## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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The Nigerian political landscape on February 16, 2026, is defined by an intensifying confrontation between the federal government and high-profile members of the political elite, most notably former Kaduna State Governor Nasir El-Rufai. El-Rufai was formally arraigned by the Department of State Services (DSS) on three counts of cybercrime and national security violations following a televised admission that he intercepted communications of National Security Advisor (NSA) Nuhu Ribadu. This legal battle is occurring concurrently with an invitation by the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) for questioning regarding financial misconduct

during his tenure, sparking rival protests in the capital that necessitated the use of tear gas by security forces. These developments signal a breakdown in elite consensus and a potential shift toward using state judicial apparatus to settle political scores ahead of the 2027 election cycle ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)). Simultaneously, Nigeria is navigating a "constitutional crisis" regarding the 2027 general elections. The Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) released a timetable for February 2027, which coincides with Ramadan and Lenten observances, prompting calls for adjustment from religious leaders and an emergency reconvening of the National Assembly. This scheduling conflict is exacerbated by a legislative deadlock over the Electoral Act Amendment Bill 2026. While the House of Representatives favors mandatory real-time electronic transmission of results, the Senate has introduced a "manual backup" proviso that critics argue creates loopholes for electoral fraud. This legislative uncertainty, combined with the 2027 timetable, has created a volatile environment where the "legitimacy of the next election" is being questioned by civil society and legal experts ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)). Security remains fragile as localized insurgencies and banditry persist across Kwara, Niger, and Borno states. The deploy-

ment of 200 US military personnel to Nigerian airbases and the introduction of a US Congress bill (HR 7457) seeking to hold the Miyetti Allah Cattle Breeders Association (MACBAN) accountable for religious freedom violations indicate an increasing internationalization of Nigeria's internal conflicts. While headline inflation showed a marginal drop to 15.1%, the broader economic picture remains strained by a massive budget deficit and debt servicing costs that eclipse combined spending on defense, education, and health, highlighting a persistent gap between macroeconomic data and the lived reality of citizens ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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### Legal Arraignment of Nasir El-Rufai and Elite Fragmentation

- The federal government filed a three-count charge against former Governor Nasir El-Rufai at the Federal High Court in Abuja for unlawfully intercepting the communications of NSA Nuhu Ribadu. The charges stem from a February 13th interview where El-Rufai admitted to listening to the NSA's calls ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- El-Rufai honored an invitation by the EFCC for questioning regarding his eight-year stewardship in Kaduna. Pro and anti-El-Rufai protesters clashed at the EFCC headquarters, leading security forces to use tear gas to disperse the crowds ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- Legal experts and former INEC officials warned that these developments underscore a dangerous level of "statute sabotage" and "statutory capture" by political heavyweight governors who influence the turnover rate of the National Assembly ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

### Electoral Reform Deadlock and 2027 Timetable Controversy

- The National Assembly reconvened for an emergency session to deliberate on the 2027 election timetable released by INEC, which sets presidential polls for February 20, 2027. Critics argue the date overlaps with Ramadan and Lent ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- The joint conference committee remains divided over Clause 60(3) of the Electoral Act Amendment Bill. The House of Representatives version mandates real-time transmission, whereas the Senate version includes a proviso allowing manual collation if electronic transmission "fails" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Former INEC Commissioner Mike Igini stated that 2021 data showed 93% of polling units have adequate network coverage for electronic transmission, calling the Senate's "no-network" argument a pretext for rigging ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

### Escalating Security Threats and International Intervention

- The US military deployed 200 personnel to select Nigerian airbases as part of a counter-terrorism partnership. Analysts are debating if this represents a routine collaboration or a deeper recalibration of regional security policy ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- Armed bandits attacked Share community in Kwara State and multiple communities in Niger State, resulting in six deaths and the destruction of a police station. Troops in Borno successfully repelled ISIS-West Africa (ISWAP) attacks in Pulka and Mandara Girau ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- MACBAN rejected US Bill HR 7457 (Nigeria Religious Freedom and Accountability Act of 2026), which seeks to associate the group with mass atrocities, calling it "dangerously simplistic" ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## Economic Stability Indicators vs. Structural Deficits

- Nigeria's headline inflation rate eased slightly to 15.1% in January 2026, mark 10 consecutive months of decline. Food inflation dropped to 8.89% ([Source](#)).
- Capital importation surged 380% year-on-year to \$6.01 billion, suggesting renewed investor interest despite lingering forex liquidity issues ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Budget defense sessions revealed that debt servicing costs (15.9 trillion Naira) now exceed the total budget for defense, health, and education (15 trillion Naira), raising concerns about a "debt trap" ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## Labor Party Leadership Crisis

- The Labor Party's National Working Committee, led by Senator Nenadi Usman, petitioned the Inspector General of Police for the arrest of Julius Abure. Allegations include criminal trespass, theft, and malicious damage to the party's national headquarters following a Supreme Court judgment nullifying Abure's chairmanship ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

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### Geopolitics and International Relations

- The 39th Ordinary Session of the African Union (AU) in Addis Ababa adopted a resolution labeling slavery and colonialism as "genocide against the people of Africa." Ghana is set to present this to the UN General Assembly to seek formal reparations ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## Critical Infrastructure

- Niger Delta Power Holding Company (NDPHC) MD Jennifer Adighije reported that while Nigeria has 12,000 MW of installed capacity, transmission grid constraints limit actual supply to far lower levels. The NDPHC is now focusing on bilateral trading to circumvent the national grid ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Ogun State officials defended their construction of 1,600 km of roads but admitted to a total deficit of over 4,000 km of deplorable roads ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## LEGISLATION/POLICY

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The legislative agenda is dominated by the **Electoral Act Amendment Bill 2026**, which has reached a critical bottleneck in the joint conference committee over the mandatory nature of electronic result transmission. Simultaneously, the **Special Seats for Women Bill** is seeing renewed pres-

sure from civil society. Executive actions include the signing of MoUs for medical industrialization (Medipol) and agro-industrial logistics (BUA Group/AD Ports). **BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:**

- **Electoral Act Amendment Bill 2026:** Focuses on the mandate for real-time electronic transmission of results from polling units to the IREV portal. ## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### **Elite Fragmentation and Judicial Weaponization**

The arraignment of Nasir El-Rufai marks a rare moment where a prominent member of the ruling party's inner circle is targeted using national security and cybercrime laws. Analysts suggest that the "rate of turnover in the National Assembly" is increasingly determined by governors, making lawmakers vulnerable to executive whim. El-Rufai's claim that he was "wiretapping" the NSA suggests a high degree of surveillance and counter-surveillance among the political class, indicating that trust within the elite has evaporated. This internal "civil war" between the state and its former high-level operatives poses a significant risk to domestic stability ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

### **Technological Skepticism vs. Administrative Transparency**

A recurring theme is the political class's resistance to technology that enhances transparency. The debate over the Electoral Act reveals a deep-seated "fear of electronic transmission" among some senators, who cite infrastructure deficits that independent data from the NCC and former INEC officials refute. This "statute sabotage" suggests that the legislative push for manual backups is a deliberate attempt to maintain "dark alleys"

in the collation process where results can be altered. The ongoing "Occupy NASS" protests highlight a growing public recognition that technology is the primary defense against electoral fraud ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)). **Internationalization of Internal Conflict** Nigeria's security crisis is no longer viewed as a purely domestic matter. The arrival of US troops and the introduction of US HR 7457 indicate that international actors are moving toward direct intervention and sanction-based accountability. This shift creates a "sovereignty vs. security" dilemma for the Nigerian government. While some welcome US assistance in bombing terrorist hideouts, others—like MACBAN—see it as an unjust "simplification" of complex ethnic and religious dynamics that could further destabilize the Middle Belt ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened political tension and potential civil unrest in Abuja and Kaduna as El-Rufai's supporters mobilize against the DSS and EFCC proceedings. The National Assembly will likely buckle under pressure from religious bodies to revise the 2027 election timetable, leading to an immediate delay in INEC's preparation schedule ([Source](#), [Source](#)). **Medium Term**

**(1-6 Months):** The harmonization of the Electoral Act will likely result in a compromised version of Clause 60(3), potentially retaining the Senate's manual backup proviso, which will trigger further litigation and public distrust. Capital importation may slow if the political elite's infighting begins to affect macroeconomic policy consistency or investor risk perception ([Source](#), [Source](#)). **Long Term (1-5 Years):** If the US HR 7457 is passed and MACBAN is sanctioned, expect a significant shift in Fulani-herder relations and a possible rise in retaliatory ethnic militia activity across the Middle Belt. Structural changes in the power sector, with states independently regulating electricity, could lead to an uneven industrial landscape where "solar clusters" in the north thrive while the national grid continues to struggle ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Security Integration:** US and international partners should ensure that troop deployments are matched with transparent bilateral agreements to protect Nigeria's territorial integrity and avoid fueling "sovereignty" narratives used by political actors ([Source](#)).

- **Reparations Dialogue:** The AU resolution on colonialism as genocide will likely strain relations with former colonial powers; diplomatic missions should prepare for formal requests regarding artifacts and financial compensation ([Source](#)).
- **Electoral Monitoring:** International observers must pivot focus from just "polling unit" monitoring to "collation center" transparency, as legislative changes are specifically targeting the collation phase ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Compliance:** Companies must prepare for the "second month" of enforcement of new tax laws, ensuring technology-driven reporting systems are in place to avoid the opacity that NRS officials are now targeting ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
