Iran Negotiates for Survival in Geneva while Threatening US Naval Assets and Suppressing Anniversary Unrest

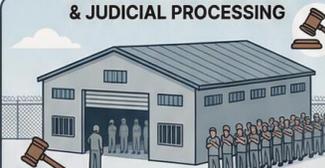

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IRAN NEGOTIATES FOR SURVIVAL
IN GENEVA WHILE THREATENING
US NAVAL ASSETS AND
SUPPRESSING ANNIVERSARY
UNREST

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 17, 2026, marked a day of extreme cognitive dissonance for the Iranian state, characterized by a high-stakes diplomatic effort in Geneva, aggressive military rhetoric from the Supreme Leader, and a domestic security apparatus struggling to contain the "Chehelom" (40th-day) mourning ceremonies for thousands killed in recent protests. In Geneva, Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi engaged in a second round of indirect talks with US representatives, including Jared Kushner and Steve Witkoff, mediated by Oman. While Araghchi reported a "common understanding" on "guiding principles," the gap remains vast, with Iran demanding the lifting of crippling sanctions in exchange for concessions, while the US—under pressure from Israel—seeks the total dismantling of Iran's nuclear infrastructure and severe limits on its ballistic missile program. Notably, the Iranian team has pivoted toward a "businessman's approach,"

offering the Trump administration an economic package that includes investment opportunities in Iran's energy and mining sectors to incentivize a deal.

Simultaneously, Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei delivered a defiant speech aimed at both domestic and international audiences. He dismissed US threats, claiming that for 47 years the US has failed to destroy the Islamic Republic and asserting that Iran possesses weapons capable of sinking the US aircraft carriers currently deployed to the region. Domestically, the regime is engaged in a sophisticated war of narratives. Khamenei attempted to co-opt the grief of the January 2026 massacre by classifying some victims as "martyrs" while labeling others as "seditionists" or "foreign agents." Despite these attempts at "grief management," reports from cities like Abadan, Mashhad, and Tehran indicate continued unrest, internet shutdowns, and a massive wave of arrests, with human rights organizations reporting over 53,000 detainees since the start of the current crisis.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Geneva Indirect Negotiations:** Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi met with the Omani mediator to exchange messages with a US delegation led by Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner. Araghchi reported progress on "general principles" but emphasized that drafting a final text remains difficult and time-consuming. Iran is reportedly offering an economic package to the US to secure a deal ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Khamenei's Naval Threats:** Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei publicly threatened to sink US aircraft carriers (USS Abraham Lincoln and USS Gerald Ford) currently stationed near Iranian waters, calling them "dangerous" but vulnerable to Iranian "secret weapons." He claimed Donald Trump is the latest in a line of US presidents who have failed to achieve regime change ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **The "Chehelom" Crackdown:** Security forces deployed heavily across Iran to prevent protests on the 40th day following the January 8-9 massacres. Clashes and gunfire were reported in Abadan, while Mashhad saw anti-government slogans during mourning rites. The government attempted to host its own "official" ceremonies to co-opt the narrative ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Massive Incarceration Totals:** The Human Rights Foundation reported that over 53,500 people have been arrested and more than 25,000 injured during the current wave of unrest. Reports indicate detainees are being held in non-standard facilities like warehouses belonging to the IRGC ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Digital Suppression and "White-Listing":** Technical analysts confirmed that Iran is moving toward a "white-list" internet model, where only government-approved traffic is allowed. Reports also detailed deep cooperation between Iran, China, and Russia to develop "anti-space" technology to jam Starlink satellite signals ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

- **Geopolitics:** The US has deployed the USS Gerald Ford to the region, adding to the USS Abraham Lincoln. Analysts view this as "leveraging military pressure" to force a diplomatic breakthrough. Iran, in response, conducted "Smart Control of the Strait of Hormuz" naval exercises, implicitly threatening global oil transit ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Domestic Stability:** The regime faces an "unhealable wound" following the January massacres. - **Economic Statecraft:** The Iranian delegation has explicitly offered US companies investment rights in energy and mining sectors. This is a strategic attempt to bypass the US Congress by appealing directly to Trump's interest in "America First" economic gains ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Critical Infrastructure:** Iran is readying a "switch" to completely disconnect from the global internet and transition to a national intranet during "security events." Reports indicate this infrastructure was tested during the January 18-19 blackout ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Legislation:**
 - **Cyber Protection Bill (Tarh-e Sianat):** Discussion of the "National System for Regulating Cyberspace," which provides the legal framework for the national intranet and criminalizes the sale/distribution of VPNs ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
 - **Espionage Punishment Law:** Passed following the "12-day war" (referencing a previous conflict), this law is being used to prosecute current protesters under charges of "War against God" (Moharebeh) and "Corruption on Earth" ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
 - **Note 48 of the Criminal Procedure Code:** This regulation restricts political detainees to a list of government-approved lawyers, which is being strictly and "illegally" enforced in Tehran courts ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:** The "National System for Regulating Cyberspace" (the rebranded Sianat bill) remains the primary legislative vehicle for digital suppression, granting the Supreme Council of Cyberspace and security agencies total control over bandwidth and access ([Source](#)).
- **HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:**
 - **Araghchi Press Conference (Geneva):** Announced agreement on "principles" but warned of a long road to a specific text ([Source](#)).
 - **Supreme Leader's Address to Tabriz Residents:** Categorized protest victims and issued military threats against US naval assets ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
 - **Senator Lindsey Graham Press Event (Tel Aviv):** Stated that US and Israeli goals are aligned and that both diplomatic and military paths lead to regime change ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Current policy is focused on the legal codification of digital isolation and the rapid-fire judicial processing of tens of thousands of detainees. The state is utilizing emergency "espionage" and "security" laws passed in the wake of recent military escalations to bypass traditional due process.

- **Cyber Protection Bill (Tarh-e Sianat):** Legally mandates the Ministry of Communications to identify and "disable" all censorship-circumvention tools (VPNs) and establishes the National Information Network as the "default" state for Iranian internet users ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

- **The Businessman's Gambit:** Iran has identified a perceived vulnerability in the Trump administration: the preference for "deals" over ideology. By proposing a package that benefits US mining and energy firms, Tehran hopes to create a rift between Trump and the US Congress/Israeli interests. Iran is not just buying Chinese hardware; it is adopting the Chinese "Sovereign Internet" model. - **Military Brinkmanship as Negotiating Leverage:** Khamenei's carrier-sinking threats and the IRGC's "Hormuz Control" drills are timed to coincide with Araghchi's presence in Geneva. The strategy is to signal that Iran is willing to risk a "scorched earth" regional war rather than accept a "surrender" deal. This suggests that the "pragmatists" in the Foreign Ministry and the "ideologues" in the Leader's office are playing a coordinated good-cop/bad-cop routine ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** High risk of tactical military "accidents" in the Persian Gulf as the USS Gerald Ford arrives and Iran continues its "Hormuz Control" drills. Expect a further surge in "sedition" trials and potentially the first wave of executions related to the January protests to serve as a deterrent ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The Geneva talks will likely hit a wall if Iran refuses to address its enriched uranium stockpile (approx. 440kg of 60% uranium). Trump may face an ultimatum from Netanyahu to end the "diplomatic hook" and engage the "military hook" if no breakthrough occurs within Trump's self-imposed one-month deadline ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** Structural "Sino-fication" of the Iranian internet will likely be complete, creating a permanent digital barrier between the regime and the global information flow. If the regime survives this mourning cycle, it will likely be as a more isolated, technologically-advanced surveillance state dependent on the Russia-China security orbit ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

- **For International Policy:**
 - **Security:** Naval commanders in the Persian Gulf should prepare for "asymmetric swarming" tactics and the use of anti-ship ballistic missiles, as signaled by Khamenei's carrier threats ([Source](#)).
 - **Diplomatic:** Policy makers should treat Iran's "economic package" with skepticism; it is likely a tactical ploy to create US domestic division rather than a sign of genuine regional realignment ([Source](#)).
 - **Human Rights:** International bodies must demand access to the "non-standard" detention centers (warehouses) where tens of thousands of Jan 2026 protesters are reportedly being held without legal counsel ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **For Private Sector/Investors:**
 - **Regulatory Risk:** Any attempt by US firms to engage with Iran's proposed mining/energy package faces extreme legislative risk in the US Congress, where anti-regime sentiment is at a historic high ([Source](#)).
