT 26 TIMES SINCE 2019-20

- Clemson overcame its second halftime deficit of the season against No. 2/2 Duke at home on Feb. 8, 2025. Trailing 41-35 at the half, Clemson rallied in the second period to top Duke 77-71.
- The Tigers overcame its first halftime deficit of the year and managed to come back and win the game over San Francisco (11/25).
- The Tigers trailed 29-24 at the break and were down as many as seven in the second half (33-26).
- Clemson went on a 25-4 run to surge ahead and win the game 70-55.
- It was the largest victory margin in a game Clemson had trailed at the half away from home since 12-21-07 vs. DePaul – trailed 41-40 at half and won 90-74.

## CLEMSON OPENS SEASON WITH CONSECUTIVE 25+ POINT VICTORIES

- Clemson has started the season 2-0 and has won each game by 27 and 26 points, respectively.
- The last time the Tigers began a season with back-to-back 25+ point victories was in 2015-16. Clemson beat NC Central 74-40 and UTSA 78-45. Those games were played in Greenville at Bon Secours Arena during Littlejohn's latest renovation.
- This season's occurrence only marks the eighth time in the ACC era that Clemson has done it. They have done it 10 times overall, including the first season of Clemson Basketball in 1911-12.

## CLEMSON STAYING OLD

- Head Coach Brad Brownell has used the transfer portal to blend his team full of high school and developed players in the program to add collegiate experience from the outside.
- Last year it was Joseph Girard III, Jack Clark, Bas Leyte and Jake Heidbreder (redshirt in 2023-24).
- After losing Girard, Clark and Leyte, in addition to PJ Hall, RJ Godfrey, Alex Hemenway and Josh Beadle, Brownell and staff went back into the portal.
- Clemson added ACC veteran guard Jaeden Zackery (Boston College), Big 12 veteran center Viktor Lakhin (Cincinnati), veteran forward Myles Foster (Illinois State) and a young center Christian Reeves (Duke).
- Per Stats Perform research, blended with the returners to the roster, Clemson has 437 career starts amongst its team's top six most experienced players – the ninth-most starts in the country.
- Of Division I teams that boast the most players with at least 50 or more starts in their careers, the Tigers tied for fourth nationally with six.

## CLEMSON PREDICTED TO FINISH FOURTH IN ACC

- Ian Schieffelin (Atlanta, Ga./Grayson) and Chase Hunter (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) were tabbed preseason Second Team All-ACC on Tuesday by media at the league's annual preseason media day, which was held in Charlotte on Oct. 10.
- In addition, Clemson was predicted to finish fourth in the ACC. That is the highest preseason prediction for the Tigers since 2010 when they were picked to finish third. The last time Clemson was picked fourth in the preseason poll was 2008 when they finished third.
- Schieffelin and Hunter were named to the second team along with Jamir Watkins (Florida State), Baye Ndongo (Georgia Tech) and Ishmael Leggett (Pitt).
- Schieffelin is coming off a season in which he earned the ACC's Most Improved Player award after averaging 10.1 points and 9.4 rebounds. It was the second time a Tiger has won the award (Jaron Blossomgame, 2016). He finished with 340 total rebounds – the sixth-most in a single season in program history.
- Schieffelin totaled his 10th and 11th double-doubles of the season with 16 points and 12 rebounds against New Mexico and 18 points and 11 rebounds against Alabama. With his 11th double-double, Schieffelin was just the second Clemson player to record double figures in double-doubles in a season since 2008-09. Hunter Tyson did it last year with 16, but that is the only other player to do it since Trevor Booker had 13 double-doubles in 2008-09. Schieffelin also had 17 double-digit rebounding games last season.
- Hunter returns for his sixth season after he led the Tigers in the NCAA Tournament with 17.8 points, 5.8 assists and 4.3 rebounds per game. He finished with 20 points and six assists against Baylor. It was his third 20-point game of the year and second in a row after a game-high 21 points on 8-of-16 shooting from the floor against New Mexico.
- Hunter became the 46th 1,000-point scorer in Clemson history against Louisville (January 30, 2024) and has 1,228 career points entering this season.

## CLEMSON CONSISTENTLY EXCEEDING PRESEASON EXPECTATIONS

- The Tigers were picked to finished fifth in the ACC last season, as voted on by selected media members.
- Fifth is the highest the Tigers have been picked in the preseason media poll since the 2008-09 season. Clemson was also picked fifth that season.
- In 2022-23, the Tigers were picked 11th in the preseason poll, the Tigers finished with a 14-6 mark, the most conference wins in program history, the Tigers finished eight spots ahead of their projected finish.
- Clemson has exceeded the preseason poll projection 11 times in Head Coach Brad Brownell's 14 full seasons leading the program.
- With a 10-6 record in 2020-21, Clemson finished the season in a tie for fifth place in the ACC standings entering games. The Tigers were picked 10th in the preseason vote by the Atlantic Coast Conference Media – a five-place improvement over the preseason prediction.
- Brad Brownell's team had the second-best standing relative to its preseason prediction. Only Virginia Tech was better, standing eight spots ahead of its preseason prediction. Virginia Tech was 11th in the preseason media poll and finished in third.
- Brownell's teams have finished equal to or better than its preseason prediction by the ACC media in nine-of-his-previous 12 years. That includes a 10-place improvement in 2017-18 when the Tigers were picked 13th in the preseason and finished third.
- That is the all-time record improvement in ACC history from the preseason to the postseason. That team also reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament and Brownell was named the National College Coach of the Year by Sports Illustrated.

## BRAD BROWNELL SIGNS CONTRACT EXTENSION

Clemson University and Head Basketball Coach Brad Brownell have agreed to a contract through 2029.

• **"I'm honored and grateful to continue to lead the Clemson Basketball program. I want to thank Graham Neff, President Jim Clements and our entire administration for their continued belief and confidence in me and my staff. I am extremely proud of our recent success, both on and off the court, and there is not a better time than now to be a part of the Clemson family."**

• Brownell is the winningest coach in program history with 265 wins as the leader of the Tigers, earning the 2017-18 Sports Illustrated National College Coach of the Year Award. The Tigers have reached the NCAA Tournament four times, including three in the last seven seasons that have culminated in a Sweet 16 appearance in 2018 and an Elite Eight in 2024. They are one of just 15 programs since 2018 to advance to a Sweet 16 and Elite Eight in separate seasons.

• Clemson most recently reached the Elite Eight for just the second time in history and the first time in 44 years. The Brownell led Tigers beat New Mexico, Baylor and Arizona en route to a historical 24-win campaign for Clemson.

• The Tigers have won 47 games over the last two seasons, the second-most in program history, while also posting a .625 (25-15) win percentage in the ACC over that same period. That is the highest in consecutive seasons in program history. Since 2017-18, the Tigers are fourth in the ACC in wins (141) and fifth in league wins (72).

• During Brownell's 14 seasons, his impact off the court at Clemson has been just as successful as on it.

• Developing a basketball donor base has been central to Clemson and Brownell's success since he was hired in 2010. He has been instrumental in the fundraising for the Littlejohn Coliseum/Swann Pavilion renovation, helping spearhead the \$63.5 million project, to the basketball program's home arena in 2015, in addition to multiple overseas experiences for student-athletes and much, much more.

• Now, another addition has been planned for the future of the building, with the gracious support of the Brown family, that will provide the men's basketball program with 30,000 feet of new construction. That will include new and updated team areas, offices and an additional practice gym.

• Under Brownell's direction, the basketball program has maintained very good Athletic Progress Rate performances, including being one of eight Power-Six programs with a 1000 multi-year score and one of two in the ACC. It was the program's third 1000 in its history and its first since the 2015-16 cohort. This last cohort comprised 2019-20 through 2022-23 academic years.

• Basketball associate head coach Billy Donlon and assistants Sean Dixon and Dick Bender also received new contracts.

## -- IT'S ALL IN THE FAMILY --

• Chase and Dillon Hunter scored in double figures in the same game for the first time in their career against Radford (11/21). A 79-51 win for Clemson.

• Dillon scored 15 off the bench for the Tigers -- a new career-high. Chase scored 10. Both were a combined 9-16 from the floor and 4-10 from three.

• The last time two brothers scored double figures in the same game for the Tigers was Trevor and Devin Booker on Dec. 22, 2009 against Western Carolina. A 79-57 win for Clemson.

• Trevor finished with a game-high 31 and Devin totaled 10 off the bench.

• The Clemson record for points in a game by two brothers is 62, set by Randy (34) and Richie (28) Mahaffey in a home game against Virginia on Jan. 14, 1967.

### UNCW SEAHAWK TIES IN THE CLEMSON PROGRAM

• Head Coach Brad Brownell was an assistant coach for Jerry

Wainwright at UNCW from 1994-02 before becoming the head coach from 2002-06.

• While an assistant at UNCW, Brownell coached his current associate head coach, Billy Donlon.

• As a collegiate player, Donlon was a star guard at UNC Wilmington for four seasons (1996-99), playing in 118 career games. He finished with 901 points and at the time of his graduation he was the Seahawks all-time assist leader with 456, which currently stands fourth in UNCW history. He was a member of the Colonial Athletic Association's (CAA) All-Rookie Team in 1996 and led the team in assists as a junior (5.6 apg) and senior (5.2 apg).

• Director of Recruiting Lucas McKay attended UNCW during his undergrad years and first worked under Brownell as a student manager from 2003-06.

• Prior to Brownell's arrival in 1994, his current special assistant Jeff Reynolds had spent the previous (1990-94) four seasons as an assistant for the Seahawks.

## -- CLEMSON TIGERS IN THE NBA --

### HUNTER TYSON DRAFTED 37TH OVERALL BY DENVER NUGGETS

• Tyson was selected 37th overall by the Oklahoma City Thunder in the second round of the 2023 NBA Draft on June 22. The pick was made by the Denver Nuggets as part of a previously agreed upon trade.

• Tyson was selected the highest in the NBA Draft by a Tigers since K.J. McDaniels was picked 32nd by the Philadelphia 76ers in 2014. He was the first Tiger selected since Jaron Blossomgame in the 2017 NBA Draft (59th overall).

• Tyson earned his first career All-ACC honor last season and was named to the All-ACC First Team for his performance in 2022-23. Tyson put together a career year this past season season.

• He averaged a team-best 15.3 points and 9.6 rebounds per game while shooting 47.9 percent from the floor, 40.5 percent from three and 83.8 percent at the free throw line. In league play, he was even better. He averaged 16.4 points and 9.9 rebounds while shooting 50.5 percent and 84.3 percent at the charity stripe.

• He was named the 2023 ACC Skip Prosser Scholar-Athlete of the Year for his work on the court and in the classroom.

• Tyson became the 44th player in Clemson history to amass 1,000 career points and has since moved into the top 40 all time. He was named to the 2023 Naismith Hall of Fame Karl Malone Award Top 10 and the 2023 USBWA Oscar Robertson Trophy Award Midseason Watch List.

• He collected 16 double-doubles which tied him for eighth all-time in Clemson history for a single season with Sharone Wright (1992-93). It is the most in a season since Wright posted 18 in 1993-94.

• Tyson ranked 11th in the nation in double-doubles and is second in the ACC. He's first in defensive rebounding per game (8.26) and second nationally. His 325 rebounds are fourth in the league and 18th nationally.

• The Monroe, N.C. native became just the 17th player in Clemson history to eclipse 1,000 points and 600 rebounds in a career. In Clemson's win over the Wolfpack (Feb. 25), Tyson became the all-time games played leader in Clemson history (136).

### TYSON SHOWS OUT IN 2023 NBA SUMMER LEAGUE

• Tyson was named to the NBA 2K24 All-Summer League First Team after an outstanding showing in Las Vegas.

• Tyson averaged 20.8 points and 6.0 rebounds, while shooting 54.1 percent from the field and 50.0 percent from three.

• Hunter Tyson made his NBA debut against the Oklahoma City Thunder on Oct. 29, 2023. Tyson played three minutes and grabbed one rebound.

• Tyson scored his first career NBA points at the Minnesota Timberwolves on November 1. He played a season-high four minutes and finished 1-for-2 from the field with his first basket coming on a dunk. He also added a rebound.

### TYSON COMPLETES FIRST SEASON IN THE NBA

• Hunter Tyson played in 18 games last season for the Denver Nuggets, averaging 2.7 minutes per contest.

• He scored 20 points, grabbed nine rebounds and totaled two assists and one steal.

### PJ HALL SIGNS TWO-WAY CONTRACT WITH DENVER NUGGETS

• PJ Hall (Spartanburg, S.C./Dorman) agreed to terms with the Denver Nuggets. Hall will join Hunter Tyson (Monroe, N.C./Piedmont) in Denver after Tyson spent his rookie season with the Nuggets in 2023-24.

# NOTES

- Hall was an All-ACC First Team selection as a senior after being named to the Third Team as a junior. He was an AP All-American Honorable Mention and was named to the NCAA All-West Region Team, NABC All-District First Team, a finalist for the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award (nation's best center) and the Oscar Robertson Trophy All-America Watch List in 2024.
- Hall finished with 659 points this year in 36 games, an 18.3 average per game. He set the school record for points in a season. The existing record was 651 points by Horace Grant in 1986-87 and Bill Yarborough in 1954-55.
- He posted fourteen 20-point games this season and has scored in double-figures 35 times. Hall totaled seven double-doubles and netted one 30-point game, which was a career high 31 points and 17 rebounds against Georgia Tech (Jan. 16).
- Hall finished fourth in the ACC in scoring with 18.3 points per game, while ranking 15th in rebounding (6.4 per game). He shot at a very high clip this past season, ninth in the league (48.8 percent). Defensively, Hall was fourth in the ACC blocks per game (1.42) and had 51 blocked shots.
- He finished seventh on Clemson's all-time scoring list (1,702 points). He is just the fourth Tiger to amass 1,700 points, 600 rebounds and 100 blocks in a career (Trevor Booker, Elden Campbell and Dale Davis).
- Hall is seventh in career points (1,702), 15th in scoring average (14.20), 22nd in rebounds (634) and seventh in field goals made (641).
- He finished with five NCAA Tournament games played in his career. He averaged 11.2 points and added 19 rebounds, three assists, two blocks and a steal.

## PJ HALL SCORES FIRST CAREER POINTS IN THE NBA

- PJ Hall scored his first career points on 11/23/24 at the Los Angeles Lakers. The Nuggets won 127-102.
- Hall played three minutes and finished with two points which came on a reverse dunk.
- Hall has seen time in five games this season for Denver. He scored again against the Atlanta Hawks on 12/8/24 in three minutes of action. He scored on a layup assisted by former roommate and Clemson teammate Hunter Tyson.

## PARKER FOX - PHOENIX SUNS FRONT OFFICE

- Parker Fox (2018-22) spent three seasons as a walk-on for the Tiger basketball team before earning a scholarship his senior season in 2021-22.
- Fox graduated from Clemson and immediately began work as a Basketball Operations intern in the Milwaukee Bucks front office.
- Now Fox has moved into a role in the Phoenix organization.

## GREG BUCKNER - ASSISTANT COACH, MILWAUKEE BUCKS

- Greg Buckner (1994-98) has served on an NBA coaching staff since 2017. He started as an assistant for the Memphis Grizzlies from 2017-19 and had been with the Cleveland Cavaliers since 2020. While in Cleveland, Buckner was promoted from assistant to associate head coach prior to the 2022 season and served in that role through 2023-24.
- Buckner was hired by the Milwaukee Bucks in the offseason as an assistant coach beginning in 2024-25.
- Buckner enjoyed a long playing career in the NBA: Dallas Mavericks (1999-02, 2006-07), Philadelphia 76ers (2002-04), Denver Nuggets (2004-06), Minnesota Timberwolves (2007-08) and Memphis Grizzlies (2008-09).

## CAREER-HIGH 30 POINTS AT BOISE STATE

- Chase Hunter scored a career-high 30 points at Boise State (Nov. 17) and also made a career-best 12 field goals.
- He scored 20 points in the first half against the Broncos – the most he's scored in a single half in his career. He scored 19 points on two occasions.
- He became the 41st Clemson player to score 30 points in a game. It was the 33rd occurrence on the road. Of those, just 21 players in school history have scored 30 or more in a true road environment.
- It was the 10th road game with 30+ points for a Clemson player dating back to 1999 and just the second in a non-conference game.

- After leading the Tigers to the Elite Eight with an incredible 2024 NCAA Tournament performance, Hunter began the 2024-25 season where he left off last March.
- Hunter posted 17 points on an efficient 6-for-9 from the field, including 3-of-3 from three. He added three assists, five rebounds and two steals for good measure.
- Hunter chipped in 13 more against Saint Francis in the second game of the season.

## CHASE HUNTER – PRESEASON ALL-ACC SECOND TEAM

- Returning for his sixth season in Tigertown, Chase Hunter received preseason recognition following the league's annual media days.
- Hunter joined teammate Ian Schieffelin on the All-ACC Second Team (both ranked No. 6 and No. 7 out of 10 possible honorees).

## CHASE HUNTER IN THE CLEMSON NCAA TOURNAMENT RECORD BOOK

- Chase Hunter finished with 73 points – good for fifth in program history.
- His average of 14.6 was good for seventh, while his 23 assists is tied for the most by a Tiger in program history.

## GREAT COMEBACK BY CHASE HUNTER

- Chase Hunter had a frustrating game in the ACC Tournament against Boston College as he was 0-10 from the field and scored just two points. But the senior was bound and determined to have an impact in this NCAA Tournament and he responded with 21 points on 8-for-16 field goal shooting and added six assists to lead Clemson in both categories.
- Hunter continued a torrid NCAA Tournament run with 20 points in a win over Baylor, 18 points against Arizona and 12 points against Alabama.
- His consecutive 20-point performances in wins over New Mexico and Baylor marked the second time that he has netted consecutive 20-point games in his career (2021-22).
- For the NCAA Tournament, Hunter 17.8 points, 4.3 rebounds, 5.8 assists and shot 50.0 percent from the field.
- It was the eighth and ninth time in his career he has scored at least 20 points in a game, the second and third time this

year.

- Chase Hunter became the 46th player in Clemson history to amass 1,000 career points against Louisville (1/30).

- In addition to his preseason All-ACC honors, Schieffelin has been recognized as a preseason top 20 power forward in the country by the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame.
- In an effort to promote the game of basketball and the best of the best within the sport, The Basketball Hall of Fame and ESPN proudly present college basketball's five positional awards – given to the best men's college player in their respective position.

- The annual Karl Malone Award, named after the Class of 2010 Hall of Famer and two-time NBA Most Valuable Player, celebrates its 11th year by recognizing the top power forwards in Division I men's college basketball.
- Just three ACC players were recognized, including Schieffelin. North Carolina's Cade Tyson and Syracuse's Donnie Freeman.
- Tyson is the younger brother of Littlejohn Legend and Denver Nugget Hunter Tyson. The elder Tyson was a member of the Top 10 list for the Karl Malone Award in 2023.

## IAN SCHIEFFELIN WAS THE ACC'S MOST IMPROVED PLAYER

- Ian Schieffelin was the only player in the ACC that averaged at least 10.0 points, 9.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists per game last season. There were only 18 other players in America that accomplished that.
- Schieffelin had significant raises in his points per game (+4.6), rebounds per game (+5.3), field goal percentage (+5.3%), 3-point percentage (+13.6%) and free throw percentage (+4.3%).
- He finished third in the ACC in rebounding per game (9.4) and 34th nationally. Third in offensive rebounding and 80th nationally (2.75 per game). Second in defensive rebounding and 32nd nationally (6.69 per game).
- He totaled 11 double-doubles last season, good for third-most in the ACC.
- The Tigers were +106 when Ian Schieffelin is on the court this season.

- Clemson forward Ian Schieffelin produced his fifth career double-double in a monster game against North Carolina (1/6/24). He posted 16 points and 11 rebounds, in addition to five steals and four blocks. He was the first player in the country to accomplish that feat this season and just the eighth since 2010 to do so.
- Ian Schieffelin secured his fourth career double-double at Miami (Fla.) (1/3/24) and the third of his current campaign with 11 points and 11 rebounds.
- He posted his third career double-double and second of the season at Memphis (12/16/23). He had 11 points and 11 rebounds.
- He posted his second career double-double in a 72-67 win over South Carolina on Dec. 6, 2023. He had 12 points and 12 rebounds.
- He had 17 rebounds in Clemson's victory at Pittsburgh on December 3, 2023, the most by a Clemson player under Brad Brownell and the most in any game since Trevor Booker had 17 at East Carolina on December 5, 2007.
- Schieffelin had a 14-rebound effort at Alabama the previous game on November 28, 2023. Those two individual efforts were big reasons Clemson won at Alabama and Pittsburgh and allowed the Tigers to stay even on the boards at Alabama and +7 at Pittsburgh. Alabama and Pittsburgh were both among the top 25 teams in the nation in rebounding with margins of at least +10 rebounds per game entering those contests.
- Schieffelin's 31 rebounds over a two-game period were the most by a Tiger since the 1998-99 season. Tom Wideman had 17 rebounds in an NIT quarterfinal game against Butler on March 18, 1999, then had 15 against Xavier in the NIT semifinals in Madison Square Garden on March 23, 1999.
- Ian Schieffelin tied his career high with 14 rebounds in an

85-77 win at Alabama (11/28). He's the 12th Clemson player since 2010-11 to post at least 14 rebounds in a game and just the fifth to do it in a true road game.

## SCHIEFFELIN IN 2022-23

- Schieffelin demolished his previous career high with a 20 point performance on 9-of-13 shooting from the floor in the season opener against The Citadel in 2022 (11/6/22)
- The nine made field goals also served as a career high.
- Schieffelin had a monster night on the boards, tallying a career-best 14 rebounds. He secured a career-best nine on the offensive glass.
- The nine offensive rebounds were the most for a Tiger since James Mays had 10 at Maryland on Jan. 13, 2007.

- Myles Foster's 17 points are the most by a Clemson player off the bench in a debut since Marquise Reed in 2016.

### JACK OF ALL TRADES

- Jaeden Zackery has long been known as a player that can fill up the stat sheet in name of a victory for his team.
- In just his second game as a Tiger, Zackery turned in a classic effort, helping lead Clemson to victory over Saint Francis.

- Zackery totaled 16 points, six assists, four rebounds and four steals. He was 6-9 from the floor, 2-3 from three and 2-3 at the line. Efficient.

## -- CLEMSON'S NCAA TOURNAMENT HISTORY --

### -- 1980 --

- 1980:** The first time the Clemson Tigers entered the NCAA tournament turned out to be the deepest run in program history. Bill Foster's Tigers advanced to the Regional Final (Final Eight) before falling to UCLA, who went on finish as the national runner-up to Louisville.
- Clemson opened the tournament with a 76-73 win over Utah State in Ogden, UT. Billy Williams, first-team All-ACC that year, led Clemson with 22 points, while Larry Nance chipped in with 13 points and nine rebounds. Bobby Conrad, who drew 24 charges that season, drew yet another from Rich McElrath with nine seconds left and Clemson ahead by a 75-73 margin. Conrad hit one free throw to ice the game (no three-point shot then). The Tigers won despite shooting 12-24 from the free throw line.
- Clemson's second round victory over BYU was also close. The Cougars, led by future NBA stars Danny Ainge, Fred Roberts, and Greg Kite, held a 24-11 lead early in the first half and led 42-38 at halftime. BYU led 58-54 with 9:04 remaining before the Tigers made a comeback. Clemson went on an 8-2 run to grab the lead at 62-60 with 4:20 remaining on a jumper by Williams. Clemson was able to hold on down the stretch, running the "Tiger Paws" offense. The Tigers missed three one-and-ones in the last minute and shot 9-17 in the game, but won thanks to a strong defense. The Tigers won by a final score of 71-66, as Williams led the Tigers with 24 points and eight assists, while Larry Nance added 16 points and 11 rebounds.
- The Tigers took on Lamar and coach Billy Tubbs in the Sweet Sixteen at the University of Arizona and won by a score of 74-66. Clemson trailed by eight with 10 minutes remaining, but again came back, as a Chris Dodds layup with 7:48 left put the Tigers ahead for good. Nance led the Tigers with his second consecutive 16-point, 11-rebound game, while Moose Campbell added 15 points and 12 rebounds. Williams chipped in with 12 and Fred Gilliam added 10 off the bench. The Tigers made all six free throws attempted in the final 1:21, despite shooting 10-19 prior. It set up the first meeting between Clemson and UCLA, who was coached by former North Carolina player Larry Brown.
- The Bruins and Tigers squared off in a nationally televised contest on NBC for the right to play in the Final Four. Clemson and UCLA were even for much of the first half, but the Bruins closed the first half on a 17-5 run over the final 5:07 to take a 46-35 lead at intermission. The two teams scored 39 points apiece in the second half and Bruins held on to win, 85-74. Williams led the Tigers with 18 points, while Nance and Gilliam poured in 13 each. Nance was named to the All-West Regional after averaging 14.4 points over four contests. Nance remains the only player in Clemson history named to an NCAA All-Regional Team.

### -- 1987 --

- 1987:** The Tigers entered the 1987 tournament as a #4 seed with a 25-5 record against Charlie Spoonhour's Southwest Missouri State Bears. The 13th-seeded Bears knocked out the Tigers 65-60 by holding second-team All-American Horace Grant to 16 points on only 11 field goal attempts. Michael Brown was 6-7 from the field for 14 points, but it wasn't enough. The Tigers shot 54 percent from the field, 83.3 percent from the line, and 45.5 percent from behind the arc and still lost. Winston Garland led the Bears with 24 points. Clemson point guard Grayson Marshall was limited by a sprained ankle, an injury that was a contributing factor to Clemson losing four of its last five games that year after a 24-2 start.

### -- 1989 --

- 1989:** Clemson traveled to Boise, ID to play St. Mary's of California in the first round. Dale Davis and Elden Campbell had a coming out party, as the "Duo of Doom" combined to shoot 17-23 for 38 points and rack up 16 rebounds in the Tigers' 83-70 win. David Young was 5-7 behind the arc and scored 19 points for Clemson, who shot 60 percent from the field and 60 percent from three-point range.
- The Tigers were then charged with taking on #1 Arizona. The Wildcats, led by Sean Elliot and future long time major-leaguer Kenny Lofton, defeated Clemson 94-68, the Tigers worst loss in NCAA Tournament history in terms of margin. Campbell had 24 points and Derrick Forrest added 21, but Arizona held Davis to just two points and five rebounds. Arizona forced 22 Clemson turnovers while only committing nine themselves. Elliot paced Arizona with 25 points, while Lofton added eight points and four assists.

### -- 1990 --

- 1990:** The Tigers earned a #5 seed in the East Regional after winning the ACC regular-season championship for the first time in history. The Tigers found themselves in a game with the BYU Cougars in Hartford, the same school Clemson played and defeated in the 1980 Tournament. Clemson again emerged victorious by a close 49-47 margin. Elden Campbell led the Tigers with 15 points. Both teams shot 33.3 percent from the field and the Tigers made only 14-30 from the free throw stripe. BYU had a last shot at the basket, but it missed as time expired and the Tigers advanced.
- In the second round, the Tigers took on a LaSalle team that entered the game with only one loss and featured All-American Lionel Simmons. Simmons lived up to his billing, pouring in 28 points, including 15 in the first half, as the Explorers jumped out to a 43-27 lead, which swelled to as large as 19 in the second half. The Tigers still trailed by 11 with 12 minutes remaining, but the Tigers went on an 11-0 run to knot the game at 55. LaSalle jumped back up by five, but the Tigers responded with a 15-3 run to take a 70-62 with 2:08 left, highlighted by a Marion Cash layup off a Davis steal. Davis, who had given his team a tongue-lashing at halftime before the coaches entered the room, led Clemson with 26 points and 17 rebounds. Sean Tyson added 17 points and 11 rebounds as the Tigers advanced to take on UCONN in the Sweet Sixteen.
- Clemson met Connecticut, the third-ranked team in the nation and a number-one seed, at the Meadowlands in East Rutherford, NJ. Once again, Clemson trailed 38-29 at the half. The Huskies had the lead as high as 19 points at 59-40 at the 12:36 mark. With five minutes remaining, the Tigers had chipped the deficit to 10. Clemson then went on a 13-2 run culminated by a David Young three-point shot with 12 seconds left, putting the Tigers ahead, 70-69. The Tigers forced a UCONN miss and Sean Tyson got the rebound and was fouled with two seconds remaining. However, he missed the front end of the one-and-one and UCONN gathered the miss and called its final timeout with one second left. Scott Burrell then inbounded the ball with a 75 foot pass to Tate George, who caught the ball, turned, and shot in one second. The ball went through the hoop at the buzzer for a 71-70 Connecticut win. Dale Davis led the Tigers with 15 points and 17 rebounds, while Clemson shot just 16-25 from the foul line.
- Davis averaged 14.7 rebounds per game in the three games of the tournament and led all rebounders for the entire event on a per game basis. His 14.7 rebound average is still the highest rebound average for any player in the NCAA Tournament since 1977.

### -- 1996 --

- 1996:** Behind four freshman starters, Rick Barnes' team was chosen as the nine seed in the West Regional. The Tigers took on a Georgia team that started five seniors, a matchup of the oldest team in the field against the youngest. The first half was close throughout with the Bulldogs taking a 26-25 advantage. The first half saw only 51 total points, while in the second half, the two teams combined for 104 points. The Bulldogs were able to outscore the Tigers 55-49 in the half en route to an 81-74 victory. The Tigers led by three with just under six minutes remaining, but an 11-0 run put Georgia on top for good. Greg Buckner led the Tigers with 20 points and seven assists, while freshman Andrius Jurkunas added 19 points and seven boards in the loss.

### -- 1997 --

- 1997:** The Tigers got back to their winning ways in the Tournament, downing the Miami (OH) Redskins 68-56 in Kemper Arena in Kansas City, Mo. The win marked Rick Barnes' first-ever victory in the Big Dance. Greg Buckner scored a game-high 22 points on 9-17 shooting and grabbed nine boards. Terrell McIntyre also scored in double figures 10 points. The Tigers only turned the ball over eight times and led by 14 at halftime, 39-25. Tony Christie sparked the Tigers off the bench, adding eight points. The win set up a matchup with Tulsa two days later.
- Tom Wideman pulled down 11 rebounds (eight offensive), while Iker Iturbe added 10 as the Tigers advanced to the Sweet Sixteen with a 65-59 win over Tulsa. Wideman's eight offensive rebounds tied for the most in the Rick Barnes era at Clemson. The team grabbed 23 offensive rebounds, and out-rebounded Tulsa, 49-35. The Tiger defense limited All-America senior Shea Seals to five points, including 0-7 behind the arc. Seals was in foul trouble for much of the game, picking up three fouls before intermission and notching his fourth early in the second half. Clemson was able to overcome a 31.6% clip from the field for the game, including a 22.6% mark in the first half. Remarkably, the Tigers only trailed by three at the break and a second half rally, led by Terrell McIntyre's 16 points and two steals, pushed the Tigers to another Sweet Sixteen berth.
- With the win over Tulsa, the Tigers advanced to San Antonio for their first Sweet 16 since 1990, where they would square off with Minnesota, who had won the same matchup earlier in the season

in Puerto Rico. The result was a classic double-overtime thriller in which the Tigers came up short, 90-84. Bobby Jackson (36) and Sam Jacobson (29) combined for 65 points for the third-ranked Gophers. Greg Buckner paced the Tigers with 22 points, while McIntyre added 17. Mohammed Woni played his best game of the season and had a career-high 12 points, including 10-10 from the line, while Tom Wideman added 10 points and 10 boards in the loss. Tony Christie gave the Tigers new life sending the game to overtime on a buzzer-beater, his only field goal of the game. Clemson took a six-point lead in the first overtime, only to see Minnesota come back to tie. Jackson missed a shot as time expired in the first overtime to extend the game. The Gophers then outscored the Tigers 10-4 in the second overtime to advance to the Final Eight, 90-84.

## -- 1998 --

• **1998:** The Tigers entered the 1998 Tournament as the sixth seed in the Midwest Regional after a semifinal loss to #1 ranked Duke in the ACC Tournament by two points. The Tigers drew Western Michigan in Chicago, IL. WMU's Saddy Washington (24) and Rashod Johnson (32) led the Broncos to a 75-72 win over the Tigers. Five Tigers scored in double figures, led by Harold Jamison's 14 points and 10 rebounds. WMU led by 12 at halftime. The Tigers made a strong comeback, but couldn't overcome the Broncos' 11-24 (.458) shooting from behind the arc. Johnson hit 8-15 on his own. Terrell McIntyre put together a solid all-around game, notching 10 points, seven assists, six rebounds, and four steals. Ultimately, Western Michigan was able to pull out a three-point victory, shocking the 21,711 in attendance in Chicago.

## -- 2008 --

• **2008:** Villanova outscored Clemson 48-30 in the second half and went on to a 75-69 win over the Tigers in the first round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament in Tampa, Fla. Clemson was seeded fifth and Villanova was seeded 12th, as the Tigers were coming off a run to the championship game of the ACC tournament and were ranked 22nd in the final AP poll. Clemson jumped out to a 36-18 lead with five minutes left in the first half, then Villanova cut the margin to 39-27 at halftime. By the first media timeout of the second half the Wildcats had cut the lead to three and had the lead at 50-49 with 11:58 left on a long three-point goal by Scottie Reynolds. The game was close the rest on the contest and the Tigers trailed by just 67-66 with 1:37 left. But Villanova went on an 8-3 run to close the game and won by six. K.C. Rivers led Clemson with 15 points, while Demontez Stitt made 4-4 three-point goals and scored 14. Reynolds led Villanova with 21 points, while Corey Fisher added 17. Clemson made just 9-33 three-point shots and 14-23 free throws. Villanova made 11-17 shots in the second half and hit 22-27 from the foul line. Villanova did a good job defending on the inside as the Clemson combination of Trevor Booker and James Mays got just five combined field goal attempts.

## -- 2009 --

• **2009:** Trevor Booker scored 18 points, but the Tigers shot just 32 percent from the field overall, including just 5-22 three-point shots in a 62-59 loss to Michigan in the first round of the 2009 NCAA Tournament at Kansas City, MO. The loss ended Clemson's season with a record of 23-9. Michigan played a zone defense most of the game, the first time Clemson had seen a zone in quite some time. Manny Harris led Michigan with 21 points.

- Sparked by consecutive 3-pointers by Andre Young and another by K.C. Rivers, the Tigers used a 14-0 run to make it 58-57 with just over a minute left. Clemson still had a chance after Michigan's Zack Novak hit just 1 of 2 free throws with 13 seconds left, but K.C. Rivers' contested 3-pointer at the buzzer was well short.
- The Tigers missed 17 of their first 21 shots and shot 9-of-33 in the first half, missing all but two of their 12 3-pointers, yet trailed by just 27-24 at intermission.
- Clemson won the rebound margin 44-33 behind 11 rebounds by Booker, but still lost. Michigan made 10-26 three-point goals and that 15-point margin in points off three-point goals had a lot to do with the final margin.

## -- 2010 --

• **2010:** Clemson lost to Missouri, 86-78 in a matchup of teams with similar styles. The game was played in Buffalo, NY on March 19, 2010. Demontez Stitt scored 21 points and Andre Young added 19 to lead the Tigers. The two guards combined to make 9-14 three-point shots in the contest. Jerai Grant added 12 points and six rebounds, while Trevor Booker scored 11 points, had 11 rebounds and five assists.

- Clemson lost the battle of the presses, as Missouri forced Clemson into 20 turnovers and committed just nine turnovers on offense. Kim English and Keith Ramsey each scored 20 points for Missouri, who had 15 steals on defense, five by guard J.T. Tiller.

- The two teams were tied at 39-39 at halftime, but Missouri won the second half, 47-39. Clemson won the rebound margin 41-30 and made 12-24 three-point shots, but still lost the game.
- The difference was Missouri's ability to turn the Tigers over, and break Clemson's press to score easy baskets. Missouri shot 52 percent from the field for the game. Missouri won the points off turnover stat 20-5. Clemson cut the lead to 82-78 with 41 seconds left, but could get no closer.

## -- 2011 --

- **2011:** Jerai Grant scored a career-best 22 points and the fast-starting Tigers built a double-figure Tuesday night lead and never backed off in beating Alabama-Birmingham 70-52 in a First Four game at the University of Dayton. There was little time to celebrate. The Tigers hurried to catch a flight to their second-round game against fifth-seeded West Virginia (20-11) on Thursday afternoon in Tampa, Fla. The Tigers had to play their next game in Tampa less than 36 hours later. Clemson did not arrive in Tampa until 5 a.m. Wednesday, then had the first game on Thursday at noon.
- Grant, who hit 10 of 15 shots from the field and also grabbed seven rebounds to lead Clemson. Tanner Smith and Devin Booker each had 10 for Clemson. The win was its first in the NCAA tournament since the 1997 team advanced to the round of 16. Ahead 39-27 at the break, Clemson never let the Blazers draw closer than eight points in the second half.
- Clemson' season ended that Thursday afternoon with an eight point loss to fifth seed West Virginia, who had eight days of rest before playing the Tigers. Andre Young led Clemson with 22 points, while Demontez Still, playing in his last game for Clemson, had 16. Clemson had a 12 point lead in the first half, but obviously ran out of energy due to the quick turnaround.

## -- 2018 --

- **2018:** Clemson got back to their winning ways in the Tournament, downing New Mexico State 79-68 in San Diego, Calif. The win marked Head Coach Brad Brownell's second win in the NCAA Tournament. Shelton Mitchell scored a team-high 23 points, while teammate Gabe DeVoe was right behind him with 22. DeVoe made a team-best 10 field goals. Marquise Reed chipped in 15 in the victory. Elijah Thomas led the team in rebounding with 10 boards. The Tigers shot 55.9 percent from the floor, including 60.0 percent on two-point goals and 42.9 percent from three. The win set up a contest with the fourth-seeded Auburn Tigers.
- Clemson's dominant performance against Auburn in the second round was one for the record books. The Tigers boartraced the other Tiger squad in the first half, leading to a 43-19 lead. At one point, the game was 70-29 in favor of Clemson. The 84-53 victory proved to be the largest victory margin for a lower seed over a higher seed in NCAA Tournament history. Gabe DeVoe turned in another 20-point effort finishing with 22, while Elijah Thomas posted 18 points and 11 rebounds, Marquise Reed scored 16 and grabbed seven boards and Shelton Mitchell tallied 10 with six rebounds and six assists. Clemson shot 47.5 percent from the floor and 38.5 percent from three (10-for-26). Clemson limited Auburn to just 25.8 percent shooting, including 21.9 percent from three. With the win, Clemson would advance to the Sweet 16 round for the first time since 1997.
- In the Sweet 16, Clemson faced the No. 1 seed Kansas Jayhawks. The pod of teams in the Midwest Regional by chance happened to be three-of-four ACC teams: Clemson, Duke and Syracuse. In his final game as a Tiger, Gabe DeVoe turned in the best performance of his career. The senior scored a career-high 31 points on 10-for-17 shooting and added nine rebounds and three assists. He came the first 30-point scorer against the Jayhawks since the 2015-16 season. Clemson found themselves down by as many 20 points in the second half, but a 49-point second period provided a furious rally by the Tigers. A 26-12 run to help the Tigers pull to within four would not be enough and the Tigers' season would end in Omaha, Neb. to Kansas, 80-76.

## -- 2021 --

- **2021:** Amir Simms scored 15 points, while Clyde Trapp added 14 and Hunter Tyson totaled 10 in a 60-56 loss to Rutgers in the first round of the 2021 NCAA Tournament in Indianapolis, Ind. The loss ended Clemson's season with a record of 16-8.
- Clemson led for 15:23 of the contest and led at halftime 26-23, but couldn't find enough baskets down the stretch.

## -- 2024 --

- **2024:** Just the second team in Clemson history to reach Elite 8 of NCAA Tournament, first time in 44 years. Accomplished this as a No. 6 seeded team in West regional, same seed and regional as the 1980 Clemson team. According to research by CBS Sports, the 44 years in between Elite 8 appearances is the fourth longest in the history of the tournament. The longest is a 54-year stretch by Loyola

(Chicago).

- Defeated No. 3 seed Baylor and No. 2 seed Arizona in the NCAA Tournament. Win over No. 3 seed Baylor was best seed Clemson has beaten in NCAA Tournament since 1980. Then topped that with win over No. 2 Arizona that was the best seed Clemson has beaten in the NCAA Tournament.
- Had three players (PJ Hall, Chase Hunter, Ian Schieffelin) named to NCAA All-Regional team, most in one year in Clemson history. Had just two selections total previously (Larry Nance, 1980, Gabe Devoe, 2018).
- Clemson won its first three games of the NCAA Tournament as the underdog, the first team to do that since 1985.
- Basketball posted the second largest victory margin in the NCAA Tournament in program history to advance to the second round with a decisive 77-56 win over No. 11 seed New Mexico on Friday afternoon.

The Tigers (22-11) were powered by Chase Hunter's (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) 21 points on 8-of-16 shooting. Hunter added a team-high six assists and collected three rebounds and two steals.

Ian Schieffelin (Loganville, Ga./Grayson) totaled his 10th double-double of the season with 16 points and 12 rebounds. PJ Hall (Spartanburg, S.C./Dorman) added 14 points, three rebounds and a steal.

Jack Clark (Cheltenham, Pa./Cheltenham) was more than solid with six points, eight rebounds and four assists, in addition to suffocating defense.

Clemson's bench outscored New Mexico's 13-12, which was led by RJ Godfrey (Suwanee, Ga./North Gwinnett) with six and Chauncey Wiggins (Grayson, Ga./Grayson) with five.

The Tigers went back and forth with the Lobos in the early going, but Clemson would race out to a 30-11 advantage in the opening stanza thanks to a 19-2 run. Clemson coasted to a 14-point lead at the break 42-28.

A 9-2 run coming out of halftime extended the Tigers' advantage to 21. A Hunter jumper with 2:04 left gave Clemson its largest lead of the game at 75-52 and the Tigers would coast to the 21-point victory.

The Tigers held the Lobos to just 29.7 percent shooting from the floor – its lowest field goal percentage of the season by nearly 6.0 percent. It's the second-best field goal percentage difference in an NCAA Tournament game for the Tigers (25.8 percent vs. Auburn – 3/18/18).

- Basketball program never trailed, leading by as many as 15 points and holding on late, advancing to the fifth NCAA Sweet Sixteen in program history after a 72-64 victory over No. 3 Baylor (24-11) at FedEx Forum in the West Region. The Tigers (23-11) had a ten-point lead at halftime in the first meeting between the programs since 1983.

A 16-2 Baylor lead in a late four-minute span narrowed the margin to two, but Clemson went 8-for-8 from the line in the final two minutes to ice the win.

Clemson advances to play No. 2 Arizona (27-8) at Crypto.com Arena in Los Angeles on Thursday, March 28. The Tigers joined NC State, North Carolina and Duke as ACC teams in the Sweet 16.

Sophomore RJ Godfrey (Suwanee, Ga./North Gwinnett) hit a pair of clutch free throws with 29 seconds to play to give Clemson a 68-64 lead, and added two more with 8.3 seconds left to ice the game.

Chase Hunter (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) paced the Tigers offensively for a second straight game, netting 20 points on 5-for-10 shooting, and hit seven of his eight free throw attempts while handing out a team-high six assists. Hunter had scored 20 or more points once in the 2023-24 regular season before doing so in both NCAA Tournament games this week.

"We were hanging on for dear life at the end, but I thought our defense for 38 minutes was unbelievable," said Head Coach Brad Brownell in his postgame interview on TNT.

The Tigers held Baylor to 64 points, their third-lowest offensive output of the season, and a 6-of-24 (.250) mark from behind the arc. Clemson hit 20-of-24 (.833) of its free throw attempts, while Baylor was unable to capitalize, hitting 16-of-26 and missing three one-and-one front-ends in the second half.

Ian Schieffelin (Loganville, Ga./Grayson) added 11 points and six rebounds, while Joe Girard III (Glens Falls, N.Y./Glens Falls) added 13 points, including a pair of free throws with 19 seconds left to give the Tigers a six-point advantage.

PJ Hall (Spartanburg, S.C./Dorman) finished with 11 points in just 19 minutes as he battled foul trouble throughout before fouling out with 36.2 seconds to play.

After the teams traded three-pointers and were tied 5-5 in the first four minutes, Jack Clark's (Cheltenham, Pa./Cheltenham) layup with 16:34 remaining in the first half gave the Tigers the lead for good. Hunter's double-pump buzzer-beater from 25 feet just before halftime gave Clemson the 35-25 lead heading into the half.

Clemson stretched its lead to 14 six minutes into the second half, and led by 15 minutes after Schieffelin made a jumper with 6:44 to play. The Bears roared back with a 16-2 run to pull within two points at 64-62 with 2:18 to play. But Clemson went 8-for-8 as a team from the free throw stripe in the final two minutes to seal the

win.

- Chase Hunter's (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) three-point play with 25 seconds remaining put the Tigers up five and helped hold off a late run by No. 2 seed Arizona (27-10), as No. 6 seed Clemson prevailed 77-72 inside the Crypto.com Arena to advance to the second NCAA Elite Eight in program history. The Tigers (24-11) are the first to advance to the West Regional final. Clemson led for 37:02 in the game and trailed for just 20 seconds, while the game was tied twice.

Arizona cut the lead to two with under a minute remaining, but the Tigers used the three-point play from Hunter to push the lead back to five. The Wildcats got a layup with 15 seconds to go to cut it back to three, but Dillon Hunter (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) snuck behind everyone and made a layup with nine seconds remaining to clinch the victory for Clemson.

PJ Hall (Spartanburg, S.C./Dorman) and the elder Hunter combined for 20 of Clemson's 38 second-half points, finishing the game with 17 and 18 points, respectively. Hall was also the Tigers' leading rebounder, pulling down eight boards with Hunter adding seven. Ian Schieffelin (Loganville, Ga./Grayson) recorded his third-straight tournament game in double figures with 14 points to go along with seven rebounds.

Chauncey Wiggins (Grayson, Ga./Grayson) and RJ Godfrey (Suwanee, Ga./North Gwinnett) were big for the Tigers in the first half, finishing a combined 5-for-6 from the floor with three 3-pointers, including Godfrey's third of the season.

Every Tiger that saw the court scored, as Clemson shot 49.2% from the floor as a team and recorded 17 assists on 29 made field goals. The 17 assists are the most for the Tigers in this year's tournament. Clemson held Arizona to 37.3% shooting, just 17.9% from beyond the arc, their lowest three-point percentage of the year. The Bears' 72 points were 15 below their season average, and Clemson held Arizona to just one field goal over an 11-minute stretch in the second half, including 12 straight misses at one point.

After a free throw by Caleb Love tied the game at 43 with 16:33 to go, Clemson held the Wildcats without a field goal for two minutes, but couldn't stretch the lead, as Arizona grabbed a one-point advantage with 14:32 to go. Jack Clark (Cheltenham, Pa./Cheltenham) drained his only field goal of the second half, a three-pointer just 20 seconds later, to put the Tigers' back in front and Clemson would never trail again.

The Wildcats tied the game one final time with 9:55 to go, but a layup by Hall sparked a 9-2 run to put Clemson back in front with 7:46 remaining. Both teams went without scoring for 2:30, but six points from Hall held off a furious Arizona run to help keep the Tigers in front.

The Tigers led by as many as 13 in the first half, as Wiggins' third basket of the first 20 minutes gave Clemson the 27-14 advantage with 7:19 to go. Arizona cut it to six with 56 seconds remaining, but a pair of Schieffelin FTs gave the Tigers an eight-point lead heading into the break.

The win, Clemson's first over Arizona in history, puts the Tigers into the Elite Eight for the first time since the 1980 NCAA Tournament.

- Basketball's historic NCAA Tournament run came to an end on Saturday night, as the No. 6 Tigers fell to the No. 4 Alabama Crimson Tide 89-82 in the Elite Eight inside the Crypto.com Arena in Los Angeles.

Clemson was led offensively by Joseph Girard III (Glens Falls, N.Y./Glens Falls), who finished the game with 19 points, including 17 in the second half, highlighted by five second-half threes. Ian Schieffelin (Loganville, Ga./Grayson) finished with 18 points and 11 rebounds, good for his 11th double-double of the season. PJ Hall (Spartanburg, S.C./Dorman) tallied 14 points before fouling out, while Chase Hunter (Atlanta, Ga./Westlake) added 12 and a team-high five assists. RJ Godfrey (Suwanee, Ga./North Gwinnett) also finished with 12 points.

The Tigers led by as many as 13 in the first half, as a jumper by Jack Clark (Cheltenham, Pa./Cheltenham) put the Tigers ahead 26-13 with 7:54 remaining. The Crimson Tide closed the half on a 22-6 run, however, to take a 35-32 lead into the half.

Clemson hung around for the majority of the second half, not allowing Alabama to lead by more than six until back-to-back threes put the Crimson Tide up nine with 6:22 to go. A three-point-play from Schieffelin followed by a three from Girard cut the lead to three with just over 2:00 to go, but Alabama responded to take a seven-point advantage with 1:15 remaining. The teams traded baskets and free throws the remainder of game time, with Alabama taking the 89-82 win.

The Tigers finish the season with a 24-12 record, the best since 2017-18 (25-10), also a Sweet Sixteen team.


