DECEMBER 12, 2017

The Compton City Council meeting was called to order at 5:42 p.m. in the Council Chambers of City Hall by Mayor Aja Brown. The Pledge of Allegiance and Moment of silence ceremonies were also led by Mayor Aja Brown.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS AND NON-AGENDA MATTERS

Robert Ray, Compton resident and Red Cross Ambassador, addressed the City Council and commended and praised the late ***Reverend Arturo Frazier*** for his service and dedication to the community. Mr. Ray provided an oral report regarding the disaster relief services; noting the recent wild fires and floods and urged the citizens to assist the American Red Cross with monetary donations, blood donations and other recovery assistance.

Benjamin Holifield, President-Compton Business Chamber, requested that the Council repair the audio system in the City Council Chambers to improve communication to the residents. Mr. Holifield, once again, urged the Council to immediately replace the ‘Welcome to Compton’ sign at the Towne Center, as well as other major thoroughfares. Mr. Holifield beseeched the Council to add additional Code Enforcements Officers and clean-up and beautify the City.

Ms. Sohelia Amidi, 7-Eleven Owner, spoke before the Council and requested to know on what basis the Planning Department was allowed to issue a business permit for the 7-Eleven located at 821 West Rosecrans Avenue, noting that the cite is a vacant lot and has been afforded a permit in accordance with the “grandfather Clause.”

David Irons, Compton resident, addressed the Council and noted that churches were set up to provide shelter, food and clothing for the homeless residents of the City. Mr. Irons noted that he is in favor of providing assistance to all homeless individuals.

Corey Nash, Compton resident, spoke before the community and Council and stated that he work with Angels for Sight, and requested support for Cynthia Nunn’s Christmas Toy Giveaway and further requested that the City assist them by providing barricades or blockades to facilitate bringing in a train for the children to ride the train near their business.

Kyron Kopanos, Compton resident, wished everyone a Happy Holiday Season and also extended an invitation to everyone to attend a Community Health Fair on Saturday, December 16, 2017 at 349 West Compton Boulevard.

Martha Barajas, Representative of United Hands, invited the Council and community to inform their organization of any children that are in need of Christmas Toys and they will be provided to the children. Ms. Barajas also noted that toy donations are also appreciated.

Rev. Mello Desire, film producer, addressed the Council and asserted that she has recently returned to the community to focus on providing film and studio development and education for the youth of the community. Rev. Desire informed the Council that she is involved in formulating the ‘Alanya Echols Institute for the Fine Arts’ at the intersection of Manchester and Vermont Avenue. Rev. Desire then requested support for the state-of-the-art facility which is named in memory of Alanya Echols who was a Compton native.

Joyce Kelly, Compton resident, addressed the Council and thanked everyone involved with the Compton Christmas Parade and further asked the cost associated with the parade.

Jacqueline Venters, Compton resident, spoke before the Council and commended the Compton Christmas Parade Committee and further suggested that next year, the volunteers wear clearly identifiable clothing for the benefit of the community. Ms. Venters then noted that she had

reviewed the Measure P funding allocations, however, she was disappointed to see that there was no allocation for a gang intervention component.

Lynn Boone, Compton resident, spoke before the Council regarding a certain conversation she had with individuals associated with the City’s 7-Eleven convenience stores. Ms. Boone asserted that several agencies will be addressing the complaints regarding the 7-Eleven Stores.

Craig Henry, Volunteers of America, stated that one of his most proudest moments this year was to see Compton High School marching in the Compton Christmas Parade. Mr. Henry urged the community to promote and uplift one another for the benefit of the entire City.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS AND NON-AGENDA MATTERS

Bishop L. J. Guillory, Compton resident, addressed the Council and praised the late *Reverend Arturo Frazier* and urged the Council to continue the good work and fight the good fight.

Robert Ray, Compton resident, spoke before the Council and noted that the Sheriff's Department is processing the parking citations, and further questioned why is the Sheriff's doing City work. He also cautioned the Council against amending the Charter. Mr. Ray spoke out against the marijuana initiatives on the upcoming election and urged the citizens to vote against the initiatives.

SUMMARY

Adoption of the attached resolution will authorize the City Manager to establish an additional purchase order in the amount of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) for William Kalvikov dba Fire Apparatus Solutions for continued provision of maintenance and repair services of Compton Fire Department emergency apparatus for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

BACKGROUND

The City's fire engines are over twelve (12) years old and due to the high volume of emergency responses the cost of repairs to an aging fleet are increasing.

Annual apparatus maintenance and repair for the Department's emergency vehicles are essential for safe and efficient emergency response and operation. The Department performs routine apparatus and equipment inspections on all apparatus daily to ensure that preventive maintenance guidelines are adhered to and that there are no defects with reference to fire engine operations. Furthermore, all vehicles are required to meet the Department of Transportation and California Highway Patrol regulatory statutes concerning emergency vehicles.

After reviewing a number of bids received for provision of maintenance and repair services, staff recommended and the City Council adopted, on July 25, 2017, Resolution No. 24,621 which approved using the services of William Kalvikov dba Fire Apparatus Solutions during the first (1st) quarter of Fiscal Year 2017-2018 in the amount of \$45,000.00.

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

The City has no vendor in the City boundaries that provide maintenance and repair for emergency fire apparatus.

The services provided thus far by William Kalvikov dba Fire Apparatus Solutions have been satisfactory and staff requests that an additional purchase order in the amount of \$75,000.00 be

SUBJECT: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COMPTON AMENDING SECTIONS 7-21.1 THROUGH 7-25.16 (SEX OFFENDER RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS) OF THE COMPTON MUNICIPAL CODE IN ITS ENTIRETY

SUMMARY

The City Council will consider adopting an ordinance amending Sections 7-21.1 through Section 7-25.16 of the Compton Municipal Code, which imposed residency restrictions on registered sex offenders in the City of Compton.

BACKGROUND

On November 7, 2006, the voters of the State of California overwhelmingly approved Proposition 83, the “Sexual Predator Punishment and Control Act” commonly known as “Jessica’s Law,” so as to better protect Californians, and, in particular, to protect the State’s children from sex offenders. Proposition 83, as codified at Penal Code Section 3003.5, provides that registered sex offenders may not reside within 2,000 feet of a public or private school or a park where children regularly gather, and also authorized cities and counties to adopt local ordinances to increase the distance restrictions and add other locations applicable to the distance restrictions. On June 30, 2009, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2,192, which added Sections 7-25.1 through 7-25.16 (Sex Offender Residency Restrictions) to Chapter 7 of the Compton Municipal Code, in reliance on “Jessica’s Law”.

In 2014, the California Court of Appeal, in *People v. Nguyen* (2014) 222 Cal.App.4th 1168, held that California Penal Code restrictions on the public and private places where sexual offenders may be located preempts local regulations prohibiting sexual offenders from accessing particular locations in a City. The following year, the California Supreme Court in *In re Taylor* (2015) 60 Cal.4th 1019 held that blanket enforcement of residency restrictions under Penal Code Section 3003.5(b) hampers efforts to supervise and rehabilitate sex offenders in the interests of public safety, such enforcement was arbitrary and oppressive, violating due process under the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, as such enforcement caused many registered sex offenders on parole to be homeless, and that such blanket restrictions bear no rational relationship to advancing the state’s legitimate goal of protecting children from sexual predators. Then in 2016, the California Court of Appeal, in *People v. Lynch* (2016) 2 Cal.App.5th 524, interpreted Penal Code Section 3003.5 as applying only to parolees.

STATEMENT OF THE ISSUE

Based on these judicial decisions, a dispute has arisen regarding the City's authority to enforce the residency requirements codified at CMC Sections 7-25.1 through 7-25.16. The City of Compton, as are all cities in the state, is required to comply with state law as interpreted by the courts of the state. There are still some issues pertaining to the extent to which a city can adopt local regulations in the area of sex offender residency restriction.

It should be noted that convicted sex offenders are still required to register their residences with local police, who in turn, submit this information to the state Department of Justice for inclusion on the Department of Justice "Megan's Law" website and therefore, communities are still provided the protection of knowing where registered sex offenders reside and law enforcement can thereby monitor their activities in the community. It remains unlawful for any person for whom registration is required pursuant to Penal Code Section 290 to reside within 2000 feet of any public or private school, or park where children regularly gather. It is also still the law that when a person is released on parole after having served a term of imprisonment in state prison for any offense for which registration is required pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, that person may not, during the period of parole, reside in any single family dwelling with any other person also required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, unless those persons are legally related by blood, marriage, or adoption.

In addition, according to the Penal Code, every person who is required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, based upon the commission of an offense against a minor, is prohibited from residing, except as a client, and from working or volunteering in a child day care facility or children's residential facility that is licensed by the State Department of Social Services, a home certified by a foster family agency, or a home approved by a county child welfare services agency. Moreover, every person who is required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, based upon the commission of an offense against a minor, is prohibited from residing, except as a client, and from working or volunteering in a home or facility that receives a placement of a child who has been, or may be, declared a dependent child of the juvenile court pursuant to Section 300 of the Welfare and Institutions Code or who has been, or may be, declared a ward of the juvenile court pursuant to Section 601 and 602 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.

Amending Chapter 7 of the Compton Municipal Code does not preclude the City's law enforcement officers from enforcing existing Penal Code provisions that regulate registered sex offenders.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact with the adoption of this ordinance.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached ordinance repealing Ordinance No. 2,192 ("Sex Offender Residency Restrictions").

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COMPTON
AMENDING SECTIONS 7-27.1 THROUGH 7-25.16 (SEX OFFENDER
RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS) OF THE COMPTON MUNICIPAL CODE IN
ITS ENTIRETY**

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2006, the voters of the State of California overwhelmingly approved Proposition 83, the “Sexual Predator Punishment and Control Act” commonly known as “Jessica’s Law,” so as to better protect Californians, and, in particular, to protect the State’s children from sex offenders; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 83, as codified at Penal Code Section 3003.5, provides that registered sex offenders may not reside within 2,000 feet of a public or private school or a park where children regularly gather, and also authorized cities and counties to adopt local ordinances to increase the distance restrictions and add other locations applicable to the distance restrictions; and

WHEREAS, on June 30, 2009, the City Council of the City of Compton adopted Ordinance No. 2,192, which added Sections 7-25.1 through 7-25.16 (Sex Offender Residency Restrictions) to Chapter 7 of the Compton Municipal Code, in reliance on “Jessica’s Law”; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Fourth Appellate District of California Court of Appeal, in *People v. Nguyen* (2014) 222 Cal.App.4th 1168, held that California Penal Code restrictions on the public and private places where sexual offenders may be located preempts local regulations prohibiting sexual offenders from accessing particular locations in a City; and

WHEREAS, in 2015, the California Supreme Court in *In re Taylor* (2015) 60 Cal.4th 1019 held that blanket enforcement of residency restrictions under Penal Code Section 3003.5(b) hampers efforts to supervise and rehabilitate sex offenders in the interests of public safety, such enforcement was arbitrary and oppressive, violating due process under the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, as such enforcement caused many registered sex offenders on parole to be homeless, and that such blanket restrictions bear no rational relationship to advancing the state’s legitimate goal of protecting children from sexual predators; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, the First Appellate District of California Court of Appeal, in *People v. Lynch* (2016) 2 Cal.App.5th 524, interpreted Penal Code Section 3003.5 as applying only to parolees; and

WHEREAS, based on these judicial decisions, a dispute has arisen regarding the City’s authority to enforce the residency requirements codified at CMC Sections 7-25.1 through 7-25.16; and

WHEREAS, the City of Compton is required to comply with state law as interpreted by the courts of the state; and

WHEREAS, there are still some issues pertaining to the extent to which a city can adopt local regulations in the area of sex offender residency restriction; and

WHEREAS, it remains the law that convicted sex offenders are still required to register their residences with local police, who in turn, submit this information to the state Department of Justice for inclusion on the Department of Justice “Megan’s Law” website and therefore, communities are still provided the protection of knowing where registered sex offenders reside and law enforcement can thereby monitor their activities in the community; and

WHEREAS, it remains unlawful for any person for whom registration is required pursuant to Penal Code Section 290 to reside within 2000 feet of any public or private school, or park where children regularly gather; and

WHEREAS, it remains the law that when a person is released on parole after having served a term of imprisonment in state prison for any offense for which registration is required pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, that person may not, during the period of parole, reside in any single family dwelling with any other person also required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, unless those persons are legally related by blood, marriage, or adoption; and

WHEREAS, it is the law that every person who is required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, based upon the commission of an offense against a minor, is prohibited from residing, except as a client, and from working or volunteering in a child day care facility or children’s residential facility that is licensed by the State Department of Social Services, a home certified by a foster family agency, or a home approved by a county child welfare services agency; and

WHEREAS, it is the law that every person who is required to register pursuant to Penal Code Section 290, based upon the commission of an offense against a minor, is prohibited from residing, except as a client, and from working or volunteering in a home or facility that receives a placement of a child who has been, or may be, declared a dependent child of the juvenile court pursuant to Section 300 of the Welfare and Institutions Code or who has been, or may be, declared a ward of the juvenile court pursuant to Section 601 and 602 of the Welfare and Institutions Code; and

WHEREAS, amending Chapter 7 of the Compton Municipal Code does not preclude the City’s law enforcement officers from enforcing existing Penal Code provisions that regulate registered sex offenders; and

WHEREAS, the City Attorney’s Office recommends that Ordinance No. 2,192 (“Sex Offender Residency Restrictions”) be repealed.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COMPTON DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 2,191 (“Sex Offender Residency Restrictions”) adopted by the City Council of June 24, 2009, and codified at Sections 7-25.1 through 7-25.16 of the Compton Municipal Code, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 2. The City Council declares that, should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance hereby adopted be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction, or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentence or words of this Ordinance hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. That a copy of this Ordinance shall be forwarded to the offices of the City Manager, City Attorney, Planning and Economic Development, Building and Safety Department and the Los Angeles County Sheriff’s Department, Compton Station.

Section 4. That is Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

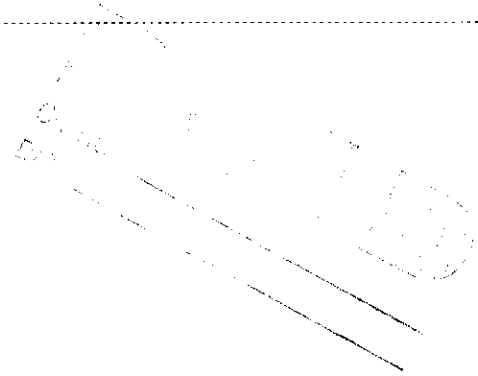

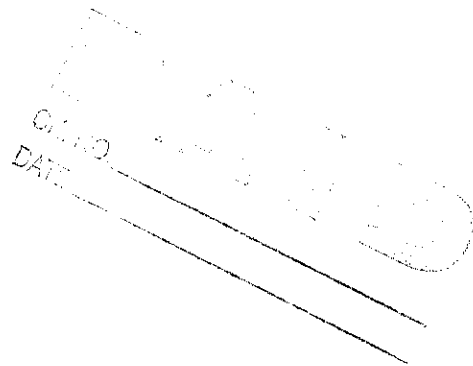
