NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF A FILING BY VIRGINIA ELECTRIC AND POWER COMPANY OF ITS INTEGRATED RESOURCE PLAN CASE NO. PUR-2024-00184

On October 15, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") the Company's 2024 Integrated Resource Plan ("IRP") pursuant to § 55-599 of the Code of Virginia ("Code").

An IRP, as defined by Code § 55-597, is "a document developed by an electric utility that provides a forecast of its load obligations and a plan to meet those obligations by supply side and demand side resources over the ensuing 15 years to promote reasonable prices, reliable service, energy independence, and environmental responsibility." Pursuant to Code § 55-599 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services filing. Pursuant to Code § 55-599 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP "highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers." Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or Portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 66% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values for resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "This shift further supports the proposition that serving the Company's customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 55-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. Dominion represents that the Stakeholder Process consisted of: (i) a kickoff meeting providing stakeholders an overview of the IRP; (ii) small group meetings between stakeholders and facilitators; (iii) topic-specific workshops for more in-depth conversations; and (iv) summary pre-filing meetings to review collective input and recommendations that were integrated into the IRP, and post-filing meetings for an overview of final information.

On October 11, 2024, the Commission ordered the Company to provide the following additional information by way of a supplemental filing by November 15, 2024:

1. Additional modeling that presents, as a sensitivity for comparison purposes to the Company's modeling presented in its 2024 IRP, the following: (i) its least cost plan; and (ii) at least one VCCA-compliant plan, both with projected data center load growth removed;
2. Additional modeling to include updated capacity price forecasts that incorporate the impacts of the PJM base residual capacity auction held in July 2024 for the entire 15-year planning period;
3. After obtaining and incorporating updated capacity price forecasts, present as sensitivities for comparison purposes, the following: (i) its least cost plan which includes data center load; (ii) at least one VCCA-compliant plan which includes data center load; (iii) at least one VCCA-compliant plan without data center load; and (iv) at least one VCCA-compliant plan without data center load; and

4. For each planned transmission project, an indication of whether the need for the transmission project is primarily being driven by data center load growth.

The Commission entered an Order for Notice and Hearing that, among other things, scheduled public hearings on Dominion's IRP. On April 14, 2025, at 10 a.m., the Commission will hold a telephonic hearing for the purpose of receiving the testimony of public witnesses. On or before April 8, 2025, any person desiring to offer testimony as a public witness shall provide to the Commission: (a) your name, and (b) the telephone number that you wish the Commission to call during the hearing to receive your testimony. This information may be provided to the Commission in three ways: (i) by filing out a form on the Commission's website at scc.virginia.gov/pages/Webcasting; (ii) by completing and emailing the PDF version of this form to scc.virginia@vcc.virginia.gov; or (iii) by calling (804) 371-4141. This public witness hearing will be webcast at scc.virginia.gov/pages/Webcasting.

Beginning at 10 a.m. on April 14, 2025, the Commission will telephone sequentially each person who has signed up to testify as provided above.

On April 15, 2025, at 10 a.m., in the Commission's second floor courtroom located in the Tyler Building, 1300 East Main Street, Richmond, Virginia 23219, a hearing will be conducted to receive testimony and evidence from the Company, any respondents, and the Commission's Staff.

To promote administrative efficiency and timely service of filings upon participants, the Commission has directed the electronic filing of testimony and pleadings, unless they contain confidential information, and required electronic service on parties to this proceeding.

Those unable, as a practical matter, to submit comments electronically may file such comments by U.S. mail to the Clerk of the State Corporation Commission, c/o Document Control Center, P.O. Box 2118, Richmond, Virginia 23218-2118. All comments shall refer to Case No. PUR-2024-00184.

On or before January 17, 2025, any person or entity wishing to participate as a respondent in this proceeding may do so by filing a notice of participation with the Clerk of the Commission at scc.virginia.gov/caseinfo. Those unable, as a practical matter, to file a notice of participation electronically may file such notice by U.S. mail to the Clerk of the Commission at the address listed above. Such notice of participation shall include the email addresses of such parties or their counsel, if available. A copy of the notice of participation as a respondent must also be sent to counsel for the Company, at the address listed above. allows them to develop their own rules. The chief patron is Sen. Stella Parks, D-Fairfax. Another co-patron is Sen. Ghazala Hashmi, D-Richmond.

The bill gives districts the option of keeping the bell-to-bell policy set by Youngkin, or loosening them.

"If the administrators, the schools don't buy in, it's not going to work," VanValkenburg said. "They pull in a policy and they see that they need to tweak it, they'll have the leeway to do it."

California Gov. Gavin Newsom called for a similar ban in June. Newsom signed the Phone-Free School Act into law on Sept. 23. The bill requires school districts to develop policies around cellphone usage by July 1, 2026.

"I don't think Gavin Newsom and Glenn Youngkin agree on anything," VanValkenburg said. "I don't think either would be happy to have their name in the same sentence, but the fact that you see those two governors essentially asking for the same thing tells you all you need to know."

There is a bipartisan effort underway, after conversations about mental health and distraction ramped up nationally post COVID-19, according to VanValkenburg.

U.S. Rep. Rob Wittman, R-VA, supports Youngkin's cellphone ban. Removing distractions will improve the wellbeing of students' and positively affect learning

outcomes, he stated in an email.

"While cellphones can be helpful educational tools in certain settings, permitting unrestricted cellphone use can be counterproductive to cultivating healthy learning environments," Wittman stated. "By limiting screen time, we can help restore students' engagement and ensure that classrooms are spaces where every child can thrive."

Beth Holmes is a parent, and a counselor at Amelia High School. Students have benefited from cellphone policies and some have said they have better focus, according to Holmes.

"Her grades went from like C's, D's, and F's to the just made honor roll this last quarter," Holmes said.

The final guidance for Youngkin's cell phone ban states all localities must develop an emergency communication plan.

The Department of Criminal Justice Services has guidance on how to construct an emergency plan. The procedures would include information about how and when to contact parents should an emergency occur.

On October 15, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") the Company's 2024 Integrated Resource Plan ("IRP") pursuant to § 56-595 of the Code of Virginia ("Code").

An IRP, as defined by Code § 56-597, is "a document developed by an electric utility that provides a forecast of its load obligations and a plan to meet those obligations by supply side and demand side resources for the ensuing 15 years to promote reasonable prices, reliable service, energy independence, and environmental responsibility." Pursuant to Code § 56-599 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services filing. Pursuant to Code § 56-599 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP "highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for (the Company's) customers." Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or Portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 65% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "[t]his shift further supports the proposition that serving (the Company's) customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 56-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. Dominion represents that the Stakeholder Process consisted of: (i) a kickoff meeting providing stakeholders an overview of the IRP; (ii) small group meetings between stakeholders and facilitators; (iii) topic-specific workshops for more in-depth conversations; and (iv) summary pre-filing meetings to review collective input and recommendations that were integrated into the IRP, and post-filing meetings for an overview of final information.

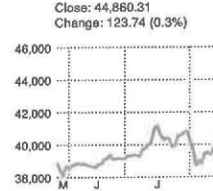

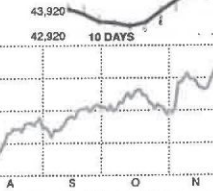

Funding school safety

Virginia Education Department hands out \$12M in grants for school security

The Virginia Department of Education granted \$12 million in school security equipment grants to 96 school divisions to help harden and protect schools, the department announced Thursday.

Schools will use the grants to buy voice and video internal communication systems, mass notification systems, security card access systems, visitor ID badging systems and surveillance cameras, among other protections.

The General Assembly established the School Security Equipment Grants program in 2013 following the mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown, Connecticut, the year prior.

Overall, the state distributed grants to 472 schools in the 96 divisions.

Neither Charlottesville nor the surrounding counties of Albemarle, Orange and Nelson were awarded any money, but other school divisions in Central Virginia were.

■ Buckingham County's Prekindergarten Center received \$32,027.

■ Fluvanna County's Central Elementary and Fluvanna Middle received \$128,598.

■ Greene County's Nathaniel Greene Elementary and William Monroe High received \$50,420.

■ Loudoun County's Loudoun County

High, Loudoun County Middle, Moss-Nuckols Elementary, Thomas Jefferson Elementary and Trevilians Elementary received \$215,160.

■ And Madison County's Madison County High, Waverly Yowell Elementary and William H. Wetzel Middle received \$73,376.

Grants were given to schools with the highest need for modern security equipment, schools with a high number of reported student offenses and schools in divisions least able to afford security upgrades.

All school divisions that receive the school security grants are required to pitch in a 25% match. The cities of Buena Vista and Hopewell and Lee County were exempt from the local match requirement due to a lack of local funds.

"The equipment purchased with these grants will help ensure the safety of all students and staff in Virginia's public schools," said Superintendent of Public Instruction Lisa Coons in a statement.

"Every child deserves a high-quality education experience, one where they can deeply focus on learning and growing the minute they step onto a school bus or pass through the doors of their school. These grants help create safe, supportive environments, both on school grounds and while traveling to and from school."

'Skill game' company sues Virginia AG Jason Miyares

Manufacturer says AG has unfairly enforced ban on gambling games

Queen of Virginia, a company that manufactures so-called skill games, and a retailer that hosts the machines have sued to block an investigation led by Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares and his finding that Queen of Virginia's new Pace-o-Matic products are illegal gaming devices.

The lawsuit also seeks to block Henrico Commonwealth's Attorney Shannon Taylor from enforcing a state ban on skill games. Queen of Virginia has argued that the ban does not apply to the devices it launched this past summer after Gov. Glenn Youngkin vetoed legislation to legalize skill games.

The suit also asks the Henrico County Circuit Court to declare that the new game is legal under Virginia law.

In the lawsuit, Queen of Virginia and the owner of a Buffalo Wild Wings outlet on West Broad Street accused Miyares and Taylor of violating the state constitution's due process clause. They assert that Taylor and Miyares used their positions as a prosecutor and as the state's lawyer to rewrite Virginia law to support what the lawsuit says is a baseless theory to declare that Queen of Virginia and the retailers hosting its machines violated the law.

Queen of Virginia says the new games are not illegal skill games because they no longer require players to insert money.

Instead, players pay a store, truck stop or restaurant cashier the funds necessary to play the game, and the cashier then remotely unlocks the device.

Since part of the definition of an illegal skill game in the Code of Virginia is that it requires

insertion of money, Queen of Virginia says its new machines are legal.

But earlier this fall, Miyares issued a memorandum to prosecutors and law enforcement agencies, saying the new machines are basically the old illegal games with an unimportant tweak to get around state law.

He said the new games were still illegal.

Retailers hosting them were subject to a \$25,000 fine for each device, Miyares' memo said.

"The Attorney General has also harassed QVS retail customers — seeking voluminous information" about their relationship with the gaming firm, Queen of Virginia says in its suit.

It says Miyares' demand for records through a civil investigative demand "was designed to imply wrongdoing" while his memorandum "specifically and falsely" accused Queen of Virginia and retailers hosting its machines of violating Virginia law.

its to businesses operating the Queen of Virginia machines to advise them that the machines were illegal around Oct. 21, threatening to fine them.

On Nov. 4, police made a round of visits to tell retailers to disable the machines or face fines.

Police delivered another round of warning flyers on Nov. 2, the lawsuit says.

Belle Holdings, which owns the Buffalo Wild Wings outlet, said it has stopped operating the Queen of Virginia machines, and Queen of Virginia said several retailers in other parts of Virginia are doing the same.

The General Assembly banned skill games in 2020, but a Greensville County judge blocked enforcement of the law. That block lasted until late last year, when the Virginia Supreme Court overturned the Greensville order.

Convenience store owners and truck stop operators say the machines are important sources of income that keep them in business.

Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant de-rating of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "this shift further supports the proposition that serving the Company's customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 56-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. 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A WICKED-LY AMAZING ADAPTATION

Ever since rumors of a film adaptation of the hit Broadway musical "Wicked" began in 2012, musical theatre fans such as myself have been on the edge of their seat to see how the show's intricacy and wonder would be brought to the screen.

Based on Gregory Maguire's novel of the same name, the show centers itself around the Wicked Witch of the West from the Wizard of Oz, and begs the question "Are people born wicked, or do they have wickedness thrust upon them?"

The witch, named Elphaba after the phonetic sounds of Wizard of Oz author L. Frank Baum's initials EL FA BA, begins her journey as a young college-aged student. The show progresses through her life and rise to wickedness, giving new backstories to many of the people and places within the Wizard of Oz story.

For many of those in the arts, once you hear the show you immediately latch onto the characters, the story and the music. The central theme of the show is the want for acceptance in a deeply unaccepting world, which is a message that nearly anyone can understand in some facet of their own personal lives.

"Wicked" has always held a place in my heart. It was the first professionally done Broadway touring show I ever saw. "Wicked" merchandise constantly remained on my Christmas lists through my younger years. I would sit at my CD player day after day listening to the original cast recording and singing along, hoping one day I could play Fiyero, or the Wizard, or even just a side character. My biggest theatrical mentor, Brad Bass, was even in the show for a good while. I have always deeply loved the story, the characters and the brilliant music by Stephen Schwartz.

The show holds weight, there's no two

ways about it. Those who love the show are not just casual fans, they are deeply devoted and connected to the story, as typically it has served as a source of therapy at some point in their life. The task of creating a movie that would appeal to these fans was a heavy task, but one that director Jon M. Chu handles masterfully.

From the film's opening shots and first musical swell, I already began to feel a lump in my throat. Whether this was because of relief that a "Wicked" movie was finally on the screen after 12 years of rumors, or because of the flood of nostalgic feelings that the show provides for me. Once the first chorus of the opening song "No One Mourns the Wicked" began, I was immediately transported to my 11-year-old self sitting in the Altria Theatre (then the Landmark) in Richmond, absolutely in awe of the spectacle unfolding before me that was Wicked.

The casting of this film cannot be overstated. It was absolutely phenomenal. From the film's leads, all the way to the ensemble in each musical number, there was a deep understanding of each character from every performer on the screen. However, as someone who has dreamt of playing Fiyero, the pretty-boy who hitches up with Glinda and has secret eyes for Elphaba, I wasn't the biggest fan of Jonathan Bailey's portrayal of the role. Call me jealous, call me biased, call me crazy, it just wasn't my cup of tea. Everything else? I could not compliment enough.

When it was announced that Jeff Goldblum would be playing the Wonderful Wizard of Oz, I have to admit, I was not thrilled at all. The same can be said for Ariana Grande being cast as Glinda, both of those decisions left a very sour taste in my mouth. I am very glad to say that I was proven absolutely wrong in every way possible.

Grand's Glinda was a breath of fresh air. The character is indeed the same bubbly witch that tells Dorothy to "fol-

low the yellow-brick road" in "The Wizard of Oz." Yet, like Elphaba, we meet her in her University years, where she is very much akin to a "Mean Girl," at first, concerned with her popularity and social status. Where some actresses in the role tend to portray Glinda as vapid and ditzy, Grand's Glinda oozes the role beyond just her pink facade. In Grand's performance, you could tell she shared the same desperation for acceptance that Elphaba has, truly making the characters two sides of the same coin. It was also incredibly refreshing to see her vocal interpretation of the role being a true soprano, much like Kristin Chenoweth who originated the role. Many Glindas onstage tend to use what's known as a "mix," where their equal blends of belting and more "classical" sounds. Grand, who is mostly known for her pop songs, brought a uniquely musical theatre tone to the film and it was very much appreciated.

One of the film's strongest qualities was its pacing. Although the movie is over two and a half hours long, you would never know it. There are no moments that drag everything engages your attention and keeps you glued to the screen. One of the largest criticisms of the original Broadway production is that there was too much content packed into the show, with the storytelling feeling rushed. This was not the case for the film.

While I initially scoffed at the film being split into two parts, seeing it as nothing more than a quick cash-grab, I now fully realize the necessity for splitting the two acts of the show into two separate movies. I don't believe there were any additional scenes to the movie that aren't found in the show, however each scene takes its time to set up the story, utilize all the original dialogue from the Broadway script (with some extra lines and characters) and allows the audience to get more involved in the story. We see each and every emotion that dwells within these characters, we laugh when they do, we feel pain when they do, and we even shed tears when

they do. Even those who have never heard a single note from the show's score or go in completely blind to the experience will come out on the other side feeling moved and enriched.

To take a spare moment from my outpouring of positivity towards this adaptation, I would like to note that I do have some small criticisms beyond just the British accent that comes with Fiyero.

Those who have seen "Wicked" onstage know that the colors are extremely vibrant and saturated. In a piece that is entirely about the uniqueness of greenness, color is an important storyteller. One area I felt fell flat was the color-grading of the film in editing. Where I was expecting the lush colors, I received watered down pastel colors everywhere. Luckily, the overall costume and set design was so well-done that it saved me from being distracted by the fact that the color looked as though the ink cartridge was only 15% full.

In addition to the lifelessness of the colors, the film's utilization of CGI was distracting at times. For some reason, as time goes on, CGI has begun to get slightly worse. Some of the sequences were very jerky and poorly done when it came to the computer enhancement, as well as some of the animals being fairly off putting, although again I say, the performances kept me distracted from being a grumpy about it.

To put it simply, this movie is good. The cast, crew, executives and everyone else in between know it's good too. Heck, there wouldn't be so much advertising about the film everywhere you look if the producers didn't think it was a movie worth seeing.

Whether you're the world's largest theatrical nerd, or someone who has never seen a piece of art in your life, "Wicked" is a great place to start. I truly believe that this will go down as one of the greatest films of 2024, as well as one of the greatest musical movie adaptations in existence. Grab your Broadway tickets and fly to the movie theater immediately to see this.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF A FILING BY VIRGINIA ELECTRIC AND POWER COMPANY OF ITS INTEGRATED RESOURCE PLAN CASE NO. PUR-2024-00184

On October 15, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") the Company's 2024 Integrated Resource Plan ("IRP") pursuant to § 56-509 of the Code of Virginia ("Code").

An IRP, as defined by Code § 56-507, is "a document developed by an electric utility that provides a forecast of its load obligations and a plan to meet those obligations by supply, transmission, and demand side resources over the ensuing 15 years to promote reasonable prices, reliable service, energy independence, and environmental responsibility." Pursuant to Code § 56-509 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services. Pursuant to Code § 56-509 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, this IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 2.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP "highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers." Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or Portfolio.

expansion, there are other players involved as well. Firefly Fiber Broadband is contracted to build fiber in the northern portion of Cumberland County while Kinex works on the southern part. Also, though Kinex has been fiber laid in Buckingham, Firefly was awarded grant money to build

Pursuant to Code § 56-598 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services. Pursuant to Code § 56-599 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in the IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customer capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy profiles and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers. Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 65% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in the most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear and gas units). Community Choral to present Christmas concerts

The Commonwealth Choral of Virginia will present "To Hear the Angels Sing," a collection of Christmas music spanning seasons of holiday style, Dec. 7, at Crenshaw United Methodist Church, 200 Church Street, Blackstone. A second performance will be held at Farmville United Methodist Church, 212 High Street, Dec. 8.

Both concerts begin at 4 p.m. and are free and open to the public.

The program begins with a lively Moravian rendition of "What Good News the Angels Bring" and moves on to the delightfully happy Mass of Saint Nicholas written by Joseph Haydn first performed with chamber ensemble on December 6, 1772, St. Nicholas Day.

"Children celebrate St. Nicholas Day in various ways throughout Europe," Choral artistic director Carol J. Henderson said. "Many of our Christmas Day traditions arose from this festival."

A major portion of this year's concert will focus on carols — both old and new.

"Popularity of the carol in the 15th century was proven by the fact the nearly 500 lyrics in that form survive," Henderson said. "The middle 1600s brought a return to Puritanism, and carol singing nearly became an endangered tradition. It wasn't until 1822 that collections of traditional carols began to be published. By the mid-1800's both new and old carols were explored and revived."

The program includes Carols of the Nativity, a four-part collection that travels through the ages from 15th century England in "As I Lay Upon the Night," to France in the mid-1800s with "Bring a Torch Jeannette Isabelle," and a French-Canadian Christmas Carol "The Huron Carol" ("Twice in the Moon of Wintertime").

"We will sing the first verse in the Huron language as well as in English," Henderson said.

The set of carols ends with the well-known "Angels We Have Heard on High."

"This is a beautiful arrangement by Stephen Chatman," Henderson said. "In this arrangement we visualize angels swirling to the heavens in rising textures and surprising key changes that create a feeling of heightened joy."

The program continues with two carols arranged by Alice Parker and Robert Shaw: "The Holly and the Ivy" from 15th century England and "Tou-rou-Lou-rou," a French Provencal carol from the 19th century.

"Christmas Day: A Choral Fantasy on Old Carols" by Gustav Holst was first performed in 1911. Inspired by orchestral chimes, the Choral had added a handbell accompaniment written by Henderson.

"We hope that you find this moving holiday melody from a great composer uplifting and joyous — with an additional sparkle of handbells," Henderson said.

Rounding out the carol section of the program are three well-known favorites: "We Saw Three Ships," "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," and "Joy to the World."

The concert will conclude with a Choral tradition — "Hallelujah!" from Handel's "Messiah."

The Choral will be accompanied by pianist Susie Thomas and organist Judy Amos. Soloists from the Choral will be featured during the performance.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that its IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the permanent requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers. Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or Portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 65% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (such as gas or coal). According to Dominion, this shift further supports the proposition that serving the Company's customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category.

Activists vow to keep up fight for justice

Conference discusses how to move forward during Trump presidency

ST. LOUIS — They feed the hungry. They counter violence and racial injustice. They fight for criminal justice reform and against book bans. And more than 4,200 of them came together Nov. 20-22 in St. Louis to find solace and support and to map out how to respond if President-elect Donald Trump delivers on campaign promises to dismantle programs that support their work.

The effort comes as many racial justice activists said they mourn Vice President Kamala Harris' defeat to Trump.

"We find ourselves at a crossroads," Glenn Harris, president of Race Forward, told activists. "We cannot allow ourselves to fall into hopelessness."

In the wake of the presidential election, the activists, educators, government workers and researchers participated in a two-day "Facing Race" conference hosted by Race Forward, a progressive-leaning national social justice organization.

The event took place 10 years after Michael Brown, an unarmed Black teenager, was killed by a white police officer a few miles away in Ferguson, Missouri. Brown's death sparked demonstrations and a focus on racial tensions there and other places.

Traditionally, the conference is held every two years and two weeks after Election Day.

Organizers said the convening provided activists an opportunity to discuss some concerns, including Trump's campaign promises to eliminate the federal Department of Education, deport millions of immigrants and scrap programs centered on diversity. Other groups are also ramping up progressive activism efforts.

Harris praised activists for their work, acknowledging they may be tired, but stressed their civic engagement

efforts weren't about just one election. "We still have agency," he said. "The road ahead will be tough."

Searching for strategies

Katherine Boyles attended the conference hoping to learn how best to strategize if there are major changes in federal policies or budget cuts for programs that provide food aid.

"We have to figure out how to navigate," said Boyles, community nutrition and food policy coordinator for the Office of Public Health and Safety in Indianapolis. Part of her work is trying to improve food equity in the city.

Boyles said that in the wake of the election, there needs to be more focus on ramping up local and community-based strategies.

"It will be very difficult if there are in fact cuts," she said.

Trump officials have said they will cut or eliminate some federal programs to reduce costs.

Jarvis Williams of Augusta, Georgia, said he expects Trump's win will impact the work of many grassroots activists.

"They will have to think about how their work can flourish within a new global context," said Williams, director of race and democracy at Horizons

to undo some of the expected changes. "We're not getting out of here in one election cycle," he said.

Eric Ward, executive vice president of Race Forward, agreed.

"This will be a generational struggle," he told reporters. "This will not be solved in four years or eight years or 10."

Keep our eyes on the movement

Conference organizers said they recognize that some activists are still grieving the loss of the presidential election and provided offers to help, including a session called, "Finding my wellness and well-being and gathering strength for the road ahead."

"We need to grieve, whatever people need to do to re-center themselves," said Harris. "We can mourn, but we need to get back to remembering who we are, where we come from and what debt we owe to our ancestors."

Kim Desmond, chief equity officer for the International City/County Management Association, said the work of activists will continue.

"Let us keep our eyes on the movement," Desmond said.

Among others, there were sessions on combating systemic racism, navigating the post-election landscape, empowering community through climate initiatives and using equity tools in communities. There was also a call for more police accountability during a panel on the 10th anniversary of Brown's death.

It's important for activists to be prepared to build, block and protect their communities for whatever changes come, conference organizers said.

"In times like these, sometimes we just have to remind ourselves, remind ourselves of our strength, remind ourselves of our power, remind ourselves that we have strength in our community," said Karla Bruce, chief of staff for Race Forward. "And sometimes, in the immortal words of the poet Kendrick Lamar, we just have to pop out and show 'em."

"Don't be mistaken. We are doing the most important work there is to do — advancing racial justice."

The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and the IRP methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "[t]his staff further supports the proposition that serving [the Company's] customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 85% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the last of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "[t]his staff further supports the proposition that serving [the Company's] customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 56-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. Dominion represents that the Stakeholder Process consisted of: (i) a kickoff meeting providing stakeholders an overview of the IRP; (ii) small group meetings between stakeholders and facilitators; (iii) topic-specific workshops for more in-depth conversations; and (iv) summary pre-filing meetings to review collective input and recommendations that were integrated into the IRP, and post-filing meetings for an overview of final information.

On October 11, 2024, the Commission ordered the Company to provide the following additional information by way of a supplemental filing by November 15, 2024:

- Additional modeling that presents, as a sensitivity for comparison purposes to the Company's modeling presented in its 2024 IRP, the following: (i) its least cost plan, and (ii) at least one VCEA-compliant plan, both with projected data center load growth removed;
- Additional modeling to include updated capacity price forecasts that incorporate the impacts of the PJM base residual capacity auction held in July 2024 for the entire 15-year planning period;

Uva shooter pleads guilty to murder

A week after the University of Virginia marked the two-year anniversary of a deadly shooting on Grounds, the former student who shot and killed three of his schoolmates agreed to a plea deal that could result in five life sentences.

In a Wednesday morning hearing in Albemarle County Circuit Court, 25-year-old Christopher Darnell Jones Jr. pleaded guilty to three charges of first-degree murder, two charges of malicious wounding and five firearms charges.

More than a dozen of the victims' friends and family members were in the courtroom, occasionally bursting into tears and passing a box of tissues as the prosecution read the chilling details of how Jones killed his Uva schoolmates and members of the Cavaliers' football team. Family members started at Jones as he stood to meet his fate, his right cheek wet with tears as he pleaded guilty to a total of 10 counts.

ROANOKE: Virginia Military Institute and a prospective student have resolved her claim that she was sexually assaulted by a cadet in the school's barracks during an overnight "Open House" event. A lawsuit filed by the then-high school student was settled Tuesday during a private mediation session in Roanoke's federal court, according to court records. "The parties resolved this matter upon mutually agreeable terms," U.S. Magistrate Judge Kallani Memmer wrote in a brief order that did not provide details of the terms.

The alleged incident happened in September of 2021, during a two-day event during which high school students considering VMI were encouraged to visit the state-supported military school in Lexington, and allegedly happened during the early morning hours of Sept. 18, 2021.

Miyares running for reelection as AG, not for governor

Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares announced he is running for reelection in 2025 and not for governor.

Miyares' decision not to compete with Lt. Gov. Winsome Earle-Sears for the GOP gubernatorial nomination increases the likelihood that Virginia will elect its first woman governor in 2025. Rep. Abigail Spanberger, D-7th, is the presumptive Democratic nominee for governor.

Miyares was elected in 2021 alongside Gov. Glenn Youngkin and Earle-Sears. He is the first Latino to be elected to statewide office in Virginia.

Youngkin quickly endorsed Earle-Sears for governor and Miyares for attorney general, calling them "indispensable partners to advance our shared, commonsense conservative policies."

LYNCHBURG: Liberty University defended its decision to fire Ellenor Zinski, a transgender woman, from her job at the university, arguing her termination was based on the school's religious beliefs, and did not constitute discrimination based on sex in violation of federal law. The arguments were made in a filing with the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Virginia, asking the court to throw out a lawsuit brought by Zinski against the university accusing the school of violating Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The university's lawyers also accused Zinski of attempting "to set up Liberty University for this lawsuit" when she was hired. In response to Liberty's previous attempts to get the lawsuit dismissed, Zinski's lawyers said, "Simply put, if Ms. Zinski identified as a male, she would not have been terminated."

Processed foods such as eggnog, fruitcake, sweet potato casserole, and pecan pies during the holidays may lessen your ability to belt out a hearty ho-ho-ho.

"We now know there is no mystery to these higher rates," said the study's lead author, Dr. Mercedes R. Carnethon. She and her colleagues at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine analyzed data collected from more than 4,200 participants in the CARDIA (Coronary Artery Risk Development in Young Adults) study, which was published in JAMA in 2017.

"Our efforts to control the traditional risk factors can work to reduce the disparities we observe in diabetes," Carnethon said.

This year, turn up the ho-ho-ho volume by deliberately controlling your diet. Pull out your pots and pans and stuff them with these healthy holiday alternatives: Baked apples or pears, baked pecan bars, apple cider, red wine sangria, crisp baked fruit chips with a fruit dip. Or try sweet potato muffins, roasted white potatoes with herbs, baked sweet potatoes, and green bean casserole. Also, try making soup from roasted butternut or acorn squash or potatoes. Stuff your turkey with butternut squash and kale quinoa stuffing.

Innovate, in other words, because diabetes occurs when glucose stays in your blood, and not enough reaches your cells. Over time, too much glucose in your blood causes health problems, such as heart disease, nerve damage, eye problems, and kidney disease.

Limiting or outright avoiding certain holiday foods can reduce the risk of a health crisis. These foods contain high levels of sugar, salt and fat to include sugar-sweetened beverages, processed and fried foods, red meat, excessive alcohol, low-fiber and low-potassium foods.

According to the American Heart Association, use in three adults has heart disease. Additionally, 103 million Americans have high blood pressure, which increases their risk of a heart attack or stroke. Blacks, however, have higher rates.

About 60 percent of all Blacks have heart disease and heart disease death rates are highest among Blacks compared to other racial and ethnic groups, according to the American Heart Association. Hypertension and stroke do not just strike the elderly.

They may strike younger people. Black women in particular need to be aware of the increased risk. Black women are twice as likely to experience a stroke compared to white women, and 50 percent more likely to have high blood pressure, according to the Office of

But the problem is a heart attack doesn't always produce warning signs such as pain or pressure, which is so intense that it causes a person to clutch their chest and drop to the floor. Silent heart attacks account for about 20 percent of all heart attacks, according to 2022 statistics from the American Heart Association. Some experts estimate that percentage is even higher — closer to 50 percent.

This means you may experience a silent heart attack but never know it. But, if you have a heart attack, you also experienced shortness of breath, and a general state of discomfort that led to a night of lost sleep. Worse, some heart attack patients truly experience no symptoms. The heart has no gyroscope; it doesn't know where it is in space. And it doesn't matter if you put the heart upside down or right side up, it's going to give you the same signals if it's in trouble.

Experts say if you're prone to indigestion and just ate a spicy meal, the burning feeling in your chest is likely heartburn. But, if your symptoms occur out of the blue and worsen, especially as you walk around or exercise, that's a real warning sign that it's not gastritis.

Smith moves to end federal criminal cases vs. Trump

WASHINGTON — Justice Department special counsel Jack Smith on Monday moved to end the two federal criminal cases against President-elect Donald Trump.

A long-standing department policy bars prosecuting sitting presidents, so Smith has been expected to wind down the cases after the former president won the Nov. 5 election to return to the

White House.

"It has long been the position of the Department of Justice that the United States Constitution forbids the federal indictment and subsequent criminal prosecution of a sitting President," Smith wrote in his six-page filing requesting U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan to dismiss the case alleging that Trump tried to steal the 2020 election.

"That prohibition is categorical and does not turn on the gravity of the

crimes charged, the strength of the Government's proof, or the merits of the prosecution, which the Government stands fully behind."

Chutkan did not immediately rule on the request, but Trump's lawyers didn't oppose it.

Trump spokesperson Steven Cheung said the American people demanded an end to what the president-elect's allies allege is the weaponization of the Justice Department.

"Today's decision by the DOJ ends

the unconstitutional federal cases against President Trump, and is a major victory for the rule of law," he said.

Smith also dropped his appeal in the case that alleged Trump mishandled classified documents after leaving the White House at the end of his first term. U.S. District Judge Allen Cannon had dismissed those charges by ruling Smith was appointed illegitimately, but Smith had appealed the decision to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

statements he has made linking vaccinations to increased autism and other criticisms of the health industry. He has been especially critical of the U.S. Food & Drug Administration, calling it "a corrupt system" and vowing to purge healthcare of anything that "can't be patented by Pharma."

While Kennedy has not singled out anything specific to the pharmaceutical cluster in Petersburg, Warner was succinct in letting the secretary-designee know that any action would be fought hard against. The senator noted broad bipartisan support behind funding its development and indicated it would not be wise to cut any of those dollars.

"It would be short-sighted and just plain dumb if that funding was cut off," Warner said.

Petersburg's pharmaceutical cluster — AMPAC Fine Chemicals, Plow Corporation and the nonprofit CivicaRx — was recognized by the U.S. Economic Development Administration in 2023 as a federal "tech hub" that advances "the growth, innovation, and sustainability of the U.S.-based APM industry to re-shore safe and affordable medicines via innovative hybrid and continuous flow manufacturing technologies."

Millions of dollars have been poured into the development of the hub in the past decade in part because the U.S. sees drug manufacturing here as a sort of defense against intelligence infiltration by China, a world-leading pharma-

ceutical producer and exporter, China regularly exports \$10 billion in drugs to the U.S., and given the tense political relations between the two countries, more attention has been given to shoring up onshore production and distribution.

Kaine: Cluster 'sells itself'

Warner's fellow senator from the commonwealth sits on the Senate Health committee that will vet Kennedy and recommend yes or no about the appointment. Sen. Tim Kaine said the fact that the Petersburg initiative to reboot the former Boehringer Ingelheim medicine-making plant that launched the current cluster took place during the first Trump administration should be a sign that Kennedy and the next Trump administration would not subject it to cuts.

"I do not assume that RFK as HHS secretary would get in the way of those plans," Kaine said. "I think the value proposition of this tech hub really sells itself to the country, and I suspect the Trump administration will want it to succeed."

Still, both senators said they will monitor developments for any potential

red flags. If it does, Warner said, the administration will be in for a battle.

"I will fight like hell to make sure the innovation that is taking place in Petersburg and Richmond around the bio and advance pharma" stays where it is, Warner added.

It is not just the senators who will defend the cluster. Rep. Jennifer McClellan, D-Virginia, who represents Petersburg and Richmond in Congress, told The Progress-Index she has "strong concerns" about an RFK secretariat and hopes the next White House will not "undermine" the "common-sense bipartisan efforts" to gird the industry in central Virginia.

"Under the Biden-Harris administration, we have made tremendous progress to improve public health outcomes and strengthen our domestic pharmaceutical manufacturing capabilities through strategic investments in communities like Petersburg," McClellan said. "We continue working to onshore pharmaceutical manufacturing in a bipartisan manner to create new jobs, ensure national resilience, and safeguard public health."

On the ground? Silence

So, how do the ones affected most by any major tinkering feel about the future? If they're worried, they're not letting on, at least publicly.

Messages left for AMPAC and Plow seeking comment were not returned. A spokesperson for Civica said the company does not comment on presidential appointments but reiterated the company's mission.

"At Civica, we remain focused on our mission to provide high quality and affordable generic medicines to patients," company spokesperson Liz Power said in an email. "To that end, we continue to work to bring our new manufacturing facility in Petersburg online and are making good progress toward that goal. We have hired more than 100 people in the last year alone to work at the facility, where we will manufacture generic sterile injectable medicines, including commonly prescribed forms of insulin."

A spokesperson for Petersburg Mayor Sam Parham also declined to comment.

"RFK Jr. has not been confirmed, and this is not a local issue at this time," Joanne Williams said in a text.

The industry's leading trade group, however, has weighed in.

In a statement shortly after Kennedy's nomination was announced, the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America offered something of an olive branch to the Trump administration.

"This industry is a crown jewel of the American economy, giving American patients more medicine choices than anywhere else in the world and supporting millions of high-paying, high-tech jobs around the country," the statement said. "We want to work with the Trump administration to further strengthen our innovation ecosystem and improve health care for patients."

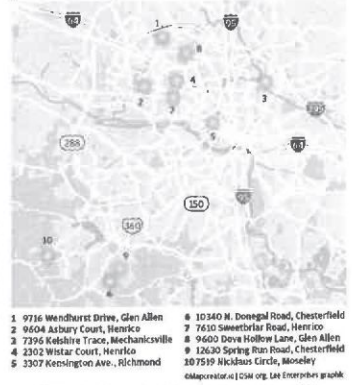

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF A FILING BY VIRGINIA ELECTRIC AND POWER COMPANY OF ITS INTEGRATED RESOURCE PLAN CASE NO. PUR-2024-00184

On October 15, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") the Company's 2024 Integrated Resource Plan ("IRP") pursuant to § 56-599 of the Code of Virginia ("Code").

An IRP, as defined by Code § 56-597, is "a document developed by an electric utility that provides a forecast of its load obligations and a plan to meet those obligations by supply and demand side resources over the ensuing 15 years to promote reasonable prices, reliable service, energy independence, and environmental responsibility." Pursuant to Code § 56-599 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services filing. Pursuant to Code § 56-599 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone with the PJM. The PJM Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company's IRP highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers. Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or Portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 15% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar and wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "[t]his shift further supports the proposition that serving [the Company's] customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 56-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. Dominion represents that the Stakeholder Process consisted of: (i) a kickoff meeting providing stakeholders an overview of the IRP; (ii) small group meetings between stakeholders and facilitators; (iii) top-level workshops for more in-depth conversations; and (iv) summary pre-filing meetings to review collective input and recommendations that were integrated into the IRP, and post-filing meetings for an overview of final information.

On October 11, 2024, the Commission ordered the Company to provide the following additional information by way of a supplemental filing by November 15, 2024:

1. Additional modeling that presents, as a sensitivity for comparison purposes to the Company's modeling presented in its 2024 IRP, the following: (i) its least cost plan, and (ii) at least one VCEA-compliant plan, both with projected data center load growth removed;
2. Additional modeling to include updated capacity price forecasts that incorporate the impacts of the PJM base residual capacity auction held in July 2024 for the entire 15-year planning period;
3. After obtaining and incorporating updated capacity price forecasts, present as sensitivities for comparison purposes, the following: (i) its least cost plan (which includes data center load); (ii) at least one VCEA-compliant plan (which includes data center load); (iii) its least cost plan without data center load; and (iv) at least one VCEA-compliant plan without data center load; and

Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within the PJM region. The PJM Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). STARS was founded in 1996, by Appalopians of America Association (AAA) after AAA received the Historic Stonehill Theatre as a charitable donation from Irwin R. Cohen, the theatre's owner and owner of R-C Theatres located in Reisterstown, MD.

Making its debut as a troupe of 10 members who faced physical disabilities and/or intellectual challenges under the directorship of the late Vivian Pend-

leton, STARS has grown to a troupe of 28 members. STARS has performed each year in Clifton Forge or Covington since 1996, except for one year during COVID-19, when Virginia's theatres were closed.

AAA owned and operated the Historic Stonehill Theatre for 12 years, made more than \$200,000 worth of restoration improvements to the theatre to render it ADA compliant while restoring it from a twin-cinema to its original function as an opera house (circa 1905), and donated the entire facility to the Town of Clifton Forge in

2003. AAA founded many programs to fill seats during its tenure, and STARS is one that has served the Allegheny Highlands by filling the need to offer performers who face intellectual challenges and/or physical disabilities the opportunity to develop their talent, social skills, and self-esteem.

Another success story AAA has enjoyed is the founding of The Virginia Opry on October 17, 1992, an outreach program to musicians and entertainers that became the Commonwealth of Virginia's official Opry in 2020, when Governor Ralph

S. Northam signed "Senate Bill 283" that passed the Virginia Senate by a 40-0 vote and the Virginia House of Delegates by a 93-6 count.

M. Ray Allen, founder and president of AAA, remarked, "STARS and The Virginia Opry continue to flourish despite the fact that AAA no longer has ownership of the Historic Masonic Theatre, the name the Town of Clifton Forge restored to the facility after AAA donated the theatre to the Town."

During its time of ownership, AAA teamed with Media Storm Productions of Virginia Beach and pro-

duced a documentary film titled "STARS," and the film won a Bronze Telly. The documentary film can be viewed at the Clifton Forge Public Library.

Allen concluded, "Appalopians will begin its 40th year as a nonprofit organization on Dec. 5, this year, and STARS' "Hometown Christmas" will be the first show of the beginning of our 40th year here in the Allegheny Highlands, and I invite the public to attend this free show that will feature more than 20 members of STARS."

Rev. Susi Ennis, Pastor, welcomed the little over 50 people who turned out to enjoy some uplifting music and to honor McClinton. She then turned the program over to Tammy Scruggs-Duncan, Executive Director, AHAC and Sandra Minter, Organist/Director of Music for the church.

"We are very grateful to be able to partner with First Presbyterian on this effort to honor Calvin McClinton and to present one of his favorite choirs, the RPCC," said Duncan. She also recognized visitors from the Wrightsville Baptist and Old Stone Presbyterian choirs, that McClinton also directed. She then asked for a show of hands of everybody whose life "Calvin touched" and everybody in the audience raised their hands.

Scruggs-Duncan talked about McClinton being a child of the community and sharing his "many talents, boundless energy, and great imagination" all over the United States.

McClinton was born and raised in the historic village of Wrightsville. He went on to earn a bachelor's degree in Vocal Music Education from Westminster Choir College, NJ, and a master's degree in Conducting from Trenton State College, NJ. He also founded the McClinton Musical Theatre Foundation in Romania, where he served as a Fulbright Scholar. This foundation, later renamed the McClinton Foundation, continues to support young artists.

"He was wonderful enough to come back to his community and share his gifts with us," continued Scruggs-Duncan. After re-

turning to his hometown in 2005, McClinton initiated the Wrightsville Renewal Festival, revitalizing the community and promoting cultural enrichment. He actively participated in local arts organizations and served on the board of directors of the AHAC. In recognition of his extraordinary contributions to the arts, he was honored with the AHAC's Arts Legacy Award in 2019.

McClinton also spearheaded a community movement to restore Green Pastures, a historic African American park, led the initiative to have markers placed at slave burial sites; and was in the forefront of

the Wrightsville Revitalization Project. These are just a few things that he was actively involved in at the time of his death in 2021.

Linda Cook, RPCC, shared some of her memories of McClinton before introducing the choir.

"We have travelled many different places," said Cook of the choir's travels to MD, NC, WV, and various places in VA. "We just go when asked, whether a funeral, birthday party, or whatever it is, just call us and we will be glad to come and celebrate with you and sing for you," added Cook.

After introducing choir directors: Roger Patter-

son, Sue Venable, and Eric Hunter; and musicians: Bishop Isaiah Freeman, III, pastor, New Dimensions Christian Fellowship, Covington and Devon Helton, percussionist, she invited the audience to "sit back and enjoy." The choir treated the audience to about an hour of music. The program was followed with refreshments.

FPC and the AHAC extended their deepest gratitude to the RPCC for their beautiful performance in remembrance of McClinton. "Your voices have filled this space with love, hope, and inspiration. Calvin would be smiling," read the joint statement.

LEGAL NOTICE

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On October 15, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") the Company's 2024 Integrated Resource Plan ("IRP") pursuant to § 56-599 of the Code of Virginia ("Code").

An IRP, as defined by Code § 56-597, is "a document developed by an electric utility that provides a forecast of its load obligations and an plan to meet those obligations by supply and demand side resources over the ensuing 15 years to promote reasonable, prudent, reliable service, energy independence, and environmental responsibility." Pursuant to Code § 56-599 A, Dominion files its IRP in each year immediately preceding the year the utility is subject to a biennial review of rates for generation and distribution services being furnished to Code § 56-599 E, the Commission determines whether an IRP is reasonable and in the public interest.

As indicated in its IRP, Dominion is a member of PJM Interconnection, L.L.C. ("PJM"), a regional transmission organization in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. The Company states that the IRP was prepared for its service territories in Virginia and North Carolina, which are both within the PJM region. Dominion states that it serves approximately 2.7 million electric customers in Virginia and North Carolina, and that the Company's combined service territory in these two states covers approximately 30,000 square miles.

According to the Company, the IRP presents multiple potential portfolios ("Portfolios") that Dominion could use to meet customers' capacity and energy needs over the next 15 years. Dominion forecasts a 5.5% annual increase in demand over the next decade, and for demand to double by 2039 in the Company's delivery zone within PJM, the Dominion Energy Zone ("DOM Zone"). Dominion asserts that the Company IRP highlights the need to address significant demand growth through resource adequacy across all functions of the utility, the balance between clean energy priorities and the paramount requirement of service reliability, and maintaining rates that continue to be affordable for the Company's customers. Dominion also recognizes that the IRP is a "snapshot in time" and not a request to approve any specific resource or portfolio.

Dominion states in its filing that two dynamics within PJM since the last IRP filing have underscored the need for additional power generation and electric transmission resources within the Company's delivery zone. First, the Company states the most recent PJM capacity auction in July 2024 yielded the highest capacity price ever for the DOM Zone. The DOM Zone, according to the Company, has the highest forecasted load growth of any area within PJM. Dominion represents that the capacity price within the DOM Zone was 65% higher than the capacity price for PJM generally, and more than 15 times the prior year's clearing capacity price for the rest of PJM in this most recent capacity auction.

Second, PJM adopted an approach called effective load carrying capability ("ELCC") in January 2024, which measures how much capacity may be provided by different generation resources at different times. Compared to PJM's prior approach, Dominion states that the ELCC methodology results in significant discounting of the capacity value of resources that cannot produce electricity upon demand (such as solar or wind) and higher capacity values of resources that can run on demand (including nuclear or gas units). According to Dominion, "[t]his shift further supports the proposition that serving the Company's customers reliably requires a balanced and effective mix of resources, and not over-reliance on any single generation technology or category."

Dominion states that the Company conducted a Stakeholder Process, pursuant to Code § 56-599 D, in preparation for filing its IRP. Dominion represents that the Stakeholder Process consisted of: (i) a kickoff meeting providing stakeholders an overview of the IRP; (ii) small group meetings between stakeholders and facilitators; (iii) topic-specific workshops for more in-depth conversations; and (iv) summary pre-filing meetings to review collective input and recommendations that were integrated into the IRP and post-filing meetings for an overview of final information.

On October 11, 2024, the Commission ordered the Company to provide the following additional information by way of a supplemental filing by November 15, 2024:

1. Additional modeling that presents, as a sensitivity for comparison purposes to the Company's modeling presented in its 2024 IRP, the following: (i) its least cost plan; and (ii) at least one VCEA-compliant plan, both with projected data center load growth removed;
2. Actuarial modeling to include updated capacity price forecasts that incorporate the impacts of the PJM base residual capacity auction held in July 2024 for the entire 15-year planning period;
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4. For each planned transmission project, an indication of whether the need for the transmission project is primarily being driven by data center load growth.

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
