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### SYSTEMIC POLITICAL COLLAPSE IN SARAJEVO AND THE WIDENING TRANSATLANTIC SCHISM

#### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 15, 2026, was defined by a major political earthquake in the Western Balkans, as the government of Sarajevo Canton collapsed following three days of intense, youth-led protests. The resignation of Prime Minister Nihad Uk marks a critical failure in state capacity and a sharp public rejection of systemic corruption and infrastructure neglect, catalyzed by a fatal tram accident. This domestic instability in Bosnia and Herzegovina is unfolding against a backdrop of heightened ethnic tensions, with experts warning that the "transactional" nature of the current U.S. administration has emboldened secessionist forces in Republika Srpska (RS) and stimulated talk of a "Third Entity" for Bosnian Croats. The convergence of these factors suggests a precarious moment for the Dayton Agreement's survival, as official state diplomacy is increasingly bypassed by ethnic paradiplomacy fueled by multi-million dollar lobbying efforts in Washington.

On the international stage, the Munich Security Conference underscored a profound and growing divide between American and European visions for the global order. The U.S. version of "Economic Independence" through aggressive reciprocal tariffs and a retreat into "old ways of life" stands in stark contrast to European efforts to maintain a rules-based system and support for Ukraine. Meanwhile, the revelation of a specific neurotoxin (epibatidin) as the cause of Alexey Navalny's death two years ago has provided a new focal point for Western accusations against the Kremlin. Collectively, the day's events suggest a world moving away from multi-lateral cooperation toward a "zero-sum" era of transactional politics, where traditional diplomatic norms are being replaced by high-stakes economic statecraft and direct public pressure.

#### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **Collapse of Sarajevo Canton Government:** Prime Minister Nihad Uk resigned following mass protests sparked by a tram accident that killed one student and severely injured a girl. Protesters successfully demanded the release of the tram driver, arguing the fault lay with a corrupt system and poorly maintained infrastructure rather than an individual ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Shift in U.S. Balkan Policy:** Analysts and experts highlighted a dramatic shift in Washington, where the removal of sanctions against Milorad Dodik is viewed as a move toward transactionalism. Concerns are rising that Republika Srpska's secession is being discussed behind closed doors, potentially leading to a violent partition of Bosnia ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Navalny Death Investigation Update:** A joint investigation by five European nations concluded that Russian opposition leader Alexey Navalny was poisoned with epibatidin, a toxin from Ecuadorian frogs, classified as a chemical weapon. - **U.S. Reciprocal Tariff Offensive:** President Trump's "Liberation Day" executive order has placed tariffs on over 100 countries, reversing eight decades of U.S. trade policy. Critics warn this is fostering "crony capitalism" where political loyalty dictates tariff exemptions ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Iran Nuclear Negotiations:** Tehran has signaled a willingness to limit its nuclear program in exchange for the lifting of sanctions, though it refuses to curb its missile arsenal. This comes as the U.S. deploys more aircraft carriers to the Middle East to increase pressure ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Economic Statecraft:** The "Pink Tax" in Bosnia and Herzegovina, where female-branded products are significantly more expensive than male equivalents, is being challenged as a form of gender discrimination. Comparative data shows FBiH has significantly higher sick leave rates (25 days/year) than the EU average (7.4 days), creating a massive "business risk" for the private sector ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Corruption & Governance:** Investigations into the Sarajevo tram accident revealed that the public transit company (GRAS) awarded a contract for brake servicing to a firm with no prior experience in the field, which returned zero serviced parts over eight months ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Succession & Stability:** Norway is grappling with the fallout of the "Epstein Files," which have implicated high-level diplomats and the Crown Princess, leading to a significant loss of public confidence in the monarchy and the diplomatic core ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Protectionism vs. Globalism:** The U.S. is aggressively pursuing 19th-century economic models (tariffs), while Europe and the rest of the world (including Canada) are attempting to preserve the post-WWII open-trade order. This creates a "win-lose" geopolitical environment where allies are treated as competitors ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Technological Anxiety and Biosurveillance:** From "Gain of Function" research risks to the non-consensual use of smart glasses and AI in mortgage approvals, there is a pervasive theme of technology outpacing regulation and ethical standards. ## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Continued protests in Sarajevo as the youth demand the resignation of the Minister of Transport and GRAS leadership. High risk of infiltrators (huligans) attempting to delegitimize the peaceful movement. Expect aggressive Russian disinformation campaigns surrounding the Navalny "frog toxin" report ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** Political paralysis in Sarajevo Canton during the "technical mandate," delaying critical infrastructure projects. Possible movement by RS toward a formal declaration of independence if the U.S. signals further "transactional" support. Iran-U.S. talks in Geneva (scheduled for Tuesday) will determine if military escalation is avoided ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** Potential structural collapse of the Dayton Agreement. If the U.S. continues its protectionist path, expect a formalization of a "multi-polar" trade world where the EU and China forge deeper ties to bypass Washington. Energy security in the Balkans will hinge on the "Southern Connection" gas project, currently a lobbying flashpoint ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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- **For International Policy:**
  - **Security:** NATO should increase its visible presence in the Brčko District to deter RS secessionist moves during this period of Sarajevo's political instability ([Source](#)).
  - **Diplomacy:** European states must coordinate a unified response to the Navalny findings to prevent Russia from using its "Balkan front" to divide the EU ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
