The Compton City Council meeting was called to order at 5:40 p.m. by Mayor Emma Sharif in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The Moment of Silence Ceremony and Pledge of Allegiance was also led by Mayor Emma Sharif.

Mayor Sharif asked the citizens of Compton to pray for Lynn Boone's family.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS AND NON-AGENDA MATTERS

Luis Hernandez, Battalion Fire Chief, requested a face-to-face interview for the deputy fire chief position instead of the Zoom interview scheduled by staff. He maintained that it is essential for the fire department to conduct face-to-face interviews with candidates because the position is high-ranking.

***Councilperson Spicer in at 5:45 pm.**

Todd Bouquet & Karen Harris, Compton Initiative, invited the citizens of Compton to march with them in the Compton Christmas Parade scheduled to be held on Saturday, December 9. Volunteers are asked to sign up at justdogood.org.

Maria Villareal, President of the Latino Chamber of Commerce, encouraged the Latino community to sign up for their free 4-week citizenship classes starting on January 20, 2024.

Paul Perrodin petitioned the residents to be professional when addressing the City Council at the podium. He declared that it is rude and embarrassing to watch community members degrade their elected officials week after week.

Richard Earl, Concerned Citizens of Compton, encouraged the City Council to focus on the re-establishment of quality education, movie theaters, restaurants, and entertainment options for the youth. He also mentioned his dissatisfaction with the closing of the 99 Cent Store previously located on Alondra and Long Beach Boulevard.

Fidel Marquez submitted reports of homelessness and illegal dumping at the City's brickyard. He questioned if funds would be available to address all the street repair specified in the 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP); and asked that 131st Street and Stockwell Street be added to the list.

Missy Barbara petitioned the City of Compton to replicate the city of Downey's financial priorities because she prefers their amenities and services. She asked the City Manager to investigate Victor Orozco because she believes that he is blocking the opening of her nephew's juice bar. She also asked the City Manager if he talked with Mr. Strickland regarding street repair on Wilmington because it has been on the CIP list for years.

Travis Martin asked the City Council to assist him with parking at his residence. He acknowledged the efforts of the Mayor and City Manager to assess the situation and asked what he should do next to get this issue resolved.

Miller Martin petitioned the City Manager to scrutinize the Sheriff's department because the street takeovers on Grandee and Stockwell are out of control. He further urged the Mayor and City Council to implement the strategies and suggestions offered by residents because they voted for them.

Tanya Lewis advised the Compton Initiative to upgrade the corner of Compton and Willowbrook with donations received from Home Depot and Lowe's. She articulated her support for Item Number Three and requested a report from the fire chief regarding all four fire stations. She reported illegal dumping on Parmalee and El Segundo and asked that "No Dumping" signs be posted in the area.

City Manager Groomes reported on the City of Compton's Five (5) Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) which outlines the City's Capital Infrastructure needs and plans over the next five (5) years. A workshop was held last week detailing proposed improvements for parks, streets, fire stations, city hall facilities and Council Chambers. Public Works, General Services, Recreation and the Water Department all coordinated with the City Manager's office to develop this plan. The streets were inspected and studied by an outside consultant who ranked and categorized the streets by condition. Within the CIP, Council and residents will find a full breakdown of all the grind and overlay rehabilitation plans for streets in all four (4) districts.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON THE PUBLIC HEARING

Missy Barbara inquired about funding for Wilmington Avenue street improvements.

Mayor Sharif confirmed that funds have been allocated for Wilmington Avenue street improvements.

Miller Martin expressed his support for street improvements on Wilmington Avenue because it is a major thoroughfare that many drivers use to travel to the 91 freeway.

Hector Bernal, City Manager's Office, directed residents to page four of the CIP under Public Works Engineering for more information.

City Manager Groomes confirmed that \$15M is programmed for Wilmington Avenue street improvements from Rosecrans to the south side of the 91 freeway.

Daniel Salazar, President of Compton Firefighters Local 2216, asked the City Council to address why they are focusing on repairing toilets, lighting and carpet when FEMA is requiring them to retrofit two fire stations.

Tanya Lewis asked the City Attorney if the City of Compton has paid any money to drivers claiming their vehicles were damaged from driving on Compton streets. She also requested an update on the Rosecrans bridge due to safety concerns.

Vanessa Cain suggested that all streets and bridges be repaired because they are in poor condition.

Fidel Marquez requested that Central Avenue and Piru Street be addressed at the same time due to their proximity to each other.

COUNCIL COMMENTS ON THE PUBLIC HEARING

Councilperson Duhart requested an oral report regarding any plans to upgrade the monument located on the corner of Compton and Willowbrook.

Hector Bernal, City Manager's Office, stated that the plan is a collaboration between Metropolitan Water District and the Water Enterprise Fund to clean up and add water conservation plants and green space to the area.

Councilperson Bowers expressed a concern for the amount of funds allocated to each of the City's fire stations.

City Manager Groomes stated that \$1.2M was allocated to the General Services Department to take on certain projects in the fire stations.

Councilperson Bowers inquired about Wilmington Avenue street improvements and previous allocations for street design.

John Strickland, Public Works Engineering, reported that there were changes to the street design because the street improvements were extended on Wilmington from Greenleaf to Victoria. He explained that the Wilmington Avenue Safe Streets Pedestrian/Bicycle Improvements Project is a pedestrian and bicycle safety improvement project aimed to improve pedestrian and bicycle safety for communities that are adjacent to the Wilmington Avenue transportation corridor. The project will develop safer pedestrian crossings and intersections, in addition to installing bicycle lanes to improve bicycle visibility and safety, which aims to reduce traffic collisions.

Councilperson Darden recounted her request to repair Wilmington before Santa Fe because it was in worse condition. Mr. Strickland stated that at the time of construction, Santa Fe was ready and Wilmington was still in the design phase.

City Attorney Perrodin proposed that the CIP be adjusted to address a number of streets in the City of Compton.

SUMMARY

The City of Compton seeks approval from the City Council to appoint Charles Scott, a retired annuitant, as an interim Senior Building Inspector. This appointment is in accordance with Government Code section 21221(h) of the Public Employees Retirement Law, which permits the appointment of a retiree to a vacant position during the recruitment process for a permanent replacement.

BACKGROUND

The position of Senior Building Inspector has become vacant due to retirement. The role is essential for ensuring that the City's building inspections are conducted in compliance with applicable codes and regulations.

Charles Scott previously served the City of Compton with distinction as a Senior Building Inspector, bringing extensive knowledge and experience in building inspection and code enforcement.

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Pursuant to Government Code section 21221(h), a retired person may be appointed to a vacant position on an interim basis during the recruitment process for a permanent appointment, provided that:

- The retiree has specialized skills necessary to perform the work.
- The appointment is approved by the governing body in a public meeting.
- The compensation paid to the retiree is within the limits set forth by law.

Charles Scott possesses the specialized skills and experience needed to fulfill the duties of the Senior Building Inspector during this interim period. The City is actively recruiting for a permanent replacement and expects the process to be completed before June 2025.

The appointment will ensure continuity of services within the Building and Safety Division while the recruitment process is underway.

FISCAL IMPACT

The cost of this appointment is within the budgeted salary for the Senior Building Inspector position and will be funded from 1001-770-000-4101. Per Government Code section 21221(h), the retiree's compensation will not exceed the limits established by law and will not include any additional benefits.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the attached Resolution.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COMPTON AUTHORIZING THE APPOINTMENT OF CHARLES SCOTT AS INTERIM SENIOR BUILDING INSPECTOR PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 21221(h)

WHEREAS, the position of Senior Building Inspector within the City of Compton has become vacant due to an incumbent’s retirement; and

WHEREAS, the duties and responsibilities of the Senior Building Inspector are critical to ensuring compliance with building codes and regulations within the City; and

WHEREAS, Charles Scott, a retired annuitant, possesses the specialized skills and experience necessary to perform the duties of Senior Building Inspector on an interim basis; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 21221(h) permits the appointment of a retiree to a vacant position on an interim basis during the recruitment process for a permanent appointment, provided that the appointment is approved by the governing body in a public meeting; and

WHEREAS, the City of Compton is actively recruiting for a permanent Senior Building Inspector and expects the recruitment process to be completed before June 205; and

WHEREAS, this resolution is retroactive to October 23, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the compensation paid to Charles Scott as interim Senior Building Inspector shall not exceed the limits established by law and shall not include any additional benefits;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COMPTON DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City Council hereby authorizes the appointment of Charles Scott as Interim Senior Building Inspector pursuant to Government Code section 21221(h).

Section 2. The compensation paid to Charles Scott for services as Interim Senior Building Inspector shall be in accordance with the requirements of Government Code section 21221(h) and shall not exceed the maximum allowable compensation under the law.

Section 3. The appointment of Charles Scott as Interim Senior Building Inspector shall remain in effect until a permanent Senior Building Inspector is appointed or until the recruitment process is completed, whichever occurs first.

Section 4. That a certified copy of this Resolution shall be filed in the offices of the City Manager, City Attorney, City Clerk, City Controller, and the Human Resources.

Section 5. That the Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall attest to the adoption of this Resolution.

A retired person may serve without reinstatement from retirement or loss or interruption of benefits provided by this system, as follows:

- (a) As a member of any board, commission, or advisory committee, upon appointment by the Governor, the Speaker of the Assembly, the President pro Tempore of the Senate, director of a state department, or the governing board of the contracting agency. However, the appointment shall not be deemed employment within the meaning of Division 4 (commencing with Section 3200) and Division 4.5 (commencing with [Section 6100\) of the Labor Code](#), and shall not provide a basis for the payment of workers' compensation to a retired state employee or to his or her dependents.
- (b) As a school crossing guard.
- (c) As a juror or election officer.
- (d) As an elective officer on and after September 15, 1961. However, all rights and immunities which may have accrued under [Section 21229](#) as it read prior to that section's repeal during the 1969 Regular Session of the Legislature are hereby preserved.
- (e) As an appointive member of the governing body of a contracting agency. However, the compensation for that office shall not exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) per month.
- (f) Upon appointment by the Legislature, or either house, or a legislative committee to a position deemed by the appointing power to be temporary in nature.
- (g) Upon employment by a contracting agency to a position found by the governing body, by resolution, to be available because of a leave of absence granted to a person on payroll status for a period not to exceed one year and found by the governing body to require specialized skills. The temporary employment shall be terminated at the end of the leave of absence. Appointments under this section shall be reported to the board and shall be accompanied by the resolution adopted by the governing body.

(h) Upon interim appointment by the governing body of a contracting agency to a vacant position during recruitment for a permanent appointment and deemed by the governing body to require specialized skills or during an emergency to prevent stoppage of public business. A retired person shall only be appointed once to this vacant position. These appointments, including any made concurrently pursuant to Section 21224 or 21229, shall not exceed a combined total of 960 hours for all employers each fiscal year. The compensation for the interim appointment shall not exceed the maximum monthly base salary paid to other employees performing comparable duties as listed on a publicly available pay schedule for the vacant position divided by 173.333 to equal an hourly rate. A retired person appointed to a vacant position pursuant to this subdivision shall not receive any benefits, incentives, compensation in lieu of benefits, or any other forms of compensation in addition to the hourly rate. A retired annuitant appointed pursuant to this subdivision shall not work more than 960 hours each fiscal year regardless of whether he or she works for one or more employers.

(i) Upon appointment by the Administrative Director of the Courts to the position of Court Security Coordinator, a position deemed temporary in nature and requiring the specialized skills and experience of a retired professional peace officer.
