An examination of the variety of approaches to the social and cultural history of medicine and public health. Readings are drawn from recent literature in the field, sampling writings on health care, illness experiences, knowledge production, and medical cultures in Asia, Latin America, Africa, Europe, and the United States from antiquity through the twenty-first century. Topics include the role of gender, race, ethnicity, class, and religion in the experience of illness, suffering, and healing; medical epistemology and interactions among divergent understandings of the body; medicine, colonialism, and imperialism; and the role of the marketplace in shaping cultural authority, professional identities, and patient expectations.

The course evaluation will be based on informed and engaged participation in discussions and a short paper due on December 12. This may be either a reflective essay (*not* a research paper) of ca. 15-20 pages that explores historical or historiographic themes that link together several of the seminar readings, or an orals field reading list related to the history of medicine, health culture, and/or public health with a 10-page essay discussing the field's central issues and challenges.

The course may also be taken as a research seminar, in which case a research paper will be substituted for the reflective essay. Students who elect the research option should meet individually with the instructor to discuss the formulation of a research focus and plan of analysis.
