DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 18, 2026, was defined by a high-stakes diplomatic deadlock in Geneva, as trilateral negotiations between Russia, Ukraine, and the United States (led by the Trump administration's special envoys) concluded with mixed signals. While military-technical groups reported progress on ceasefire monitoring mechanisms, political discussions stalled due to rigid Russian demands, including territorial recognition of occupied Donbas and "external management" of Ukraine. The Russian delegation, led by Vladimir Medinsky, appears to be utilizing historical grievances and unrealistic ultimatums to delay substantive progress, reflecting a broader strategy of attrition. Simultaneously, Russian President Vladimir Putin has been absent from the public eye for over 10 days, with the Kremlin deploying "canned" footage—exposed by discrepancies in office plants and officials' manicures—to simulate

his presence during what may be a period of personal or political retreat.

Beyond the frontline, the Eurasian region is undergoing a period of intense structural tightening. Russia is accelerating its transition toward a "sovereign internet," with impending total blockages of Telegram and the mandatory adoption of a national DNS system designed to isolate the domestic information space. Central Asian states are navigating their own crises: Kyrgyzstan is conducting a massive "personnel purge" within its security services following the dismissal of the powerful Kamchybek Tashiev, while Uzbekistan faces social backlash over environmental regulations banning older vehicles. The convergence of these events suggests a region bracing for prolonged conflict, where digital and physical borders are hardening, and elite power structures are being aggressively reshuffled to ensure regime survival in a post-globalization landscape.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Geneva Peace Negotiations Reach Partial Stasis:** Trilateral talks in Geneva involving the U.S. (Steve Witkoff, Jared Kushner), Ukraine (Rustem Umerov), and Russia (Vladimir Medinsky) concluded with a disconnect between technical and political tracks. Military technical experts have reportedly agreed on ceasefire monitoring protocols, but political agreements remain out of reach due to Russian demands for territorial concessions and Ukrainian resistance to any plan perceived as a "surrender." - **Putin Absence and Kremlin "Canned" Media Strategy:** Investigative reports have confirmed that Vladimir Putin has not appeared in real-time for over 10 days. The Kremlin has been releasing pre-recorded "canned" meetings, identified by inconsistencies in the physical environment (plants) and the appearance of officials (Vice-Premier Golikova's changing manicure). - **Impending Nuclear Arms Control Collapse:** The expiration of the New START (SNV-3) treaty on February 5th has left the world's two largest nuclear powers without formal deployment limits for the first time in half a century. Analysis indicates a high probability of an arms race, with technical capabilities allowing the U.S. and Russia to rapidly triple warhead counts on existing delivery systems. - **Russian Digital Sovereignty and Telegram Crackdown:** Russian authorities are moving toward a "total blockage" of Telegram by April 1st, citing foreign intelligence access to military communications. The state is aggressively promoting "Max," a domestic alternative linked to the Putin family through shareholders like Mikhail Shelomov and the Sogaz insurance company. - **Purge of Kyrgyz Security Services (GKNB):** Following the dismissal of Kamchybek Tashiev, the GKNB is undergoing a significant "cadre cleaning." High-ranking officers with criminal-style nicknames ("Vaseline," "Licker," "Pito") have been arrested on corruption charges, signaling a major realignment of power within the Japarov administration. - **Taliban Codifies Class and Gender Segregation:** A new 58-page criminal procedure code issued by Mullah Haibatullah Akhundzada has institutionalized a tiered justice system where elites (Ulama and the wealthy) receive lighter punishments than ordinary citizens. The code also formalizes "gender apartheid," providing drastically lower penalties for domestic violence against women compared to minor civil infractions. ([Source](#))

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Geopolitics and International Relations

- **Armenia's Western Pivot:** Armenia continues to distance itself from the CSTO (ODKB), recently signing nuclear cooperation agreements with the U.S. to reduce energy dependence on Russia. Kremlin media has responded with aggressive rhetoric, labeling the Pashinyan government "satanic" and "hostile," mirroring pre-invasion narratives used against Ukraine. ([Source](#))

Domestic Stability and Social Order

- **Russia's "War with the Dead":** In St. Petersburg, activists are being threatened with "extremism" charges for maintaining "Last Address" memorial plaques for victims of Stalinist repressions. - **Xenophobia in Ufa:** A violent knife attack by a radicalized teenager on Indian medical students in Ufa has sparked international tension. Students report a systematic climate of fear and lack of police protection, threatening Russia's strategic goal of recruiting labor from South Asia. ([Source](#))

Economic Statecraft and Energy Security

- **Russian Economic Stagnation:** Analysis from CSIS characterizes Russia as a "second or third-tier economic power" with a growth rate of only 0.6% in 2025. The country remains absent from the top 100 global tech companies and is significantly behind in AI development. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Cuban Fuel Crisis:** A total fuel import collapse has stranded thousands of Russian tourists on the island. The crisis is being used by Kremlin propaganda to prepare the domestic audience for the "surrender" of Cuba to U.S. influence, citing the high cost of supporting distant allies during the war in Ukraine. Corruption and Governance

- **Transparency International Index:** Russia's corruption score dropped to 22 points, attributed to centralized management and the lack of an independent civil society. Corruption is described not as a malfunction, but as the "system" itself. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Recent legislative activity in the region focuses on consolidating state control over information, formalizing social hierarchies, and enforcing environmental or labor standards through coercive measures. Major policy shifts were observed in the Taliban's Afghanistan and Russia's Duma.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Taliban Criminal Procedure Code:** A new 58-page legal framework that formalizes "class segregation" and "gender apartheid," offering mitigated punishments for the religious and social elite. ([Source](#))

The Digital Iron Curtain: Monetizing Isolation

Russia's pivot from Telegram to "Max" and the strengthening of the national DNS system represents a strategic merger of "digital sovereignty" and elite enrichment. By forcing

the population onto platforms controlled by the "nominal" billionaires of the Putin family (like Shelomov) and the Kovalchuk media empire, the state is creating a closed-loop system where data control and profit are inextricably linked. Eurasian "Cleaning" Cycles

The simultaneous reshuffles in Turkmenistan and Kyrgyzstan indicate a broader Eurasian trend of "regime hardening." This suggests that as the war in Ukraine drags on, neighboring autocracies are preemptively purging their ranks to prevent internal coups or fragmentation as Russian influence becomes more volatile and less reliable as a security guarantor. STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks):

- Expect social unrest in Uzbekistan to intensify as the February vehicle ban affects the livelihoods of thousands of small-scale transporters. ([Source](#))
