DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 17, 2026, marks a pivotal moment of strategic convergence where the formal architecture of international security is fraying while the internal economic realities of the Russian Federation reach a point of public friction. The expiration of the New START (SNV-3) treaty on February 5 has left the world's two largest nuclear powers without formal limitations for the first time in over half a century, coinciding with a "Doomsday Clock" nearing midnight. Against this backdrop, a third round of peace negotiations has commenced in Geneva. However, the return of Vladimir Medinsky to lead the Russian delegation suggests a pivot toward ideological and historical demands rather than a technical resolution to the conflict. While the Trump administration pushes for a rapid settlement, the Kremlin appears to be playing for time, using historical grievances to stall substantive progress on a ceasefire.

Domestically, the Russian state is facing a quiet but pervasive crisis of "war attrition." Massive hikes in utility (ЖКХ) rates—described by some analysts as a "hidden war tax"—have triggered a rare wave of public outcry across the regions. This economic pressure is compounded by new forensic allegations from five European nations claiming that opposition leader Alexei Navalny was poisoned in prison with Epibatidine, a rare toxin derived from South American frogs. Simultaneously, in Central Asia, the power dynamic is shifting; Kyrgyzstan is undergoing a brutal internal purge of its security apparatus (GKNB), signaling the end of the Japarov-Tashiev "tandem," while Kazakhstan attempts a delicate balancing act by investigating pro-war figures for mercenarism while continuing to deport anti-war Russian dissidents back to Moscow.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Geneva Peace Talks Resume with Shift to Ideological Demands:** A three-party negotiation (Ukraine, Russia, USA) began in Geneva in a closed-door format. Russia replaced its military intelligence representative with historical advisor Vladimir Medinsky, signaling a return to political and territorial ultimatums rather than technical discussions on troop withdrawal ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Formal Nuclear Limitation Era Ends:** Analysts highlight that as of February 5, 2026, the New START treaty has officially expired without a successor. For the first time in 50 years, the US and Russia are operating without mutual inspections or warhead caps, as China rapidly expands its arsenal toward 1,500 warheads ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Forensic Escalation in Navalny Poisoning Allegations:** On the two-year anniversary of his death, reports from laboratories in Germany, France, the UK, Sweden, and the Netherlands claim to have found traces of Epibatidine, a neurotoxin, in Navalny's bio-materials. The Kremlin has dismissed this as a "Western information dump" ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Public Outcry over Russian Utility Price Surge:** Residents in multiple Russian regions reported January utility bills increasing by 50% to 100%. Economic analysts label this a "hidden tax" to fund military expenditures and compensate for decaying infrastructure that the state has failed to repair over 25 years ([Source](#)).
- **Kyrgyzstan Security Purge Following Tashiev's Exit:** Following the removal of GKNB chief Kamchybek Tashiev, a massive "cleansing" of the security services is underway. Arrested officers are being identified in media by bizarre underworld-style nicknames (e.g., "Vaseline," "Licker"), suggesting a breakdown in formal institutional culture ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Kazakhstan's Legal Dualism:** Authorities in Astana have launched an investigation into popular comic Nurlan Saburov for "mercenarism" after he provided motorcycles to the Wagner Group. Simultaneously, Kazakhstan continues to deport Russian anti-war activists, demonstrating a volatile "multi-vector" policy ([Source](#)).
- **F-16 Foreign Volunteer Squadron in Ukraine:** Reports indicate the formation of an F-16 squadron in Ukraine composed of retired Dutch and American pilots. Though officially denied by some quarters, the reports suggest a move to bypass the lack of experienced local pilots ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Geopolitics and International Relations

- **US Mediation Pressure:** President Trump continues to apply public pressure on President Zelensky to "sit at the table" immediately, warning that the window for a deal may close. However, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio remains skeptical of Russia's actual intent to end hostilities ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Russian-Iranian-Chinese Cooperation:** Iran is conducting naval exercises in the Strait of Hormuz with Russia and China, even as it conducts "indirect" nuclear talks with the US in Geneva ([Source](#)).
- **Western Pilot Integration:** The presence of Dutch and US pilots in Ukraine signals a deepening of NATO-standard military integration, moving from equipment transfer to direct personnel "volunteering" ([Source](#)).

Domestic Stability & Social Order

- **The "War Tax" Friction:** The Russian populace is beginning to feel the direct cost of the war through utility inflation. This is creating a rare point of unity across political lines, with even Kremlin-allied politicians like Sergey Mironov criticizing the hikes ([Source](#)).
- **State Censorship and Digital Control:** Russia has officially begun the transition to a "sovereign internet" by removing RFE/RL, YouTube, and WhatsApp from its national Domain Name System (DNS), ensuring that even with a VPN, users receive a "site does not exist" error ([Source](#)).

- **Taliban Class Segregation:** The Taliban's new criminal code in Afghanistan has introduced formal class-based legal protections, where religious elites (Mullahs, Ulama) receive significantly lighter punishments than common citizens for the same crimes ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Corruption & Governance

- **Transparency International Index:** Russia's score has plummeted to 22 points, driven by centralized, non-transparent military spending and the crushing of independent oversight. By contrast, Moldova and Armenia are showing modest improvements through Western-aligned reforms ([Source](#)).
- **Ukrainian Energy Corruption:** Former Ukrainian Energy Minister German Galushchenko is facing a multi-million dollar bail hearing regarding the "Medas" money laundering case, highlighting ongoing domestic struggles with institutional integrity despite the war ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Legislation in Russia is trending toward the total centralization of executive power and the neutralization of digital privacy. Meanwhile, Afghanistan's new legal code signals a transition from "decree-based" rule to a formalized system of religious and gender-based apartheid.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Russian Communication Law Amendments (Blocking Power):** The State Duma passed amendments in the second and third readings allowing the FSB to block mobile and internet connections solely on the President's order, without needing to prove a security threat. - **Taliban Criminal Procedure Code:** A 58-page document signed by Hibatullah Akhundzada. HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Geneva Summit Press Briefing:** Dmitry Peskov cautioned against expecting a "breakthrough" on Day 1, emphasizing the closed-door nature of the talks ([Source](#)).
- **Crocus City Hall Sentencing Request:** Prosecutors have formally requested life sentences for 15 of 19 defendants in the 2024 terror attack, as well as the stripping of Russian citizenship for those who provided logistical support ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Weaponization of History

A recurring theme is the Russian state's use of 18th-century analogies to justify current geopolitical outcomes. By referencing the 21-year war with Sweden, the Russian delegation in Geneva is signaling that it is prepared for a "generational" conflict if its territorial gains are not recognized. Economic "Shock Therapy" and the Escapism Economy

As real wages stagnate and utility costs explode, the Russian state is fostering an economy of "cinema escapism." Record box office numbers for Soviet-era remakes like "Cheburashka 2" and "Prostokvashino" indicate a population that is increasingly retreating from a grim present into a sanitized, fairy-tale version of the past. Cultural analysts suggest this "cinematic anesthesia" is a deliberate governance strategy to maintain social order as infrastructure begins to fail ([Source](#)).

The End of the Nuclear Taboo

With the expiration of SNV-3, the rhetoric of nuclear deterrence is shifting. The transcripts suggest a growing fear that Russia may resort to "non-traditional" delivery systems like the Burevestnik or Poseidon due to concerns about the "survivability" of its standard ICBM fleet. The entry of China as a primary nuclear peer has turned a bilateral standoff into a tri-

lateral race, significantly increasing the risk of accidental escalation ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): We expect increased domestic arrests in Russia following the Navalny poisoning report, as the state moves to prevent "anniversary" protests from gaining momentum. In Geneva, expect a "stalemate communiqué" where parties agree only to further prisoner exchanges while remaining far apart on "energy truces" or the "shadow fleet" issue ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The impact of utility hikes will likely manifest in regional budget crises as arrears grow. In Kyrgyzstan, President Japarov will likely consolidate total control, potentially moving to formalize his ability to run for a third term despite the constitutional court's current "two-term" ruling. Ukraine may see a more aggressive air campaign if foreign-piloted F-16s are used to target Russian long-range aviation ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Long Term (1-5 Years): Without a new nuclear treaty, we are entering a period of rapid warhead expansion. China will likely reach warhead parity with the US and Russia by 2030. Within Russia, the continued neglect of utility infrastructure in favor of military spending will likely lead to major regional environmental and humanitarian disasters (e.g., mass heating failures in Siberian cities) ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- **Security:** Prepare for a "no-inspections" nuclear environment. Intelligence agencies must shift from cooperative monitoring to high-resolution satellite and signals intelligence to track Russian and Chinese mobile ICBM movements.
- **Diplomatic:** The forensic evidence in the Navalny case should be used to apply secondary sanctions on the Russian military laboratories (GOSNIIOKHT) that are currently bypassing sanctions via international scientific exchange programs.
- **Regional:** Central Asian states like Kyrgyzstan and Kazakhstan should be monitored for internal instability as the Russian "elder brother" narrative increasingly conflicts with local nationalist sentiments.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Logistics Risk:** The fuel crisis in Cuba and potential instability in the Strait of Hormuz present immediate risks to tourism and oil supply chains. Diversify routing away from Russian-Iranian coordinated naval zones.
- **Regulatory Compliance:** Total digital sovereignty in Russia means that any remaining Western software or data services are now subject to immediate FSB interception without judicial review. Data residency within Russia is now a critical security liability.

- **Infrastructure Exposure:** Avoid investments in Russian heavy industry or regional utilities. The current "under-investment" in pipes and power grids is a systemic risk that will lead to unplanned outages and "force majeure" events in the coming winters.
