1 Introduction	[1] Whether you are traveling for business or pleasure, traveling light has become the new norm, as airlines increase fees for check-in baggage and frequently cancel and delay flights. 	<p>[2] Reducing luggage to a simple carry-on that can be placed in the overhead compartment of the plane and/or a backpack or bag that fits under the seat in front of you can have huge benefits. Carrying less baggage will give you increased flexibility that can be translated into more time and money, and less stress and limitations for your trip.</p> <p>[3] In addition to the reduced costs, you'll have less to haul around, you won't have to wait around at baggage claim, you'll have instant access to your luggage, you'll be able to switch flights more easily - in case yours is delayed or canceled, — and most importantly, you won't have to worry about your bags getting lost.</p> <p>[4] Traveling internationally? Traveling light also has the advantage of saving you additional time and frustration. Most international connections require you to pick up your checked-in luggage after your first flight and re-check it on your new flight. If you have a tight layover or if your first flight delays, you might not have time to re-check your luggage. 4 311 Rule	<p>Don't forget that flying with just a carry-on means that your liquids will be subjected to the 3-1-1 rule. 5 Packing	<p>[1] You never need as much as you think. Reduce your clothing to half of what you initially select. Rather than throwing in random pieces of clothing that you like, think through your daily itinerary, and pack a specific outfit to wear for each day and activity. This will ensure you pack only what you need (and nothing extra). Boots may be a pain to take off at the TSA checkpoint but wearing them will free up a significant amount of space in your suitcase. <p>6 Maximize Space</p>	<p>[1] Fold most of your clothing and then fit rolled-up items in the crevices of the remaining space. Don't forget to fill up your shoes too. You can pack socks and small items inside them.</p> <p>[2] Compression bags can help you fit more clothing into your carry-on.
