HISTORY OF FATAL CASE REVIEWS

Began in the U.S., in the 1970s, focused on child and infant deaths.

The WTSC supports the Cooper Jones Active Transportation Safety Council's fatal crash reviews, under RCW 43.59.156.

Recognized as helpful tool that can lead to important changes to traffic safety.

The WTSC is expanding reviews beyond ATSC's scope, starting with impaired driving.

WHAT IS A FATAL CASE REVIEW?

- A comprehensive deep dive into the factors of a fatal crash or sample of multiple crashes with similar factors (e.g., impairment).
- Identifying and reporting the modifiable risk and protective factors using the Safe System Approach and Spectrum of Prevention framework.

PATTERNS EMERGE OVER TIME AND EXPERIENCE

HOW DO WE CHOOSE WHAT CASES TO REVIEW?

- Start with aggregate data, ask questions, and look for patterns
- Drill down into subgroups and narrow scope for case selection
- Legislatively mandated
- Sometimes it just arrives





WHAT INFORMATION IS USED?

- Police traffic collision report
- Technical, reconstruction, investigation reports
- Toxicology reports
- Drivers' license history
- Roadway, weather, lighting, traffic control conditions
- Location visualizations
- Press memos

- WTSC Research Director and/or Senior Research Associate
- FARS Analyst
- WTSC Program Managers
- Investigating Officer or Traffic Unit Lead
- Licensing
- Public Health
- Engineers
- Traffic Safety Prosecutors

- Medical Examiner / Coroner



WHAT IS THE OUTCOME OF A FATAL CASE REVIEW?

The observations shared during a review are summarized in a report and may be used for consideration when determining possible action steps, new countermeasures, policy, or programs.



FATAL CASE REVIEW REPORT EXAMPLE

WIDAC Fatal Case Reviews

- Conducting four FCRs
 - March, June, Sept, Dec
- FCR team is members of WEB
 - Not open to the public
- Scope of first two FCRs
 - Impaired drivers BAC at .05 or less
 - Fentanyl & Unlicensed
- Observations reported to WIDAC



FUTURE GOALS OF FATAL CASE REVIEW PROGRAM

- Implementing best practices
- Expanding FCRs to other programmatic areas (e.g., speed, distracted driving, etc.)
- Developing FCR toolkit for partners
- Reporting on patterns of observations overtime via QA software
- Publishing annual reports
