QUICK VIEW FOR BAKERS IN THIS COUNTY

HOME KITCHEN ALLOWED?

Yes (Utah Code §4-5-501 (formerly §4-5-9.5) establishes the Cottage Food Registration program administered by UDAF. A food handler’s permit and UDAF registration are required. No sales cap. Local governments are explicitly prohibited from imposing additional requirements on compliant registered operations. A parallel Home Consumption and Homemade Food Act (Title 4, Chapter 5A) allows sales without state registration but only at direct-to-sale farmers markets.)

PETS ALLOWED?

No specific pet restriction in state cottage food law.

HOME OCCUPATION PERMIT?

Yes (Grand County is subject to Utah state law under Utah Code §4-5-501, which requires UDAF registration and a food handler’s permit. Utah state law explicitly prohibits local governments from imposing additional requirements on compliant registered cottage food operations. No county-specific ordinance was found that restricts cottage food beyond state law. Grand County (Moab) has an active tourism economy and a robust farmers market. The Utah state preemption bars local government from imposing additional requirements on compliant UDAF-registered cottage food operations. Sellers can take advantage of high tourist traffic at Moab farmers markets.)

DELIVERY / PICKUP RULES	Direct sales at home, farmers markets, events, and online sales permitted. Indirect/ wholesale sales also allowed under UDAF registration. No sales cap.
MAX EMPLOYEES IN HOME	Not specified in state statute.

Relevant county code

Utah Code §4-5-501 (UDAF Cottage Food Registration); local governments preempted from imposing additional restrictions on compliant operations.

RESEARCH NOTES

State baseline applied. Freedom tier state. Allowed foods: All non-TCS (non-potentially hazardous) foods including baked goods, jams, jellies, candy, granola, dried herbs, non-TCS beverages, and other shelf-stable foods. No sales cap. Prohibited: Potentially hazardous foods (TCS) including meat, raw dairy, and any food requiring time/temperature control.

State context — Utah cottage food law

Grand County’s rules sit on top of Utah’s state cottage food framework. The state law sets the floor — counties can add but cannot remove protections.

INDIRECT SALES

Yes — Registered cottage food operations may sell through various channels. The Utah Department of Agriculture and Food (UDAF) issues registration; local health departments do not have jurisdiction to regulate compliant cottage food operations except to investigate foodborne illness outbreaks. The state also has a separate Home Consumption and Homemade Food Act (Utah Code Title 4, Chapter 5A) that allows unregistered sales of certain homemade foods with a business license, but only at direct-to-sale farmers markets or direct-to-sale locations with appropriate signage. Food service establishments may not use cottage food products as ingredients in food served to the public.
