## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 17, 2026, marked a stark transition from Lithuania's Independence Day celebrations to a day of significant political and legal turbulence. The domestic landscape was dominated by the Special Investigation Service (STT) interrogating two former Prime Ministers, Saulius Skvernelis and Gintautas Paluckas, as special witnesses in separate cases involving corruption and illicit enrichment. These probes into high-ranking political figures, including the current leader of the Democrats "For Lithuania" and a prominent Social Democrat, signal a potential shift in the political hierarchy and have already begun to inflict reputational damage on their respective parties. This domestic instability occurs as Lithuania continues to assert its Western alignment, with President Gitanas Nausėda reinforcing that the country's democratic path is irrevocable despite mounting "hostile

forces" attempting to re-establish imperial influence ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

On the international front, diplomatic efforts to resolve the war in Ukraine transitioned to Geneva, where Ukrainian, Russian, and American delegations met for a third round of talks. However, optimism remains low as Russia concurrently launched massive strikes on Ukrainian energy infrastructure, and the appointment of Vladimir Medinskis—a figure associated with Kremlin-centric historical revisionism—to lead the Russian delegation was interpreted by Kyiv as a deliberate delay tactic. Simultaneously, the European Union is debating a total ban on shipping Russian oil, a move that faces internal resistance from maritime-dependent members like Greece and Malta. In the Middle East, tensions escalate as the U.S. and Iran engage in indirect talks via Oman in Geneva, while the Trump administration maintains a dual-track strategy of diplomacy backed by a significant military buildup in the Persian Gulf ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **High-Level Political Corruption Probes:** The STT interrogated former PM Saulius Skvernelis regarding corruption in the State Plant Service and former PM Gintautas Paluckas regarding illicit enrichment. Skvernelis is considering his future as party leader, while Paluckas resists calls to suspend his party membership ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Geneva Peace Talks Impasse:** A new round of Ukraine-Russia-US negotiations began in Geneva. Ukraine remains skeptical of Russia's intent following energy infrastructure attacks and the selection of Vladimir Medinskis as the Russian negotiator. Trump expressed hope for a quick resolution, while the EU seeks a seat at the table ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **LRT Governance Dispute:** A Seimas working group is debating changes to the LRT law, specifically the threshold for dismissing the broadcaster's head. This follows European Parliament concerns regarding potential political interference in Lithuanian public media ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **EU Sanctions Escalation:** The EU is proposing a total ban on shipping services for Russian crude oil. While revenue from Russian oil and gas has dropped significantly, experts warn that maritime bans could harm European shipping industries and may be bypassed via "shadow fleets" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Safety and Infrastructure Crises:** Lithuania faced a tragic spike in fire-related deaths (5 in 24 hours) attributed to heating malfunctions. Separately, a lighting bar collapsed on spectators during a concert at the recently reconstructed Agila Cultural Center in Nida, which notably lacked a final construction completion certificate ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Historic Olympic Achievement:** Alpine skier Andrejus Drukarovas secured 22nd place in the slalom at the Milano-Cortina Winter Olympics, the highest ranking in Lithuanian history for the sport ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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- **Corruption & Governance:** The simultaneous interrogation of Skvernelis and Paluckas represents a critical stress test for political ethics in Lithuania. Skvernelis's status as a "special witness" prevents immediate charges but has prompted discussions within his party about leadership changes. The probe into the State Plant Service reveals allegations of systematic bribery for phytosanitary certificates ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Geopolitics:** Lithuania is aggressively pushing for a "Military Schengen" to remove bureaucratic barriers for NATO troop movements across European borders. Officials estimate Lithuania needs at least €1 billion to address critical infrastructure gaps for military mobility ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **International Relations:** The Trump administration's engagement with Hungary's Viktor Orban, including promises of financial support if his party faces electoral challenges, highlights a diverging U.S. policy toward European "illiberal" leaders compared to the broader EU consensus ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Economic Statecraft:** 21% of Lithuanian residents have submitted requests to withdraw from the second-tier pension pillar since January, following a change in law. This reflects significant public skepticism toward private pension funds or a pressing need for immediate liquidity ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Domestic Stability & Social Order:** A major drug trafficking case involving 4.7 kg of Alprazolam (Xanax) was sent to court, notably involving a prominent biomedical doctor, highlighting the penetration of criminal activity into professional sectors ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Legislation:**
  - LRT Law: Proposed amendments regarding the dismissal of the director-general and the creation of a management board ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
  - Administrative Fines: Proposal to increase fines for purchasing sex services tenfold (up to €1,600) to deter demand ([Source](#)).

## LEGISLATION/POLICY

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Current legislative focus remains divided between tightening internal administrative penalties and adapting to EU-level concerns regarding democratic standards. Key debates involve the degree of political control over public media and the balance between punitive drug laws and professional medical practices ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **LRT Law Amendments:** Concerns the governance structure of the national broadcaster. The working group must present drafts by February 24. Currently, 2/3 of the council is required for dismissal; the group is debating if this threshold should be lowered or if the grounds for dismissal (public interest) need clearer definition ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Prostitution Demand Suppression Bill:** Proposed by MP Birutė Vėsaitė, it seeks to raise fines for buyers of sex to €100-€1,600. Critics argue it lacks accompanying social support for victims ([Source](#)).
- **EU Maritime Oil Ban:** A proposed EU-level regulation to prohibit all shipping services (insurance, bunkering, logistics) for Russian crude oil to tighten the existing price cap mechanism ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **STT Press Briefing (Post-Interrogation):** Saulius Skvernelis addressed the media after his one-hour interrogation, claiming the probe is a "blow" to his party and outlining three potential paths for his political future ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **National Emancipation Day Ceremony:** Speeches delivered from the Signatarų Namai balcony focused on women's political representation and the "systemic" barriers remaining in the labor market ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### The Architecture of "Simulated Diplomacy"

A recurring theme is the skepticism surrounding high-level peace talks. Former Foreign Minister Gabrielius Landsbergis and current Ambassador Linas Linkevičius both characterize current negotiations as an "imitation" or "time-wasting" exercise. The synthesis of re-

porting suggests a dangerous parallel to the 1938 Munich Agreement, where temporary territorial concessions (Sudetenland then, Donbas now) are proposed in the vain hope of sating an aggressor. The inclusion of Mediniskis by Russia is seen not as a gesture toward settlement, but as a commitment to a historical narrative that denies Ukrainian statehood, effectively weaponizing history at the negotiating table ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## Reputational Contagion in the Elite

The Lithuanian political center is facing a "reputational contagion." The targeting of Skvernelis and Paluckas simultaneously suggests that the STT is moving against the "old guard" of the 2010s-2020s. Political analysts note that even without formal charges, the visual of a party leader entering an STT office is enough to alienate undecided voters. This is exacerbated by the "Foxpay" investigation and the illicit drug manufacturing case involving a doctor, creating a public perception of a pervasive "professional criminal class" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## The Fragility of State Infrastructure

A pattern of state capacity failure is emerging. Fatal fires during cold snaps are historically common, but the rise in deaths compared to 2025 (29 vs 15) points to a failure in public safety education or equipment (*dūmų detektoriai*). The Nida Agila incident is even more damning for the government: a flagship cultural project, six years in reconstruction, was being used for public events without a safety certificate. This reflects a "delivery at all costs" mentality that bypasses regulatory safeguards ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect Saulius Skvernelis to either resign or face a vote of confidence within the Democrats "For Lithuania" on February 23. The Geneva talks are unlikely to produce more than a basic prisoner swap agreement. Surveillance of Lithuanian airspace for "Lukašenka's hybrid balloons" will likely lead to further Vilnius Airport closures ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The 20th EU sanctions package will likely be watered down to appease Greek and Maltese shipping interests. Lithuanian domestic politics will see a surge in "populist" sentiment as reitings for mainstream parties (Social Democrats and Democrats) fall due to the STT investigations. Infrastructure spending for "Military Schengen" will become a dominant budget debate ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** The precedent set by the "special witness" probes into PMs may lead to a more aggressive judiciary but could also fuel political polarization. If the U.S. continues to push for Ukrainian territorial concessions, Lithuania may seek even closer defense ties with Nordic-Baltic (NB8) partners to hedge against a perceived softening of U.S. NATO commitments ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Security:** NATO allies should prioritize funding for the "Military Schengen" projects in the Baltics, as current infrastructure cannot support rapid heavy armor deployment ([Source](#)).

- **Diplomatic:** EU members should resist U.S. pressure for a "quick deal" in Ukraine if it does not include ironclad security guarantees, as Lithuanian experts warn this only provides Russia with an "atokvėpis" (breathing room) for future aggression ([Source](#)).
- **Institutional:** European monitors should increase oversight of Lithuanian public media legislation to ensure the "LRT working group" does not implement changes that allow for executive control under the guise of "public interest" ([Source](#)).

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Risk:** Investors in Lithuanian agriculture and phytosanitary logistics should conduct deep audits of their local permits, given the "systemic corruption" identified in the State Plant Service ([Source](#)).
- **Compliance:** European shipping and insurance firms should prepare for significantly higher compliance costs if the EU total ban on Russian oil transport is adopted, particularly regarding the identification of "shadow vessels" ([Source](#)).
- **Standardization:** Construction and engineering firms in the Baltic region face heightened scrutiny following the Agila center failure; strictly adhering to "final completion" certificates is now a high-priority legal safeguard ([Source](#)).
